





Legal Authorization

The Administrative Office of the Courts was established by 10 Delaware Code, Chapter 1, during the 1971 General Assembly.

Duties

The Administrative Office of the Courts serves as the focal point for coordination and communication concerning all court administrative activities in the judicial system. The office prepares budgets for the Supreme Court and the Court of Chancery and assists in preparation of the budgets of the Public Guardian and the Law Libraries. It administers the payment of all jurors and The AOC is largely responsible for the acquisition of witnesses. space or facilities for the judicial system, and is responsible for the supervision of lease negotiations and the payment of all rentals. The Administrative Office has assumed a role of general supervision over and assistance to the Alderman's Courts. It has primary responsibility for the acquisition, supervision, and administration of federal funds received to assist the court system. Together with the Statistical Analysis Center, the Administrative Office of the Courts is developing a computerized judicial information system. Also, the AOC acts as the focal point between the court system and other government agencies on the local, state, and federal levels.

Personnel

The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware.

The Director may, with the approval of the Chief Justice, appoint such assistants and clerical personnel as are required.

The staff of the Judicial Planning Committee is operationally part of the Administrative Office of the Courts.

### Legal Authorization

The Supreme Court was created by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I.

### Geographic Organization

The Supreme Court has statewide jurisdiction and sits in Dover.

## Legal Jurisdiction

The Court has final appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases in which the penalty exceeds certain minimums and in civil cases as to final judgments and certain other orders of Superior Court, Chancery Court, and Family Court. Appeals are heard on the record. The Supreme Court has jurisdiction to issue writs of prohibition, quo warranto, certiorari, and mandamus.

### Judges

The Supreme Court consists of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, who are appointed by the Governor on a bipartisan basis with the consent of the Senate. The Justices are appointed for 12-year terms and must be learned in the law.

#### Support Personnel

The Chief Justice is responsible for the administration of all courts in the state and appoints a Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts to manage the non-judicial aspects of court administration.

### Caseload Trend

The number of appeals filed in the Court remains at an extremely high level. During fiscal year 1978, a total of 361 civil and criminal appeals were filed - just one fewer than last year and an increase of more than 180% over the same period ten years ago. The number of pending cases increased to 329 at the end of FY 1978, the highest total ever. The Court has finally been expanded to 5 Justices, and this should enable it to cope with the increased workload; however, staff in the office of the Clerk of the Court has not increased since 1965.





# Court of Chancery

## Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, authorizes the Court of Chancery.

# Geographic Organization

The Court of Chancery holds court in Wilmington, Dover, and Georgetown, that is, at one location in each county in the county seat.

### Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Chancery has jurisdiction to hear and determine all matters and causes in equity. The general equity jurisdiction of the Court is measured in terms of the general equity jurisdiction of the High Court of Chancery of Great Britain as it existed prior to the separation of the American Colonies. The General Assembly may confer upon the Court of Chancery additional statutory jurisdiction. In today's practice, the litigation in the Court of Chancery largely consists of corporate matters, petitions concerning trusts, estates, and other fiduciary matters, disputes involving real property such as boundary and title disputes, and commercial and contractual matters. When issues of fact to be tried by jury arise, the Court of Chancery may order such facts to trial by issues at Superior Court.

# Judges

One Chancellor and two Vice-Chancellors hold the Court of Chancery. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the majority of the Senate's elected members for 12 year terms. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors must be learned in the law.

### Support Personnel

The Chancellor may appoint court reporters, bailiffs, criers or pages, and law clerks. Each of the judges may appoint one office secretary.

An elected Register in Chancery of each county is Clerk of the Court of Chancery for the county. The Judges appoint one Chief Deputy Register in Chancery in each county.

The Register of Wills acts as a Clerk of the Court of Chancery for probate matters. The majority of the Register's former judicial and quasi-judicial powers are now held by the Court of Chancery. A Register of Wills is elected in each county for that county. The Chancellor names a Chief Deputy Register of Wills for each county.

### Public Guardian

The Chancellor has the duty to appoint the Public Guardian. The Public Guardian serves, when appointed by the Court, as the guardian of the person and/or property of the aged, the mentally infirm and the physically incapacitated. Under the law, the Public Guardian is intended to be the guardian of last resort.

# Caseload Trend

All three categories of work handled by the Court of Chancery (civil cases, miscellaneous matters, and estates) experienced increases in the number of filings in FY 1978. The number of statewide civil cases filed increased from 368 to 400, an 8.7% rise. The number of miscellaneous matters filed in Delaware during FY 1977 was 613, an increase of 14.4% from the previous year's total of 536. The number of estates opened increased from 1,700 in FY 1977 to 1,744 in FY 1978, a 2.6% upward change. The numbers of pending cases in each category at year's end also increased by amounts ranging from 2.5% to 5.7%.

# Public Guardian

#### Legal Authorization

The authority for the Office of the Public Guardian is derived from Title 12, §3991, of the Delaware Code:

"There is established the Office of the Public Guardian. The Chancellor shall appoint the Public Guardian, who shall serve at his pleasure. The salary of the Public Guardian shall be \$18,500.00 per annum, to be paid from the General Fund. The Chancellor, in his discretion, may require the Public Guardian to post bond.

#### Geographic Organization

The Office of the Public Guardian has responsibility for the entire state and presents its petitions for guardianships in the Court of Chancery in all three counties.

#### Legal Jurisdiction

The powers and duties of the Public Guardian are spelled out in Title 12, §3992, of the Delaware Code:

"The Public Guardian, when appointed as guardian by Court Order, shall:

- Serve as guardian for the property of aged, mentally infirm or physically incapacitated persons, pursuant to §3914 of this Title;
- Serve as a guardian for the person of aged, mentally infirm or physically incapacitated persons where such persons are in danger of substantially endangering their health, or of becoming subject to abuse by other persons, or of becoming the victim of designing persons; or,
- 3. Serve as both guardian of the person and of property of such person."

The intent of the legislation creating the Office of the Public Guardian was to create a guardianship capability for those situations in which a person needing a guardian does not have any relative, friend, or other person interested in or capable of serving as a guardian, whose estate is insufficient to purchase the services of a private guardian, or who would be best served by a neutral guardian.

#### Personnel

The Public Guardian is assisted by an administrative assistant and a secretary.

#### Caseload

In the year of operation July 1, 1977 to June 30, 1978, the office received 159 referrals, almost double the total of referrals

in FY 1977. Of this number, 13 were determined to need the services of the Public Guardian as a guardian, and petitions were presented in the appropriate counties. As of June 30, 1978, the Public Guardian had responsibility for a total of 41 wards - 28 in New Castle County, 4 in Kent, and 9 in Sussex.

The remaining 146 cases were determined not to need guardianship for the solution of their problems and were served by mobilizing the resources of other state and private agencies to aid the client, involving the family of the client, helping the client to take some voluntary action on his own behalf, or simply offering counselling to help the client solve his own problems.

# Superior Court

#### Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, created the Superior Court.

#### Geographic Organization

Sessions of Superior Court are held in each of the three counties at the county seat.

#### Legal Jurisdiction

Superior Court has statewide original jurisdiction over criminal and civil cases, except equity cases, over which the Court of Chancery has exclusive jurisdiction. The Court has exclusive jurisdiction over felonies and drug offenses (except most felonies and drug offenses involving minors and except possession of marijuana cases).

