

Profile of State Prison Inmates:

Sociodemographic Findings
from the 1974 Survey of Inmates
of State Correctional Facilities

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Preface

This report discusses certain demographic and socioeconomic characteristics of the inmates of State correctional facilities. It presents major findings from the Survey of Inmates of State Correctional Facilities, conducted in January 1974 for the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Designed to complement the Census of State Correctional Facilities, taken in the same month, the survey elicited from a representative sample of inmates in State correctional systems extensive information on their demographic and socioeconomic background, criminal and correctional history, adjudication experience, and prison routine. Within these broad areas, detailed information was obtained on preincarceration employment and income, on drug use, on offenses for which confined, on length of sentences, and on parole patterns of repeat offenders. Preliminary findings from the survey were published in an advance report in March 1976.

The approach used in this report was to examine the inmates' demographic and socioeconomic characteristics in relation to one another and to selected criminal characteristics to determine the type and extent of major relationships between them. The variables used most consistently throughout this study were race, offense, and the number of sentences an inmate had served during a lifetime. Because statistical measures were not used to determine the strength of these relationships, the tables used for analysis are limited to crossings of two, or sometimes three, variables.

The Survey of Inmates of State Correctional Facilities encompassed all persons held in custody under the jurisdiction of correctional authorities in the several States. It therefore included not only those inmates detained in facilities directly administered by State correctional systems, but also those in any public or private institution charged with the custody of persons under the jurisdiction of State correctional authorities. Examples of the latter are inmates committed to State mental hospitals and inmates housed in YMCAs while assigned to work-release programs. This scope differentiates the survey from the annual National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) study, *Prisoners in State and Federal Institutions*, as well as from the special NPS Census of Prisoners, conducted on June 30, 1973; both of these were limit-

ed to inmates with a maximum sentence of more than 1 year and covered only inmates housed in facilities directly administered by State correctional systems.

All statistical data in this report are estimates subject to errors arising both from the use of information obtained from a sample survey rather than a complete census and from the recording and processing mistakes that invariably occur in the course of a large-scale data collection effort. As part of the discussion on the reliability of estimates, these sources of error are treated in the Methodology section of this report. This section also provides technical information on the design and size of the sample that was used and on the estimation procedure. It should be noted that, with respect to the effect of sampling errors, estimate variations can be determined rather precisely. In this report's major findings, statements involving comparisons have met statistical tests which indicate a probability of at least 95 percent that each difference described did not result solely from sampling variability. Estimates of less than 300, and proportions derived therefrom, were considered to be statistically unreliable, and hence were not used as the basis for any statement. Standard error tables are given in Appendix D.

The Survey of Inmates of State Correctional Facilities was undertaken as part of the NPS program. Based on a voluntary reporting system, the NPS program was instituted to collect and interpret data on State and Federal correctional institutions and their inmates. The program was initiated by the Bureau of the Census in 1926 and was transferred to the Bureau of Prisons in 1950 and to LEAA in 1971. Since 1972, the Bureau of the Census, acting as collecting agent for LEAA, has had the responsibility for compiling and analyzing the statistical data.

IMPORTANT

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Background

On January 31, 1974, an estimated 191,367 persons were being held as adult or youthful offenders under the jurisdiction of State correctional authorities in the United States. Of these, 187,487, or 98 percent, were serving sentences. The remaining 3,880 had not received sentences. These unsentenced inmates were mainly drug addicts committed for treatment under civil narcotics or dangerous drug statutes in lieu of being sentenced, persons committed for study and observation prior to sentencing, individuals awaiting trial or release on bail, or detainees being held for other authorities.

Region of incarceration

More than twice as many inmates were incarcerated in the South (87,135) as in any of the other three regions.¹ Furthermore, the South's share of the total prisoner population (46 percent) considerably exceeded its share of the total U.S. civilian population (32 percent). The North Central Region accounted for the second largest number of inmates (37,277), followed by the West (35,011), and the Northeast (31,943) (Figure A).

Distance from home

Some 57 percent of all sentenced inmates were confined in correctional facilities 100 or more miles from their homes, including approximately 29 percent who were at least 250 miles distant. By contrast, only 5 percent were being held in facilities less than 15 miles from their homes (Figure B).

Offense

Slightly over half of all inmates serving time on their present sentence² had been incarcerated for violent offenses, about one-third were being detained for property offenses, and the remaining 15 percent were held for drug or public order crimes (Figure C).³ Prisoners held for homicide, robbery,

¹Estimates of the inmate population for each of the four regions were adjusted to conform to the counts obtained in the *Census of State Correctional Facilities, 1974*, NPS Special Report No. SD-NPS-SR-1, July 1975, and thus are not subject to sampling error. See Appendix C for the States included in each region.

²As defined for the purposes of the survey, and as used in this report, an inmate's "present" sentence was the one that most recently brought him under the jurisdiction of a State correctional system (including parole authorities) for an uninterrupted period as of the time of the survey. In the case of a small minority of prisoners, the "present," or entry, sentence was not the same as that which they were serving at the time of the survey. An example of a sentence incurred subsequent to the "present" sentence is one handed down for a new

Figure A. Percent distribution of the inmate population and the U.S. population, by region, 1974.

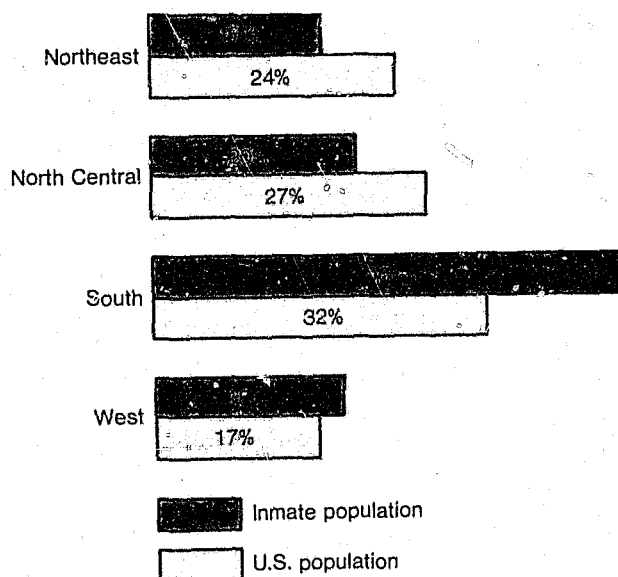
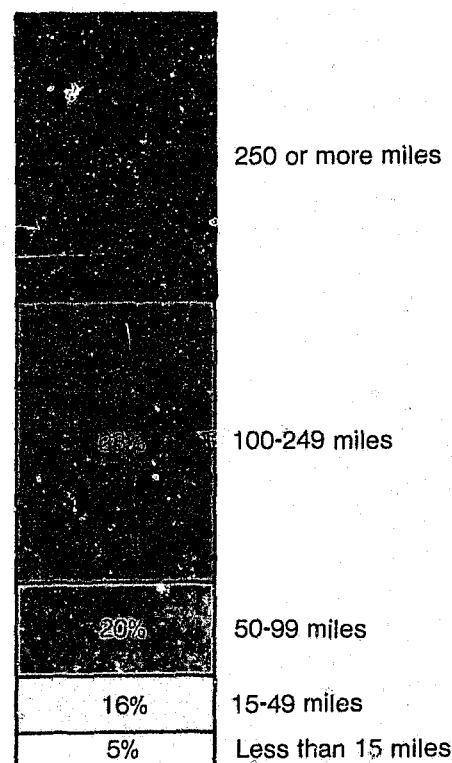


Figure B. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates, by distance between place of confinement and home, 1974.

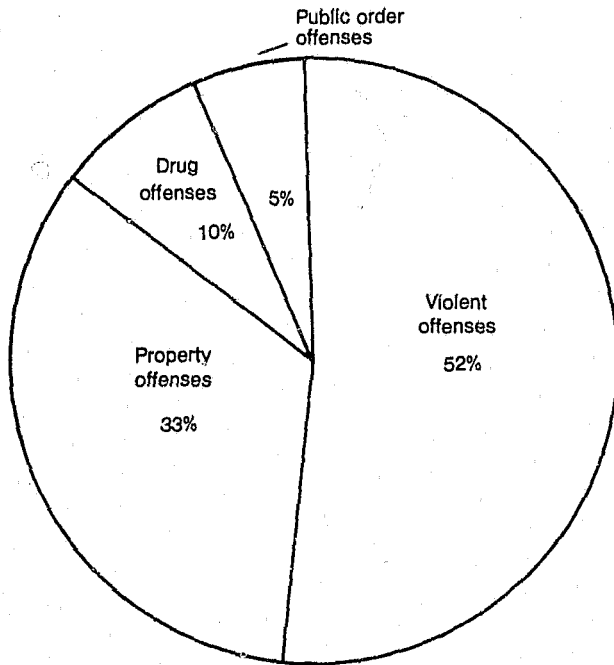

crime committed by a parolee. Another example is a sentence incurred for a crime committed by an inmate while in prison.

Figure C. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates, by type of offense, 1974.

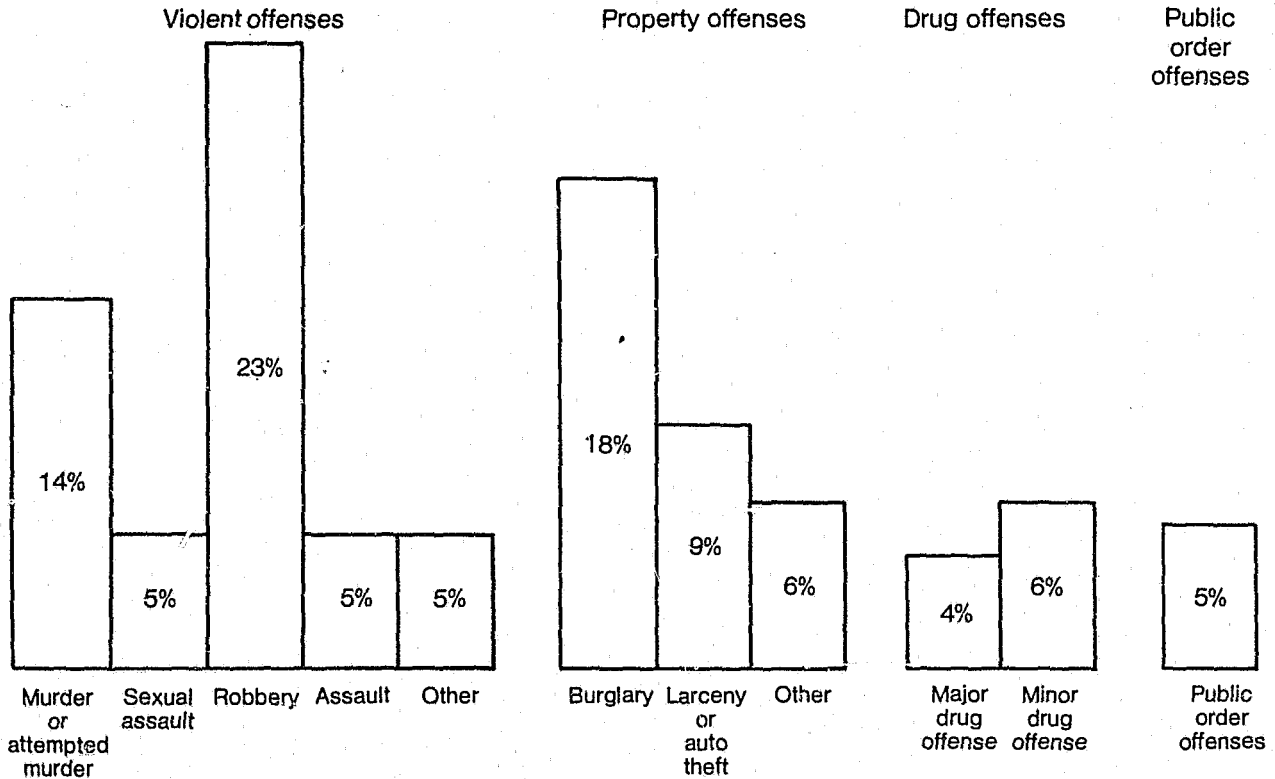


or burglary together made up about three-fifths of the total sentenced inmate population, with those serving time for robbery (23 percent) being the most numerous. No other offense accounted for as much as 10 percent of the total (Figure D).

