

This report contains the most current and complete information concerning reported crime in Oregon for 1977. Further, because of the detailed data regarding the nature of the offenses, this report is one of the most comprehensive in the nation.

There is a strong indication that statewide planning and crime prevention programs including increased security measures and citizen awareness are showing positive and tangible results. This is supported by the fact that property crimes such as burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft have shown decreases for the second consecutive year. In addition, the clearance rates for these and other major crimes have shown increases in the past two years.

It is apparent from this report that Oregon's major crime problem relates to crimes of theft, which constitute almost one-half of all crimes reported. The report shows that the median age of persons arrested for these crimes is 18 years of age with the juvenile arrest rate being three times higher than adults. Research will also be directed toward the problems of forcible rape, shoplifting, bad checks, and offenses against the family, which includes child abuse, in an attempt to determine whether or not the increases are reflective of increases only in victim reporting. It is believed that these offenses have been under-reported in the past.

The report is part of the continuing effort to provide reliable data about criminal offenses and offenders to administrators, legislators, planners, educators, and the media. Such information is vital if we are to project and respond to the problems of crime in our society and plan to meet the additional problems that will result from the rapid population growth forecast for our state.

Law enforcement agencies are realizing the value of trend data and use it to more effectively allocate scarce resources to deal with the most serious and urgent problems and improve their responsiveness to the needs of their communities.

Participation in the Oregon Uniform Crime Reporting program includes the State Police, all of the sheriff's departments, and virtually 100 percent of the police agencies and reflects a sense of cooperation and dedication among law enforcement agencies throughout the state. Their support is sincerely appreciated.

#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

This report on crime and arrests in Oregon for the calendar year 1977 was prepared jointly by the Planning and Data Analysis Unit of the Oregon Law Enforcement Council and the Law Enforcement Data System, Executive Department. The publication is the fourth annual analytical report prepared from statistics collected and compiled by the Oregon Uniform Crime Reporting program of the Law Enforcement Data System and analyzed by the Oregon Law Enforcement Council.

This report was prepared and published with financial assistance from the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service, Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, United States Department of Justice.

#### ABSTRACT

This report is an in-depth analysis of criminal offenses and arrests reported in Oregon during 1977.

Contained herein, on a statewide basis, are detailed data regarding Index and Part II offenses under the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting categories including month, day of week, and time of occurrences, location of offenses, and types of property stolen. Arrest statistics reflect age, sex, race and degree of charge.

Other comparisons include Index Crime Rates for Oregon and neighboring states; Oregon's 14 administrative districts and 36 counties; Portland, Salem, and Eugene SMSA; and detailed Index crime comparisons between the cities of Portland, Salem, and Eugene.

Also included, in tabular form only, are types of offenses, clearances, and arrests for each reporting agency in Oregon and type of arrests by age grouping for each of the 36 counties.

New to this annual report are: additional data regarding Index and Part II offenses; a comparison of arrest charges for juveniles versus adults (felonies, misdemeanors, violation); a comparison of the volume of criminal offenses with other non-criminal calls for police service reported by various size law enforcement agencies; and an analysis of types and models of stolen motor vehicles in 1977.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

For the second consecutive year, serious crime (Index crime) showed a decrease in Oregon. Violent offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault) showed a decrease for the first time since at least 1968. Property offenses (burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft) showed a second year decrease statewide, in both urban and rural areas.

The decrease in serious crime in Oregon was larger than shown for its neighboring states and is in keeping with the trend nationwide. Because of large increases in crime in both Oregon and the nation as a whole prior to 1976, this decrease represents a significant change from past years. It is not possible to predict whether this decrease represents a new trend or a short term fluctuation. It should be kept in mind that the total decrease of Index crime is mainly as the result of a decrease in burglary and larceny which constitute 87 percent of the Index. Forcible rape, which represents less than 1 percent of the Index, continued to increase in most areas of the state. Shoplifting, which represents 8 percent of the Index, also continued to increase statewide. It is thought that a portion of the increase in these two offenses may be reflective of an increase in victim cooperation and reporting.

Part II offenses continued to increase statewide. This finding is difficult to interpret because of the small amount of data available. These crimes are not reported on a nationwide basis and have been reported statewide only since 1975. Some of the increase is due to an increase in reporting from agencies which did not report Part II offenses in previous years. It is also thought that some of the increase in the two offenses of bad checks (fraud) and DUII is the result of business cooperation and stricter police enforcement.

Contrary to what people may perceive, the greatest portion of calls for police service is not in the area of criminal offenses but for such noncriminal activities as traffic accidents, family disturbances, animal problems, and rendering assistance to other law enforcement and government

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agencies. An analysis included in this report for the first time, compared calls for police service for different size police departments. However, the analysis does not point out how much time is spent in response and investigation of various types of calls.

Crimes of theft of property, in relatively small dollar values, continue to constitute a substantial percentage of criminal offenses with the highest portion of arrests being of juveniles (age 17 and under). Charges at time of arrest of both juvenile and adult indicate that only 15 percent of the total arrests in 1977 were for felonies with the remaining 85 percent being for misdemeanors and violations. This points to the fact that the vast majority of offenses reported do not involve personal serious injury or large property losses but can be termed "lesser offenses."

While the number of serious assault offenses remained fairly stable in 1977, incidences involving resisting arrest and assaults against police officers showed large increases, especially in the larger metropolitan areas. The four-year trend indicates increasing numbers of assaults and resistance to arrests not only statewide but on a national scale.

An analysis of the proportion of theft to number of types of registered motor vehicles revealed a rate of theft of commercial trucks and buses and motorcycles of almost three times higher than for automobiles. The highest numbers of stolen automobiles were 1960-1969 Chevrolets. Equally as popular were 1965-1969 Fords and 1973-1976 Honda motorcycles.

The following statistical summary is presented as an overview of the volume of major activity in Oregon in 1976 and 1977 with detailed information regarding various offenses which may be of interest to especially those persons involved in crime prevention and planning.

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#### **OREGON AT-A-GLANCE\***

Oregon, central state of the Pacific group, is bounded on the north by Washington, on the east by Idaho, on the south by California and Nevada and on the west by the Pacific Ocean, and lies between 42 degrees 15 minutes, north latitude; and 116 degrees 45 minutes and 124 degrees 30 minutes, west longtitude.

Oregon originally included Washington and Idaho, and parts of Montana and Wyoming, with an area of 286,541 square miles. The width east and west is 395 miles and the length north and south is 295 miles. Oregon was admitted to the Union on February 14, 1859, and the 33rd star in the flag was added for the state on July 4, 1859.

#### COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY\*

Growth of diversified manufacturing in recent years has been changing Oregon's largely resource-oriented economy, which historically has been heavily dependent on forest and agriculture products as the basic foundation.

Forest products, including lumber and plywood and paper and allied products, continue to be Oregon's leading industry. The harvesting and processing of timber into a wide variety of products accounts for nearly 43 percent of the state's more than 5,000 manufacturing establishments, about 37 percent of its manufacturing employment and slightly less than half of the value added by all of the state's manufacturing industry.

The relative position of the forest products industry has been lessened somewhat by the growth of other kinds of manufacturing and the growth of service industries.

From 1958 to 1974, the value added by all manufacturing increased from \$1,222 million to \$4,721 million. During this same period, value added by the forest products industry increased from \$660 million to \$1,974 million.

The metals-related group of industries, including primary metals, fabricated metals, machinery, electrical machinery and transportation equipment has been the state's pacesetter in growth of manufacturing. In the 15 years from 1960 to 1975, employment in the metals-related industries rose from about 24,000 to about 53,000 representing an increase from 16 percent to about 29 percent of the state's total manufacturing employment.

Agriculture is a major industry in Oregon, with cash receipts from farm marketing of over \$1 billion in 1975.

Tourism is another important contributor to Oregon's economy. The impact of spending by tourists from out of state is felt on a number of industries and activities, including retail and wholesale trade, services and transportation.

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#### SECTION 1

#### OVERVIEW OF OREGON CRIME REPORTING AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

#### INTRODUCTION

This is the fourth annual report of criminal offenses and arrests produced by the State of Oregon since the beginning of the Oregon Uniform Crime Reporting Program (OUCR). OUCR is an incident based reporting program, tailored to the needs and operational procedures of the police agencies in Oregon.

Incident based reporting requires the recording of specific information about each criminal event known to the police. A criminal event may be reported to a police department by a victim or other source or discovered as a result of police operations. Any reported criminal incident that is determined to be unfounded through subsequent police investigation is deleted from the counts.

The Oregon Uniform Crime Reporting Program requires the reporting of all criminal offenses defined as "Part I and Part II Crimes", and the reporting of all arrests for such offenses. Law enforcement agencies also report the clearance of such offenses by arrests of persons or other means. The number of persons reported as arrested includes all persons reported as physically arrested, summoned or cited by police agencies during 1977.

The OUCR system provides reporting agencies with the capability to record statistics on activities handled by the agency that do not constitute criminal events. It also allows the agency to record and report additional attributes of both criminal events and activities such as the location within the jurisdiction or time of day of the occurrence.

Reporting agencies submit the recorded data monthly to the Law Enforcement Data System either on provided forms or magnetic tape. The data is then processed in a computerized system and reports reflecting the monthly activity of each agency are produced and returned to the contributor for their use.

As agency reports are processed each month, data required for the FBI National UCR Program is extracted. When all agencies have been processed, a magnetic tape containing UCR data for all Oregon incident reporting agencies is mailed to the FBI.

Definitions of the offenses, clearances, and arrests are included in Appendix A of this report.

#### **REPORTING JURISDICTION**

Reported offenses relate to the jurisdiction in which they occur. The arrest and clearance, in every case, is attributed to the jurisdiction in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense. State Police and County Sheriffs have concurrent jurisdiction in all counties of the state. Their reports generally apply to criminal offenses and arrests occurring in those areas outside incorporated cities which have municipal police departments.

#### DEGREE OF REPORTING

During 1977, offense and related supplementary information, including arrest data, was received from 133 municipal police departments, 36 county sheriff departments and the Oregon State Police, who have provided offense and arrest information in all 36 counties.

In 1977, the number of agencies participating in the OUCR program represented service to 99 percent of the state's population. The Portland and Multhomah County Departments reported both Part I and Part II information in summary form, and because of the summary method, statistics relating to day of week, time of day, premise type and article type do not include the Portland Police Bureau or the Multhomah County Sheriff's Department.

#### USE OF OUCR

Only crimes known to the police will be included as part of the official crime rate. Thus, under-reporting of crime can have a significant impact on crime rates and also on the evaluation of the effectiveness of crime reduction programs.

Substantial evidence is contained in reports on criminal victimization surveys which indicates that reporting rates are highly stable among most social groups and across different geographical areas. This suggests reported crime can be a good indicator of crime patterns and trends.

While it is apparent that crime information reported to the police does not provide a complete picture of the crime situation in our society, it is compiled and analyzed because of the following reasons:

- a. Reported crime information is used by the police agencies for resource allocation and determining appropriate agency responses to occurrences.
- b. Reported crime data, recognized as a portion of the total crime, is, in fact, a highly accurate measurement of occurrences in society that must be addressed by the criminal justice system.
- c. This system is based in definitions which are standardized (uniform) across the nation and it is unlikely that it will be appreciabely altered in the forseeable future.

#### INTERJURISDICTIONAL COMPARISONS

Care should be taken in drawing conclusions and making decisions about problems based solely on crime and arrest data as reported by different law enforcement jurisdictions. Factors relating to crime reporting practices, law enforcement policies, population characteristics and attitudes all made for variation in reported data.

Some general factors which may affect the amount of crime reported and type of crime committed are:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age.
- Economic status, education, and recreation characteristics of the community population.
- Relative stability of the population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions, and other geographical variations.
- Religious characteristics of the population.
- Effective strength of the police force.
- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
- Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.
- The administrative and investigative follow-up of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

#### LAW ENFORCEMENT IN OREGON

Municipal police departments have full police powers within their jurisdictions including the investigation of crime, enforcement of state criminal and traffic laws and city ordinances.

County sheriffs exercise general law enforcement authority in their respective counties enforcing state criminal and traffic laws, and county ordinances. Sheriffs departments generally confine their law enforcement services to areas not served by municipal police departments. Sheriffs may provide law enforcement services to incorporated municipalities on a contract basis.

The Oregon State Police have full law enforcement authority. They may conduct criminal investigations and enforce state laws anywhere within the State. However, they generally function outside of incorporated cities except when assistance is requested by a local police agency. State Police have primary responsibility for patrol of interstate freeways, the state highway system, and enforcement of fish and game laws. Occasionally, patrols are also provided on county roads. The Department of State Police also provides support services to municipal and county departments upon request. These include crime laboratory services, fingerprint identification, criminal records, questioned document examination, polygraph service and specialized investigation teams for arson and narcotics investigations.

#### Law Enforcement employees - 1977

The Oregon Uniform Crime Reporting Program also includes the collection of data relating to the number of full-time employed police officers and civilian personnel. There were 5,979 full-time law enforcement employees reported in 1977 as illustrated in Table 1.1. This represents an increase of 6.6 percent in the total of all personnel in municipal police agencies, sheriffs departments, and the State Police over 1976.

Male employees accounted for 77.4 percent of the total employees. The total number of male employees increased by 5.4 percent in 1977 while the number of female employees increased by 10.6 percent. Sworn officers accounted for 74.9 percent of the total work force with the remaining 25.1 percent being full-time civilians.

Of the 4,625 total male employees, 92.8 percent were sworn officers and 7.2 percent were civilians. Of the 1,354 total female employees, 14.0 percent were sworn officers and 86.0 percent were civilians. Using the total state population of 2,396,100, the number of law enforcement employees per 1,000 population was 2.50. The number of sworn officers per 1,000 population was 1.87. The number of sworn officers decreased from 1976 by 3.8 percent.

#### COURTS

During 1976, there were forty-four Justice Courts with misdemeanor and traffic jurisdiction. Twenty-four counties had district courts with circuit courts providing service to all 36 counties. Circuit courts have jurisdiction in all felony criminal matters. The State Court of Appeals and the State Supreme Court provide service at the appellate levels.