Superior Court has jurisdiction over adoptions and terminations of parental rights and also over involuntary commitments of the mentally ill to the Delaware State Hospital. The Court serves as an intermediate appellate court, hearing appeals on the record from the Court of Common Pleas, Family Court, administrative agencies such as the Industrial Accident Board, Unemployment Insurance Appeal Board, Alcohol Beverage Control Commission, Tax Appeal Board, Zoning and Adjustment Boards, and other quasi-judicial bodies. Appeals from Alderman's Courts, Justice of the Peace Courts, and Municipal Court are heard as trials de novo (second trials) in Superior Court. Appeals from Superior Court are argued on the record before the Supreme Court.

#### Judges

Number: There are eleven judges appointed to the Superior Court bench; one is appointed President Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and three are appointed as Resident Judges and must reside in the county in which they are appointed.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Superior Court Judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: The judges must be learned in the law and must be members of the Delaware Bar.

#### Support Personnel

Superior Court may appoint court reporters, law clerks, bailiffs, presentence officers, a secretary for each judge, and other personnel.

An elected Prothonotary for each county serves as Clerk of Superior Court for that county. The Prothonotary is the recordkeeper for Superior Court, and as such, the Prothonotary is directly involved with the civil court alendar. The office handles the jury list, property liens, registration of law students and attorneys, and is the custodian of fees for the courts and for the Attorney General. Administratively, for example, the New Castle County Prothonotary's office is divided as follows: Civil, Criminal, Indexing and Entry of Judgements and Executions, Administrative, and Terminations and Adoptions. Further, the Prothonotary's office is charged with the security, care and custody of Court's exhibits.

#### Caseload Trend

Superior Court was able, in FY 1978 to dispose of 83.2% of its criminal cases in New Castle County (79.5% statewide) within 120 days of arrest, the time interval specified by the Chief Justice's Speedy Trial Directive. The Court was able to achieve this rate because the Court controls its own criminal calendar through the Case Scheduling Office and the Criminal Office Judge, and because of the policy in New Castle County of regularly assigning 5 of New Castle County's 8 judges to criminal matters and 3 to civil matters. The total number of criminal cases filed in Superior Court declined by 19.6% over the previous year, in part due to increased preindictment screening of defendants by the Attorney General's office. Superior Court held 370 criminal trials in FY 1978, an average of over 30 per month. The Court disposed of more criminal cases than were filed, and thus was able to reduce the number of pending cases statewide by 11.1%

However, Superior Court's emphasis on criminal cases has continued to handicap its efforts to deal with its civil jurisdiction. The court experienced a 2.4% rise in the number of filings statewide, and while the Court disposed of slightly more cases in FY 1978 than it did in FY 1977, it was not able to dispose of as many cases as were filed. Thus, the number of civil cases pending adjudication rose by 7.4%. Projections show that the number of civil filings in the court will continue to rise over the next several years. Even excluding the effects of any increases, it is estimated that Superior Court needs two additional judges to give the Court the resources to deal as adequately with civil cases as it does with criminal cases.

FISCAL YEAR 1978 CRIMINAL FILINGS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. All figures represent numbers of defendants only; they should not be confused with numbers of indictments, numbers of cases, criminal action numbers, or any other such figures.
- 2. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment, so that an individual named in 3 indictments is counted as 3 defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series of informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day is counted as one defendant.
- 3. In Kent County only, each charge indicted against each defendant is returned as a separate indictment. Due to this practice, each person indicted at a Grand Jury session is counted as one defendant, no matter how many charges are indicted against that defendant, and without regard to later actions of the Attorney General which lead to separate trials.
- 4. Informations represent defendants who have waived indictment.
- 5. Transfers are defendants brought before the Court of Common Pleas in New Castle County who request jury trials. Since the Court of Common Pleas in Kent and Sussex Counties itself holds jury trials, there are no transfers in those 2 counties.
- 6. Although New Informations are given separate criminal action numbers by Superior Court, they are not counted in these figures since they represent amendments to charges facing defendants already pending before the court, not new defendants. Inclusion of New Informations as filings would artificially inflate the number of defendants filed in any time period.
- 7. Reinstatements represent defendants who have had their cases disposed of who are brought back before Superior Court for one of the following reasons: -Mistrial
  - MISCITAT
  - -Hung jury
  - -Motion for new trial granted
  - -Guilty plea withdrawn
  - -Lower court appeal reinstated after being dismissed
  - -Conviction overturned by Supreme Court; remanded to Superior Court for new trial

- All figures represent numbers of defendants only; they should not be confused with numbers of cases, criminal action numbers, or any other such figures.
- 2. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment; an individual named in three indictments is counted as 3 defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series of informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day is counted as one defendant.
- 3. The trial dispositions refer to the number of defendants whose charges were disposed of at a trial, not the number of trials per se. The date of disposition is the trial date, unless the decision is reserved, in which case it is the date when the opinion is handed down.
- 4. A defendant is counted as being disposed of by nolle prosequi only if all charges in an indictment or information or all charges transferred or appealed simultaneously are dropped. If a defendant pleads guilty to one charge in an indictment, and other charges in the same indictment are then nol-prossed, that defendant is considered to have been disposed of by guilty plea, and his disposition date is the date of the plea.
- 5. Defendants are not counted as disposed of by nol-pros if the nolle prosequi was filed to an original charge because the defendant entered a guilty plea to a New Information. Since the New Information is a further action in an existing case and is not counted as a separate filing, so also the nol-pros is not the primary disposition. Counting a defendant as nolprossed and as having entered a plea to a new information would mean counting two dispositions for one case.
- 6. Only nol-prosses filed for defendants who were actually brought before Superior Court by indictment, information, appeal, transfer, or reinstatement are counted in the total number of Superior Court dispositions. Nolle prosequis of unindicted defendants are listed separately because such defendants were never formally before the Superior Court. Counting them as dispositions would be erroneously counting dispositions for cases which were never filed.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES (CONTINUED)

- 7. Remands are defendants who appealed or transferred their cases to Superior Court and had them remanded back to lower court.
- 8. ADRR's and remands do not constitute the dispositions of all appeals that are filed; some are disposed of by trial de novo, plea, or nolle prosequi.
- 9. Unindicted nolle prosequis are felony or drug defendants who were arrested and were bound over to Superior Court by a lower court either because probable cause was found or because the defendant waived preliminary hearing. The Attorney General then decided not to seek indictment or the grand jury ignored the indictment and a nolle prosequi was filed. Unindicted nolle prosequis are not counted as dispositions because they are not counted as filings until an indictment or information is filed.

- "PG-All" means that the defendant pled guilty to every charge facing him. These pleas of guilty are the only ones not pleabargained.
- "PG-Most Serious" indicates that the defendant pled guilty to the major charge of a multi-count indictment, appeal, transfer, or reinstatement.
- 3. "PG-LIO" denotes that a defendant pled guilty to a lesser included offense of the most serious charge.
- 4. "PG-Lesser" indicates a plea of guilty to a lesser charge of the same indictment or other filing.
- 5. "PG-LIO-Lesser" means that the defendant pled guilty to a lesser included offense of a lesser charge of a multi-count indictment or other filing. This is the weakest type of plea.
- "PG-NI" indicates that a defendant pled guilty to a new information - always a less serious charge than the original one.
- 7. "PG-Information" denotes a defendant who waived indictment and pled guilty to an information filed by the Attorney General. This is always a reduced charge.
- 8. Pleas of guilty to amended informations (PG-AI) are counted in with the PG-LIO's.
- 9. A plea of nolo contendere is considered to be the equivalent of a guilty plea; e.g., a plea of nolo contendere to an LIO is counted in with the PG-LIO's.