Sentence length

Among sentenced inmates held in State correctional facilities on January 31, 1974, the median maximum sentence length was 7.8 years for those prisoners serving a specified term of fewer than 98 years. However, 12 percent of all sentenced inmates had received sentences of 98 or more years, life, or death. Of those prisoners serving a specified term of fewer than 98 years, approximately 15 percent had received sentences of 20 or more years, and the remainder were more or less equally divided among those serving sentences of less than 5 years, 5-10 years, or 10-20 years (Figure E). The largest number of such inmates had received sentences of from 5 to 5.9 years.

Proportion of sentence length served

Of the total number of sentenced inmates, 22 percent had served less than 10 percent of their maximum sentences at the time they were interviewed, and another 19 percent had served from 10 to 19 percent. At the other extreme, only 2 percent had served as much as 75 percent of their maximum sentences. The median amount served was 20.8 percent.

Number of sentences ever served

Some 29 percent of the inmate population were serving their first sentence or, in the case of those being detained without a sentence, had served but one sentence in the past. Another 23 percent counted two sentences ever served, and approximately 10 percent counted more than 5 (Figure F). A small number of inmates (494) had no sentence record at all: they were not sentenced at the time of the survey, and they had no record of past incarcerations.

Number of past sentences

Almost two-thirds of the inmates had records of past sentences, most of them with a history of only one such sentence. Among prisoners with a record of past sentences, including those who were detained without a sentence at the time of the survey, approximately 37 percent had one past sentence; 27 percent, two; 16 percent, three; 9 percent, four; and 11 percent, five or more.

Figure F. Percent distribution of inmates, by number of sentences ever served, 1974.

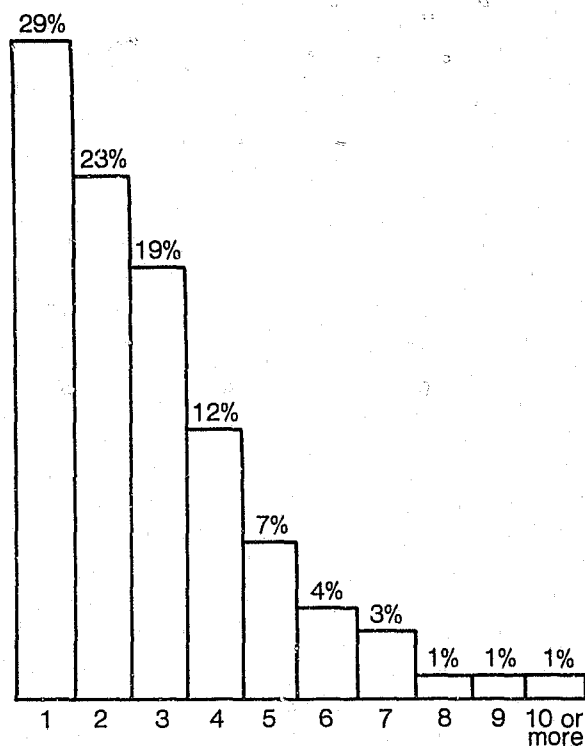


Figure E. Sentenced inmates, by maximum sentence length, 1974.

Demographic and socioeconomic characteristics

Sex, race, and age (Appendix Tables 1-8)

• The overwhelming majority of inmates in State correctional facilities on January 31, 1974, were males. Females made up only 3 percent of the inmate population. The ratio of males to females was about the same for both black and white prisoners.

• White inmates outnumbered black inmates by 51 to 47 percent. Members of other races, primarily American Indians and Asians, accounted for the remaining 2 percent of the total.

• In relation to their proportion of the U.S. population, blacks were overrepresented in the prisoner population by a factor of about four. Of the four regions in the country, they were least overrepresented in the South (Figure G).

• Persons of Hispanic heritage, numbering 12,359 or about 7 percent of the total inmate population, were slightly overrepresented in relation to their share of the national population.

• In terms of demographic and socioeconomic characteristics, black inmates, as a group, were far more like their counterparts in the U.S. general population than were white inmates. Black inmates under age 20, however, constituted an important exception to this generalization in several instances.

• Black inmates were more likely than white inmates to have been sentenced for violent crimes, particularly robbery, and less likely to have been sentenced for property crimes, particularly burglary (Figure H).

• Persons of Hispanic origin were about 2½ times as likely as non-Hispanics to be serving time for drug-related offenses.

• The median number of sentences ever served—2.9—was about the same for white in-

mates, black inmates, and those of Hispanic heritage.

• No substantial difference existed between the age structure of the male and female inmate populations (Figure I).

• Over half of all inmates in State correctional facilities at the time of the survey were young adults in their 20's. Only 1 percent were under age 18 and 6 percent were age 50 and over. The median age was 27.1 years.

• In relation to their share of the U.S. male population age 18-64, inmates under the age of 30 were overrepresented in the prisoner population (62 percent vs. 36 percent). Those between the ages of 30 and 44 comprised the same proportion as in the U.S. population (29 percent), while persons age 45 and over were underrepresented (9 percent vs. 35 percent) (Figure J).

• Even greater disparity was apparent when age at the time of admission to State correctional facilities was considered. Roughly 7 of every 10 sentenced inmates were under age 30 at the time of their admission; 5 of every 10 were under age 25. The median age at admission was 24.7 years.

• Black inmates were younger on the average than white prisoners. Some 66 percent of all black inmates were under age 30, compared with 58 percent of their white counterparts. The median age for blacks was 26.4 years; it was 28.0 years for whites.

• For sentenced inmates, the median ages of those serving time for murder (31.0 years), for manslaughter (31.4), or for public order crimes (30.9) were among the highest, while the median ages of those imprisoned for robbery (25.6), for burglary (25.4), or for larceny, including auto theft (25.7), were among the lowest.

• A greater proportion of persons age 50 and over than of sentenced inmates as a whole were sentenced for violent crimes, due in large part to the natural accumulation of prisoners with long sentences for such crimes as murder and manslaughter. The 50 and over group, as well as those in the 45-49 age group, were also more likely than the total sentenced inmate group to be incarcerated for public order offenses, but they were less likely than that group to be in prison for property or drug offenses (Figure K).

• In contrast, inmates under age 20 were more likely than sentenced inmates as a whole to be serving time for property crimes, but less likely to be held for violent offenses or drug-related crimes. There was also some evidence that per-

Figure H. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates, by race and type of offense, 1974.

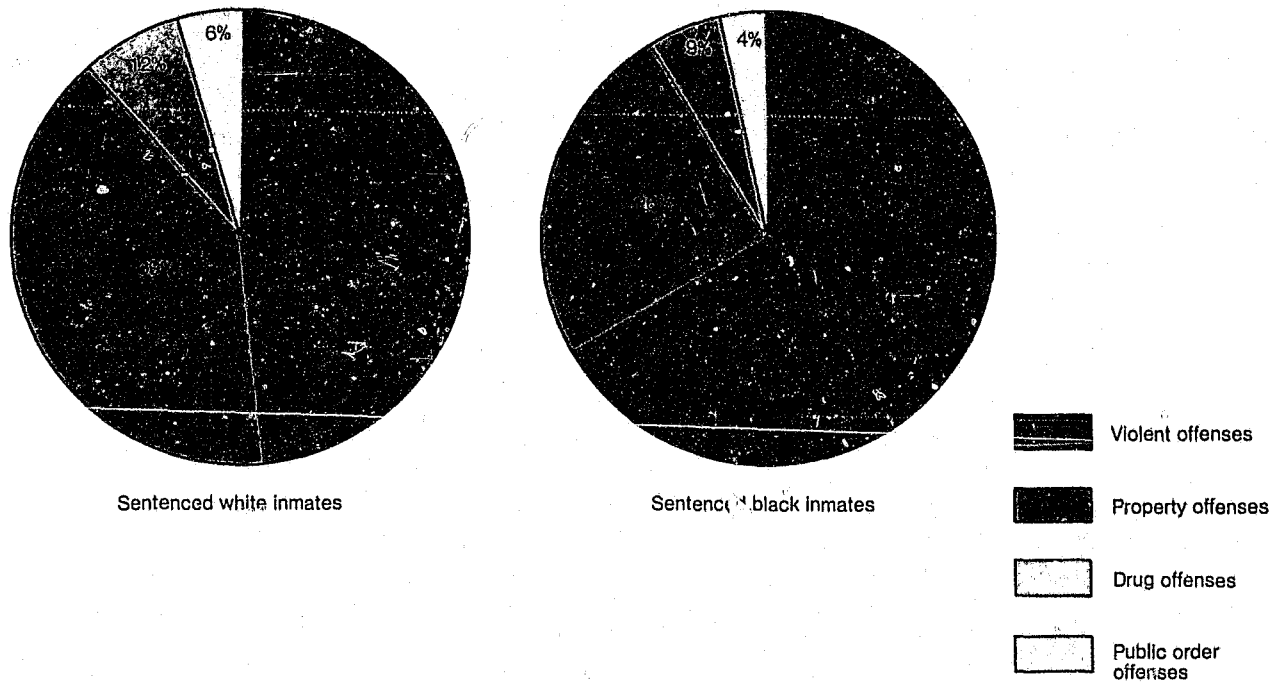


Figure I. Age structure of the inmate population, by sex, 1974.