During 1977, 33,696 felony cases, 42,642 misdemeanors and 550,997 traffic cases were filed in the state court system; municipal courts reported handling an additional 144,358 traffic cases<sup>1</sup> (includes only those municipal courts reporting for the entire 12 month period).

Child Welfare and the prevention and control of juvenile delinquency is a joint responsibility of the State of Oregon and its 36 counties, working in conjunction with private agencies. Oregon's circuit courts, and in some cases, county courts, have exclusive jurisdiction in cases involving persons under 18 years of age whose actions may be in violation of a law and/or ordinance.

Juvenile courts and departments are essentially involved with the juvenile correction process. Referrals made by law enforcement officers, parents, relatives, neighbors or any interested party may result in an informal or formal hearing, followed by dismissal, supervision or detention, depending on a referral cause and the needs of the child. The juvenile department, under the auspices of the circuit court or county court, is responsible for disposition of all delinquency cases.

#### CORRECTIONS

At the state level, the Corrections Division of the Oregon Human Resources Department is responsible for all adult offenders sentenced to state penal institutions or placed under the supervision of parole or probation. During 1977, the division received 1,446 offenders committed to institutional custody with 3,619 placed on probation. As of December 31, 1977, the division had 2,719 inmates in actual custody plus 205 housed in regional or local facilities on work release or educational programs; an additional 8,989 persons were under parole or probation supervision. During 1977, 1,296 persons were released from institutions to parole by order of the Oregon Board of Parole.<sup>2</sup>

Responsibility for state programs dealing with juvenile delinquency, welfare and other needs of children is vested in the Children's Services Division of the Department of Human Resources. The division operates two training schools, two work-study camps, a juvenile parole and community service unit, administers subsidy funds distributed to county juvenile departments, certifies foster homes and child care agencies, and purchases group treatment and care from private child care agencies and family foster care from families.

#### SECTION 2

#### STATEWIDE OFFENSE AND ARREST DATA

#### INTRODUCTION

This section presents the number of criminal offenses and arrests reported by police agencies in 1977. The statistics represent the aggregate of all reporting agencies within the state, except when noted, and is arranged in the following six subsections:

- 1. Overview of offenses.
- 2. Overview of arrests.
- 3. Detailed information regarding Index and Part II offenses.
- 4. Data regarding other types of calls for service.
- 5. Data concerning assaults against police officers.
- 6. Comparison with neighboring states.

Certain types of information do not represent the State as a whole (e.g., day of week, time of day, type of premise, article stolen, degree of charge at time of arrest). Some of these elements are optional for agencies to report and others, such as Part II offense breakdown data, were not reported by the agencies still using the summary reporting method (Portland Police Bureau and the Multnomah County Sheriff's office).

The statewide offense totals in this section are not identical to those shown in Section 4 of this report. The differences are less than 1/2 of one percent and are the result of two different and separate methods of compiling the data at two different points of time.

#### OVERVIEW OF OFFENSES

The total number of offenses (Index and Part II) should not be compared between 1976 and 1977 as two large agencies, Eugene and Springfield Police Departments, did not report Part II offenses in 1976. However, the rates (number of offenses per 100,000 population) can be compared. The 1976 rates were calculated by subtracting out the populations for Eugene and Springfield from the state total.

The total crime rate in 1977 (12,353.2) increased by 1.0 percent over 1976. The Index crime rate in 1977 (5,918.0) showed a decrease of 6.3 percent from 1976, while the Part II crime rate in 1977 (6,435.2) increased by 8.8 percent (see Table 2.1). The Part II crime rate in 1977 was 8 percent higher than the Index rate. Among all crimes, the highest rate was calculated for larceny at 3,462.9 offenses per 100,000 population while the second highest was burglary at 1,613.7. Together, these two offenses represented 41.1 percent of the total number of offenses reported in 1977.




FIGURE 2.1 - ALL OFFENSES - 1977 PERCENT DISTRIBUTION The Index and Part II offenses were combined into seven general categories as shown in Table 2.2 with their respective percent distribution, rate per 100,000 population, and change from 1976 to 1977. As shown, the crimes involving theft represented the highest rate per 100,000 (5,934) and showed a decrease of 5.6 percent from 1976. Crimes involving destruction to property also showed a decrease (-1.2 percent) while the remaining categories showed increases.

The 1977 percentage distribution of both Index offenses and Part II (from Table 2.1) is depicted in the form of a pie chart in Figure 2.1. Larceny represents the largest single offense portion of all offenses with larceny, burglary, and vandalism together representing 52.8 percent of the total in 1977. Two major crimes, normally considered the most serious, murder and forcible rape, represented a very small percentage of crime in 1977 (less than 0.4 percent).

A chi-square test on the distribution of rates for the two years showed a significant difference at the 99 percent confidence level ( $X^2$ =41.34, DF = 6). The most significant difference in the rates was in the category of crimes involving theft, down 5.6 percent from 1976.

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#### Index Offenses

There were 141,803 Index offenses reported by police agencies in 1977, representing 47.9 percent of all offenses reported statewide. Of the Index offenses, 7.6 percent (10,710) were violent offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault) and 92.4 percent (131,093) were property offenses (burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft).




FIGURE 2.2 - INDEX OFFENSES - 1977 PERCENT DISTRIBUTION

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Larceny accounted for 58.5 percent of all Index offenses and 63.3 percent of the property offenses as depicted in Figure 2.2 with burglary second at 27.3 percent of the total. Aggravated assault accounted for 4.7 percent of all Index offenses, but represented 62.8 percent of the violent offenses. Murder represented the lowest percentage of the total (0.08 percent) in 1977.

The Index crime rate (offenses per 100,000 population) was 5,918 per 100,000 in 1977 - a decrease of 6.3 percent from 1976 as presented in Table 2.3. The highest increase in Index crime rates was in murder (+17.1 percent over 1976) while the forcible rape rate increased by 11.1 percent. A chi-square test was performed on the violent crime rates in each category for 1976 and 1977 and revealed no significant change at the 95 percent confidence level ( $x^2 = .58$ , DF =3).

A chi-square test performed on the property crime rates in each category for 1976 and 1977 revealed no significant change at the 95 percent confidence level ( $x^2 = 1.58$ , DF = 2).

There were 30,549 arrests in 1977 for Index offenses of which 4,289 (14.0 percent) were for violent offenses and 26,260 (86.0 percent) were for property offenses. As in 1976, the highest number of arrests in 1977 were for larceny (59.5 percent of the total arrests for Index crimes).

Of the 141,803 reported Index offenses, 21.8 percent (31,021) were cleared compared to 19.6 percent in 1976. The clearance rate for violent crimes was 45.1 percent (up 0.6 percentage points) while the clearance rate for property crimes was 20.0 percent compared to 17.7 percent in 1976. The highest clearance rate was for murder (73.3 percent) with the next highest being for aggravated assault (50.4 percent). Both showed a decrease from 1976.

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#### Part II Offenses

There were 154,194 Part II offenses reported by police agencies in 1977 representing 52.1 percent of all offenses reported statewide. The highest number of Part II offenses were of vandalism (22.5 percent of the Part II total) with DUII offenses second and representing 17.2 percent of the Part II total.

The Part II crime rate in 1977 (offenses per 100,000 population) was 6,435 compared to 5,918 for Index offenses. The Part II crime rate increased by 8.8 percent over 1976 with increases in virtually every category. The largest increase in 1977 was shown in the liquor law rate - up 31.8 percent over 1976. The largest decrease was shown in the rate for stolen property offenses down 30.6 percent from 1976.

#### STOLEN, DAMAGED, DESTROYED PROPERTY AND LOSS VALUE

#### Index Offenses

In 1977, the total value of property stolen in the commission of Index offenses was reported at \$48,494,320 - an increase of 4.5 percent over 1976 (see Table 2.4). Of this total, \$16,772,574 or 34.6 percent in value was recovered. The largest increase in recovery rate (percent recovered) was for currency (from 5.4 percent in 1976 to 11.7 percent in 1977).

The highest value of type of property stolen was \$17,159,167 for stolen motor vehicles which accounted for 35.4 percent of the total stolen value and showed the highest percentage of recovered value (73.6 percent). If motor vehicles are subtracted from the totals, the stolen value of property stolen would be \$31,335,153; recovered, \$4,136,256 - a recovery rate of 13.2 percent (11.8 percent in 1976).

Part II Offenses

Part II offenses reported to the police, which involved a loss of property, either stolen, damaged, or destroyed, are presented in Table 2.5. Property loss values for Part II offenses were not reported by the Portland Police Bureau or Multnomah County Sheriff's office in 1977. Consequently, the values shown in Table 2.5 are considerably less than actual for the state as a whole.

The loss of property resulting from arson was over \$6.3 million compared to vandalism which accounted for over \$2.2 million in property loss. The property loss involved with fraud, which is mainly bad check writing, exceeded \$800,000 in 1977.

#### TOTAL ARRESTS STATEWIDE (TABLE 2.6)

In 1977, police agencies reported a total of 113,810 arrests - an increase of 9.2 percent over 1976 and reflects a increase of 13.7 percent since 1975. Arrests for Index offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft) accounted for 26.8 percent of the total (30,549 arrests reported for Index offenses in 1977 - an increase of 6.7 percent over 1976). Arrests for Part II offenses accounted for the remaining 73.2 percent of the total (79,190 arrests reported for Part II offenses in 1977). This is an increase of 4.8 percent over 1976.

#### <u>Juvenile Arrests (17 years of age and under)</u>

In 1977, the total number of arrests of juveniles (38,147) increased by 5.6 percent over 1976. Arrests of juveniles for Index offenses in 1977 (15,744) increased 4.8 percent while arrests of juveniles for Part II offenses (22,403) increased by 6.2 percent.

Of the total arrests, 33.5 percent were juveniles; of the arrests for Index offenses, 51.5 percent were juveniles; and of the arrests for Part II offenses, 28.3 percent were juveniles. As in 1976, the highest numbers of arrests of juveniles were for larceny, liquor laws, runaway, burglary and curfew respectively. A chi-square test performed on the numbers of arrests of juveniles for Part I offenses for 1976 and 1977 showed no significant differences at the 95 percent confidence level ( $X^2 = 9.83$ , DF = 7). However, the chi-square for the number of arrests of juveniles for Part II offenses for the same two years revealed significant differences at the 99 percent confidence level ( $X^2 = 104.77$ , DF = 17). The most significant differences between 1976 and 1977 were an unexpected decrease in arrests for vandalism and drug abuse and a larger increase in curfew than expected.

#### Adult Arrests (18 years of age and older)

In 1977, the total number of arrests of adults (75,663) increased by 11.1 percent over 1976. Arrests of adults for Index offenses in 1977 (14,805) increased 8.8 percent while arrests of adults for Part II offenses (60,827) increased by 11.6 percent.

Of the total arrests, 66.5 percent were adults; of the arrests for Index offenses, 48.5 percent were adults; and of the arrests for Part II offenses, 71.7 percent were adults. As in 1976, the highest numbers of arrests of adults were for DUII, larceny, liquor laws, and drug abuse respectively.

As is the case with juveniles, the differences in the number of adults arrested for Part I offenses between 1976 and 1977 were not significant at the 95 percent confidence level ( $X^2 = 12.95$ , DF = 7). However, the chi-square for the numbers of arrests of adults for Part II offenses for the same two years showed significant differences at the 99 percent confidence level ( $X^2 = 189.60$ , DF = 16). The most significant differences between 1976 and 1977 were an unexpected decrease in drug abuse arrests, a higher increase in DUII arrests than expected, and a high increase in arrests for the "all other" category. As shown later in this report, a very high percentage of arrests for the "all other" category is for trespassing.

#### Summary - Juvenile/Adult Arrests (Table 2.7)

A summary of the arrest rates (arrests per 1,000 population) for both juveniles and adults is presented in Table 2.7 by general offense categories for 1976 and 1977.

A chi-square test was performed on both distributions: juvenile rates by category for 1976 and 1977, and adult rates by category for 1976 and 1977, and showed no significant differences between the two years (juvenile rates -  $X^2$ = .05, DF = 6; adult rates -  $X^2$  = .03, DF = 6).

This shows that although there were significant differences in the absolute numbers of arrests between 1976 and 1977, there were no significant differences in the rate of arrests (per respective 1,000 population).

Male Arrests (Table 2.8)

Of the total arrests in 1977, 92,367 or 81.2 percent were of males. The total reflects an increase of 9.1 percent over 1976.

Of the total arrests of males in 1977, 23,663 or 25.6 percent were for Part I offenses - this represents an increase of 6.0 percent over 1976. Arrests of males for Part II offenses in 1977 (68,704) accounted for the remaining 74.4 percent of the total male arrests - an increase in number of arrests for Part II offenses of 10.2 percent over 1976.

A chi-square test on the numbers of arrests of males for Part I offenses in 1976 versus 1977 revealed a significant difference at the 95 percent confidence level ( $X^2 = 16.32$ , DF = 7). The most significant difference was in motor vehicle theft. The number of arrests showed a decrease rather than an expected increase.

A chi-square test on the numbers of arrests of males for Part II offenses in 1976 and 1977 revealed a significant difference at the 99 percent confidence level ( $X^2$  = 200.37, DF = 18). The most significant differences were:

Vandalism - an unexpected decrease Prostitution - an unexpected decrease Drug Abuse - an unexpected decrease DUII - a larger increase than expected.

Female Arrests (Table 2.9)

Of the total arrests in 1977, 21,443 or 18.8 percent were of females. The total reflects an increase of 9.8 percent over 1976.

Of the total arrests of females in 1977, 6,919 or 32.3 percent were for Part I offenses - this represents an increase of 9.3 percent over 1976. Arrests of females for Part II offenses in 1977 (14,524) accounted for the remaining 67.7 percent of the total female arrests - an increase in number of arrests for Part II offenses of 10.1 percent over 1976.