- 1. The numbers of Judge Days Assigned to criminal trial work are determined in the following manner. One judge is assigned to be Criminal Office Judge and one to be Civil Office Judge; they manage their respective calendars and do not hear criminal trials. No trials are assigned to Fridays, which are used for arraignments, motions, sentencings, and civil miscellaneous matters by all judges. Vacation days and holidays are removed from the schedule. The remaining time is trial time, approximately 65% of which is assigned to the criminal calendar, and 35% to the civil calendar.
- 2. Trial time is computed in  $\frac{1}{2}$  day increments, with the luncheon recess considered to be the dividing point.
- 3. When more than 100% of assigned time is used, the extra time is found in one or more of three ways: 1) using the Criminal Office Judge to try criminal cases, 2) using Fridays to try criminal cases, or 3) transferring judges from the civil to the criminal calendar.

FISCAL YEAR 1978 PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. The Speedy Trial Directive of Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann states that all criminal defendants brought before Superior Court should be tried within 120 days of arrest.
- 2. The Elapsed Time charts measure the average and median time intervals between arrest and disposition, and the average and median time intervals between indictment and disposition. Since Superior Court cases do not all originate by indictment, it is not possible to subtract the figures for indictment to disposition from the figures for arrest to disposition to determine preindictment time intervals.
- 3. In measuring the elapsed time of defendants for the purposes of computing compliance with speedy trial directives or average elapsed time, Superior Court excludes the following time intervals:
  - a. For all capiases, the time between the date the capias is issued and the date the capias is executed.
  - b. In the case of arraignment capiases, the interval between the execution of the capias and arraignment.
  - c. In the case of trial capiases, the time between execution of the capias and the first scheduled trial date.
  - d. For all Rule 9 Summonses and Rule 9 Warrants, the time between arrest and indictment, if any.
  - e. In the case of Rule 9 Warrants, the interval between indictment and arrest.
  - f. In the case of Rule 9 Summonses which are superseded by Rule 9 Warrants, the full interval between indictment and arrest.
  - g. For all nolle prosequis, all time between the scheduled trial date and the actual filing date of the nolle prosequi.





- 1. Complaints are suits for damages. The Complaints category includes Complaints for Damages, Condemnations, Ejectments, Appeals from Justice of the Peace Court, Appeals from Arbitration Panel, Declaratory Judgments, Foreign Judgments, Replevins, Foreign Attachments, Domestic Attachments, Interpleaders, Transfers and Removals from the Court of Chancery, and Transfers and Removals from the Court of Common Pleas.
- 2. Mechanic's Liens and Mortgages are property suits.
- 3. Family Court assumed jurisdiction over Divorces in November, 1975. During FY 1978 the last three Divorce cases pending in Superior Court were disposed of.
- 4. Terminations and Adoptions are parental rights cases.
- 5. Involuntary Commitments are proceedings held to determine whether individuals shall be involuntarily committed as mentally ill. Because Delaware State Hospital, the state's facility for mentally ill patients, is located in New Castle County, all Involuntary Commitment hearings are held in New Castle County.
- 6. Appeals are appeals on the record. This category includes Appeals from Administrative Agencies, Appeals from Family Court, Appeals from the Court of Common Pleas, Appeals from Municipal Court, and Certioraris.
- 7. Miscellaneous includes all other cases. During FY 1978 this category consisted of Complaints Requesting Order, Consent Orders, Habeus Corpus, Mandamus, Writs of Prohibition, Writs of Possession, Bail Forfeitures, Petitions for Destruction of Indicia of Arrest, Petitions to Compel Satisfaction of Judgment, Petitions to Extend Judgment, Petitions to Satisfy Mortgage, Petitions to Set Aside Mortgage, Petitions to Set Aside Sheriff's Sale, Petitions for Redemption, Petitions for Issuance of Subpoena, Petitions for Appointment of Attorney, Out of State Depositions, Out of State Subpoenas, Petitions for Return of Property, Petitions to Vacate Public Road, Road Resolutions, and Tax Ditches.

LAW LIBRARIES

There are three Law Libraries located in the State of Delaware, staffed and maintained by state funds and each presided over by a Law Librarian. The libraries are named after the counties in which they are situated.

The primary function of the Law Libraries is to provide a legal information center for the Judiciary, Public Defender's Office, legal representatives of counties and municipalities, city solicitors, and members of the Delaware Bar. They are also the official depositories for state laws, administrative regulations, and court rules. The libraries are made available to registered law students to assist them in preparation for state bar examinations and in their legal education. All three libraries are designated as official depository libraries by the U.S. Government Printing Office. As state-supported agencies, the libraries are available to the general public during normal working hours. Aid and assistance is rendered to persons wishing to make use of the facilities.

The New Castle County Law Library, located in the Public Building, Wilmington, Delaware, is the busiest of the three libraries. It houses in excess of 20,000 books and there is presently seated working space for 26 persons at one time. The facility is maintained and administered by one full-time Law Librarian and one part-time assistant. The Kent County Law Library, due to its location, is designated as the State Library. It houses the largest legal library maintained by the state and is staffed by one full-time librarian and one part-time assistant. The Sussex County Law Library is staffed by one Law Librarian and houses over 13,000 volumes.

All three libraries are currently in need of space for expansion due to the growing number of volumes. In addition, the Kent and Sussex libraries have recently experienced physical problems - leaking roofs in Kent and structural difficulties in Sussex.

The Law Librarians are responsible for administrative library work as well as maintaining the bookkeeping records required by the State. These duties and responsibilities include but are not limited to the following: insertion of pocket parts, maintenance of loose leaf service bookkeeping for the agency's accounts, preparing invoices for library expenditures, filing and indexing reported and unreported opinions from the several courts, obtaining and filing copies of rules and regulations promulgated by the governmental agencies, maintaining of books and their monetary values, obtaining and filing statutes from the legislative council and other states, handling requests from various persons for information contained in the library, handling special requests for research work from the judges, planning and recommending development and improvement of services, writing reports, and performing other duties associated with library work.

# Family Court

#### Legal Authorization

The Family Court Act, Title 10, Chapter 9, Delaware Code, authorizes the Family Court.

#### Geographic Organization

The Family Court is a unified statewide Court with branches in New Castle County at Wilmington, Kent County at Dover, and Sussex County at Georgetown.

#### Legal Jurisdiction

The Family Court has broad civil and criminal jurisdiction over domestic relations matters and over juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) who are dependent, neglected, or delinquent.

Domestic relations jurisdiction includes divorces and annulments, property settlements, separate maintenance of spouses, custody and visitation of children, non-support of dependents, and actions involving family discord.

Matters heard in the interest of a child include neglect, abuse, abandonment, and contribution to the delinquency of a minor, and juvenile delinquency.

The Family Court does not have jurisdiction over adults charged with felonies nor juveniles charged with first degree murder, rape, and kidnapping.

Appeals are made, usually on the record, to Superior Court, except divorce and support cases, which are appealed on the record to the Supreme Court.

#### Judges

Number: There are 12 judges of equal judicial authority; one is appointed Chief Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and the remaining 11 are Associate Judges.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Family Court judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: Judges must have been duly admitted to the practice of law before the Supreme Court of Delaware at least five years prior to appointment and must have a knowledge of the law and interest in and understanding of family and child problems. They shall not practice law during their tenure and may be reappointed.