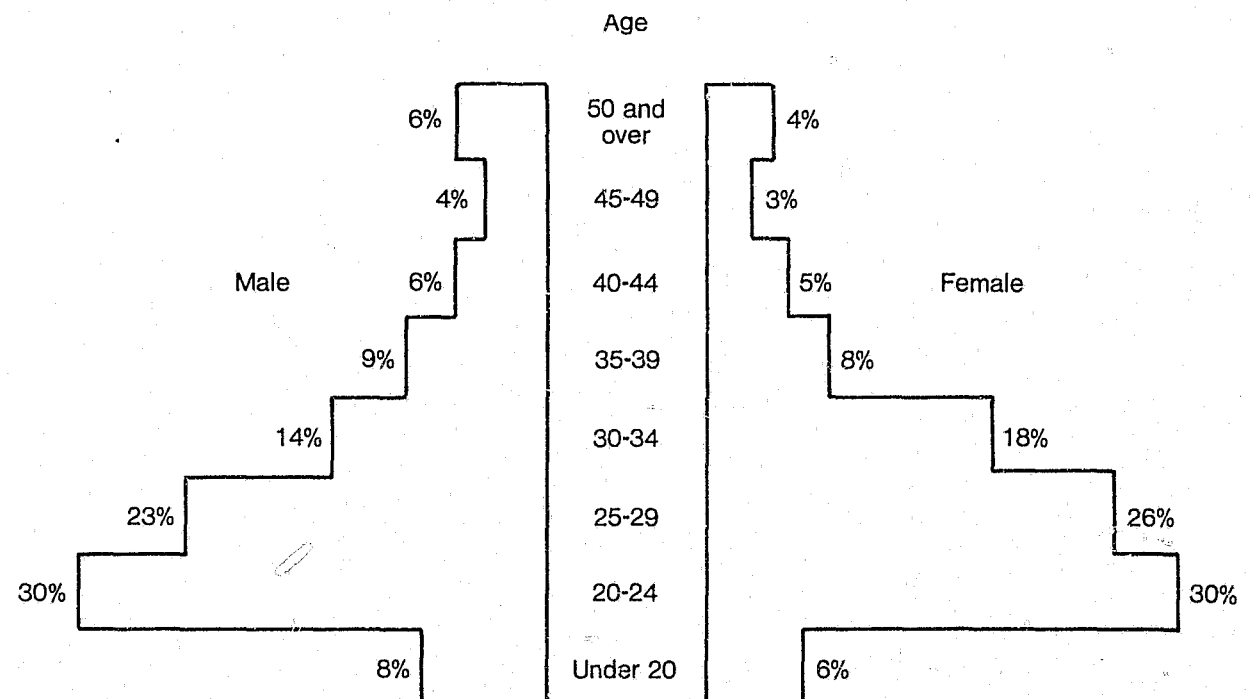
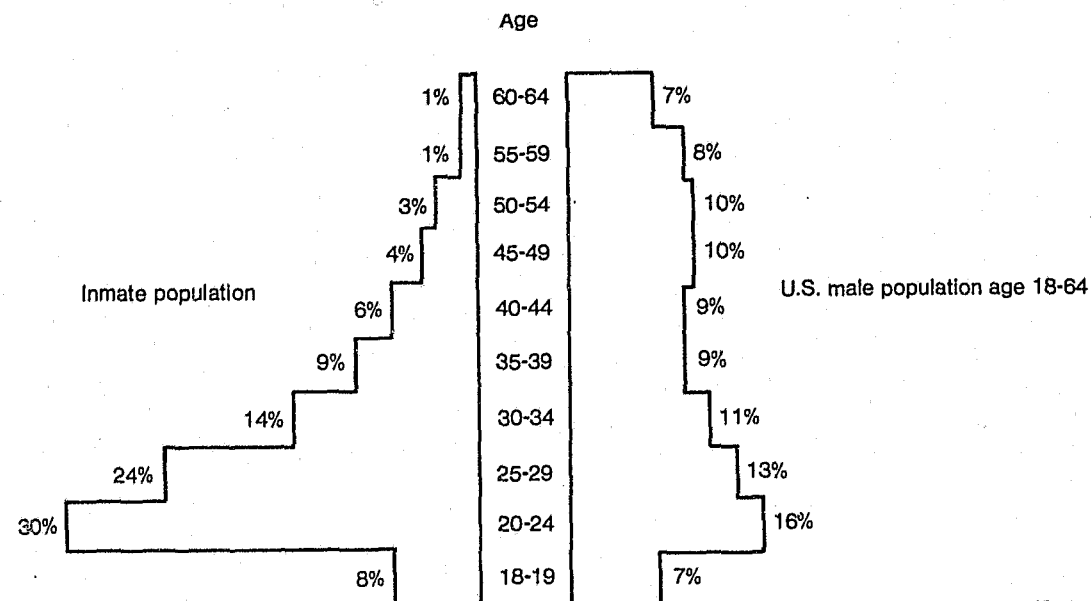


Figure J. Age structure of the inmate population and the U.S. male population age 18-64, 1974.

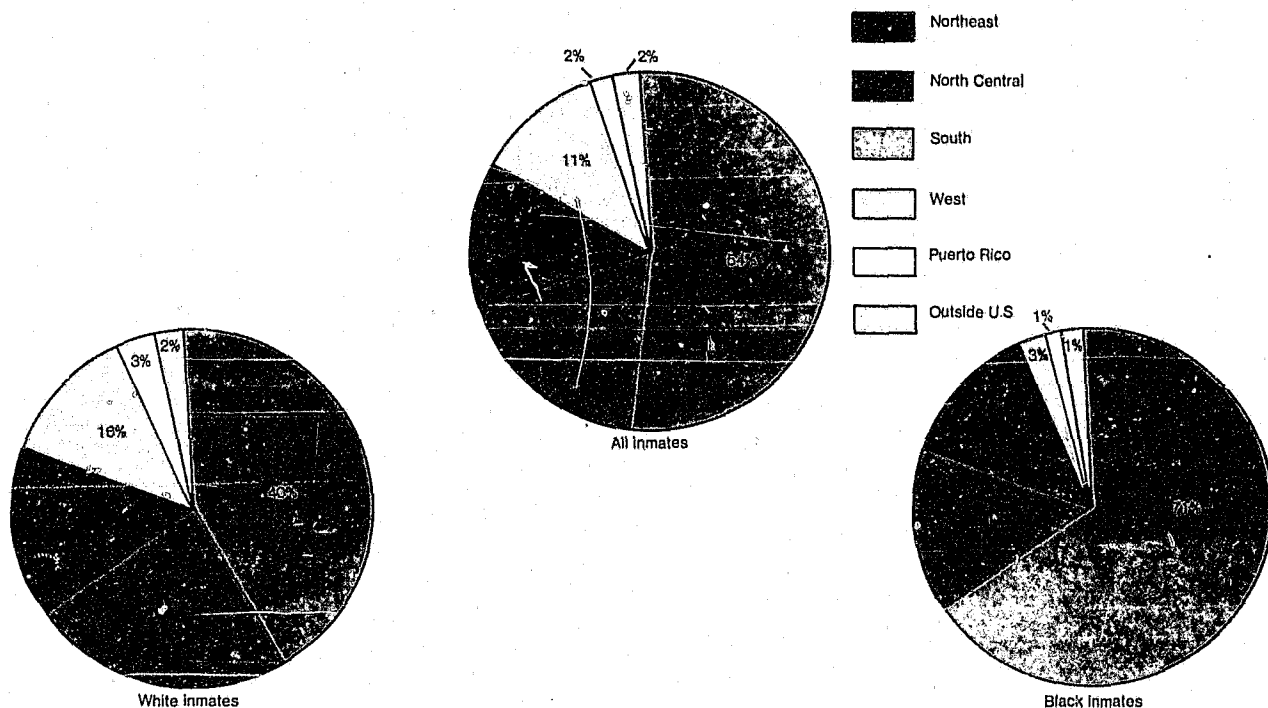

sons age 20-24 were more likely than the total sentenced inmate population to be detained for property offenses.

- Inmates under age 20, as well as those age 50 and over, were less likely to have been held for drug offenses than those in most of the intervening age groups (Figure K).

- With a few exceptions, the patterns discerned between age at the time of the survey and type of offense also held true between age at time of admission and type of offense. Thus, persons age 50 and over at the time of admission were more likely than the sentenced inmate population as a whole to have been admitted for public order offenses. A higher proportion of persons under age 20 when admitted were convicted of property crimes and a lower proportion were convicted of drug-related offenses (Figure L) as compared to the total sentenced inmate population.

Region of birth (Appendix Table 9)

- More than half of all inmates held in State correctional facilities at the time of the survey had been born in the South. Seventy-one percent of the black inmates, compared with 40 percent of

the white inmates were native to the South (Figure M).

- Roughly 4 percent of the inmate population had been born outside the 50 States or the District of Columbia; these were about equally divided between those native to Puerto Rico and those born elsewhere.

- The proportion of women inmates born in the West was about double that of men prisoners. In relative terms, more females than males also had been born in the South (Figure N).

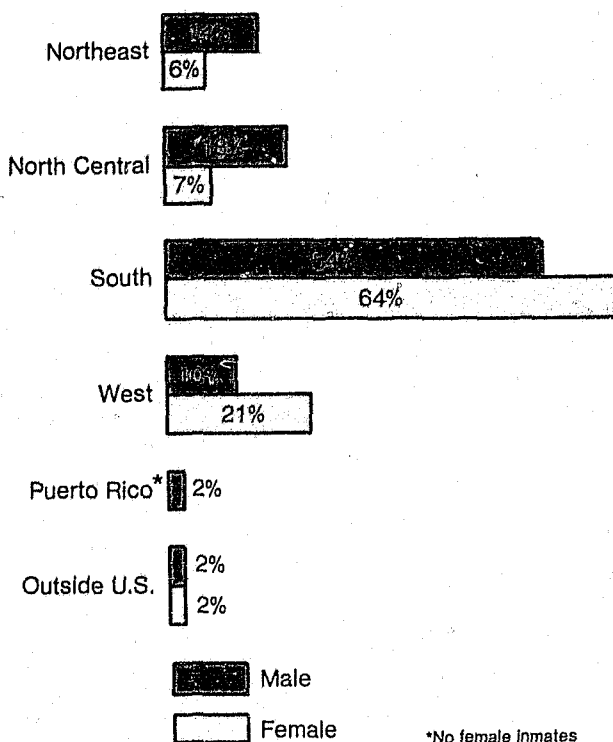
- Within the black inmate population, roughly 9 of every 10 women were native to the South; among men, the figure was 70 percent.

Marital status (Appendix Tables 10-16)

- At the time of the survey, some 48 percent of all sentenced inmates had never been married. About 25 percent were divorced or separated, 24 percent were married, and 3 percent were widowed.

- In relative terms, there were about four times as many divorced or separated persons within the sentenced inmate population as among males age 18-54 in the general civilian population. There

also were about twice as many persons who had never been married, but only one-third as many married individuals (Figure O).

- Sentenced black inmates were more likely than their white counterparts never to have been married; whites were more apt than blacks to be divorced.

- Dissimilarity in marital status between prison inmates and the general male population, apparent at the time of admission, became even more pronounced during the course of imprisonment.

- Roughly 1 sentenced inmate in every 8 had experienced a change in marital status since entering a State correctional facility. Most were those whose marriages had since terminated in divorce (Figure P).

- Sentenced white inmates were more likely than their black counterparts to have experienced a change in marital status since entering a correctional facility.

- Sentenced inmates whose marital status had changed since imprisonment, as a group, were older, had received longer sentences, and had served a greater proportion of their sentence than those whose status had not changed.