A chi-square test on the numbers of arrests of females for Part I offenses in 1976 versus 1977 revealed no significant difference at the 95 percent confidence level ( $X^2 = 13.37$ , DF = 7). However, there were significant differences in the number of females arrested for Part II offenses in comparing 1976 and 1977 ( $X^2 = 75.66$ , DF 18). The most significant differences were:

"All Other" offenses - a significant increase over 1976. DUII - a larger increase than expected. Fraud and Drug Abuse - an unexpected decrease in both.

#### Summary--Male/Female Arrests

In general, the number of males arrested in 1977 increased proportionately to the number of females arrested. A significantly higher percentage of females than males proportionately are arrested for Part I offenses, particularly for larceny-theft, whereas, a higher percentage of males than females proportionately are arrested for Part II offenses, particularly for drugs and liquor violations.

### Number of Arrests By Degree of Charge (Table 2.10)

Of 113,810 arrests made in 1977, 75,996 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest and could be related to Oregon Revised Statues (O.R.S.) and class of crime. Arrests by degree of charge were not reported by agencies using the summary method in 1977 (Portland Police Bureau and Multnomah County Sheriffs Department).

Of the 75,996 arrests, 15.3 percent were for felony offenses; 38.4 percent were for misdemeanor offenses; and 46.3 percent were for unclassified misdemeanors and violations such as DUII and liquor law violations. Among the most serious, felony-class A comprised 5.3 percent of the total arrests.


A greater percentage of juveniles were arrested for felony offenses than were adults (24.5 percent of the juveniles arrested compared to 11.3 percent of the adults), whereas the majority of the adults (55.6 percent) were arrested for unclassified misdemeanors, DUII, and liquor violations. Arrests for class A felony offenses represented 9.8 percent of the arrests of juveniles compared to 3.4 percent of the arrests of adults.

Of the total arrests for felony offenses, juveniles represented 48.1 percent and adults represented 51.9 percent.

Figure 2.3 depicts the median age of persons arrested for each offense category including the median age of persons arrested for total Part I offenses, Part II offenses, and all offenses. As illustrated, the median age of persons arrested for Part I offenses was 18 years compared to 22 years of age for Part II offenses. The lower median ages of 15 to 18 were for crimes of theft (burglary, larceny, motor vehicles), vandalism and runaways.




#### MURDER

### Introduction


There were 117 offenses of murder reported in 1977 - an increase of 20.6 percent over 1976. Murder represented 0.08 percent of the total Index offenses in 1977 and 0.04 percent of all crimes. The clearance rate of 72.6 percent, although dropping from 84.5 percent in 1976, remained the highest rate among Index crimes.

As depicted in Figure 2.4, the murder rate (number of offenses per 100,000 population) has not changed substantially since 1974. The rate in 1974 was 5.5; the rate in 1977 was 4.8.




### Murder--Month of Occurrence (Figure 2.5)

The number of murder offenses in 1977 are depicted in Figure 2.5 by the month in which they were reported. The highest percentage of murders occurred in August in 1977. According to the 3-year average (1974-1976) the highest numbers of offenses occurred during July and October.



# Murder---Time of Day (Figure 2.6)

Figure 2.6 depicts the number of murders in 1977 by the time of day in which they occurred. As shown, the period 10 p.m. to midnight accounted for the highest percentage of incidents. The majority of murder offenses occurred between 4 p.m. and 4 a.m.




FIGURE 2.7 - MURDER - TYPE OF WEAPON

## Murder--Weapon (Figure 2.7.)

The percentage of murders by type of weapon used is shown in Figure 2.7. Of the 117 murders reported, 78 (67%) were committed using a firearm (handgun, rifle or shotgun). The remaining 33 percent involved a knife, blunt instrument, other type of weapon and hands, fists, and feet.

### Murder--Victims (Table 2.11)

The number of murder victims are presented in Table 2.11 by various age groupings, sex, and race. Of the total victims, 10.2 percent were under 18 years of age; 26.5 percent were 18 to 24 years of age; and the majority (69.3 percent) were 25 years of age or older. Male victims represented 67.5 percent of the total with the remaining 32.5 percent being female. 81.1 percent were White; 12.0 percent were Negro; and 6.9 percent were Indian.




FIGURE 2.8 - MURDER - KNOWN CIRCUMSTANCES

## Murder--Circumstances (Figure 2.8)

The number of murders are depicted in Figure 2.8 by the type of circumstance surrounding the incidents. As shown, 23.0 percent involved family relations (spouse, parent/child, other family). Persons involved in a romantic triangle or lovers quarrels represented 12.8 percent and other types of arguments constituted 23.0 percent of the total. Of the total, 32.5 percent were as the result of unknown circumstances.

PERCENT DISTRIBUTION

## Arrests for Murder (Table 2.12)

In 1976, there were 112 arrests made for murder, of which 11 percent were juveniles and 89 percent were adults. Of the total, 98 percent were male and 2 percent were female. The median age of arrest for murder was 27 years.

### FORCIBLE RAPE

### Introduction

There were 937 forcible rape offenses (which include attempts) reported in 1977 - an increase of 13.7 percent over 1976. Forcible rape represented 0.6 percent of all Index offenses and 0.3 percent of all crimes. The clearance rate of 47.0 percent is among the highest rates for Index crime and showed a slight increase over 1976. In 1974, the forcible rape rate per 100,000 females was 63.4. The figure dropped slightly in 1975 to 63.1 and has increased since (68.8 in 1975; 77.4 in 1977). The rate in 1977 showed an increase of 12.5 percent over 1976. The rate in Oregon (number of offenses per 100,000 female residents) is approximately 32 percent higher than the national rate.





FIGURE 2.9 - FORCIBLE RAPE RATE

### Rape--Month of Occurrence (Figure 2.10)


The number of forcible rape offenses for 1977 are depicted in Figure 2.10 by the month in which they occurred. The highest percentages of offenses occurred in July through September. This is consistent with the average for the period 1974-1976. August 1977 was approximately 53 percent higher then the 3-year average.



# Rape--Day of Week (Figure 2.11)

Of the 937 forcible rape offenses in 1977, 481 were reported by the day of the week on which they occurred as shown in Figure 2.11.

Of the 481 offenses reported with day of week, the highest number were reported as occurring on Tuesday (90 offenses or 19 percent). The next highest day was Sunday (76 offenses or 16 percent).




FIGURE 2.12 - FORCIBLE RAPE - TIME OF DAY

### Rape--Time of Day (Figure 2.12)

Of the 937 forcible rape offenses in 1977, 419 were reported by the time of day in which they occurred as shown in Figure 2.12.

Of the 419 offenses reported by time, the highest number were reported between 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. (67 offenses or 16 percent) with 188 offenses (45 percent) reported between 10 p.m. and 4 a.m. Of the total, 291 offenses (69 percent) were reported at night (6 p.m. - 6 a.m.). The distribution is similar to that reported in 1976.

### Rape--Type of Offense (Table 2.13)

Of the total 937 forcible rape offenses reported in 1977, 675 offenses (72.0 percent) were rape by force and 262 offenses (28.0 percent) were attempted forcible rape as shown in Table 2.13. The clearance rate for rape by force was 51.6 percent (49.9 percent in 1976) and 35.1 percent for attempted offenses (33.6 percent in 1976). The total clearance rate for rape increased from 45.6 percent in 1976 to 47.0 percent in 1977.

Using estimated female population figures for 1977, the rate per 100,000 for rape by force was 55.1 (an increase of 8.7 percent over 1976) while the rate for attempted was 21.4 (up 18.2 percent over 1976). The total rate per 100,000 female residents was 76.5. Assuming one victim/one offense, one out of 1,307 female residents was a victim of a forcible rape offense in 1977. The national rate in 1976 was one victim out of 1,923 female residents.

## Rape--Type of Weapon (Table 2.14)

Of the 937 forcible rape offenses in 1977, 510 were reported by the type of weapon used as shown in Table 2.14. Of the 510 offenses, 422 (83 percent) involved the use of hands or fists and the remaining 88 (17 percent) involved the use or threat of a dangerous weapon.

### Rape--Type of Premise (Table 2.15)

Of the 937 forcible rape offenses in 1977, 305 were reported by the type of premise on which they occurred. As shown in Table 2.15, 53.4 percent of the offenses occurred in a residence/apartment/duplex; 23.0 percent occurred in a parking lot and street; 5.6 percent occurred in a public building, such as a school, and business; the remaining 18.0 percent occurred at other types of locations.

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

### ROBBERY

#### Introduction

There were 2,936 robbery offenses in 1977 - a decrease of 5.1 percent from 1976. Robbery represented 2.1 percent of Index crimes and 1.0 percent of all crimes in 1977. The clearance rate for robbery in 1977 was 31.5 percent compared to 28.9 percent in 1976. In 1977, the rate per 100,000 population was 122.5 (a decrease of 7.3 percent from 1976). The national rate in 1976 was 195.8.


Figure 2.13 depicts the robbery rates (offenses per 100,000 population) in Oregon from 1974 to 1977. This rate in 1977 was 122.5 as compared to 130.7 in 1974. This means that approximately one out of every 816 persons was a victim of a robbery in 1977 assuming one victim/one offense.



# Robbery--Month of Occurrence (Figure 2.14)

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The number of robbery offenses for 1977 are depicted in Figure 2.14 by the month in which they occurred. As shown, the highest percentage of offenses occurred during January and December. The pattern is quite similar to that shown in 1976. The highest number of offenses occurred in December of 1977 - consistent with the 3-year average.





FIGURE 2.15 - ROBBERY - DAY OF WEEK

## Robbery--Day of Week (Figure 2.15)

Of the 2,936 robbery offenses in 1977, 945 offenses were reported by the day of the week in which they occurred as depicted in Figure 2.15. As shown, the lowest number of offenses were reported as occurring on Wednesday with Saturday showing the highest number (161 offenses or 17 percent of the total).

### Robbery--Time of Day (Figure 2.16)

Of the 2,936 robbery offenses reported in 1977, 921 were reported by time of day in which they occurred as shown in Figure 2.16.

Of the 921 offenses, the highest number occurred between 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. (158 offenses or 17.2 percent of the total). Robberies occurring at night (6 p.m. - 6 a.m.) represented 67 percent of the total. The distribution is similar to that shown in 1976.



### Robbery--Target (Table 2.17)

The number of robbery offenses in 1977 are presented in Table 2.17 by location of their occurrence. The highest number of robberies occurred at miscellaneous locations such as public schools, parking lots, parks, etc. (43.1 percent of the total) with the second highest percentage (14.6 percent) occurring on the highway (streets, alleys, sidewalks). The number of robberies occurring on the highway and at commercial houses showed sharp decreases from 1976 (-35.9 percent and -33.8 percent respectively). Although the number is small, bank robberies increased 36.7 percent over 1976.

The total value of property stolen in 1977 was reported at \$909,114 - an increase of 11 percent over 1976. As with 1976, the highest mean value per offense was \$1,907 in 1977 for bank robberies.

# Robbery--Type of Weapon (Table 2.18)

As shown in Table 2.18, 44.3 percent of the robbery offenses in 1977 involved the threat or use of strong-arm (hands, fists, feet) while 39.4 percent involved firearms. There are only slight differences in the clearance rates for the type of weapon involved.

### Arrests For Robbery (Table 2.19)

In 1977, there were 1,038 arrests for robbery - an increase of 12 percent over 1976. Of the total, 30 percent were of juveniles and 70 percent were adults; 89 percent were male, and 11 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 20 years with 72 percent of the total arrested being White, 25 percent being Negro and the remaining 3 percent other races.

Of the 1,038 arrests for robbery in 1977, 463 were reported by specific degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.19. The distributions by degree were similar to those in 1976. The majority of persons arrested were for first degree robbery (55 percent) which is a class A felony. The majority of adults arrested was for first degree (60 percent) while the majority of juveniles arrested was for second and third degree robbery (52 percent) class B and C felonies respectively.



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#### AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

#### Introduction

There were 6,720 aggravated assault offenses in 1977 - an increase of 2.0 percent over 1976. Aggravated assault represented 4.7 percent of Index crime and 2.3 percent of all crimes reported in 1977. The clearance rate for aggravated assault was 50.4 percent in 1977 compared to 51.1 percent in 1976.

The rate per 100,000 population in 1977 was 280.4 - a slight decrease from 1976. The rates for the period 1974 - 1977 are depicted in Figure 2.17 and have shown a relatively stable pattern since 1975.




FIGURE 2.18 - AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - MONTH

## Aggravated Assault--Month of Occurrence (Figure 2.18)

As shown in Figure 2.18, the highest number of offenses occurred in August and December. The distribution is similar to that for the 3-year average except for December. December 1977 was approximately 41 percent higher than the average.




FIGURE 2.19 - AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - DAY OF WEEK




FIGURE 2.20 - AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - TIME OF DAY

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## Aggravated Assault--Type of Premise (Table 2.21)

Of the 6,720 offenses reported in 1977, 3,001 were reported by the type of premise in which the offense occurred. As shown in Table 2.21, 38.9 percent occurred in a residence, apartment, duplex; 27.7 percent were in a parking lot or street; 8.6 percent occurred in a tavern/restaurant/nightclub; 7.2 percent occurred in a park or yard; and the remaining 17.6 percent occurred in other locations.

### Arrests For Aggravated Assault

In 1977, there were 2,869 arrests for aggravated assault - a 14.3 percent increase over 1976. Of the total, 20 percent were juveniles and 80 percent were adults; 88 percent of the total White, 8 percent Negro and 4 percent other races.

Of the 2,869 arrests for assault, 2,142 were reported by specific degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.22. The distribution of arrests was similar to that in 1976 with the majority of arrests (52 percent) being for third degree assault - a class A misdemeanor. Of the total arrests, 26 percent were for felonies and 74 percent were for misdemeanors.

BURGLARY

Introduction

There were 38,665 burglary offenses reported in 1977 - a decrease of 2.0 percent from 1976. Burglary represented 27.3 percent of Index crime and 13.1 percent of all crime in 1977. The total clearance rate for burglary was 16.7 percent compared to 14.8 percent in 1976.