#### Other Judicial Personnel

The Chief Judge appoints and commissions suitable persons, who must have resided in the State for at least five years prior to appointment, to act as masters in the Court. Masters may hear any matter properly before them, and their decisions become judgments of the Court unless disapproved by a judge. Parties may request a review de novo by a judge, by petitioning in writing within 15 days of the master's decision.

#### Support Personnel

The Family Court employs a staff of approximately 219 persons in addition to the judiciary. As of October 31, 1978, 198 of these were state-funded and 21 federally-funded. The staff includes clerks of court, judicial secretaries, counselors, accounting personnel, clerks, clerk-typists, bailiffs, and process servers.

#### Caseload Trend

The Family Court's caseload has maintained a steady rise. Not only has the caseload increased in volume but it has also increased in complexity due to the divorce jurisdiction added in November, 1975 and the Mandatory Sentencing Law declared constitutional in December, 1977.

In the three years between 1975 and 1978, the workload of Family Court increased by a total of 20.3%. The projected increase from 1978 through 1983 ranges from 15.9% to 23.7%.

During FY 1978, arraignments, Arbitration, and the Criminal and Delinquency (C&D) Calendar resulted in more efficient case processing and a better use of judicial, prosecutorial, and defense counsel resources. In the present fiscal year (1979), the work force has been expanded by approximately 8 positions and the judiciary increased to 12.







#### COURT OF COMMON PLEAS

#### Legal Authorization

The statewide Court of Common Pleas was created by 10 Delaware Code, Chapters 13, 15, and 16, effective July 5, 1973.

#### Geographic Organization

The Court of Common Pleas sits in each of the three counties at the respective county seats.

#### Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Common Pleas has statewide jurisdiction which includes concurrent jurisdiction with Superior Court in civil actions where the amount involved, exclusive of interest, does not exceed \$5,000 on the complaint. There is no limitation in amount on counterclaim. All civil cases are tried without a jury.

The Court has criminal jurisdiction over all misdemeanors occurring in the State of Delaware except drug-related cases (other than possession of marijuana), and those occurring within the corporate limits of the City of Wilmington. It also is responsible for all preliminary hearings. Jury trial is available to all defendants but in New Castle County jury trials are referred to Superior Court for disposition.

#### Judges

There are five Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, one Chief Judge and four Resident Judges. The Judges are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate for 12 year terms and must have been actively engaged in the general practice of law in the State of Delaware for at least five years. No more than a majority of one judge may be from the same political party.

#### Support Personnel

Personnel are appointed by the Chief Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, and consist of a Court Administrator (Chief Clerk), one Chief Deputy Clerk for each county, and such other employees as are necessary, including Bailiffs, Court Reporters, Secretaries, Clerks, Presentence Officers, ctc.

#### Caseload Trend

The number of civil and criminal cases filed in the Court of Common Pleas continues to rise as it has year after year. It is interesting to note that the civil case filings in Kent County have risen by 41% and in Sussex County by 37.8%, while in New Castle County there has been a drop of 20.4%. This is the first time there has been a decrease in the number of civil case filings in this Court in New Castle County. The Court does not feel, however, that this is an indication of a trend. It should be noted that in Fiscal Year 1977, Sussex County experienced a drop of 42.3%, yet in Fiscal Year 1978, Sussex County experienced an increase of 37.8%. The Court is still convinced that the case filings will continue to increase.

It is interesting to note the new experience of this Court in dealing with preliminary hearings. Approximately 2,200 preliminary hearings have been disposed of within the first six months without disturbing the Court's other calendars or incurring any additional expense.

It was anticipated that the Court's space limitation problem would be solved by this time, however, the matter has now been complicated by the inability of the State and City to resolve the availability of the City end of the Public Building for court expansion.

# Municipal Court

#### Legal Authorization

The Municipal Court of the City of Wilmington is authorized by 10 Delaware Code, Section 1701.

#### Geographic Organization

The Court has jurisdiction within the geographic boundaries of Wilmington.

#### Legal Jurisdiction

Municipal Court has criminal jurisdiction over traffic, misdemeanor, and municipal ordinances concurrent with the Justices of the Peace and the Court of Common Pleas. The Court conducts preliminary hearings for both felonies and drug-related misdemeanors. Jury trials are not available. The court has a Violations Division which processes all moving and parking citations.

#### Judges

Number - There are 3 Judges of the Municipal Court of Wilmington.
Appointment - The Judges are appointed by the Governor, with the approval by the Senate.
Tenure - Judges are appointed for 12 year terms.
Qualifications - The Judges must be licensed to practice law in the State of Delaware for 5 years preceding appointment.

#### Support Personnel

The Chief Judge of the Municipal Court appoints a Chief Clerk who may in turn appoint Deputies.

#### Caseload Trend

The Municipal Court criminal caseload approached 9,000 cases in FY 1978. This workload has kept the personnel of the Court working at maximum capacity to meet the demands of a constant flow of cases. Two public defenders, four court commissioners, several prosecutors, and the three judges have barely kept pace with this workload. A near-record of 9,044 dispositions during the year permitted the Court to meet the stringent demands of processing misdemeanors and Superior Court Rule 5 committing magistrate requirements.

The activity of the court personnel is only partially reflected in these statistics. The court commissioners - working 24 hours of every day - in fact process far more than the final criminal case statistic. The commissioners process an average of 100 Family Court complaints monthly as well as rejecting a substantial number of cases for lacking probable cause. The increasing demand in time required by judges, commissioners, and staff may require increasing the number of each to handle these new demands.

Municipal Court was also faced with a 46.9% increase in the number of traffic offenses during FY 1978. 16,238 cases - an alltime high and nearly 5,200 more than the previous year - were filed during FY 1978. As a result of the vast influx of new cases, the number of pending charges increased by over two-thirds to 1,632 by the year's end. 





10-YEAR WORKLOAD TREND TRAFFIC CASES







## Justice of the Peace Courts

4

#### Legal Authorization

The Justice of the Peace Courts are authorized by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I.

#### Geographic Organization

The jurisdiction of the Courts is statewide and sessions are held throughout the state. 14 Courts are currently operating: 6 in New Castle County, 3 in Kent County, and 5 in Sussex County.

#### Legal Jurisdiction

The Justice of the Peace Courts have jurisdiction over civil cases in which the amount in controversy does not exceed \$1,500. In all Justice of the Peace Courts except 2 in New Castle County, criminal jurisdiction is exercised. JP Courts are authorized to hear minor misdemeanors and motor vehicle cases (excluding felonies) and may act as committing magistrates for all crimes. Since Justice of the Peace Courts are not courts of record, appeals may be taken de novo to Superior Court. The subject matter jurisdiction of the Justice of the Peace Courts is shared with the Court of Common Pleas.

## Justices of the Peace

The Delaware Code authorizes a maximum of 53 Justices of the Peace, 24 in New Castle County, 12 in Kent County, and 17 in Sussex County. Magistrates are appointed by the Governor with Senate confirmation for four-year terms. A Justice of the Peace must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the State of Delaware and the county in which he serves.

#### Support Personnel

A Deputy Administrator for the Justice of the Peace Courts is appointed by the Governor with Senate approval. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court is the nominal Administrator. During the current vacancy of the Deputy Administrator, the JP Courts are administered by the Administrative Office of the Courts under the supervision of the Chief Justice. Two Assistant Deputy Administrators serve the JP Courts exclusively. The state provides chief clerks, deputy clerks, constables, bailiffs, and presentence officers for the courts.