Figure O. Percent distribution of the sentenced inmate population and the U.S. male population age 18-54, by marital status, 1974.

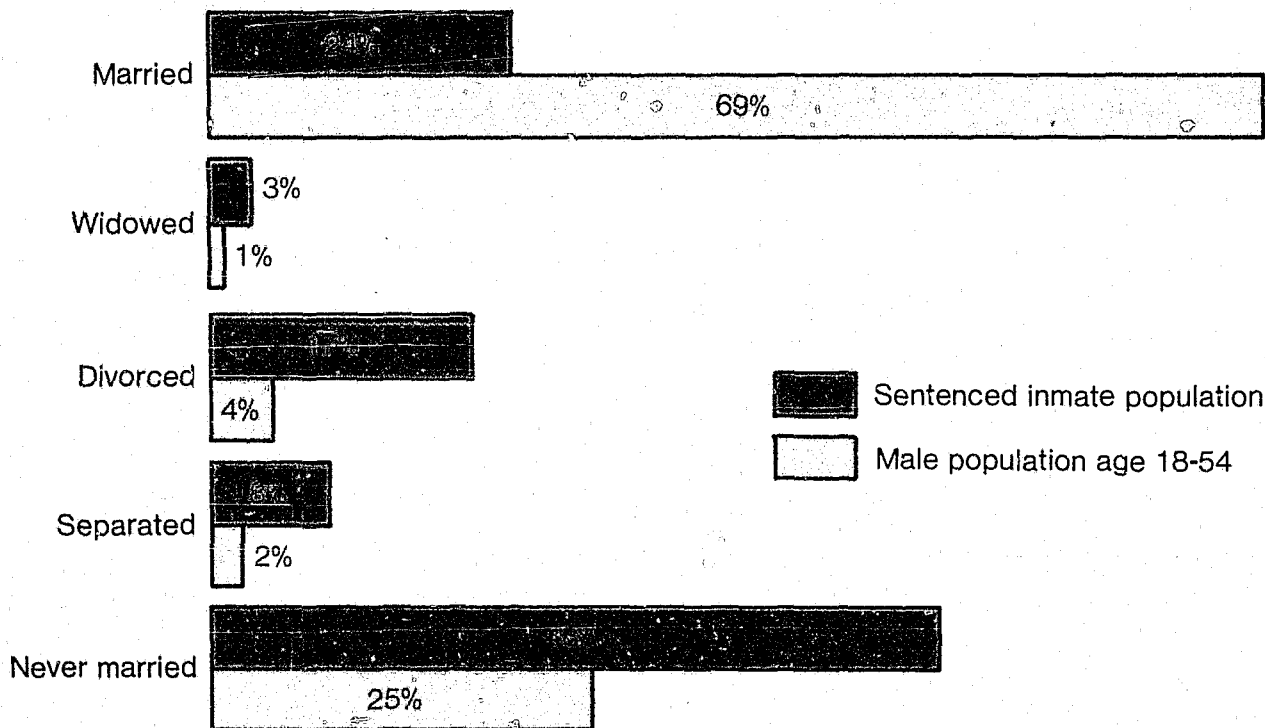
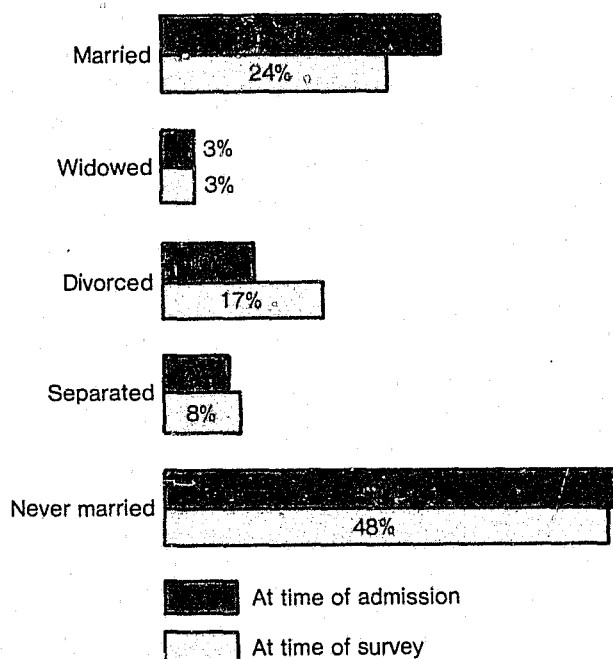


Figure P. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates, by marital status at time of admission and at time of survey, 1974.



- The distance between a sentenced inmate's place of confinement and the location of home had no bearing on changes in marital status since imprisonment.

- Among sentenced inmates, those who were married, divorced, separated, or had never been married were incarcerated for more or less the same types of crime. Those who were widowed were far more likely than those in the other marital status groups to be imprisoned for murder or manslaughter. This no doubt reflected the prevalence of older ages among inmates serving long sentences.

Dependents (Appendix Tables 17-20)

- About 60 percent of all sentenced inmates who had been self-supporting had at least one dependent in addition to themselves.⁴ Included were 16 percent with one dependent, 17 percent with two, 12 percent with three, and 15 percent with four or more.

- Self-supporting black inmates were somewhat more likely than their white counterparts to

⁴Information on dependents was asked only of sentenced prisoners who had been self-supporting, i.e., those who had been employed most of the month prior to arrest or for any 2 consecutive weeks after December 1968, and had income during the year prior to arrest that enabled them to provide half or more of the resources used to maintain themselves.

have been supporting one or more dependents (Figure Q).

- Self-supporting inmates with one or more dependents were more likely than those without any dependents to have been sentenced for violent crimes, particularly murder. On the other hand, inmates without dependents were more likely to have been sentenced for burglary.

- Dependents or the lack of them did not appear to be related to the existence of a past criminal record.

Military service (Appendix Tables 21-25)

- About 27 percent of all sentenced inmates had served in the U.S. Armed Forces, a proportion considerably below the 47 percent figure for all males age 18-59 in the civilian population.

- Approximately 1 in every 10 sentenced inmates was a Vietnam-era veteran.

- Compared with males in the civilian population, veterans age 25 and over were underrepresented in the inmate population; those under age 25 were overrepresented (Figure R).

- Roughly twice as many white inmates (35 percent) as black inmates (18 percent) had served in the armed forces.

- Sentenced inmates who had served in the armed forces were about 5 years older than the prisoner population as a whole.

- Some 8 percent of all sentenced inmates had served time in a correctional facility before completing service in the armed forces.

- The median number of sentences ever served was about the same for both veterans and non-veterans.

- Over half (55 percent) of those sentenced inmates who had served in the U.S. Armed Forces had received honorable discharges, while only 5 percent had been discharged dishonorably (Figure S).

- There was little difference between white prisoners and their black counterparts in the type of discharge received.

Educational attainment (Appendix Tables 26-31)

- Sentenced prisoners were less likely to have been high school graduates prior to imprisonment than males age 16-54 in the civilian population (26 percent vs. 65 percent). This disparity in educational level was true for both blacks and whites and for all age groups (Figure T).

Figure Q. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates who had been self-supporting prior to imprisonment, by number of dependents and race, 1974.

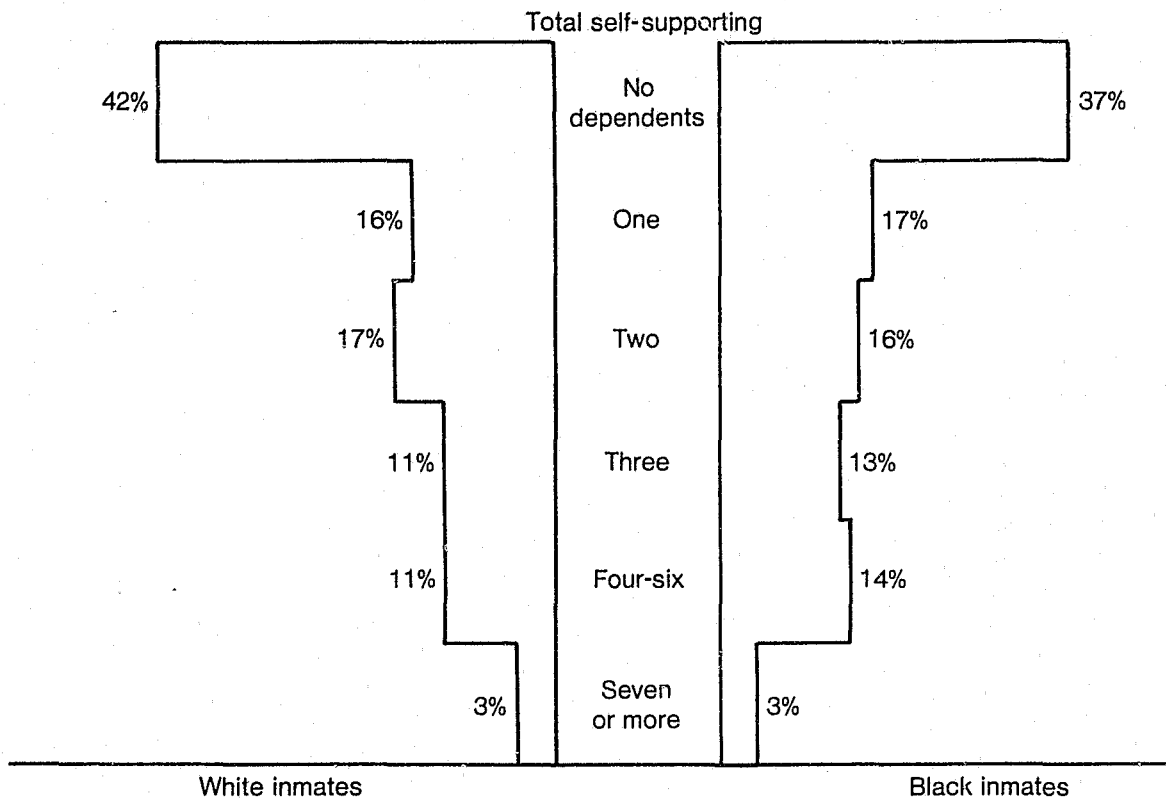
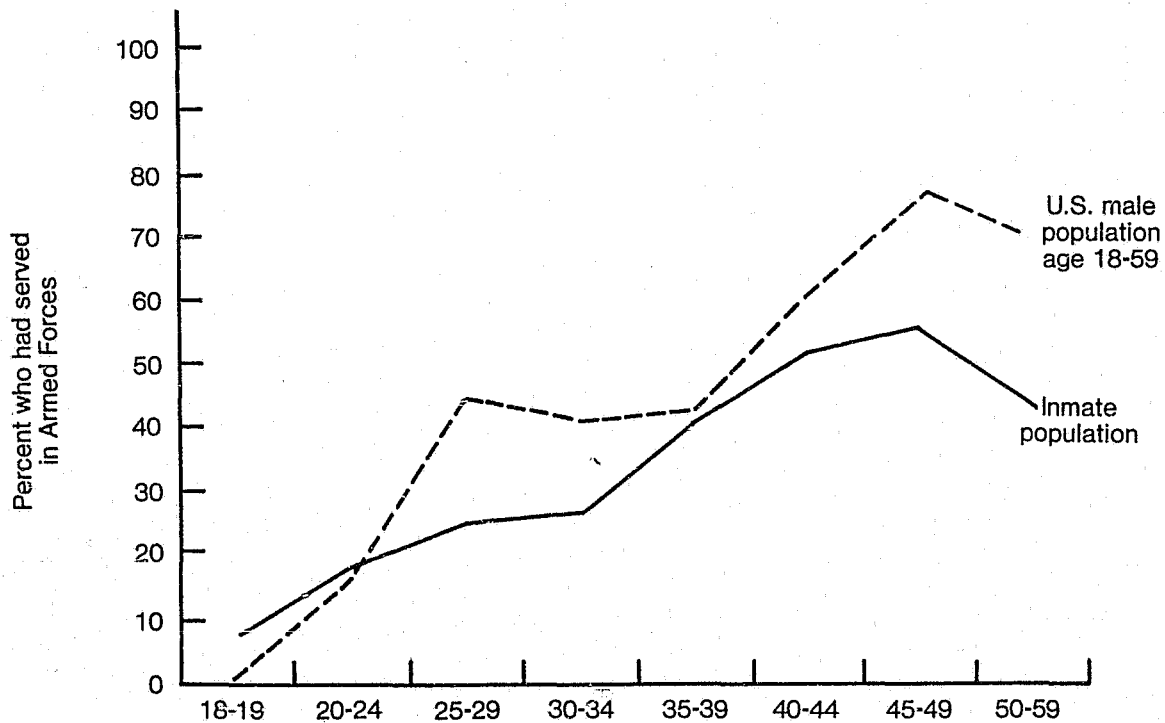
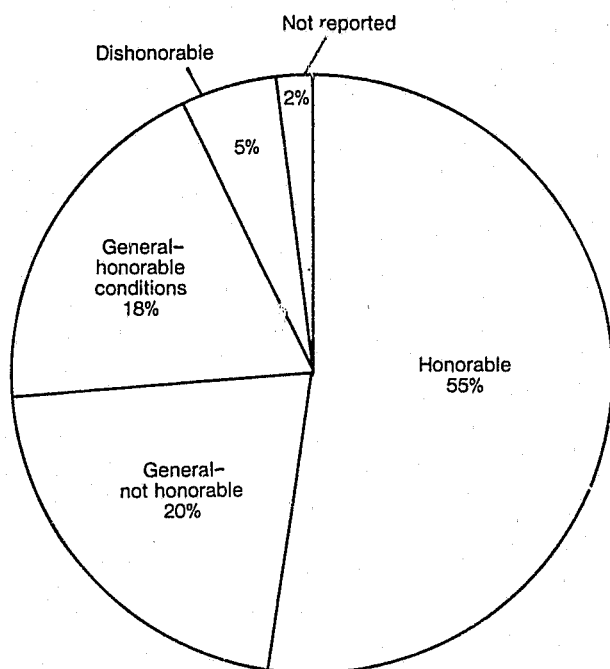