The number of burglary offenses by target and time of day are presented in Table 2.23. Residential burglaries represented 64.4 percent of the total and showed a decrease of 2.1 percent from 1976. Non-residential burglaries represented the remaining 35.6 percent of the total and decreased by 1.7 percent from 1976. The percent distribution is similar to that shown for 1976.

The number of forcible entries made in 1977 decreased by 2.6 percent from 1976 while the number of no force entries decreased 3.9 percent. The number of attempted forcible entries showed an increase of 13.3 percent.

The total reported value of property stolen in burglary in 1977 was \$15,694,513 - up 4.6 percent over 1976.

### Residential Burglary--Introduction

In 1977, the residential burglary rate (offenses per 1,000 residential units)<sup>3</sup> was 26.5 compared to the non-residential rate of 228.0 per 1,000 businesses.





FIGURE 2.21 - RESIDENTIAL BURGLARY RATES

The residential rate in 1977 decreased by 6.7 percent from 1976 and has shown a total decrease of approximately 17 percent since 1975 (Figure 2.21).



### Residential Burglary--Type of Property Stolen (Table 2.25)

Of the 24,908 residential offenses in 1977, 14,983 were reported by the type of property stolen as shown in Table 2.25.

Excluding the miscellaneous category, the articles involved in the highest number of offenses were televisions, radios, and stereos, followed by currency, jewelry, and consumable goods.

Of the value of T.V.s, radios, and stereos stolen (\$1,000,119), only \$78,648 in value or 7.9 percent was recovered. One of the highest recovery rates (32.9 percent) was for jewelry and watches while the lowest recovery rates were for furniture and household appliances (1.0 percent and 2.5 percent respectively).

### Non-Residential Burglary--Introduction

In 1977, the non-residential burglary rate (offenses per 1,000 business units)4 was 228.0 compared to the residential rate of 26.5 per 1,000 residential units. Assuming one victim/one offense the rate of 228.0 means that one out of every 4.4 business units in Oregon in 1977 was a victim of a burglary.





FIGURE 2.24 - NON-RESIDENTIAL BURGLARY RATES

The rate of 228.0 in 1977 was 6.4 percent lower than 1976 and 19.8 percent lower than 1975 (Figure 2.24). The trend is similar to that for residential burglary.



Of the total, 25.4 percent occurred in a public building and 74.6 percent occurred in a business. Types of businesses, other than listed, accounted for 38.3 percent of the total, while schools/colleges represented the second highest percentage (10.8 percent). The third highest percentage involved nightclub/tavern/restaurants (9.9 percent).

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### Non-Residential Burglary--Type of Property Stolen (Table 2.27)

Of the 13,757 offenses reported, 9,177 were reported by the type of property stolen as shown in Table 2.27. Excluding miscellaneous items, the highest number of incidents involved currency and securities followed by tools and consumable goods.

The highest recovery rates were for the items of sports equipment (25.8 percent of the value stolen was recovered), livestock (25.3 percent), and furniture (23.4 percent). The lowest recovery rates were shown for currency (2.9 percent), tools (6.6 percent), and household appliances (9.0 percent).

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#### Arrests For Burglary

In 1977, there were 5,916 arrests for burglary - an increase of 6.9 percent over 1976. Of that total, 63.6 percent were juveniles and 36.4 percent were adults; 94.2 percent were males and 5.8 percent were females. The median age of persons arrested for burglary was 17 years with 94 percent of the total arrested being White; 5 percent being Negro; and 1 percent as other race.

Of the 5,916 arrests for burglary, 4,636 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.28.

As shown, the majority of persons arrested were for first degree burglary (64 percent) which is a class A felony in Oregon. The percentage distributions are similar to those shown in 1976. Of the total arrests, 95 percent were felonies, and 5 percent were misdemeanors.

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#### LARCENY

### Introduction

In 1977, 82,976 offenses of larceny were reported by police agencies - a decrease of 6.1 percent from 1976. Larceny represented 58.5 percent of Index crime and 28.0 percent of all crime reported in 1977. The clearance rate for larceny 21.3 percent in 1977 compared to 18.6 percent in 1976.

The various types of larceny offenses are shown in Table 2.29. As shown, 23.1 percent involved theft of articles from motor vehicles with theft of articles from buildings representing the second highest percentage (18.8 percent). The total value of property stolen in 1977 was \$15,275,423 - an increase of 0.7 percent over 1976.

The largest percentage increase in the larceny categories in 1977 was shown in pocket-picking (+22.3 percent). Most of this increase occurred in the City of Portland. A chi-square test on the distribution of offenses for 1976 and 1977 revealed that the only statistically significant changes were in shoplifting (+8.1 percent) theft of articles from motor vehicles; and theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories (-20.2 percent).

Shoplifting has increased 18 percent since 1975; theft of articles from motor vehicles has shown a total decrease of 15.2 percent since 1975; and theft of motor parts have shown a total decrease of 17.4 percent since 1975. The lowest mean value per offense was for shoplifting (\$29) which also had the highest clearance rate in 1977 (87.1 percent).



Introduction (Figure 2.27)

In 1977, the rate of shoplifting (offenses per 1,000 retail business units)<sup>5</sup> was 1,202 compared to 1,152 in 1976 - an increase of 4.3 percent. The rate has increased 20.7 percent since 1974 (996 in 1974).


Shoplifting represented 14.0 percent of the total larceny offenses and 3.9 percent of all offenses reported in Oregon in 1977.

# Shoplifting--Month (Figure 2.28)


As shown in Figure 2.28, the highest number of shoplifting offenses were reported to have occurred during the months of March and December.




FIGURE 2.30 - SHOPLIFTING - TIME OF DAY

# Shoplifting--Type of Property Stolen (Table 2.31)

Of the 11,600 offenses in 1977, 7,530 were reported by the type of property stolen as shown in Table 2.31. The type of article most often in shoplifting offenses were consumable goods followed by clothing and furs. The recovery rate for consumable goods was 75.5 percent while the percentage of value recovered in clothing and furs was shown to be more than the value stolen. 

# THEFT OF ARTICLES FROM MOTOR VEHICLES

#### Introduction

In 1977, the rate of theft of articles from motor vehicles (offenses per 10,000 registered motor vehicles) was 92.9 compared to 122.8 in 1976 - a decrease of 24.3 percent. The rate has decreased a total of 25.9 percent since 1975 (125.3 for 1975).<sup>6</sup>

Theft of articles from motor vehicles represented 23.1 percent of the total larceny offenses and 6.5 percent of the total offenses reported in Oregon in 1977.




# FIGURE 2.31 - THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLES RATES

#### Theft From Motor Vehicles--Month (Figure 2.32)

Figure 2.32 depicts the number of thefts of articles from motor vehicles by the month in which they occurred. As shown, the highest number of offenses occurred during January and showed a 26 percent decrease through April, then increased again and remained fairly stable throughout the remainder of the year. Contrary to expectation, the number did not show a large increase in December (Christmas season).



The highest number of offenses occurred during the period 12 midnight to 2 a.m. with 68 percent of the total occurring between 4 p.m. and 2 a.m.




FIGURE 2.34 - THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLES - TIME OF DAY

# <u>Theft From Motor Vehicles--Type of Property Stolen (Table 2.32)</u>

Of the 19,206 offenses in 1977, 14,443 were reported by the type of property stolen as shown in Table 2.32. The type of property most often stolen was sound equipment (t.v.s, radios, stereos, etc.) with the highest number being of C.B. radios, tape decks and accessories.

Excluding the miscellaneous category, the other types of property most often involved were clothing, tools, parts and accessories, currency, and consumable goods. Of the offenses involving consumable goods, 63 percent were of gasoline and 14 percent were of beverages/liquor.

# Introduction

In 1977, the rate of theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories was 50.1 (offenses per 10,000 registered motor vehicles) compared to 70.7 in 1976 - a decrease of 29.1 percent. This larceny offense category has shown a net decrease of 51.5 percent since 1974.7





FIGURE 2.35 - THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE PARTS AND ACCESSORIES RATES






#### Introduction





As shown in Figure 2.41, the rate increased 17.7 percent from 1974 to 1975, and has shown a net decrease of 7.6 percent since.



# Theft of Articles From Buildings--Type of Property Stolen (Table 2.34)

Of the 15,524 offenses, 10,405 were reported by the type of property stolen as shown in Table 2.34. Excluding miscellaneous items, the highest numbers of incidents involved currency, clothing and furs.

The highest recovery rate in property value was calculated for livestock (71.1 percent of the value stolen was recovered) followed by firearms (20.6 percent) and furniture (20.5 percent). The lowest recovery rates were for boats and marine equipment (3.1 percent), motor vehicle parts and accessories (3.3 percent), and office furniture (3.3 percent).

#### Arrests For Larceny

In 1977, there were 18,194 arrests for larceny offenses - a 6.8 percent increase over 1976. Of the total, 53.1 percent were juveniles and 46.9 percent were adults; 67.5 percent of the total were males and 32.5 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 18 years with 91 percent of the total being White; 7 percent were Negro; and 2 percent were other races.

Of the 18,194 arrests for larceny in 1977, 13,009 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.35.

The majority of arrests in 1977 (82 percent) were for second degree theft - a class A misdemeanor in Oregon (property value was under \$200). The distributions were quite similar to those shown for 1976. Of the total arrests, 10 percent were felonies; 82 percent were misdemeanors; and 8 percent cannot be determined from the data given.


#### MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

#### Introduction

There were 9,452 offenses of motor vehicle theft reported in 1977 - a slight increase of 0.3 percent over 1976. Motor vehicle theft represented 6.7 percent of Index crime and 3.2 percent of all crimes reported in 1977. The clearance rate was 22.1 percent in 1977 compared to 21.9 percent in 1976.


The motor vehicle theft rate in 1977 (offenses per 10,000 registered motor vehicles) was 45.7 compared to 51.3 in 1976 - a decrease of 10.9 percent (see Figure 2.43.). The rate has shown a steady decrease since 1975 (down 21 percent total).9





FIGURE 2.45 - MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT - DAY OF WEEK

As shown, the largest decrease was calculated for the category of automobiles (-15.0 percent in 1977) while the rate for "other" increased  $16.2^{\circ}$  percent in 1977. The "other" category includes motorcycles and snowmobiles.

Of 1,090 "other" types of vehicles stolen in 1977, 943 (87 percent) were of motorcycles; 9 (0.8 percent) were of snowmobiles.

The rate for stolen automobiles in 1977 was 36.3 compared to 127.6 for trucks/buses (3 1/2 times higher than autos) and 152.1 for other types.

#### Motor Vehicle Theft--Type (Further defined)

The following data was obtained from the LEDS stolen vehicle files regarding the specific type of motor vehicles stolen during the three months of May, August, and October of 1977 in Oregon. Records totalled 2,141 and included cars, pickups, vans, motor homes, motorcycles, and other types of vehicles (Table 2.37).

Of 1,648 stolen automobiles, pickups, and vans reported for the 3-month sample, 41.4 percent were General Motors products; 21.9 percent were Ford Motors; 16.9 percent were imports; 9.2 percent were Chrysler products; 1.0 percent were American Motors; and the remaining 9.6 percent were other types.

The highest number of stolen automobiles, pickups, and vans during the period were of the model years 1965-1969 (28.1 percent of the total) with the next highest being 1973-1976 (21.9 percent).

Specifically, the highest number of stolen automobiles were Chevrolets (especially 1960-1964) followed by Fords (1965-1969) and Volkswagon (1965-1969).

Of 530 stolen motorcycles during the period, 45.8 percent were Hondas - especially high were the years 1973-1976. Of the total stolen, 50.9 percent were 1973 to 1976 motorcycles.

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# Arrests For Motor Vehicle Theft

In 1977, 2,150 arrests were made for motor vehicle theft - a decrease of 4.2 percent from 1976. Of the total, 65 percent were of juveniles and 35 percent were adults; 91 percent were male and 9 percent were females.

The median age of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft in 1977 was 17 years with 95 percent of the total arrested being White; 4 percent were Negro; and 1 percent were other races.

Of the 2,150 arrests for motor vehicle theft in 1977, 1,695 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.38. The majority of arrests (81 percent) were for unauthorized use - a class C felony in Oregon. The distribution of types of arrests in 1977 was similar to that shown in 1976.

Of the total arrests, 96 percent were felonies and 4 percent cannot be determined as to whether or not they were felonies or misdemeanors with the data given.

Of the 4,203 offenses, 53.2 percent involved harassment; 19.2 percent were resisting arrest; 0.9 percent were coercion; and 26.7 percent were other types of less serious assaults. # Arrests For Other Assaults

In 1976, thre were 2,235 arrests made for other assaults - an increase of 23.0 percent over 1976. Of the total, 21.8 percent were juveniles and 78.2 percent were adults; 89.5 percent were males and 10.5 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested for other assaults was 24 years with 86 percent of the total being White; 11 percent were Negro; and 3 percent were other races.

Of the 2,235 arrests for other assaults, 1,329 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.40. 


# Introduction

There were 1,388 offenses of arson reported in 1977. Arson represented 0.9 percent of Part II offenses and 0.5 percent of all offenses reported in 1977. The clearance rate for arson was approximately 24 percent based on 1,007 and 243 clearances. The rate (offenses per 100,000 population) for arson in 1977 was 57.9 compared to 55.1 in 1976 - a increase of 5.1 percent. # Arson--Month of Occurrence (Figure 2.48)





### Arrests For Arson

There were 334 arrests made in 1977 for arson compared to 303 in 1976 an increase of 10.2 percent. Of the total, 68 percent were juveniles and 32 were adults; 90 percent of the total were male and 10 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 16 years with 95 percent of the total White; 4 percent Negro; and 1 percent other races.

Of the 334 arrests for arson in 1977, 276 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.43. The highest percentage of arrests were for first degree arson (46 percent of the total) - a class A felony in Oregon. Of the total arrested, 59 percent were for felonies (1st and 2nd degree) and 41 percent were for misdemeanors (reck-less burning and other).