#### Caseload Trend


On July 1, 1976, the beginning of FY 1977, new laws permitting summons in Jieu of arrest for traffic violations and payment by mail of traffic fines went into effect. Prior to that year, no criminal case could be disposed of without a personal appearance by the defendant. The new laws had a drastic effect on the number of court appearances. Individual courts varied, but on the whole, the total number of JP dispositions increased by 12.4%, to 110,576 in 1977 from 90,389 in 1976. However, the number of appearances - cases where the defendant 'or parties) actually appeared in court declined by 14.1% to 84,5 0 in 1977 from over 98,000 in 1976. Thus, 12,187 traffic viol tors chose not to appear in court at all, but simply mailed in their fine. Where fines are mailed in, no action is required on the part of the magistrate, although the same work is necessary on the part of the court clerks.

In FY 1978, the total number of JP cases remained at a high level, 110,779 (a 0.2% rise from the previous year). Actual appearances - in other words, cases requiring actual magistrate time showed a 24.9% drop over the previous year, down to 63,464. Thus, in the two years of the new laws, workload ostensibly has increased from 98,000+ to 110,000+, an 11.7% gain. In fact, magistrates actually heard only 63,464 cases in FY 1978 compared to 98,389 two years previously - a drop of nearly 35,000 cases, or 35.5%. Clerical work has remained the same but actual JP work has declined by over a third.

The number of civil cases, where no reduction in court appearances is possible, has increased, reaching an all-time high of 15,844 cases filed during FY 1978. It should be noted that the Justice of the Peace Courts offer plaintiffs an inexpensive forum for litigating their minor legal matters. More litigants are also due to the increase of population within the counties, and this is particularly true in the landlord/tenant situation.

# Legal Authorization

Alderman's Courts are authorized by the town charters of their respective towns.

# Geographic Organization

Alderman's Courts have jurisdiction within their own town limits only. There are 14 Alderman's Courts currently active, plus another 3 courts which were not active during FY 1978 but which have been active in the recent past. When a town is without a court or an alderman for any period of time, its cases are transferred to the nearest Justice of the Peace Court.

# Legal Jurisdiction

The jurisdiction of an Alderman's Court is limited to minor misdemeanors, traffic offenses, parking violations, and minor civil matters. The specific jurisdiction of each court again varies with the town charter (which is approved by the state legislature). Many courts handle only traffic and parking violations; only 4 handle a high number of criminal cases. Harrington's court handles primarily civil cases. Appeals are taken de novo to Superior Court within 15 days of the trial.


# Aldermen

The selection, number, tenure, and qualifications of aldermen are determined by the towns themselves. Some require lawyers; others choose ordinary citizens. A few aldermen serve full-time, but most are part-time judges. In New Castle the mayor serves as judge of their court.

# Caseload Trend

FY 1978 was the third year during which complete workload statistics were collected. All 14 courts active during FY 1977 remained active in FY 1978, and no new courts were activated. 12 of the 14 courts active experienced increases ranging from 2% to 211%; only Newport and Fenwick Island declined in workload, the former by 21% and the latter by 27%. Overall, the total number of cases heard by aldermen in Delaware rose by over 1,200 - an 88% increase. Most Sussex County courts continue to have extremely seasonal fluctuations in their caseloads.





#### JUDICIAL CONFERENCE

#### Legal Authorization

The Judicial Conference is authorized by Supreme Court Rule 35.

#### Duties

The Judicial Conference studies the judicial business of the courts with a view towards improving the administration of justice in the State. The Conference also considers improvements in procedure, considers and recommends legislation, considers and implements the canons of judicial ethics, and holds symposia of the Bench and Bar.

#### Membership

The membership of the Conference includes the members of the Supreme Court, Court of Chancery, Superior Court, Court of Common Pleas, Family Court, and the Municipal Court of Wilmington. The Chief Justice is presiding officer of the Conference. The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts serves as secretary for the Conference. Scheduled meetings of the Conference are held on the first Wednesdays of December and June.

#### JUDICIAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

#### Legal Authorization

The Judicial Planning Committee (JPC) was created by Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann on December 20, 1976. Authorization for the expenditure of federal funds to support planning activities of the JPC is contained in Section 203(c) of Public Law 94-503, "The Crime Control Act of 1976."

#### Duties

The Judicial Planning Committee is charged with coordinating all requests for federal funds from the various courts to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. To this end, the JPC prepares an Annual Judicial Plan for the expenditure of such funds, and provides assistance in designing programs and preparing grant applications.

The Judicial Planning Committee's Advisory Subcommittee on Computerization has assumed the role of supervising and coordinating the ongoing computerization efforts of Delaware's court system.

#### Membership

Membership of the Judicial Planning Committee is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and includes judges from those state courts having criminal jurisdiction, plus the Attorney General and a representative from the Public Defender's Office. Current membership is as follows:

#### Support Personnel

A Director of Planning is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Judicial Planning Committee. The Planner may, with the approval of the Chairman, appoint such other personnel as are necessary.

#### COUNCIL ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

#### Legal Authorization

The Council on the Administration of Justice is authorized by 10 Delaware Code, §2001-2008.

#### Duties

The Council is charged with the continuous study of the administration of justice in the state, and of the organization, procedure, practice, rules, and methods of administration and operation of each and all the courts of the state, whether of record or not of record. The Council collects and uses statistical and other information concerning the work of the courts and makes recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, the courts, or the bar.

#### Membership

There are 15 members including the Chief Justice, the Chancellor, the President Judge of Superior Court, the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tem of the Senate, the Minority Leaders of the House and Senate, the Attorney General, the President of the Bar Association, the President of the University of Delaware, and five non-lawyers appointed by the Governor for a term coextensive with that of the appointing Governor. #### COURT ON THE JUDICIARY

Article IV, Section 37, of the Constitution of the State of Delaware created this Court, consisting of the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chancellor, and the President Judge of the Superior Court.

Any judicial officer appointed by the Governor may be censured, removed, or retired by the Court on the Judiciary for willful misconduct in office, willful and persistent failure to perform duties, commission of an offense involving moral turpitude, other misconduct in violation of the Canons of Judicial Ethics, or permanent mental or physical disability interfering with the proper performance of these duties.

No censure, removal, or retirement will be effective until the judicial officer has been served with written charges and has had the opportunity to be heard in accordance with due process of law.

The Court on the Judiciary has the power to:

(a) summon witnesses to appear and testify under oath and to compel production of other evidence, and

(b) adopt rules establishing procedures for the investigation and trial of a judicial officer.

#### PROJECTS SUPPORTED BY FEDERAL FUNDS

During the past fiscal year, Delaware Courts received continued support in the effort to improve the criminal justice system from the Delaware Criminal Justice Planning Commission (DCJPC), which is the state criminal justice planning agency (SPA) that administers the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) block grant allocation.