Figure R. Military service among sentenced inmates and U.S. males age 18-59, by age group, 1974.

Figure S. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates who served in the Armed Forces, by type of military discharge, 1974.

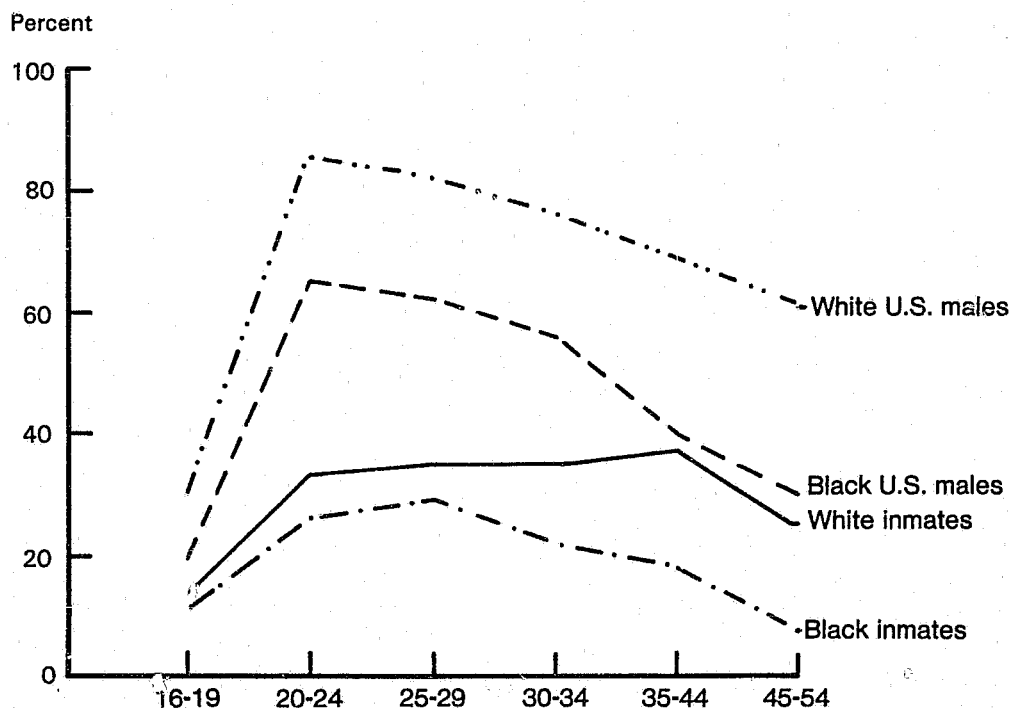


- Even when academic training undertaken while in custody was considered, sentenced inmates continued to lag behind the civilian population in formal schooling. At the time of the survey, only 36 percent of the sentenced inmates, compared to 67 percent of their counterparts in the U.S. population, had completed high school.

- Approximately 30 percent of the white sentenced inmates and 21 percent of the blacks had graduated from high school before being imprisoned. As a result of schooling obtained while in custody, 42 percent of the whites and 30 percent of the blacks held a high school diploma or its equivalent at the time of the survey.

- The median grade completed prior to imprisonment was 10.3 years, and was about the same for both black and white inmates. However, the disparity between the inmate population and the male civilian population was more pronounced for white inmates than black inmates. The median grade completed, including training received while imprisoned, was 10.9 years; it was about the same for whites and blacks.

Figure U. Percent distribution of inmates, by highest grade completed prior to imprisonment, by race, 1974.

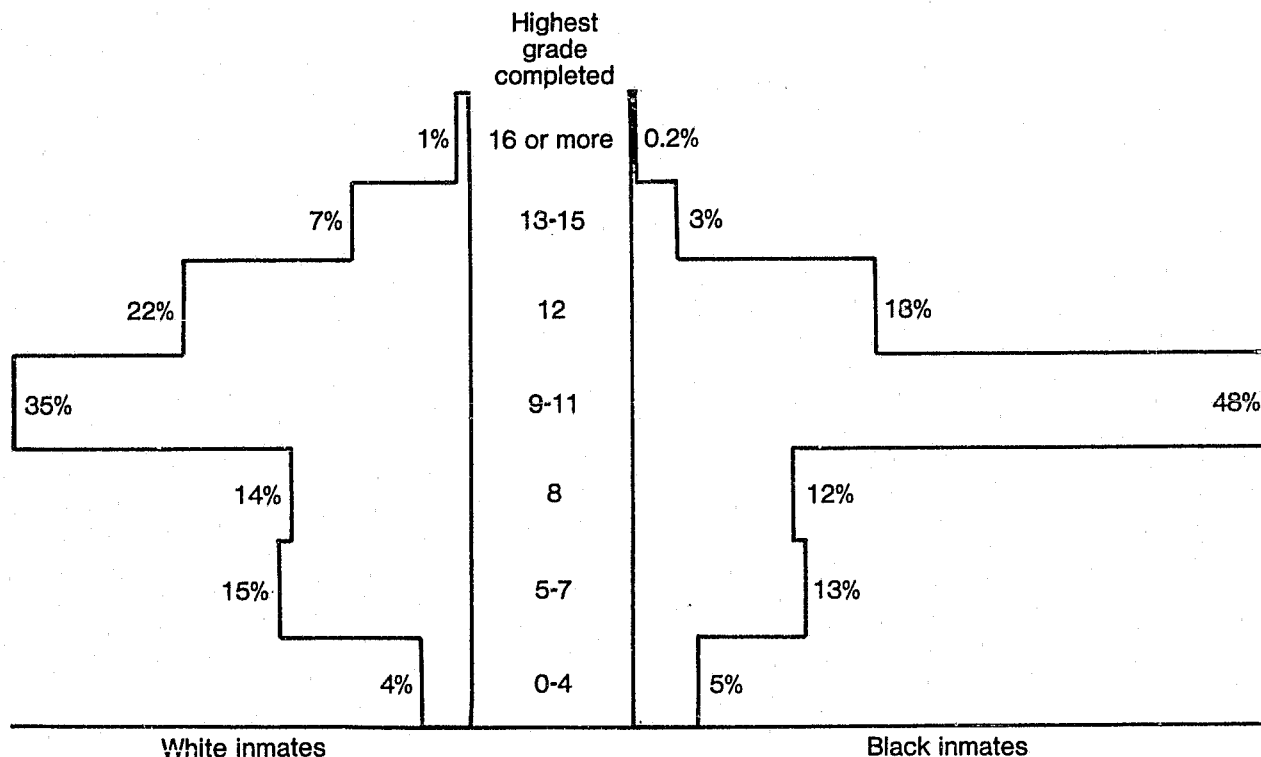
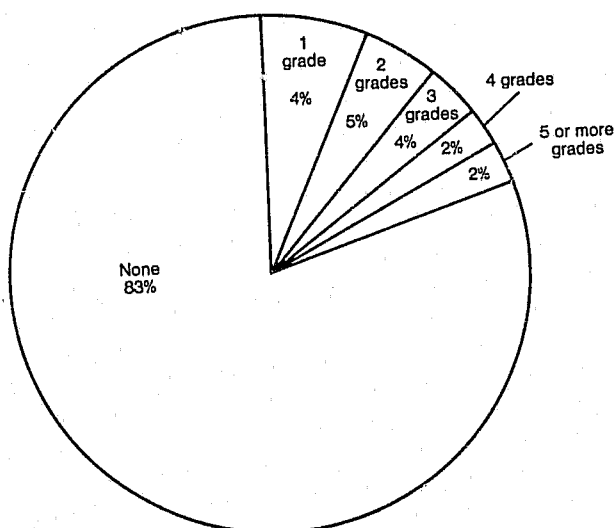


Figure V. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates, by number of grades of schooling completed while in custody, 1974.



- Roughly 32 percent of the sentenced inmates (33 percent of the whites and 30 percent of the blacks) had had no more than an eighth grade education when imprisoned.

- Relatively more white inmates than black inmates had terminated their preincarceration

schooling upon completion of high school; relatively more blacks than whites had dropped out of school during grades 9 through 11 (Figure U).

- About twice as many sentenced white inmates as their black counterparts had some college training.