#### FORGERY/COUNTERFEITING

#### Introduction

In 1977, there were 2,249 offenses of forgery/counterfeiting reported. Forgery/counterfeiting represented 1.5 percent of the Part II offenses and 0.8 percent of the total offenses reported in 1977. The clearance rate for forgery/counterfeiting was approximately 44 percent based on 1,398 offenses - 610 clearances.



#### Arrests For Forgery/Counterfeiting

In 1977, 691 arrests were made for forgery/counterfeiting compared to 656 in 1976 - an increase of 5.3 percent. Of the total, 25 percent were juveniles and 75 percent were adults; 63 percent were male and 37 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 28 years with 84 percent of the total arrested White; 15 percent Negro; and 1 percent other races.

Of the 691 arrests for forgery/counterfeiting in 1977, 429 were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.44. 

# FRAUD

#### Introduction

In 1977, there were 8,330 offenses of fraud reported. Fraud represented 5.4 percent of the Part II offenses and 2.8 percent of the total offenses reported in 1977. The clearance rate for fraud was approximately 43 percent based on 7,015 offenses - 3,005 clearances.

The rate for fraud in 1977 (offenses per 100,000 population) was 347.6 compared to 309.8 in 1976 - an increase of 12.2 percent. The rates have shown a net increase of 29.5 percent since 1975 (Figure 2.53.)



# Fraud--Type of Offense (Table 2.45)

Of the 8,330 fraud offenses in 1977, 6,947 were reported by the specific type as shown in Table 2.45.

Of the 6,947 offenses, 67.3 percent involved check fraud; 19.4 percent were for theft of services; 7.4 percent were theft by deception; 2.0 percent involved credit cards; and 3.9 percent were other types of fraud.

The lowest mean value per offense was \$31 for theft of services which includes obtaining compensable services and intentionally not paying for them. The highest mean value for offense was \$481 for theft by deception.



# Introduction

There were 34,687 offenses of vandalism reported in 1977. Vandalism represented 22.5 percent of the Part II offenses and 11.7 percent of all offenses reported in 1977. The clearance rate for vandalism was approximately 15 percent in 1977 based on 26,389 offenses - 3,996 clearances.





FIGURE 2.55 - VANDALISM RATES

The rate for vandalism in 1977 was 1,447.6 (offenses per 100,000 population) compared to 1,468.8 in 1976 - a slight decrease of 1.4 percent. Vandalism rates increased 1.9 percent from 1975 to 1976 (see Figure 2.55).






FIGURE 2.58 - VANDALISM - TIME OF DAY

Of the total, 59 percent were of juveniles and 41 percent were adults; 93 percent were male and 7 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 17 years with 95 percent of the total arrested being White; 2 percent were Negro; and 3 percent were other races.

Of the 2,573 arrests reported by degree of charge, as shown in Table 2.51, the majority (55 percent) were for Criminal Mischief 2 - a class A misdemeanor in Oregon. The next highest percentage (25 percent) were for Criminal Mischief 3 - a class C misdemeanor. The distributions were similar to those shown in 1976.

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#### WEAPONS OFFENSES

This category deals with weapons offenses, regulatory in nature, and includes manufacturing, selling, furnishing, and illegal possession of deadly weapons.

Of the 1,868 offenses in 1977, 1,365 were reorted by the specific type of activity involved as shown in Table 2.52. Of the total, 611 (44.8 percent) involved "other" such as discharging and selling; 34.0 percent involved carrying concealed weapons; and 21.2 percent involved illegal possession.

Of the total, 21 percent were of juveniles and 79 percent were adults; 91 percent were male and 9 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 23 years with 85 percent of the total being White; 14 percent were Negro; and 1 percent were of other races.

Of the 817 arrests reported by degree of charge in 1977, as shown in Table 2.53, 48 percent were for concealed weapons - an unclassified misdemeanor in Oregon. The distributions are similar to those shown in 1976.

#### PROSTITUTION

In 1977, 644 offenses of prostitution were reported. Prostitution represented 0.4 percent of Part II offenses and 0.2 percent of all offenses reported in 1977. Because of the low numbers of offenses, information regarding month, day of week, and time of day are not presented in this report.

## Arrests For Prostitution

In 1977, there were 659 arrests made for prostitution offenses compared to 736 in 1976 - a decrease of 10.5 percent. Of the total, 11 percent were of juveniles and 89 percent were adults; 19 percent were males and 81 percent were female. The median age of persons arrested was 22 years with 65 percent of the total arrested being White; 32 percent being Negro; and 3 percent being other races.

Only 50 arrests were reported by the degree of charge at time of arrest and therefore are not shown in this report.


#### SEX OFFENSES

This category includes all sex offenses (other than forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice) such as incest, indecent exposure, sodomy, and statutory rape.


In 1977, 3,503 sex offenses were reported by police agencies. Sex offenses represented 2.3 percent of Part II offenses and 1.2 percent of all offenses reported in 1977.

The rate for sex offenses in 1977 was 146.2 (offenses per 100,000 population) compared to 126.9 in 1976 - an increase of 15.2 percent. The rate has shown a net increase of 26.6 percent since 1975 (Figure 2.59).



# Sex Offenses--Month (Figure 2.60)


In 1977, the highest number of offenses occurred during August as shown in Figure 2.60.

# Victims--Age and Sex

Of the total victims, 82.0 percent involved females and 18.0 percent were males; 45.7 percent were juveniles and 54.3 percent were adults. The rate per 100,000 females was 157.6 compared to 36.4 for male persons. The rate for juvenile victims was 149.0 compared to 77.2 for adults.

#### Arrests For Other Sex Offenses

In 1977, 627 arrests were made for other sex offenses compared to 616 in 1976 - a slight increase of 1.8 percent. Of the total, 16 percent were of juveniles and 84 percent were of adults; 96 percent were males and 4 percent were females. The median age of persons arrested was 27 years with 95 percent of the total arrested being White; 4 percent being Negro; and 1 percent being other races.

Of the 627 arrests for other sex offenses, 408 were reported by the specific charge at time of arrest as shown in Table 2.55. The highest number of arrests were for public indecency (35 percent of the total) followed by sexual abuse (29 percent). Of the total arrests, 45 percent were for felonies; 50 percent were misdemeanors; and 5 percent could not be determined with the data given.




FIGURE 2.62 - DRUG ABUSE ARREST RATES

The rate of arrests for drug abuse (arrest per 100,000 population) in 1977 was 437.5 compared to 455.1 in 1976 - a decrease of 3.9 percent as shown in Figure 2.62.

## Type of Drugs Involved (Table 2.56)

Of the 10,484 arrests for drug abuse, 25 percent were juveniles and 75 percent were adults; 85 percent were male persons and 15 percent were females. The median age of persons arrested was 20 years with 95 percent of the total arrested being White; 3 percent being Negro; and 2 percent being of other races.

The majority of arrests (86.9 percent) were for marijuana with 3.9 percent of the the total for narcotics such as heroin, cocaine, and opium (Table 2.56).

#### Degree of Charge at Arrest

Of the 10,484 arrests for drug abuse, 9,029 were reported by the specific type of drug and degree of charge at time of arrest. The data are arranged by juvenile and adult arrests as presented in Tables 2.57 and 2.58.

In total, 6,745 arrest or 75 percent were for possession of drugs for use. Of those 6,745 arrests, 6,282 were for marijuana.

Of the total arrests of juveniles, 63 percent involved possession for use of under one ounce of marijuana.

Of the total arrests of adults, 57 percent involved possession for use of under one ounce of marijuana.

Of the juvenile arrests, 15 percent were for felonies and 85 percent were misdemeanors; of the adult arrests, 24 percent were for felonies and 76 percent were misdemeanors.



### OFFENSES AGAINST THE FAMILY

In 1977, 985 family offenses were reported by policy agencies. Family offenses represented 0.6 percent of Part II offenses and 0.3 percent of the total offenses reported in 1977. The clearance rate was approximately 33 percent based on 884 offenses - 290 clearances.

The rate for offenses against the family in 1977 was 41.1 (offenses per 100,000 population) compared to 32.8 in 1976 - a sharp increase of 25.3 percent as shown in Figure 2.63.





Of the 985 of the offenses, 900 were reported by specific type of offense in 1977 per Table 2.59. As shown, 37.7 percent of the total involved child neglect and 37.7 percent involved child abuse. The largest increase was shown for child abuse.

## Introduction

In 1977, there were 27,563 arrests made for DUII compared to 23,351 in 1976 - an increase of 18.0 percent. The arrest rate in 1977 was 1,648.1 (per 100,000 registered Oregon drivers) compared to 1,432.8 in 1976. This rate has shown a steady increase since 1974 (total = +62.3 percent) as shown in Figure 2.64.10





FIGURE 2.64 - DUII ARREST RATES





FIGURE 2.66 - DUII ARRESTS - DAY OF WEEK

# Arrests For Liquor Laws

In 1977, there were 13,675 arrests made for violation of Oregon's liquor laws. Of the total, 38 percent were juveniles (17 years and under) and 62 percent were adults; (18 years and older) 84 percent were males and 16 percent were females. The median age of persons arrested was 19 years.

Of the 13,675 arrests, 11,101 were reported by the specific type of violation that occurred as shown in Table 2.62. Of the 11,101 arrests, 86 percent were for minor-in-possession (M.I.P.). The distributions of arrests were similar to those shown in 1976.



# Introduction




# Disorderly Conduct--Month (Figure 2.69)

As shown in Figure 2.69, the highest numbers of offenses occurred during the months of July, August, and October.




Disorderly Conduct--Day of Week (Figure 2.70)

# Arrests For Disorderly Conduct

There were 5,098 arrests made in 1977 compared to 4,668 in 1976 - an increase of 9.2 percent. Of the total, 18 percent were of juveniles and 82 percent were adults; 88 percent were male and 12 percent were females. The median age of persons arrested was 23 years with 91 percent of the total being White; 6 percent were Negro; and 3 percent were of other races.

Of the 5,098 arrests in 1977, 4,114 were reported by the specific type of offense as shown in Table 2.64. Of the 4,114 arrests, 73 percent were for disorderly conduct - a class B misdemeanor in Oregon.

# "ALL OTHER" OFFENSES

"All Other" is the category of Part II offenses included as offense category number 26 of the F.B.I. and Oregon UCR classifications.

Of the 24,236 offenses in 1977, 21,441 were reported by the specific type of offense as shown in Table 2.65.

As shown, 33.4 percent of the total were for harassment (vocal/nuisance) and 22.0 percent for trespassing. The two most serious offenses (kidnapping and blackmail/extortion) represented only 1.8 percent of the total.

# Arrests For "All Other" Offenses

In 1977, there were 8,089 arrests reported under this category with 7,056 reported by specific type and degree of offense (Table 2.66).

As shown, 40 percent of the total arrests were for trespassing and 24 percent were for animal ordinances. The highest number of arrests of juveniles and adults were for trespassing and more specifically for second degree while the highest number of arrests of females were for animal ordinances.



# Introduction

In 1977, 13,279 offenses of runaway were reported. Juvenile runaways represented 8.6 percent of the Part II offenses and 4.5 percent of all offenses reported in 1977.

The rate in 1977 was 1,878.3 (offenses per 100,000 juveniles) compared to 1,629.8 in 1976 - an increase of 15.2 percent as shown in Figure 2.72.





FIGURE 2.73 - JUVENILE RUNAWAYS - MONTH

As shown in Figure 2.73, the highest numbers of runaway offenses occurred during February and October.




FIGURE 2.75 - JUVENILE RUNAWAYS - TIME OF DAY

#### PROFILE OF PART I AND II OFFENSES AND PART III CALLS FOR SERVICE

Included in the Oregon Uniform Crime Reporting Program is an option to police agencies to report types of calls for service for other than criminal offenses (called Part III) which include such activities as traffic accidents, disturbances reported, animal problems, alarms and in general, any reason the phones ring in a police agency for non-criminal problems.

A sampling of police agencies that report all Part I, II and III activity was compiled for this report and included in Table 2.69 by three groupings: Sheriff's Departments (six departments serving populations ranging from 45,000 to 120,000); Group I Police Departments (seven police agencies serving populations ranging from 10,500 to 83,000); and Group II Police Departments (nine police agencies serving populations ranging from 4,000 to 10,500). As with Part I and II offenses, Part III activity definitions have been included in the Appendix.




FIGURE 2.76 - CALLS FOR SERVICE BY CATEGORY

In general, of the agencies sampled, 18.7 percent of the total calls were for Part I offenses; 21.5 percent were for Part II offenses; and the remaining 59.8 percent involved Part III activity as shown in Figure 2.76.




FIGURE 2.77 - CALLS FOR SERVICE BY TYPE

Figure 2.77 depicts the ten highest percentages of calls for service for the sample. As shown, the ten categories represented 64.3 percent of the total calls for service ranging from 11.2 percent of the total being for rendering assistance to other agencies to 3.3 percent for responding to animal problems. The three criminal offenses of larceny-theft, vandalism and burglary, together, represented 22.1 percent of the total calls.

Table 2.69 presents a summary of the number of calls for service in 1977 for the six Sheriff's departments in comparison with the two groupings of police agencies, including percentage distributions. As shown, the majority of calls to police agencies were for Part III (non-criminal) activities, whereas, the slight majority of the calls to Sheriff's departments were for Part I and II (criminal) offenses.

Several of the important findings from Table 2.69 are:

- 1. Sheriff's department received a significantly higher percentage of calls for burglary and juvenile runaways than police.
- 2. Police received a higher percentage of calls for rendering assistance, security, alarms and traffic/roads problems than did sheriffs.
- 3. Group II Police (population 4,000 to 10,500) receive a small percentage of calls for traffic accidents compared to larger police agencies and sheriffs, however, they do respond more often to animal problems, store security and illegal alien problems.

# ASSAULTS AGAINST POLICE OFFICERS

Officer assault is described as an assault or aggressive attack upon a law enforcement officer whether or not there is personal injury.

The number of assaults against police officers is presented in Table 2.70 by the county in which they were reported for 1976 and 1977.

There were 712 assaults against police oficers reported statewide in 1977 - an increase of 19 percent over 1976. Of 712 assaults, 389 (54.6 percent) were reported in Multnomah and Lane Counties combined.