LEAA block grant funds were expended for the following purposes:

- 1. To offer an In-State Criminal Law Seminar. This subgrant provided funds to enable the American Bar Association Standards and Goals Implementation Committee to develop materials and conduct a seminar on the ABA Standards and Goals. This seminar focused on new court rules and rule changes in the various State courts.
- 2. <u>To employ a Detentioner Reporter</u>. This was a continuation of a subgrant which provided a person to collect data and produce reports on detentioners and prisoners awaiting criminal trial.
- 3. To employ a Courts Data Analyst. This was a continuation of a subgrant which provided the services of a person to support the Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts in making management decisions based upon statistical information. The Courts Data Analyst was primarily responsible for the development of statistics for the Annual Report of the Delaware Judiciary.
- 4. To provide Computer Terminals for the Courts. LEAA funds enabled the courts to rent 5 computer terminals for the courts, 2 in Superior Court, 1 in Family Court, and 2 in the Justice of the Peace Courts. The terminals enabled these courts to access the states automated criminal justice information system, which provides computerized criminal histories to aid the courts in bail and sentencing decisions.
- 5. To provide Personnel for the Presentence Office. This subgrant enabled the Superior Court Presentence Office to continue to employ a Presentence Officer and 3 clerk typists to respond to the increasing demand for the timely production of presentence reports.
- 6. To employ an Administrative Assistant to the Criminal Office Judge. This subgrant enabled Superior Court to continue to employ an Administrative Assistant whose primary responsibilities were to provide the Criminal Office Judge with the means to coordinate the efforts of the Case Scheduling Office with the available Judges and Courtrooms and to provide information to assist in "pre-trying" complex criminal trials.
- 7. To employ a Coordinator of Referral Services. This subgrant enabled the Family Court to continue to employ a person to refer juveniles charged for the first time with a minor crime to noncorrectional facilities.

- 8. To maintain the Detentioner Project. This subgrant enabled the Family Court to continue to employ 4 persons who supervised juveniles in the Court Detention Center while awaiting a hearing and screened Bridge House detainees for possible release to their families prior to Court hearing.
- 9. To establish an Arbitration Hearing Unit. This new subgrant aided Family Court in establishing an Arbitration Unit. Federal funds add a hearing officer, 2 interview officers, and a clerktypist to 4 state-funded personnel (2 hearing officers and 2 interview officers). The Arbitration Unit seeks to provide an arbitration mechanism for those first and second time offender juveniles and adults charged with misdemeanors, in order to divert defendants from further court involvement while still satisfying complainants and victims.
- 10. To provide a Case Coordinator. This subgrant enabled the Municipal Court to continue to employ the Case Coordinator, whose primary responsibility was to reduce the number of continuances in bringing cases to preliminary hearing or trial.
- 11. To provide Magistrates with Continuing Education. This grant provided orientation for newly appointed magistrates and ongoing education for all Justices of the Peace. The program was administered by the Delaware Law School.
- 12. <u>To provide Recording Equipment</u>. Federal funds supplied all Justice of the Peace Courts with audio recording equipment made necessary by a Supreme Court opinion requiring the tape recording of pleas and certain other procedures in the Justice of the Peace Courts.

Other federally funded programs were as follows:

1. Delaware Justice Information System (DELJIS)

Two systems analysts have been assigned to work with the Courts in the development of the courts module of the overall DELJIS program. One analyst is dedicated to the information system for family and juvenile matters and is assigned to Family Court; the second analyst is working on information requirements for adult criminal matters and is assigned to the Administrative Office of the Courts. The current design work is rederally funded from LEAA under the Offender Based Transaction Statistics/Computerized Criminal Histories (OBTS/CCH) component of the Comprehensive Date Systems (CDS) program.

- 2. <u>State Judicial Information System (SJIS)</u> LEAA has provided the Delaware Judiciary with a discretionary grant to aid in the development of its information system. This grant contains the money to purchase a minicomputer and supporting software to house the courts system, plus funds to hire a consultant to design the civil portion of the system for all the courts.
- 3. <u>Judicial Planning Committee</u> The Judicial Planning Committee (JPC) was created by Chief Justice

Daniel L. Herrmann during December, 1976 in accordance with the provisions of PL 94-503, which reauthorized LEAA for a period of three years. The Chief Justice appointed the Honorable Vincent A. Bifferato, Associate Judge of Superior Court, to serve as Chairman. In addition, judges from each of the various courts were appointed along with the Attorney General, a representative of the Public Defender's Office, and the Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts. The mission of the JPC is to plan for the improvement of the Delaware Courts, which includes planning for the utilization of federal block grant monies received through the Delaware Criminal Justice Planning Commission. The Reauthorization Act also provides funds to each participating state for the purpose of employing a professional planning staff, which must produce an Annual Judicial Plan and meet whatever additional federal requirements exist in order to ensure compliance with the Act.

#### 4. Public Guardian Caseworkers

The Public Guardian was able to hire two social workers to supplement his staff using federal Title XX, Social Security Act funds administered by the State Division of Social Services. The additional staff provided casework services to adults, including assessment of client needs, evaluation of client abilities, counselling, assisting clients in utilizing appropriate resources, and long-term follow up.

#### COURT RULES CHANGES

The following additions, deletions, or amendments were made to the rules of Delaware's courts during FY 1978. This material represents a synopsis of the changes, rather than verbatim copies of the rules themselves. The changes listed are those whose effective dates were between July 1, 1977 and June 30, 1978.

#### Supreme Court

RULE 10B (E) (1)

This rule, effective 12-27-77, states that private counsels appointed for public officers or state employees under this rule shall be paid for their services at the "ordinary and usual" rate for comparable cases in this jurisdiction as in accord with the rules of the Code of Professional Responsibility. When appointed counsel wishes to prosecute compulsory or permissive counter claims or cross-claims, he must obtain his client's permission to do so and shall apportion his fees accordingly. The public officer or employee represented by said counsel will be responsible for such apportioned fees and expenses unless the appointing Court otherwise orders.

RULE 33(2)

This amendment adds to Canon 9 of the Delaware Lawyers' Code of Professional Responsibility a new disciplinary rule 9-10 (D), effective 7-1-77, which states that a lawyer shall not engage in the private practice of criminal law while holding the position of Public Defender or Assistant Public Defender. This restriction applies to associates and partners of the lawyer as well.

#### Court of Chancery

#### RULE 3(BB)

This rule, amended on 7-1-77, breaks court costs into the categories of civil actions, trust accounting, Chancery minor and miscellaneous, and a miscellaneous category entitled "exhibit, veterans cases, Public Guardian cases". Costs for matters not covered by the rule shall be fixed by the Court. The Court may adjust costs for good cause.

#### Superior Court

#### CRIMINAL RULE 5(A)

Effective 5-31-78, this rule states that an officer or any authorized individual making an arrest shall take the arrested person be-

fore the nearest available Justice of the Peace of the county in which the offense is alleged to have been committed, or before a Justice of the Peace previously designated by the Chief Justice, or before a judge of the court from which the warrant was issued in accordance with the command of the warrant. For alleged offenses within the city of Wilmington, the arrested person is to be brought before a judge of the Municipal Court. Prior to the amendment, there was no provision for going before a Justice of the Peace previously designated by the Chief Justice. If the arrest is made without a warrant, a complaint must be filed to show probable cause.

#### CRIMINAL RULE 35(A)

Effective 6-8-78, this new rule deals with the preparation of the transcript for an appeal. In the case of an appeal under Supreme Court Rule 7 for any case in which there is a guilty verdict for a class A felony, or for any crime which has a mandatory minimum sentence of 3 years imprisonment, the appellant must deliver duplicate notice of appeal to the trial judge of Superior Court simultaneous with his service of notice of appeal upon the attorneys of record. The appellant shall attach to the notice of appeal a description of the portions of the proceedings he determines to be relevant for purposes of the appeal, so that the trial judge may determine which portions of the proceedings to include in the transcript. The appellant must clearly state in the description the reasons why such portions of the proceeding are relevant for purposes of the appeal.