- Black inmates in each age group 30 and over were less likely to have had a high school diploma before entering prison than their white counterparts. On the other hand, blacks under age 20 were as likely as whites under age 20 to have completed high school before imprisonment.

- Some 17 percent of all sentenced inmates had completed one or more grades since being imprisoned. These inmates had completed a median of approximately three grades (Figure V).

- About 20,000 persons who lacked a high school diploma when imprisoned had completed their high school education by the time of the survey. The number of inmates who had some college training increased by roughly 5,000 between the time of imprisonment and the time of the survey.

- White inmates were more likely than black inmates to have completed some schooling while in prison. At the time of the survey, however,

there were relatively more blacks than whites participating in prison educational programs.

- The vast majority of sentenced inmates who were in the process of completing a grade at the time of the survey were attending courses within their own institutions. Only a small number were enrolled in correspondence courses, study-release programs, or other curricula.

- Prisoners who had some college prior to incarceration were less likely to have been convicted of a violent offense or to have had a record of past sentences than those with less education.

- Although blacks as a group were more likely than whites to be serving time for murder or attempted murder, manslaughter, or robbery, only robbery was more characteristic of black inmates than of white inmates who were high school graduates.

- Although imprisonment for nonviolent crimes (i.e., property, drug, or public order offenses) was more characteristic of the white inmate population than the black, white inmates with less than 8 years of schooling were no more likely than blacks of the same educational level to have been convicted of drug or public order offenses; the whites, however, were more likely to have been imprisoned for property crimes (Figures W and X).

- Among sentenced white inmates, imprisonment for drug offenses and such property crimes as forgery, fraud, and embezzlement was more characteristic of those with at least 12 years of

schooling than of those with less than 8. On the other hand, confinement for public order crimes or for burglary was more apt to be associated with the lower educational level.

- For sentenced black inmates, incarceration for murder, manslaughter, or rape was more characteristic of those with less than an eighth grade education than for those who had at least 12 years of schooling. Conversely, imprisonment for drug offenses or for robbery was more commonly associated with the higher level of education.

Prearrest employment status (Appendix Tables 32-42)

- Roughly two of every three sentenced inmates were employed during most of the month prior to arrest. Included were 62 percent who had worked full time and 7 percent who had part-time jobs. Of those not working, 12 percent were looking for work and 19 percent were not (Figure Y).

- Among those who were not looking for work during the month prior to arrest, individuals who did not want work outnumbered those who did by about 2½ to 1.

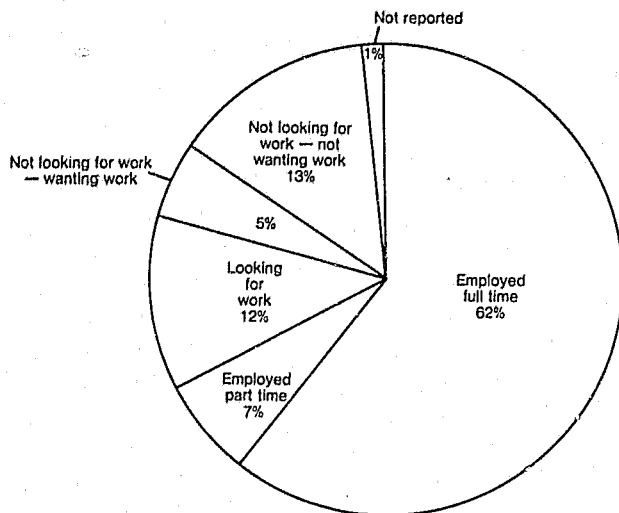
- There was little difference between black and white sentenced inmates in the proportion employed during the month prior to arrest. However, relatively more blacks than whites were looking for work. Blacks were less likely than whites to have indicated that they not only were not look-

ing for work, but also did not want work (Figure Z).

- Persons who were under age 25 when admitted to a State correctional facility were less likely than those age 25 or older to have been employed during the month prior to arrest. Those under age 20 were the least likely of any 5-year age group to have been employed.
- Joblessness during the month prior to arrest was more pronounced among those sentenced for drug offenses and robbery, than among prison inmates as a whole.
- Inmates who were jobholders during the month prior to arrest were less likely than those

Figure AA. Percent distribution of sentenced inmates, by educational attainment prior to imprisonment and prearrest employment status, 1974.

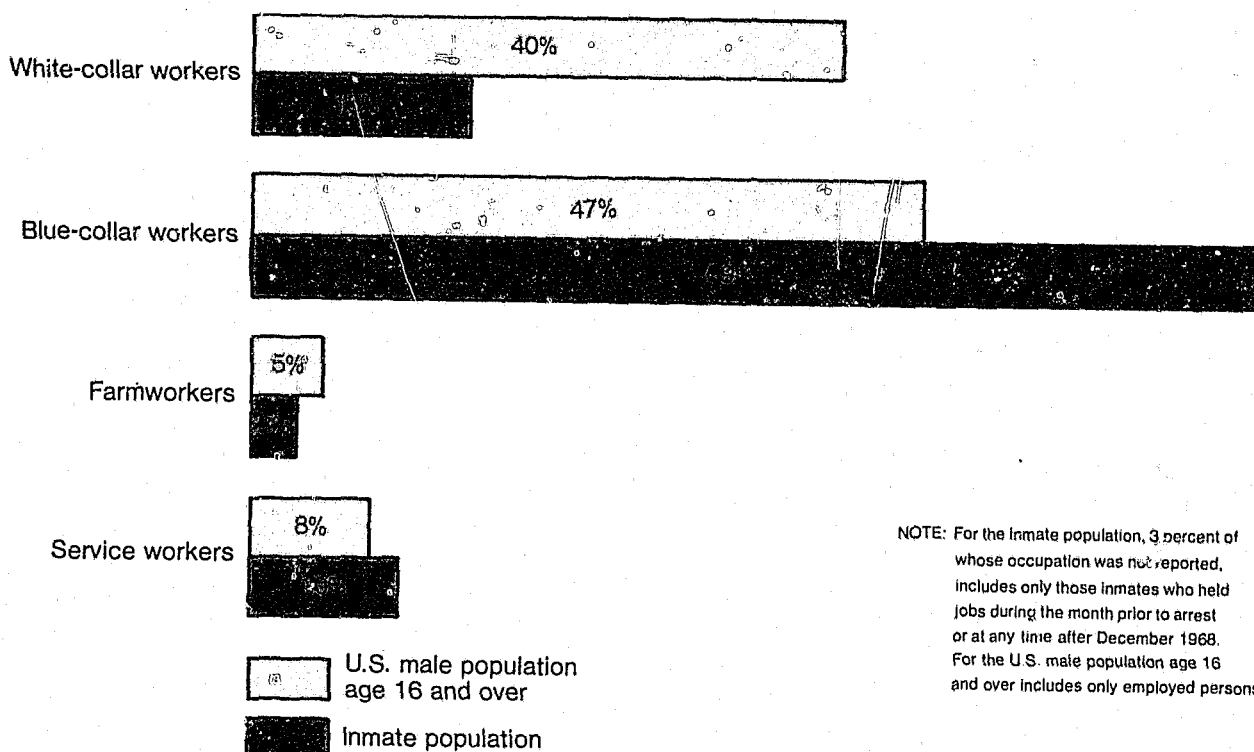

who were unemployed to have had a record of past sentences.

- Sentenced inmates who were not working and did not want a job were more likely to have been high school graduates prior to arrest than those who wanted work or who were looking for work (Figure AA).
- Joblessness during the month prior to arrest was higher among those sentenced inmates with prearrest employment in the service sector than among those in white-collar, blue-collar, or farm occupations.
- Among inmates who were self-supporting prior to arrest and had some income during the year preceding arrest, those who were not supporting dependents were more likely than those with dependents to have been jobless during the month preceding arrest.
- Also among self-supporting inmates reporting some income for the year prior to arrest, a relatively large proportion of those who were not looking for a job during the month preceding arrest and did not want a job had high incomes.
- Of those inmates looking for work during the month prior to arrest, 25 percent had been looking for less than 4 weeks, 42 percent for 4 to 12 weeks, 17 percent for 13 to 26 weeks, and 13 percent for 6 months or longer. The median was 9 weeks.
- Among jobless inmates not looking for work during the month prior to arrest, more than half gave reasons other than ill health, physical disability, or school attendance, the reasons most commonly cited by males in the general population who were not looking for work.

Prearrest occupation and industry (Appendix Tables 43-50)

- Approximately 69 percent of those inmates with prearrest employment had most recently worked in blue-collar jobs, 15 percent in white-collar positions, 10 percent in service occupations, and 3 percent in farming. The occupation for the remaining 3 percent was not stipulated.

- For two of every five inmates with prearrest employment, the last job held was not the customary occupation.

- In comparison with employed males age 16 and over in the U.S. population, the corresponding inmates were substantially overrepresented in blue-collar jobs and significantly underrepresented in white-collar positions (Figure BB).

- Disparity in occupations between white inmates and their counterparts among employed males age 16 and over was far more pronounced than that which existed between black inmates and employed black males age 16 and over (Figure CC).

- Among inmates with prearrest employment, the representation of whites was slightly higher than that of blacks in white-collar and farm occupations. It was about the same in blue-collar jobs, but only about half that of blacks in service occupations.

- Disparity between black and white prisoners was more pronounced when specific occupations were compared. Among white-collar workers, whites were more likely than blacks to have worked as managers or administrators, and less likely to have been clerical workers. Within the blue-collar occupations, whites were more likely than blacks to have been craftsmen and kindred workers and less likely to have been laborers.

- Overall, prearrest occupation had little relation to the type of offense for which an inmate was sentenced. Among white prisoners, however, a higher proportion of white-collar than blue-collar workers was serving time for property crimes other than burglary, larceny, or auto theft. Among black inmates, relatively more white-collar than blue-collar workers had been sentenced for drug offenses.

- Roughly three of every five inmates in each of the four major occupational groups had a record of past sentences, indicating no apparent relationship between occupation and past criminal record.

- Inmates with prearrest employment had worked a median of 35 weeks on their last job before incarceration. The median was about the same for whites and blacks (Figure DD).

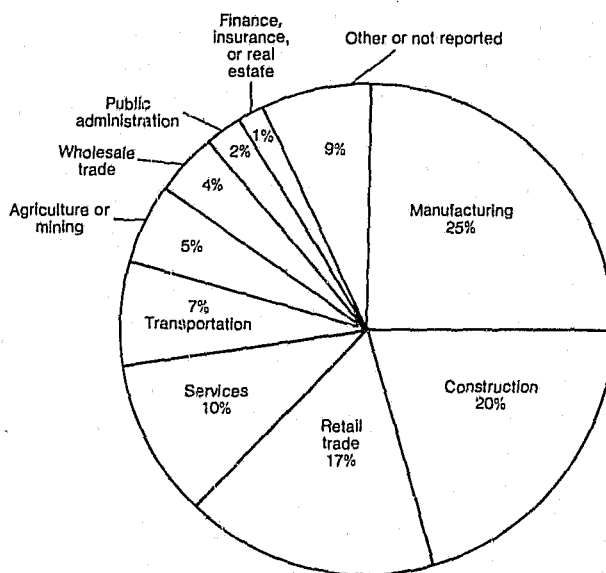
- Those who had worked in blue-collar occupations had spent less time on their last job than those who had worked in white-collar positions, more time than those in service occupations, and

about the same amount of time as those in farming.