# Month

The number of assaults against police officers is presented in Figure 2.78 by the month in which they were reported in 1976 and 1977. Of the 712 assaults of police officers in 1977, 49.4 percent or 352 were reported during the first 6 months and 50.5 percent or 360 in the last six months of the year. The first six months of 1977 showed a 42.5 percent increase over the first six months of 1976 while the last six months of 1977 showed a 12.1 percent increase over the same period of 1976.



## Circumstances




FIGURE 2.79 - ASSAULT AGAINST POLICE OFFICERS - CIRCUMSTANCES

As illustrated in Figure 2.79, the highest number of assaults (209 of 712 or 29.4 percent) involved officers responding to a disturbance while 156 (or 21.9 percent) was second for assaults while attempting other arrests. The number of assulats increased for 9 of the 11 assignment categories in 1977 with the highest increase (+26.6 percent) being for responding to disturbances.

The total number of assaults against police officers in 1977 is presented by type of assignment, type of activity, and weapon used in Table 2.72. Of the 712 reported assaults, 161 (22.6 percent) were of officers in a two-man vehicle, 453 (63.6 percent) in a one-man vehicle either alone or assisted, 15 (2.1 percent) were against detectives, and 83 (11.6 percent) were involved in other types of assignments.

Of the 712 reported assaults 620 (87 percent) were committed using hands, fists, and/or feet and the remaining 92 (13 percent) were committed using a dangerous weapon (firearm, knife, other).



# <u>Time of Day</u>

The number of assaults against officers by the time of day they were reported are depicted in Figure 2.80. The pattern remains similar to the 1976 pattern with the greatest number of assaults occurring between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. (587 of the total 712 or 82.4 percent). Within that 12 hour period, 505 assaults or 70.9 percent were committed between 8 p.m. and 2 a.m.

# OREGON COMPARED TO NEIGHBORING STATES

A comparison of population and Index Crime rates (offenses per 100,000 population) in 1976 and 1977 for Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho, and Nevada is presented in Table 2.73. However, Index crime data was not available from Washington at the time of this printing.

Among the five states, Nevada had the highest estimated increase in population in 1977 (+6.2 percent over 1976) while California showed the highest population density (138.0 persons per square mile). For the second consecutive year, Oregon showed the largest decrease in Index crime rate, excluding Washington. Oregon was the only state to show a decrease in the violent crime category (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault). All four states showed decreases in property crime (burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft).

# SECTION 3 OFFENSE DATA BY ADMINISTRATIVE DISTRICT, COUNTY, AND SMSA


#### INTRODUCTION

Oregon is divided into fourteen administrative districts for the purposes of providing a system for state agencies to use for programs requiring areawide planning and administration and for providing the Governor with an administrative tool for planning and evaluating the use of state and federal resources.

This presentation of crime statistics by districts is made for the purpose of providing information relevant to local planning of criminal justice programs and to provide for comparisons and analysis of trends.

The type and volume of offenses vary from district to district as do the influencing factors that contribute to the commission of and circumstances surrounding the criminal incidents. Factors such as population density, population characteristics, and geographic location must be considered in attempting to analyze the variance in crime rates among the fourteen districts in Oregon.

For the purposes of this report, the district data has also been combined into two regional areas: Western Oregon (west of the Cascade Mountains which includes Districts 1-8) and Eastern Oregon (east of the Cascades and includes Districts 9-14). Western Oregon is more densely populated with a topography consisting mainly of forest, timberland and agricultural areas and receives most of Oregon's annual rainfall. In contrast, Eastern Oregon is sparcely populated with a much drier climate and colder winter temperatures. Its topography consists of timberland and agricultural areas, but also includes high desert and arid land.

#### INDEX CRIMES

Index Crime rates (offenses per 100,000 population) are presented in Table 3.2, for each of Oregon's 14 administrative districts for 1976 and 1977.

District 2 reported the highest total Index crime rate in 1977 as in 1976. District 2 also reported the highest individual rates for violent crime, (i.e., forcible rape and robbery) and for property crime, (i.e., burglary and motor vehicle theft). As was the case for the other administrative districts, with the exception of districts 9 and 10, the Index crime rate showed a decrease for District 2 from 1976. The Index crime rate showed a total decrease thoughout the districts in Western Oregon of 6.5 percent and a decrease in the rate for Eastern Oregon of 3.1 percent.

The crime rates increased in Eastern Oregon in every category except larceny while the only category to show an increase in Western Oregon was forcible rape.

Table 3.3 is a ranking of administrative districts by their respective change in Index crime rates from 1976 to 1977.

NOTE: Increases or decreases in crime rates are not necessarily indicative of increases or decreases in the actual number of offenses, but rather it may be due to the increase or decrease in agency reporting. Reference should be made to Section 4 of this report, the 1976 report and another previous report entitled <u>Analysis of Criminal Offenses and Arrests, January-December,</u> <u>1975</u>, regarding the number of months of reporting from individual agencies in attempting to interpret the changes in 1976-77 crime rates.

#### PART II OFFENSES

Table 3.4 presents a summary of the highest Part II crime rates in 1977 by administrative districts. As an example, the highest rate for liquor law violations in 1977 was calculated for District 1 (Clatsop and Tillamook County).

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# COUNTY CRIME RATES

The 36 counties in Oregon are presented in Table 3.6 and are ranked in order by their respective Index crime rate, violent crime rate, and property crime rate.

As presented, four counties (Multnomah, Marion, Lane, Lincoln) were above the state Index crime rate (5,918). Four counties (Multnomah, Jefferson, Linn and Douglas) were above the state violent crime rate (447) and four counties (Multnomah, Marion, Lane, and Lincoln) were above the state property crime rate (5,471).

The ten counties with the highest Index crime rates in 1977 (Multnomah - Wasco from Table 3.6) represented a population of 1,355,100 or 57 percent of the state total.

Multnomah County continued to show the highest Index crime rate in the state and being approximately 35 percent higher than the next highest (Marion County).

The greatest changes in ranking by Index crime rate were shown for Harney County (from No. 25 in 1976 up to No. 11 in 1977) and Hood River County (from No. 31 in 1976 up to No. 23 in 1977).

There were quite a few sizeable changes in rankings by violent crime rate in 1977 over 1976, the two greatest being: Crook County (From No. 25 in 1976 up to No. 11 in 1977) and Yamhill County (from No. 26 in 1976 up to No. 14 in 1977).

#### STANDARD METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREAS (SMSA)

Within three of Oregon's administrative districts (2, 3 and 5 inclusive) are three metropolitan areas designated as Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA) by the Bureau of the Census. The Bureau of the Census recognized 243 SMSAs in the United States and four in Puerto Rico in the 1970 census.

Except in the New England states, an SMSA is a county or group of contiguous counties which contain at least one city of 50,000 population or more, or "twin cities" with a combined population of at least 50,000. In addition to the county or counties containing such a city or cities, contiguous counties are included in the SMSA if according to certain criteria, they are socially and economically integrated with the central city.

One of the prime reasons for establishing SMSAs was to delineate densely populated areas. It is therefore meaningful to compile reported crime data by these designated areas, since population density plays a role in crime rates. Cities located within areas of dense population concentration tend to have relatively more crimes than do isolated cities.




FIGURE 3.2 OREGON'S STANDARD METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREAS

There are three SMSAs in Oregon: Portland SMSA, Salem SMSA and Eugene SMSA as depicted by the map in Figure 3.2. For purposes of this report, Portland SMSA does not include Clark County, Washington.

The total population in the three SMSAs combined was 1,440,400 in 1977 (60.1 percent of the state total). This is approximately 1.8 percent higher than 1976.

There were a total of 97,526 Index crimes reported in 1977 within the three SMSAs representing 68.7 percent of the total Index crimes reported statewide.

#### PORTLAND/EUGENE/SALEM SMSA COMPARISONS

The Index Crime Rates (offenses per 100,000 population) for the three SMSAs in Oregon, separately and combined, and the remainder of the state are presented in Table 3.7 including the change in rates from 1976 to 1977.

The total population for the combined SMSAs increased by 1.7 percent over 1976 while the population of the remainder of the state increased by 3.1 percent. The population in the Eugene SMSA showed the highest increase over 1976 (+2.6 percent) while the population in the Portland and Salem SMSAs increased by 1.4 percent and 2.3 percent respectively.

The Index crime rate for the combined SMSAs was 6,771 (offenses per 100,000 population) - a decrease of 6.7 percent from 1976. The same rate for the remainder of the state was 4,644 which decreased by 4.9 percent. The violent crime rate decreased by 4.0 percent in the three SMSAs but showed an increase in the remainder of the state (up 6.9 percent). The property crime rate for the three SMSAs decreased in 1977 by 6.9 percent while the remainder of the state decreased by 5.5 percent.

The forcible rape rates continued to increase in both the combined SMSAs and the remainder of the state for the third consecutive year. Burglary rates continued to decrease in all areas statewide and the motor vehicle theft rate showed an increase for the third consecutive year outside the combined SMSAs.

#### PORTLAND SMSA

The Portland SMSA, for this report, is comprised of Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington Counties with its core city being Portland.

The estimated population for the Portland SMSA in 1977 was 968,200 (40% of the state's population). The majority of the population reside in the Greater Portland metropolitan area and includes various suburban communities ranging from 10,000 to 25,000 population.

Of the total offenses reported statewide, 48 percent were by police agencies within the Portland SMSA. In 1977, 68,606 Index offenses were reported within Portland SMSA as shown in Table 3.8.

The total Index crime rate in 1977 was 7,086 offenses per 100,000 population, a decrease of 7.3 percent from 1976 and a total decrease of 11.5 percent from 1975. The violent crime rate decreased 5.2 percent from 1976; the property crime rate decreased by 7.6 percent. The highest increase in 1977 was in the murder rate (+20.0 percent) while the largest decrease was shown in the robbery rate (-11.3 percent).

The number of persons arrested by police agencies within the Portland SMSA increased for the crimes of robbery, aggravated assault and larceny while arrests for the other offenses decreased. The arrest rate (arrests per 100,000 population) increased by 4.5 percent for total Index crimes in 1977. Arrest rates for violent crimes increased by 8.1 percent and the arrest rate for property crimes increased by 4.2 percent.

Of the total 68,606 Index offenses in 1977, 12,508 (18.2 percent) were cleared - compared to 16.7 percent in 1976. Of the violent crime offenses, 40.9 percent were cleared and 16.1 percent of the property crime offenses were cleared - both clearance rates higher than in 1976.

#### CITY OF PORTLAND

Portland is the core city within the Portland SMSA as well as the largest city in Oregon.

Situated on the bank of the Columbia River at the Oregon-Washington border, the estimated population for Portland was 384,500 in 1977 - an increase of under 1 percent over 1976.

The city is a major shipping center for lumber and agricultural products and trade with other ports further east on the Columbia River. It is also the center for much of Oregon's insurance, financial, and stock brokerage business with many other types of "clean" industry such as electronics and light manufacturing.

#### Index and Part II Offenses

A total of 63,433 criminal offenses were reported by the Portland Police Bureau in 1977 as shown in Table 3.9.

Of this total, 58.0 percent were Index offenses and 42.0 percent were Part II. Contrary to the state as a whole, the Index crime rate (9,576.3) was higher than the Part II rate (6,921.2). The highest crime rates in Portland in 1977 were for the categories of larceny-theft, burglary, vandalism, an other (simple assaults).

#### City of Portland--Selected Offenses

#### Robbery

Table 3.10 compares the number of robbery offenses by target locations in 1977 to those of 1976.

In total, the number of robbery offenses decreased by 11.0 percent from 1976. Robbery of banking institutions (+29.7 percent) and gas stations (+18.3 percent) represent the highest percentage increases. Highway (-42.0 percent) and commercial house (-32.1 percent) robberies constitute a substantial decrease. The highest number of offenses continued to occur at miscellaneous locations such as parks, streets, and parking lots and increased 8.4 percent over 1976.

The highest amount of property stolen was reported under miscellaneous locations at \$132,223. The second highest value is robbery from residences. The highest mean value, of \$625 per offense, was calculated for bank robberies.

#### Burglary

The number of burglary offenses in Portland in 1977, as compared to 1976, is shown in Table 3.11. As indicated, the total number of offenses decreased for the third straight year (down 7.1 percent from 1976). Residential burglaries decreased by 6.8 percent and non-residential or commercial offenses decreased by 7.9 percent from 1976.

The number of night, day and unknown time burglary offenses, are combined at the bottom of Table 3.11. The categories, forcible entry (-6.6 percent) and no force used (-13.3 percent), indicate a decrease while the attempted entry offenses increased by 11.8 percent.

Residential burglaries represented 73.8 percent of the total value of property stolen in burglary in 1977 and showed a mean value of \$472 per offense compared to \$361 per offense for non-residential burglaries.

#### Larceny

The number of larceny offenses in Portland in 1977, compared to 1976, by type, is presented in Table 3.12.

In total, the number of larceny offenses in Portland decreased by 12.3 percent from 1976 (21,721 to 19,047). The largest reductions were theft of articles from motor vehicles (-31.0 percent) and stolen parts and accessories from motor vehicles (-25.4 percent). Shoplifting and bicycle theft, both of sizeable volume, showed increases of 10.3 percent and 10.2 percent respectively.

The highest amount of reported property stolen was under the category, articles stolen from buildings (\$1,039,442 or 28.6 percent of the total) with the highest mean value per offense of \$236 in this category, excluding the category of all other.

#### INDEX CRIME RATES--CITY OF PORTLAND COMPARED TO MAJOR WEST COAST CITIES

Table 3.13 is a comparison of Index crime rates (offenses per 100,000 population) for the years 1976 and 1977 for the cities of Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles. Because these cities are so individually unique in terms of population, topography, area, climate and other various characteristics, the comparison of percentage change in rates is probably more meaningful than a straight comparison of rates for any particular year.