If the trial judge is unavailable due to absence or disability, the notice of appeal shall be delivered to the criminal office judge. Should he also be unavailable, the notice of appeal is to be delivered to any Superior Court judge sitting in the county in which the case was tried.

#### CRIMINAL RULE 35 (B)

As of 9-12-77, the Court can reduce a sentence within 60 days of its imposition, or within 60 days of receipt of a mandate affirming judgment or dismissing an appeal, writ of error, or writ of certiorari. The reduction of sentence may occur after the 60 day limit only if application for such reduction is made within the 60 day limit. Formerly, the time limit was 4 months for reduction of sentence.

#### CIVIL RULE 64.1

Effective 4-5-78, Civil Rule 64.1 now states that save those cases when a Rule to Show Cause is required by statute, any matter brought before the court by Rule to Show Cause is to be initiated by motion after a complaint or petition has been filed and may be presented ex parte in regards to any person who has not appeared in the case. This requirement was not present in the former Rule 64.1.

A Rule to Show Cause may only be issued where required by statute. The order must give the return date and time, and the respondent

must answer or plea before that time. The Order also shall state whether a hearing upon the Rule will be held on the return date, and if not, what action the Court expects to be taken.

#### FORM 29

As of 4-15-78, this newly adopted form must be used for orders for hearings to determine if relief should be granted. The form shall give the time of the hearing and explain the proper action to be taken if one wishes to oppose the granting of the relief.

#### Family Court

#### RULE 140

This rule states that the Court may enter an interim order upon motion or request of any party following the filing of a petition or information, or upon the Court's own motion after notice to all parties. Where emergency circumstances exist, the Court may enter the order without notifying all parties. These orders may include the complete physical, mental, psychological, or psychiatric examination of any person within the Court's jurisdiction.

The Court will hear all motions for emergency relief and other interim relief. Application for such relief must include an affidavit clarifying the situation and stating the type of relief sought. Only in abnormal circumstances will oral testimony be permitted on applications for emergency or other interim relief. The previous rule did not make clear what information was desired on the affidavits.

#### RULE 460

This rule, newly adopted 1-1-78, lists the information required in an original petition for divorce or annulment. The Clerk will not accept a petition lacking the required information without prior approval of the Court.

#### RULE 461

Rule 461, adopted 1-1-78, deals with scheduling of hearings. Contested divorce and annulment proceedings shall be heard at a time scheduled by the Court. Uncontested divorces and annulment proceedings shall be heard each Thursday in each county at a time set by the Court. The Court may set a different divorce day prior to any regular divorce day. All motions will be heard at a time scheduled by the Court.

To schedule a contested case for a hearing, either party may notify the Clerk in writing, with notice to opposing counsel, that the

case is ready for trial and that a hearing is requested. The Court will schedule the case and give notice of the time and date of the hearing to each attorney, or to any party not represented by counsel.

To schedule an uncontested case for a hearing on a regular divorce day, the attorney for the petitioner shall notify the Clerk in writing at least 7 days in advance of the day he proposes. A copy of the notice must be given to the respondent's attorney or, if the respondent is not represented, but an answer has been filed, to the respondent.

#### RULE 462

This rule, adopted 1-1-78, deals with ancillary matters. Applications for hearing of incidental or collateral matters must be made by letter to the Clerk, with a copy to opposing counsel, no later than the date of the divorce. In the case of division of property or alimony hearings, the parties and/or attorneys shall exchange information, if ordered by the Court, at least 2 days before the hearing or pretrial conference.

The information required in a letter application or information exchange is listed in this rule.

#### RULE 463

Adopted 1-1-78, this rule covers joinder of actions. It states that prayers for alimony, property division, counsel fees and other ancillary relief as specified by statute may be included in the petition for divorce or annulment, if appropriate to the action. However, prayers for custody, visitation, or support of children must be the subject of a separate petition.

#### RULE 464

Rule 464 states that if any action is pending with no proceedings having taken place in the past 12 months, the Clerk of the Court shall, at the end of the one year, send a notice to the parties notifying them that the action will be dismissed by the Court unless proceedings begin within 30 days. If there are no proceedings initiated within thirty days after the mailing of the notice, the action shall be dismissed by the Court for lack of prosecution. Such action may also be dismissed at any time for want of prosecution by motion of any party. This rule was adopted on 1-1-78.

#### **RULE 465**

This new rule established, as of 1-1-78, a schedule of costs for action in Family Court. The rule also states that the Court may order a party to pay or reimburse some or all of the costs to the other party.

#### RULE 466

This new rule states that after the filing of a petition for divorce or annulment, jurisdiction may be acquired over respondent by any of the methods provided by statute. Pursuant to statute, jurisdiction may be acquired over respondent by issuance of a summons and service of documents by a process server or other deputy designated by the Chief Judge. The rule was adopted 1-1-78.

#### Court of Common Pleas

#### CRIMINAL RULE 37

This rule, effective 10-1-77, states that appeals to Superior Court from the Court of Common Pleas are to be governed by the rules of Superior Court.

#### Court on the Judiciary

#### RULE 3(C)

Effective 5-2-78, Rule 3(C) was amended to require that an investigation be completed in each case, including those in which the complaint has been withdrawn.

#### RULE 3(D)

Rule 3(D) was amended on 5-2-78 to include mention that failure by the judicial officer concerned to comply with the committee's request for written response for more than 15 days after the second request may be deemed to be an admission of the facts alleged in the complaint, unless the failure to respond is explained adequately.

#### The Delaware Lawyers' Code of Professional Responsibility

#### CANON 2

Effective November 22, 1977, the major changes in this canon occur in DR2-101, which deals with publicity. Guidelines are set for admissable advertising practices for lawyers, including what information a lawyer may publicize and what his obligations are. Information that is admissable for use in legal advertising includes relevant qualifications (such as educational background and work experience) plus a statement of costs. Additional acceptable information such as military service and membership in fraternal orders is delineated. A new section of the canon states that once a lawyer advertises his fee in

a publication, he is obligated to honor that fee for 30 days or until the next issue of the publication, whichever comes later. These changes provide the first comprehensive list as to what is acceptable information for use in legal advertising.

# Legislation

#### LEGISLATION

#### House of Representatives

#### HOUSE BILL 303

This bill makes amendments to the Delaware Code in sections referring to the custody, care, and treatment of delinquent, neglected and dependent children. The terms "delinquent child", "dependent child", "neglected child", and "family", are redefined.

The bill also makes changes in the disposition of "status offenders". A police officer may take into custody a child he believes to be dependent, neglected, or delinquent. An officer must notify the child's custodian, and should the custodian be unable to locate or to provide adequate care for the child or to accept the child, and if the child is not charged with a delinquent act, the Division of Social Services will be responsible for further pursuing the custodian or providing for the child in some facility appropriate for children. In the past, the child would have been taken directly before the Family Court. The child shall not be placed with delinquent children. The Division of Social Services shall release the child to the custodian's care or, if necessary, file with the Court a petition for custody alleging dependency or Should the child be charged with a delinquent act, the neglect. child shall go before the Court for a disposition. Police will file with the Court a sworn complaint alleging delinquency with a report explaining this belief.

The definition of endangering the welfare of a child is amended by adding the encouragement or assistance to a child to run away from his parents, guardians, or custodians, or the knowing illegal harboring of a child who has run away from home to the statute.