- Approximately 25 percent of those inmates with prearrest employment had worked in manufacturing before confinement, and another 20 percent had been employed in construction (Figure EE).

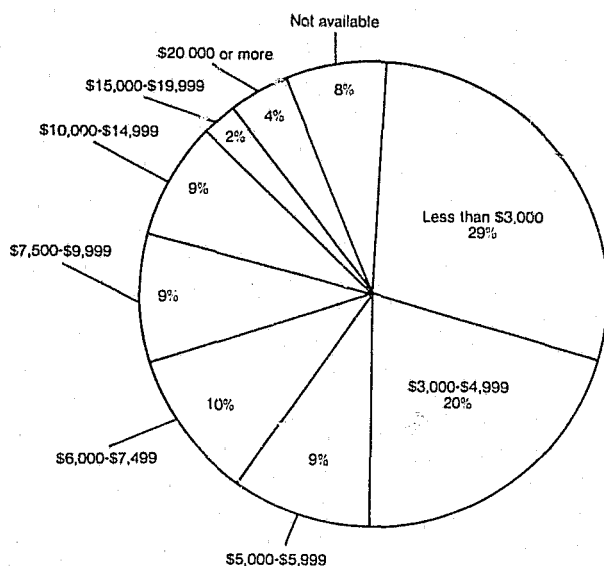
- In relation to the construction industry's share of the Nation's male work force, construction workers were overrepresented in the inmate population by a factor of about two. For other industries, inmate representation was more or less on a par with or below that of the male work force.

- A somewhat higher proportion of white inmates with prearrest employment (22 percent) than of their black counterparts (17 percent) had worked most recently in construction, but otherwise there was little difference in the proportional distribution of white and of black inmates by prearrest industry.

- There appeared to be no relationship between industry of prearrest employment and offense for which incarcerated.

- More than four of every five inmates with prearrest employment worked for wages or salaries in the private sector. Government workers and the self-employed were underrepresented in the prisoner population.

Pearrest financial status (Appendix Tables 51-79)

- Some 95 percent of the inmates with prearrest employment reported having income during the year prior to arrest, and 9 of every 10 of them claimed to be financially self-supporting.

- Of the inmates with prearrest employment, the great majority had been wage or salary earners; only 3 percent were on welfare, 1 percent received social security, and 14 percent reported some other source of income.

- The income level of inmates with prearrest employment was quite low. About one of every three of those inmates who reported their income level had earned less than \$3,000 in the year prior to arrest; only 4 percent had an income of \$20,000 or more. The median income was \$4,630 (Figure FF).

- Black inmates had less income during the year prior to arrest than their white counterparts. The median income for blacks was \$4,140, compared with \$5,112 for whites (Figure GG).

- Inmates with prearrest employment who reported no source of income for the year prior to arrest were more likely than wage or salary earners to have had a record of past sentences; sen-

tenced inmates with no income were more likely than wage or salary earners to be serving time for robbery. Those with some source of income other than wages or salaries, social security, or welfare were more likely than wage or salary earners to have been convicted of drug offenses.

- The highest level of educational attainment prior to incarceration was reported by those inmates who had sources of income other than wages or salaries, social security, or welfare. This group also was the most likely to have last worked in a white-collar occupation.

- With respect to sources of income, those whose income was from wages or salaries were most likely to have been self-supporting and have supported dependents.

- In general, prisoners who earned \$10,000 or more during the year prior to arrest were more likely to have been high school graduates, white-collar workers, or wage or salary earners than those who earned less.

- In contrast, the lower the prearrest income, the greater was the likelihood that the inmate's family was on welfare prior to the arrest.

- There was little overall relationship between an inmate's prearrest income and a record of past sentences.

- Also there seemed to be little relationship between income and the type of crime for which an inmate had been sentenced. However, the higher the income of inmates convicted of violent offenses, the more likely that they were white.

- Among inmates with prearrest employment, those who were self-supporting differed from those who were not primarily in terms of the

amount of income received. The median annual income was \$4,939 for those who were self-supporting, and \$1,251 for the others. Otherwise, the two groups were similar in regard to demographic and socioeconomic background, type of offense for which sentenced, and past criminal record.

- Inmates with no dependents had the lowest median prearrest income, and those with four or more dependents had higher incomes than those with fewer than three.

- Inmates who were supporting only one dependent prior to arrest were the least likely to report that their dependents were receiving welfare at the time of the survey.

- Black inmates were about twice as likely as whites to have had families on welfare before their arrest, and they were more likely to have had dependents who were on welfare at the time of the survey.

Methodology

Statistical results presented in this report derive from a nationwide survey conducted among adult and youthful offenders held in the custody of State correctional authorities. Most personal interviews were carried out during late January and early February 1974, and all interviewing was completed by February 22. Each participating inmate was asked 45 questions with respect to social and economic background, alcohol and drug use habits, and criminal offense and incarceration history. The survey records were processed and weighted, producing results that were representative of all inmates and of subgroups within the inmate population. Because they were based on a sample survey rather than a complete enumeration, the results are estimates.

Sample design and size

Survey specifications required a sample of some 10,000 inmates, or approximately 1 in every 18 offenders under the jurisdiction of State correctional authorities. As a first step in designing the sample, a total of 710 facilities thought to be holding such offenders was stratified according to the following five categories of size, as measured by the estimated number of persons held: less than 20, 20-199, 200-399, 400-899, and 900 or more.⁵ All facilities that had an estimated 900 or more inmates were included in the sample with certainty. To assure proper representation in the sample of institutions within the four smaller size ranges, these were further stratified on the basis of a combination of three criteria: (1) type of facility (prison for adults, community correctional center, work-release center, prison or road camp, reception or prerelease center, and others); (2) regional location; and (3) specific estimated size. These procedures yielded a sample consisting of 190 fa-

cilities. Once the institutional sample was drawn, the inmate sample was determined by a set of ratios designed to assure an overall sampling rate of 1 inmate in every 18, as shown in the following display:

These design procedures produced a sample consisting of 10,359 inmates, who were selected at random from rosters provided by the 190 participating institutions. Among those chosen, 8,869 inmates were interviewed directly; 1,205 were unavailable for personal interview, but partial information on them was taken from institutional records; 76 were unavailable for interview and their institutional records were not available; and 209 persons, including many who had been discharged from institutions but whose names had not been purged from the rosters used for sample selection, were ineligible for inclusion in the sample. Weighting adjustments were used to compensate for cases in which inmates were unavailable or ineligible for interview, and for those cases in which data were drawn from institutional records.

Estimation

Data records obtained by interviewers were assigned final weights, which were the product of the following four elements:

(1) A basic weight of 18 was applied, reflecting each inmate's probability of being included in the sample.

(2) A duplication control factor was applied only to the data records of inmates from institutions for which presurvey population estimates differed from the total number of prisoners held at the time of the interview to the degree that the discrepancy required that inmates be sampled at a rate other than that originally prescribed.

(3) A nonpersonal interview adjustment was made, designed to account for partial data obtained from records rather than interviews. Within seven noninterview clusters comprising States or groupings of States, this adjustment was made separately for males and females. With respect to the clusters of males, the noninterview data cells were defined by four variables: type of institution

⁵Conducted at the same time as the survey, the Census of State Correctional Facilities canvassed all institutions in State correctional systems, as well as all institutions outside the correctional system proper in which 50 percent or more of the occupants were offenders under the jurisdiction of State correctional authorities. A total of 710 facilities were covered, but 102 of these were determined to be administratively dependent upon another correctional facility. Accordingly, the 102 were not counted as separate facilities, and information on them was subsumed with that of the parent entity. The survey drew its sample not only from all 710 facilities, but also from institutions outside the correctional system proper in which fewer than 50 percent of the occupants were offenders under the jurisdiction of State correctional authorities.

(adult and other), race (black and other than black), types of offenses, and age (24 and under and 25 and over). For females, the noninterview data cells were defined by age and types of offenses. For any given data cell, the nonpersonal interview adjustment was defined as the ratio of the weighted number of personally interviewed prisoners plus nonpersonally interviewed prisoners to the weighted number of personally interviewed prisoners in all relevant data cells.

(4) The final factor was that of the ratio estimate, an adjustment that brought the survey-derived inmate count into accord with a total enumeration of prisoners, as determined by the January 31, 1974, Census of State Correctional Facilities. This factor was defined as the ratio of the census count of prisoners within each of the four geographical regions to the weighted survey-derived estimate of prisoners for the corresponding region. The appropriate ratio adjustment was applied to each personally interviewed prisoner's data record.

Reliability of estimates

As previously indicated, the survey results contained in this report and used in preparation of the analytical findings are estimates. Despite precautions taken during the survey design and estimation procedures to minimize sampling variability, the estimates are subject to error arising from the fact that they were obtained from a sample survey rather than a complete census and that the sample used was only one of a large number of possible samples of equal size that could have been selected. Estimates derived from different samples would, in all probability, differ from one another; they also would differ from data obtainable from a complete census using the same questionnaires, instructions, and interviewers. As a general rule, all estimates—whether numbers of inmates or percentages—based on about 14 sample cases or fewer have been considered statistically unreliable. The minimum estimate considered sufficiently reliable to serve as a statistical base was 300.

In addition to sampling variability, the survey estimates are subject to so-called nonsampling errors. In a survey such as this, nonsampling errors may have resulted from the inaccurate or incomplete reporting of data by prisoners, systematic inaccuracies introduced by interviewers, and improper coding and processing of data. All such nonsampling errors, however, also are inherent in complete censuses.

For any given survey-derived estimate, the standard error measures variations that would have occurred from all possible samples and is, therefore, a measure of the precision with which an estimate from a particular sample approximates the average result of all possible samples. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially gauges the effect of certain nonsampling errors but does not measure systematic biases in the data.

The chances are about 68 out of 100 that statistical data contained in this report would differ from the average result of all possible samples by less than one standard error (plus or minus). Similarly, the chances are about 90 out of 100 that the difference would be less than 1.6 times the standard error; about 95 out of 100 that it would be less than twice the standard error; and about 99 out of 100 that it would be less than 2.5 times the standard error.

Standard errors applicable to two types of survey statistics—absolute levels (Table I) and percentages (Table II)—are given in Appendix D. Both tables are generalized in that they contain approximations suggesting an order of magnitude rather than the precise error associated with any given survey estimate. For estimates not specifically listed in the error tables, linear interpolation must be used to approximate the standard error.

To illustrate the use of the standard error tables, assume that a group of 90,000 prison inmates shared one of the characteristics discussed in the report. Linear interpolation of values appearing in Table I yields a standard error of about 1,530 for the estimate. The chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimate (90,000) would have been a figure differing from the average result of all possible samples by less than 1,530 (plus or minus); therefore, at the 68 percent confidence level, the interval associated with that number of inmates would be from 88,470 to 91,530. The chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimates would have differed from the average result of all possible samples by less than twice this standard error (3,060); in other words, at the 95 percent confidence level, this interval would be from 86,940 to 93,060.