In 1977, the Index crime rate decreased for all the cities: Portland (-10.6 percent), Seattle, (-3.5 percent), San Francisco (-9.0 percent) and Los Angeles (-2.1 percent). The violent crime rates for Portland and San Francisco decreased (-8.3 percent and -14.2 percent). However, the violent crime rates for Seattle and Los Angeles rose (+1.2 percent and +4.4 percent).

The murder rate increased for all the cities except Seattle. The burglary and larceny rate in all four cities decreased. Rape offenses increased in all of the cities except San Francisco. Motor vehicle theft increased in all the cities except Portland.

#### EUGENE SMSA

The Eugene SMSA is comprised of Lane County which is also the Administrative District 5 and includes Eugene as its core city.

The estimated population for the Eugene SMSA in 1977 was 252,500 (10.2% of the state total). Approximately one-half of the population of this SMSA reside within the city limits of the two contiguous cities, Eugene and Springfield. With the exception of this one metropolitan area, Lane County (Eugene SMSA) is almost entirely rural (agriculture and timber).

In 1977, 15,770 Index offenses were reported within Eugene SMSA as shown in Table 3.14 which indicates a decrease of 6.2 percent from 1976.

The Index crime rate for 1977 in the Eugene SMSA was 6,242 offenses per 100,000 population, a decrease of 5.3 percent from 1976.

The violent crime rate in 1977 decreased by 12.9 percent from 1976 and 17.5 percent since 1975, while the property crime rate decreased by 4.9 percent from 1976 and 14.1 percent since 1975. The decrease in the total Index crime rate for Eugene SMSA was 5.3 percent while Portland SMSA total Index crime rate decreased by 7.4 percent and Salem SMSA total Index crime rate decreased by 4.4 percent. The most notable decrease in the Eugene SMSA crime rate was in the murder category (-25.0 percent) and in the aggravated assault category (19.7 percent). Contrary to other areas statewide, the motor vehicle theft rate showed an increase.

The number of people arrested by police agencies within the Eugene SMSA increased in all categories except forcible rape, motor vehile theft, and murder. The arrest rate (arrests per 100,000 population) increased by 3.9 percent from 1976 and by 22.2 percent since 1975; the property crime arrest rate decreased by 0.8 percent; and the violent crime arrest rate increased by 55.0 percent. The most notable increase was in the arrest rate for aggravated assault (+84.6 percent) for the Eugene SMSA which is also the highest aggravated assault arrest rate when compared to Portland and Salem.

Of the 15,770 offenses in the Eugene SMSA for 1977, 3,754 or 23.8 percent were cleared. The clearance rate for aggravated assault (49.3 percent) was the highest of the listed offenses.

#### CITY OF EUGENE

Eugene is the core city within the Eugene SMSA as well as the second largest city in Oregon representing 4.2 percent of the state's population.

Situated at the southerly end of the fertile Willamette Valley and adjacent to two of Oregon's major rivers - Willamette and Mackenzie, the estimated population for Eugene was 100,450 in 1977 - an increase of 3.9 percent over 1976.

Eugene is a major center for higher education in Oregon having the University of Oregon located within the city and attracting approximately 17,000 students annually. A progressive city, and still maintaining a rural atmosphere, its contiguous area is a hive of activity in the lumber and agricultural business.

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## Index and Part II Offenses

A total of 15,083 criminal offenses were reported by the Eugene Police Department in 1977 as shown in Table 3.15.

Of this total, 54.7 percent were Index offenses and 45.3 percent were Part II. The Index crime rate (8,215.0) was 21 percent higher than the Part II rate (6,800.4). The highest crime rates in Eugene in 1977 were for the categories of larceny-theft, burglary, and vandalism.

#### Burglary

Table 3.16 compares the number of burglary offenses, by target and time of day, for 1976 and 1977.

In 1977, 1,963 burglary offenses were reported in Eugene, a decrease from 1976 of 4.0 percent and 11 percent since 1975. Of this total, 1,346 or 68.6 percent were of residences; 617 or 31.4 percent were of commercial businesses. The number of residential burglaries decreased by 4.5 percent while the number of commercial burglaries decreased by 3.0 percent.

The total value of property stolen in residential burglaries amounted to \$351,036 in 1977, a decrease of 6.0 percent from 1976. The total value of property stolen in non-residential burglaries amounted to \$163,364, a decrease of 22.9 percent.

#### Larceny

The number of larceny offenses in Eugene in 1977 compared to 1976, is presented in Table 3.17 by type and value of property stolen.

There were 5,400 larceny offenses reported in 1977 – a decrease of 2.1 percent from 1976 and 6.7 percent since 1975. Three categories increased in 1977: shoplifting (+4.6 percent); stolen articles from buildings (+3.1 percent); and all other (+5.3 percent). The most substantial decreases in reported larceny offenses were theft of articles from motor vehicles (-8.9%) and bicycle theft (-6.1%).

The total value of stolen property resulting from larceny was \$650,431, a decrease of 9.0 percent from 1976.

#### SALEM SMSA

The Salem SMSA is comprised of Marion and Polk Counties with Salem as its core city.

The estimated population for the Salem SMSA in 1977 was 210,700 (9.1% of the state total). Approximately one-half of the population of this SMSA reside within the Greater Salem metropolitan area with the remaining population scattered throughout numerous small farming communities in the two counties. Marion and Polk counties are primarily recreation and agricultural areas with the center of Oregon's government located in Salem.

In 1977, 13,150 Index offenses were reported within Salem SMSA as shown in Table 3.18 and indicates a 2.2 percent decrease from 1976.

The total Index crime rate for the Salem SMSA in 1977 was 5,985 offenses per 100,000 population, a decrease from 1976 of 4.4 percent. The violent crime rate increased by 19.2 percent while the property crime rate decreased by 5.7 percent from 1976. The increases in the violent crime rates of robbery and aggravated assault were the largest in the three SMSA's (Portland, Eugene, Salem).

Of the total 13,150 Index offenses in the Salem SMSA in 1977, 3,953 or 30.1 percent were cleared. This indicates an increase of 26.0 percent from 1976. The clearance rate for robbery, aggravated assault and burglary have the highest percentage of clearances of the three SMSAs. The most noted change in the rate was the increase of forcible rape offenses cleared (from 25.0% to 56.0%) almost one and one half times higher than in 1976.

#### CITY OF SALEM

Salem is the core city within the Salem SMSA as well as the third largest city in Oregon and the state's capital. Situated near the middle of the Willamette Valley and lying adjacent to the Willamette River, the estimated population for Salem was 83,170 in 1977 - an increase of 4 percent over 1976.

Salem is not only the center of government for Oregon but also a major food processing center for much of the fruit and vegetables grown in the Willamette Valley. Willamette University, the oldest in the West, is located in the City of Salem.

#### Index and Part II Offenses

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A total of 12,044 criminal offenses were reported by the Salem Police Department in 1977 as shown in Table 3.19.

Of this total, 56.2 percent were Index offenses and 43.8 percent were Part II offenses. The Index crime rate (8,144.8) was 28.5 percent higher than the Part II rate (6,336.4). #### Burglary

The number of burglaries reported in Salem in 1977 decreased from the number in 1976 by 9.8 percent. Of the total in 1977, residential burglaries constituted 64.0 percent and non-residential burglaries represented the remaining 36.0 percent as shown in Table 3.20. Residential burglary showed a 5.0 percent decrease while non-residential burglaries decreased by 17.4 percent.

The total value of property stolen in residential burglaries decreased from \$260,950 in 1976 to \$238,674 in 1977 while the total value of property stolen in non-residential burglary increased from \$110,538 to \$138,752 in 1976. The mean value per residential offense in 1977 was \$253 while the mean value per non-residential offense was \$263.

#### Larceny

The number of larceny offenses reported in Salem decreased by 9.2 percent in 1977 (from 5,114 to 4,642 in 1976) as shown in Table 3.21.

Theft of articles from motor vehicles accounted for 27.0 percent of the total larcenies while shoplifting accounted for 20.7 percent of the total. Theft of articles from motor vehicles represented the highest property loss figure in the total value.

The largest increase was shown for theft of articles from buildings (+13.2%) while theft of articles from motor vehicles showed a rather large decrease of 24.6 percent.

#### Core Cities Comparisons

The three SMSA core cities of Portland, Eugene, and Salem, combined, represent 24 percent of the state's population and reported 37 percent of the state's total Index offenses. A comparison of the change in Index crime rates from 1976 to 1977 is presented in Table 3.22.

As shown, the Index crime rates decreased in all three cities in 1977 the largest (-11.2%) being for Salem. The violent crime rates decreased in both Portland and Eugene but showed a rather large increase in Salem, which also was the only city to show an increase in the robbery rate. Portland was the only city to show a decrease in aggravated assault.

Property crimes decreased in total in all three cities with Salem showing the largest decrease in burglary rate.

The following highlights regarding burglary offenses in the three cities in 1977 are from Table 3.23 - a comparison of the percent change in the number of offenses from 1976 to 1977.

Residential burglaries decreased in Portland for the third straight year and for the second time in Eugene. Residential burglary in Salem decreased by 5.0 percent after being up 15.6 percent in 1976.

Non-residential burglaries decreased in all three cities with Salem leading at -17.4 percent.

Burglaries involving forcible entry decreased in all three cities. Again, Salem showed the greatest decrease (-12.4 percent).

Burglaries in which entry was gained without force decreased substantially in Portland (-13.3 percent) and showed a decrease in Salem (-5.9 percent), and increased in Eugene (+3.6%).

In summary, and compared with the 1975-76 statistics, all three cities have shown an increasing decline in the occurrences of burglaries in both residential and non-residential.

The following highlights on larceny offenses in the three cities in 1977 are taken from Table 3.24 - a comparison of the percent change in the number of offenses from 1976.

Pocket-picking and bicycle theft continued to increase in Portland showing increases of 38.4 percent and 10.2 percent respectively.

Theft of articles from motor vehicles and motor vehicle parts and accessories showed substantial decreases in all three cities.

Shoplifting continued to increase in both Portland and Eugene while showing a very slight decrease in Salem.

In summary, the trend indicates a decline in larceny in all three cities, strongly influenced by the decrease in the categories which represent the highest percentage of offenses--theft of articles from motor vehicles and theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories.

# APPENDIX A

# INTRODUCTION

An offense, under Oregon law (ORS 161.505 - Revised 1974) is defined as: "Conduct for which a sentence to a term of imprisonment or to a fine is provided by any law of this state or by any law or ordinance of a political subdivision of this state. An offense is either a crime or a violation."

A crime is described as an offense for which a sentence of imprisonment is authorized and is either a felony (maximum sentence of more than one year) or a misdemeanor (maximum sentence of not more than one year).

A violation is described as an offense designated by statue to be a violation or if the offense is punishable only by a fine, forfeiture, fine and forfeiture or other civil penalty. Violations are not classified.

# UCR DEFINITIONS

The FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting program collects and reports criminal offense data for the nation and in many instances reports data for smaller subdivisions of the country. Essential to the maintaining of uniform and consistent data was the establishment of a standard definition of the offenses used in the program. This insures that offenses with different titles under state and local laws are considered and appropriately counted in UCR.

The offense definitions in this publication conform to those published in the FBI 1975 UCR Handbook.\*

Part I Offense Definitions

# 1.a. Criminal Homicide - Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter

Definition - the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

As a general rule, any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is counted as Homicide. One offense for each person willfully killed by another.

Suicides, accidental deaths, assaults to murder, and attempted murders are not counted as Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter. Suicides are not counted in Uniform Crime Reporting. Some accidental deaths are counted as Manslaughter by Negligence. Assaults to murder and attempted murders are counted as aggravated assaults.

# 1.b. Criminal Homicide - Manslaughter by Negligence

Definition - the killing of another person through gross negligence.

As a general rule, all deaths caused by the gross negligence of another are counted. One offense is scored for each person killed. The death of a person caused by his own negligence is not counted as an actual offense. All traffic deaths are counted and recorded. Those traffic deaths which are found through police investigation to be accidental (without gross negligence) whould be counted as "unfounded."

# 2. Forcible Rape

Definition - the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

One offense for each person raped or upon whom an assault to rape or attempt to rape has been made. Does not include statutory rape offenses. Statutory rape is defined as the carnal knowledge or the attempted carnal knowledge of a female with no force used and wherein the female victim is under the legal age of consent. Does not include other sex offenses under this category. Statutory rape and other sex offenses are classified and counted as Part II offenses.

# 3. Robbery

Definition - the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Robbery is a vicious type of theft in that it takes place in the presence of the victim. The victim, who usually is the owner or person having custody of the property, is directly confronted by the perpetrator and is treatened with force or fear that force will be used. Robbery involves a theft or larceny but aggravated by the element of force or threat of force. If no force or threat of force is used, such as in pocket picking, or purse snatching, the offense must be scored as larceny rather than robbery.

If force is used in the commission of a theft such as in overcoming the active resistance of the victim in a purse snatching, then the offense is to be classified as strong-arm robbery.

# 4. Aggravated Assault

Definition - an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Assault may be defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another. Aggravated assault is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts should be included since it is not necessary that any injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

The categories of aggravated assault include the commonly entitled offenses of assault with intent to kill or murder; poisoning; assault with a dangerous or deadly weapon; maiming, mayhem, and assault with intent to maim or commit mayhem, assault with explosives; and all attempts to commit the foregoing offenses. Attempt to murder or assault to murder are reported as aggravated assault.

# 5. Burglary - Breaking or Entering

Definition - the unlawful entry of a structure or dwelling with intent to commit a felony or a theft.

Offenses locally known as burglary (any degree); unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safe-cracking; and all attempts at these offenses are counted in UCR as burglary.

# 6. Larceny - Theft

Definition - the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

Larceny and theft mean the same thing in Uniform Crime Reporting. Motor vehicle theft is not included and is counted separately because of the great volume of thefts in that particular theft category.

All thefts which are not part of a robbery, burglary, or motor vehicle theft should be classified in this category regardless of the value of the article stolen. All thefts and attempted thefts are counted.