Family Court's jurisdiction is amended to include instances where:

 A member of a family alleges (previously only a husband, wife or other adult family member could so allege) that another family member is imperiling any family relationship by his actions, and petitions the Court for appropriate relief; or
 The Division of Social Services or a licensed youth service agency alleges that the conduct of a child, parents, custodian or any family member imperils any family relationship or serves to the disadvantage of a child, and petitions the Court for appropriate relief.

House Bill 303 was signed into law on 6/20/78 and became effective 90 days later (9/18/78).

#### HOUSE BILL 468

This bill prohibits sexual exploitation of children and material depicting children engaging in sexual activity. Sexual ex-

ploitation of a child is classified as a Class B felony. The bill also prohibits dealing in materials depicting a child engaging in a sexual act, and establishes the offense as a Class C felony. A repeat offender of the prohibition against sexual exploitation of children is to be charged with a Class B felony. A repeat offender of unlawful dealing in such materials is subject to life imprisonment. HB 468 was signed into law on 7/20/77.

#### HOUSE BILL 484

This bill transfers jurisdiction over preliminary hearings in felony cases from the Justice of the Peace Courts to the Court of Common Pleas. Hearings are to be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Criminal Procedure of the latter court. The bill became law on 6/26/78.

#### HOUSE BILL 528

This bill, which was enacted 6/27/78, deals with divorce and annulment actions as described in Title 13, Chapter 15. It serves to redefine such terms as "separation" and also to clarify the circumstances required in order to file a petition for divorce.

#### HOUSE BILL 551

This bill creates a new §2737, Title 25, labeled "Discharge of lien on payment into court or entry of security". This act insures that in a case which a mechanic's lien is filed, the defendant can have the lien removed by putting up security. This enables the person who has been sued to carry on business in a normal manner, and at the same time protects the plaintiff. This act was signed on 5/16/78.

#### HOUSE BILL 581

This bill, signed into law on 8/8/78, raises the number of Justices on the Supreme Court from three to five. It also provides that three of the Justices must be of one major political party while two Justices must be of the other major political party.

#### HOUSE BILL 660

House Bill 660, enacted 5/9/78, redefines the manner of disposition of fees received by the Court of Common Pleas. The bill states that all monies received by the Court are to be paid to the State Treasurer (as heretofore) except those provided by statue. Title 10, §1308(b) now requires all sheriff's costs and fees collected by the Court to be paid to the county treasurer or county

department of finance for distribution to the sheriff upon presentation of an itemized, verified account.

#### HOUSE BILL 769

This bill states that any person who drives on a public street or highway without having received a license or without having had a valid license reinstated after a period of suspension, revocation, or license denial shall be fined from \$50 to \$200 for the first offense and shall be fined from \$100 to \$500 and/or subject to imprisonment for up to six months for each subsequent offense. Any person who drives on a public street or highway in a class of motor vehicle for which he is not licensed or drives with an expired license shall be fined from \$10 to \$100 for the first offense and from \$25 to \$100 for each subsequent offense. HB 759 became effective 6/23/78.

#### HOUSE BILL 1098

This bill, which became effective on 7/11/78, deals with refusal by an individual who has been arrested for driving under the influence to submit to a chemical test. Any individual who fails to submit to a test shall have his license revoked for 1 year (an increase from the previous statute's 6 months). An individual has 14 days from the date he is notified of the intended revocation to demand a hearing before th. Secretary of Transportation. For the revocation to be upheld, the hearing must find that the police officer had reasonable grounds for arrest, the person was placed under arrest before being requested to take the chemical test, the officer informed the person that refusal to take the test would lead to the revocation of his license, and that the person did in fact refuse to take the test.

Penalty for conviction for driving under the influence is automatic license revocation for 1 year. The bill also offers a new alternative to the other penalties previously prescribed (fines and/or imprisonment) for driving under the influence. First offenders may now complete a course of instruction and/or a rehabilitation program for a period of not more than 6 months and pay a fine of not more than \$200. For subsequent offenses occuring within 5 years of the last offense, a person shall spend not more than 15 months in a rehabilitation program and pay a fine of not more than \$500. After 30 days have elapsed since an individual's conviction, the Secretary of Transportation may grant a conditional license to initial offenders if they have completed 8 hours of such course work and paid all costs.

#### HOUSE BILL 1102

This bill, enacted 9/15/78, increases the number of Family Court Judges from 11 to 12 and requires that there be an equal number of judges from each of the major political parties.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 68

House Joint Resolution 68, signed 6/13/78, creates a Judicial Pension Reform Committee, consisting of 9 members: 2 appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, 2 appointed by the Speaker of the House, 2 appointed by the Chief Justice, and 3 appointed by the Governor.

The Judicial Pension Reform Committee is responsible for recommending to the General Assembly and to the Governor realistic reforms in the nature of benefits payable to members of the Judiciary from the State Judiciary Retirement Fund, and reasonable adjustments in the level and manner of contributions made to the fun by members of the Judiciary.

#### Senate

#### SENATE BILL 159

This bill, enacted 1/31/78, states that a person convicted before an Alderman or Mayor has the right to appeal to Superior Court only if a sentence of at least one month imprisonment and/or a fine of at least \$100 is imposed. Formerly, all convictions were appealable. The bill also states that in all criminal cases in which the accused has the right to have his case transferred to the Court of Common Pleas, the Mayor or Alderman must advise the accused of that right to transfer before he can legally try the case.

#### SENATE BILL 161

As of 1/31/78, this bill serves to exempt the City of Newark from the statutory regulations of Title 11, §5303, which grants the accused the right to have his case transferred to the Court of Common Pleas in all criminal cases scheduled to be tried by a Magistrate, an Alderman, or a Mayor and where there may be a period of incarceration imposed.

#### SENATE BILL 223

Senate Bill 223, signed into law 6/29/78, amends the Delaware Code so as to permit Family Court to commit an 18 year old person

to the custody of the Department of Corrections even though he was charged while a juvenile. He may remain committed to the custody of the Department of Corrections until his 19th birthday.

#### SENATE BILL 291

Senate Bill 291 transfers jurisdiction over simple possession of marijuana from Superior Court to Municipal Court (in the City of Wilmington) and the Court of Common Pleas (elsewhere in the state). This bill was signed into law on 5/5/78.

#### SENATE BILL 306

Senate Bill 306, signed on 7/14/77, extended the reversion date from 6/30/77 to 6/30/78 for monies from the capital investment fund used to finance restoration of the old Sussex County Courthouse.

#### SENATE BILL 455

This measure, enacted 7/8/78, provides a supplemental appropriation of \$225.05 to the Justice of the Peace Courts to correct a salary underpayment caused by a promotion.

#### SENATE BILL 471

Effective 7/11/78, this bill lowers, from 21 to 18, the minimum age required for a merchant, store supervisor, agent, or employee of the merchant to be able to detain a person who he suspects was shoplifting without fear of civil or criminal liability for such detention.

#### SENATE BILL 502

This bill provides a supplemental appropriation of \$6,800 to the Justice of the Peace Courts for casual and seasonal salaries and wages. It was signed on 6/19/78.

#### SENATE SUBSTITUTE 1 FOR SENATE BILL 552

Senate Substitute No. 1 for Senate Bill 552, signed 6/30/78, provides a supplemental appropriation to the judicial branch in the amount of \$110,113 for the purpose of providing additional operating funds for FY 1978.