The standard error of the difference between two survey estimates is approximately equal to the square root of the sum of the squares of the standard error of each estimate considered separately. This formula will overestimate the true standard error. If the standard error of the difference is less than the difference itself, the differ-

ence between the two estimates is statistically significant at the 68 percent confidence level; moreover, if twice the standard error of the difference is less than the difference, then the difference is significant at the 95 percent confidence level.

To illustrate the calculation of the standard error of the difference between two estimates, assume that each of two groups of inmates—numbering 35,000 and 20,000 and sentenced for the same type of crime—had a different personal attribute, such as level of educational attainment. The standard error for the difference between the two estimates would be expressed as $\sqrt{(1,185)^2 + (940)^2}$ and would equal 1,510 (Table I). Since twice the standard error of the difference (3,020) is less than the difference between the two estimates (15,000), statistical significance at the 95 percent confidence level can be attached to the difference in size between the two groups.





Definitions and explanations

The Northeast consists of the States of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont. The North Central region is made up of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

The South consists of Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia.

The West includes Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming. Data on the regional distribution of the population by race were derived from U.S. Bureau of the Census, *Statistical Abstract of the United States: 1975*, Washington, D.C., 1975.

As defined for the purposes of the survey, and as used in this report, an inmate's "present" offense (and the present sentence imposed for that offense) is the one that most recently brought the individual under the jurisdiction of a State correctional system (including parole authorities) for an uninterrupted period as of the time of the survey. In the case of some inmates, the "present," or entry, offense is not the same as that for which they were serving a sentence at the time of the survey. An example of a sentence incurred subsequent to the "present" sentence is one that was handed down for a new crime committed by a parolee. Another example is a sentence incurred for a crime committed by an inmate while in prison.

In the case of inmates who were serving a present sentence for more than one offense, only the most serious of the offenses was considered in this report. Seriousness was determined by selecting from among such offenses the most serious according to a predetermined rank order (see list). The term "offense" is used synonymously with "most serious present offense" throughout this report.

For purposes of analysis, the offenses were grouped into four major categories: violent, property, drug, and public order. Violent offenses include murder, attempted murder, manslaughter, kidnaping, rape, statutory rape, lewd act with child, other sexual assaults, robbery, and assault. Property offenses include burglary, larceny, motor vehicle (auto) theft, forgery, fraud, or embezzlement, arson, stolen property offenses, and property damage. Drug offenses are classified as either major (all offenses except possession and except marijuana offenses) or minor (all possession offenses and all marijuana offenses). Public order offenses consist of weapons offenses, sexual offenses not involving force, drunk driving, flight or escape, habitual criminal act violations, and a number of minor offenses grouped under the heading "jail offenses."

The maximum sentence length was calculated by adding the maximum amount of time imposed upon the inmate for each of his present offenses, if the sentences were to be served consecutively. In the case of prisoners who were sentenced to serve time concurrently on more than one offense, the single maximum sentence length imposed was used.

Sex, race, and age

The inmate population was divided into three groups on the basis of race: white, black, and other races. The latter includes American Indians, Asians, and persons of all other races except white and black.

Persons of Hispanic origin in this report are those who indicated that their origin was Mexi-

can, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or some other Hispanic origin. The latter category includes persons from Spain, as well as persons with combinations of types of Hispanic origins. Persons who reported that they were of one of the specific Hispanic origin categories and a non-Hispanic category were included in the specific Hispanic category. Persons of Hispanic origin may be of any race. Comparative data on persons of Hispanic origin in the U.S. population were derived from U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 267, "Population Characteristics, Persons of Spanish Origin in the United States: March 1974," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., July 1974.

The inmates' age at the time of the survey is based on age at the last birthday as of January 1, 1974. Age at the time of admission was calculated by subtracting the date of birth from the date of admission (in months and years). Since the date of admission was obtained only for sentenced inmates, age at the time of admission is available only for sentenced inmates. Comparative data on the age distribution of the U.S. population were based on estimates for July 1, 1974, as reported in U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-25, No. 529, "Estimates of the Population of the United States, by Age, Sex, and Race: July 1, 1974, and April 1, 1970," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1974. The group used for comparison were males age 18-64, as this group most closely represented the population from which the prison population was drawn.

Marital status

Five categories of marital status were recorded: married, widowed, divorced, separated, and never married. Separated persons are those with legal or formal separations, not those separated by reason of incarceration. Marital status was determined at two points in time—at the time of admission to prison and at the time of the survey. A change in marital status was assumed to have taken place if the marital statuses at these two points in time were different. However, some inmates whose status was the same at the time of admission and on the day of the survey may have experienced a change that was not recorded as such. An example of the latter would be an inmate who was married when admitted for the present offense, but divorced and remarried while on parole and

then readmitted to prison for a parole violation (and thus still serving time on the same "present" offense). Such an inmate would be recorded as married at both points in time, but would have actually undergone a change in marital status.

Questions on marital status were asked only of sentenced inmates. Data on the marital status of the U.S. population were based on estimates for March 1974. See U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 271, "Marital Status and Living Arrangements: March 1974," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1974, and Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 242, "Marital Status and Living Arrangements: March 1972," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1972.

Dependents

A dependent was defined as a person who received more than half the amount of financial support from the inmate. Information on dependents was asked only of self-supporting prisoners, i.e., those who were employed most of the month prior to arrest or for any 2 consecutive weeks after December 1968 and had income during the year prior to arrest that enabled them to provide half or more of the resources used to maintain themselves.

Military service

Only sentenced inmates were asked questions relating to military service. The year of discharge from military service was construed as the year of discharge from active duty. Discharges could be of four types: 1) honorable; 2) general, under honorable conditions; 3) general, under other than honorable conditions; and 4) dishonorable. Medical discharges could be either general (honorable) or general (other than honorable). Bad conduct discharges are general (other than honorable).

The official U.S. government definition of Vietnam veterans encompasses all veterans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces between August 5, 1964 and May 7, 1975, the official "Vietnam Era." For purposes of comparison, Vietnam veterans in the prison population were designated as those inmates who were discharged from the Armed Services between 1967 and 1973, inclusive.

Data on veterans in the U.S. population were based on figures for June 1973, as reported in: U.S. Bureau of the Census, *Statistical Abstract of the United States: 1974*, Washington, D.C., 1974.

Educational attainment

Data on the number of years of school completed were derived from the combination of answers to questions concerning the highest grade of school attended by the inmate and whether or not that grade was completed. Such data were recorded only for sentenced inmates. The level of educational attainment was recorded for two points in time: at the time of admission to prison, and at the time of the survey.

Data comparing the educational attainment of the inmates prior to imprisonment to that of the U.S. population were based on estimates for March 1972 for males age 16-54 as reported in U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 243, "Educational Attainment in the United States: March 1972," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1972.

Data comparing the educational attainment of the inmates at the time of the survey to that of the U.S. population were based on estimates for March 1974 for males age 16-54 as reported in U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 274, "Educational Attainment in the United States: March 1973 and 1974," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1974.

Prearrest employment status

For the purposes of the survey, the "employed" were construed as all inmates who had a job or business, either full or part time, during most of the month preceding arrest. Full-time employment is defined as working 35 hours per week or more; part-time employment is less than 35 hours per week. A job was defined as an arrangement for regular work for pay at least every month, or as a formal arrangement with one or more employers to work a specified number of hours per week or month but on an irregular schedule. Persons who were "on call" were not considered to be working. Two or more part-time jobs totaling 35 or more hours per week were counted as a full-time job. Those who were "looking for work" were not employed during most of the month preceding arrest but were actively seeking work during that time. Together, the "employed" and those "looking for work" constitute the labor force. Those not in the labor

force include all persons who were not classified as "employed" or "looking for work" during the month preceding arrest. The term "jobless" as used in this report includes all inmates who were not working during the month prior to arrest, i.e., those who were "looking for work" and those who were "not looking," regardless of whether they wanted a job. Because of the wide variation in the dates of admission to prison, no attempt was made to correlate prearrest employment status with the employment status of the U.S. population.

Data comparing the reasons for not looking for work to those reported by the U.S. population were derived from Current Population Survey (CPS) figures as reported in the *Handbook of Labor Statistics*. Data from the State Inmate Survey and the latter source were not strictly comparable. Two of the categories specified in the former, namely, "no work available in line" and "lack age, experience or training" were not included in the latter. On the other hand the CPS included one category, "thought couldn't get job," that was not provided for in the State Inmate Survey. In addition, respondents to the State Inmate Survey were allowed to cite more than one reason but in the CPS only one reason was allowed. Since the age range used in the CPS, 16-59, encompassed all but a few prisoners (only 1 percent were over 59), it was construed here as including the entire prisoner population.

Prearrest occupation and industry

The occupation and industry data in this report are based on the detailed systems developed for the 1970 census: see *1970 Census of Population, Classified Index of Industry and Occupations*, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. The major occupational groups are combined into four divisions, as follows:

White collar—professional and managerial, sales, and clerical;

Blue collar—craftsmen and kindred workers, operatives except transport, transport equipment operatives, and nonfarm laborers;

Farm workers—farmers and farm managers, farm laborers, and farm foremen; and

Service workers—service workers and domestics.

Questions on prearrest occupation and industry were asked only of inmates who worked during most of the month prior to arrest or at any time since December 1968.

Data comparing the distribution of the U.S. population by occupation and by occupation and education to that of State prison inmates were based on figures for males age 16 and over as reported in U.S. Department of Labor, *Employment and Training Report of the President*, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1976. Data on occupation and race were derived from U.S. Department of Labor *Handbook of Labor Statistics 1973*, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 1974.

Data comparing the distribution of the U.S. population by the industry in which the last job was held to that of the inmates were based on figures for males age 14 and over as reported in U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 90, "Consumer Income: Money Income in 1972 of Families and Persons in the United States," U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., December 1973.

Prearrest financial status

Questions on the source of income were asked only of those inmates who worked during most of the month prior to arrest or at any time since December 1968. Only inmates who reported having a source of income were asked the amount of income during the year prior to arrest and whether or not they were self-supporting. Self-supporting inmates were asked whether they also supported dependents in addition to themselves, and those with dependents were asked whether these dependents were receiving welfare at the time of the survey.

Four categories of sources of income were recorded: wages and salaries, social security, welfare (including public assistance and State aid), and "other" income. "Other" income includes profits from investments, interest earnings, rental income, illegal earnings (although no attempt was made to probe for illegal earnings), and room and board provided by parents, relatives, or friends. The amount of income includes all income received by the inmate before deductions and excludes that of family or household members.

Data comparing inmates' income to that of the U.S. population by race and by education were

derived from U.S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, *Consumer Income: "Money Income in 1972 of Families and Persons in the United States,"* Series P-60, No. 87, June 1973. These data are for males age 14 and over (age 25 and over in the case of education). Data by age and race are available in U.S. Bureau of the Census: *Consumer Income: "Money Income in 1972 of Families and Persons in the United States,"* Series P-60, No. 90, December 1973.