<u>NOTE</u>: Embezzlement; fraudulent conversion of entrusted property; conversion of goods lawfully possessed by bailees, lodgers, or finders of lost property; obtaining money by false pretenses; larceny by check, larceny by bailee, and check fraud are all to be classified as Part II offenses. Larceny - thefts are broken down into the following categories:

A. Pocket Picking

Definition - the theft of articles from a person by stealth where the victim usually does not become immediately aware of the theft.

The theft includes removal of such items as wallets from women's purses or handbags and men's pockets and usually occurs in a crowd, public conveyance, or other similar situation to disguise the activity. Theft from a person in a conscious or unconscious state, including drunks, is included. However, if the victim is manhandled or force beyond simple jostling is used to overcome the resistance of the victim, the offense becomes a strong-arm robbery.

B. Purse Snatching

Definition - the grabbing or snathing of a purse, handbag, etc., from the custody of an individual.

If more force is used than is actually necessary to snatch the purse from the grasp of the person, then a strong-arm robbery has occurred.

C. Shoplifting

Definition - the theft by a person other than an employee of good or merchandise exposed for sale.

This violation assumes that the offender had legal access to the premises and thus no trespass or unlawful entry was involved. This category includes thefts of merchandise displayed outside a building as part of the stock in trade such as in department stores, hardware stores, supermarkets, fruit stands, gas stations, etc.

D. Thefts From Motor Vehicles (Except Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts and Accessories)

Definition - the theft of articles from a motor vehicle, whether locked or unlocked.

This type of larceny includes thefts from automobiles, trucks, truck trailers, buses, or motorcycles. It also includes thefts from any area in the automobile or other vehicle including the truck, glove compartment, or other enclosure. Some of the items included in this category of theft are cameras, suitcases, wearing apparel, packages, etc.

Certain state statutes might interpret Thefts From Motor Vehicles as burglaries. For Uniform Crime Reporting these thefts must be scored as larceny.

# E. Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts and Accessories

Definition - the theft of any part or accessory attached to the interior or exterior of a motor vehicle in a manner which would make the part an attachment to the vehicle or necessary for the operation of the vehicle.

This category would include theft of motors, transmissions, radios, heaters, hubcaps and wheel covers, manufacturers emblems, license plates, radio antennas, side-view mirrors, gasoline, tape decks, etc. Theft of items being transported in the vehicle should be classified in Category D, Thefts From Motor Vehicles.

F. Theft of Bicycles

Definition - the unlawful taking of any bicycle, tandem bicycle, unicycle, etc.

G. Theft From Buildings

Definition - the theft from within a building which is open to the general public and where the offender has legal access.

Not included are shoplifting and thefts from coin-operated devices or machines as these offenses should be scored in their separate categories of larceny. The category of Theft From Buildings includes thefts from such places as churches, restaurants, schools, libraries, public buildings, and other public and professional offices during the hours when such facilities are open to the public.

Theft from coin-operated machines or pay telephone boxes within open buildings should be counted as Thefts From Coin-Operated Devices or Machines.

H. Theft From Coin-Operated Device or Machine

Definition - a theft from a device or machine which is operated or activated by the use of a coin.

Some examples of such machines are candy, cigarette, and food vending machines; telephone coin-boxes; parking meters; laundry machines; pinball machines; washers and dryers located in laundromats where no breaking or illegal entry of the building is involved.

I. All Other Larceny - Theft Not Specifically Classified

Definition - all thefts which do not fit the definitions of the specific categories of larceny listed above.

This category includes theft from fenced enclosures, boats, and airplanes. Theft of animals, lawnmowers, lawn furniture, handtools, farm and construction equipment are also included, where no breaking or entering of a structure is involved.

The illegal entry of a tent, tent trailer, or travel trailer used for recreation purposes followed by a theft, felony, or attempt to commit a felony should be counted as larceny.

# 7. Motor Vehicle Theft

Definition - the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Included in this classification is the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined for this program as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Examples of motor vehicles are automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, etc.

# Part II Offense Definitions

# 8. Other Assaults

Assaults and attempted assaults which do not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim are included as other assaults.

# 9. Arson

Included are all violations of state laws and municipal ordinances relating to arson and attempted arson - any willful or malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, church, college, jail, meeting house, public building or any building, ship or other vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft; contents of buildings, personal property of another, goods or chattels, crops, trees, fences, gates, grain, vegetable products, lumber, woods, cranberry bogs, marshes, meadows, etc.

If personal injury results from the arson, the situation would include an offense of aggravated assault. In the event a death results from arson, the incident would include murder.

# 10. Forgery and Counterfeiting

Forgery and counterfeiting are treated as allied offenses. In this class are placed all offenses dealing with the making, alterning, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true.

# 11. Fraud

Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

# 12. Embezzlement

Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

# 13. <u>Stolen Property; Buying, Receiving, Possessing</u>

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

# 14. Vandalism

Vandalism consists of the willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law. This offense covers a wide range of malicious behavior directed at property such as: Cutting auto tires, drawing obscene pictures on public restroom walls, smashing windows, destroying school records, tipping over gravestones, defacing library books, etc.

15. Weapons; Carrying, Possessing, etc.

This class deals with weapon offenses regulatory in nature.

16. Prostitution and Commercialized Vice

Included in this class are the sex offenses of a commercialized nature.

17. Sex Offenses

(Except forcible rape and prostitution and commercialized vice.) Includes offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like.

# 18. Narcotic Drug Laws

Included are all violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

- a. Opium, or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana.
- c. Synthetic narcotics manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction (demerol, methadones).
- d. Dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

# 19. Gambling

All charges which relate to promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling are included in this category.

# 20. Offenses Against the Family and Children

Included here are all charges of non-support and neglect or abuse of family and children.

# 21. Driving Under the Influence

This class is limited to the driving or operating of any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

# 22. Liquor Laws

With the exception of "driving under the influence" (Offense No. 21), liquor law violations, state or local, are placed in this class.

# 23. Drunkenness\*

Included in this class are all offenses of drunkenness or intoxication, with the exception of "driving under the influence" (Offense No. 21). Detoxification cases are not recorded here.

# 24. Disorderly Conduct

In this class are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace.

# 25. Vagrancy\*

Persons prosecuted on the charge of being a "suspicious character or person, etc." are included in this class.

# 26. <u>All Other Offenses</u>

Included in this class are every other state or local offense except traffic, not included in offenses 1 to 25.

# 27. Suspicion\*

While "suspicion" is not an offense, it is grounds for many arrests in those jurisdictions where the law permits.

# 28. <u>Curfew and Loitering Laws - (Juveniles)</u>

Counted are all arrests made by departments for violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances were such laws exist.

# 29. <u>Runaway - (Juveniles)</u>

For purposes of UCR, this category includes apprehensions for protective custody as defined by local statute.

\*NOTE: Suspicion is not a criminal offense in Oregon. Drunkenness and vagrancy were repealed by the 1975 Oregon Legislature and are not longer criminal offenses by statute.

# Arrest Definition

For the purposes of UCR, adult persons are considered "ARRESTED": whether by actual physical arrest or the issuance of misdemeanor citations.

Juveniles are considered "ARRESTED" when the circumstances are such that if he or she were an adult an arrest would be made or a misdemeanor citations issued.

# Clearance Definition

# Clearances by Arrest

An offense is "cleared by arrest" or solved for crime reporting purposes when at least one person is:

- 1. Arrested;
- 2. Charged with the commission of the offense; and
- 3. Turned over to the court for prosecution.

The prosecution can follow arrest, court summons, or police notice. A clearance by arrest can be claimed when the offender is a person under 18 years of age and is cited to appear in juvenile court or before other juvenile authorities. This clearance can be taken even though no physical arrest was made.

The number of offenses and not the number of persons arrested are counted in the clearances recorded.

# Exceptional Clearances

In certain situations, police are not able to follow the three outlined steps under "clearance by arrest" to clear offenses known to them. In many instances, police have exhausted all leads and have done everything else possible in order to clear a case. If the following questions can all be answered "yes" the offense can then be cleared exceptionally.

- 1. Has the investigation definitely established the identify of the offender?
- 2. Is there enough information to support an arrest, charge, and turning over to the court for prosecution?
- 3. Do you know the exact location of the offender so that you could take him into custody now?
- 4. Is there some reason outside the police control that stops you from arresting, charging, and prosecuting the offender?

# Examples of exceptional Clearances:

An offense can be exceptionally cleared when it falls into one of the following categories:

- a. Suicide of the offender (the person responsible is dead).
- b. Double murder (two persons kill each other).
- c. Deathbed confession (the person responsible dies after making the confession).
- d. Offender killed by police or citizen.
- e. Confession by offender already in your custody or serving sentence (this is actually a variation of a true clearance by arrest - you would not "apprehend" the offender but in most situations like this the offender would be prosecuted on a new charge).
- f. An offender prosecuted in another city for a different offense by state or local authorities or prosecuted in another city or state by the federal government for an offense which may be the same (you attempt to return him for prosecution, but the other jurisdiction will not release to you).
- g. Extradition is denied.
- h. The victim refuses to cooperate in the prosecution (this does not "unfound" the offense and the answer must still be "yes" to the first three questions above).
- i. For some reason outside your control, an offender is prosecuted for a less serious charge than that for which you arrested him (such as a charge of reckless driving for a negligent manslaughter offense the offense on Return A remains the same).
- j. The handling of a juvenile offender either orally or by written notice to parents in instances involving minor offenses such as petty larceny.

It is recognized that departmental policy in various police agencies permit the discontinuance of investigation and the closing administratively of cases in which all investigation has been completed. The administrative closing of a case or the "clearing" of it be departmental policy, under UCR reporting, does not permit the clearance of an offense by exceptional clearance unless the four questions mentioned above can all be answered "yes." The recovery of proeprty does not give a reason to clear the case for UCR purposes. The clearance of a case for UCR purposes should have no affect on whether or not the department has internal policies as to "closing" a case or discontinuing active investigation on a case.

# Part III - Activity Code Definitions

Part III is defined in Oregon as Police Activity, Non-Criminal Complaints and requests for service, etc. from 39 Traffic Crime thru 99 Other, including Custody activity 500 thru 550.

The definitions presented in this section vary from exact and specific to standardized guide lines for code usage.

A number of these codes frequently border on criminal offense circumstances. When subsequent information or investigation uncovers criminal situations, the appropriate offense/arrest entry(s) are required.

39. Traffic Crime (Except DUII)

"Serious Traffic" offenses as defined by the Oregon Motor Vehicle code.

EXAMPLES: Officers from the department are investigating an Injury Accident where one of the participating vehicles fled the scene.

Officers from the department pursue a vehicle for Reckless Driving.

# 40. Traffic Accident - Fatal

Traffic accidents that result in the death of at least one of those persons involved.

41. Traffic Accident - Injury

Non-fatal traffic accidents that result in the injury of at least one of those persons involved.

42. Traffic Accident - Property damage

Traffic accidents that result in property damage <u>without</u> personal injury.

50. Illegal Alien

Police Activity surrounding circumstances relating to Illegal Aliens.

EXAMPLES: Officers from the department assist Immigration authorities with a search for illegal aliens.

52. <u>Warrants</u>

Receiving warrants as an activity.

53. Stolen Motor Vehicles Recovered for Another Agency

The recovery of a stolen "Motor Vehicle" when the original theft report and case is not from your department.

EXAMPLE: Officers from your department recover a motor vehicle reported stolen by another law enforcement agency.

# 54. Stolen Property Recovered for Another Agency

The recovery of stolen property (other than motor vehicles) when the original theft report and case is not from your department.

EXAMPLE: Your department recovers property for other agency.

# 57. Sudden Death/Bodies Found

The finding of a deceased person when the cause of death is of natural, suspicious or unknown circumstances.

If it is later determined that Homicide is involved an additional entry for that particular offense is required.

58. Suicide

The attempt of or the actual taking of ones own life by purposely self inflicted means or circumstances.

59. Other Accidents

Other forms of accidents that are not traffic related.

60. Animal Problems

Circumstances or complaints relating to the care of or actions of animals.

61. Property

The circumstances relating to lost, found or confiscated property. Does not include recovery of property associated with a reported offense by your department or outside agency or jurisdiction.

EXAMPLE: Your department receives information that a citizen lost his wallet on the street in the downtown business district.

A citizen reports that a mans' wallet and contents were found on the sidewalk by a grocery store.

# 62. Abandoned Auto

The circumstance or complaint/investigation of an abandoned auto.

64. Locate Only Auto

The complaint/investigation or search related to a missing auto.

- NOTE: If a stolen motor vehicle report is subsequently taken a criminal offense entry will also be required.
- EXAMPLE: An intoxicated and confused subject reports his car is "stolen". Your department does not wish to take a stolen report until the victim is more rational. In the meanwhile officers are checking here and there for the auto.

65. Impound Auto

Recording the activity of legally removing a motor vehicle from its location.

EXAMPLES: Your detective division impounds a vehicle involved in a Narcotics case.

A lending institution advises that they have repossessed a local resident's auto.

# 66. Assistance Rendered

An act or actions taken rendering assistance or service to the public, other law enforcement or governmental agencies that is not specifically covered by other codes.

EXAMPLES: Your department rolls a patrol unit to assist a neighboring jurisdiction with an injury traffic accident.

Your department delivers an emergency message to a local address.

# 67. Domestic Problems

Complaints or problems of the home and/or family relationships, family beefs, etc.

NOTE: If any criminal offense is determined an additional offense entry is required.

# 69. Insecure Premises/Security

Citizens reporting and/or officers finding and investigating unlocked or open doors, windows, insecure building, etc.

If it is subsequently determined that a criminal offense is involved an additional entry(s) for the particular offense is required.

# 70. Suspicious Persons and Circumstances

Complaints, observations, finding resulting from suspicious actions.

NOTE: If any criminal offense is determined and if any arrest is made, appropriate offense and custody entries are required.

# 71. Public Safety

Situations that relate to problems created by man or acts of nature that present possible danger or potential hazard, etc.

EXAMPLES: Children are reported to be playing in a vacant-dilapidated building.

# 73. Disburbance/Noise

Complaints relating to disturbances involving noise.

75. Sick Cared For

Assistance rendered to ill or injured persons.

EXAMPLES: An officer from your department responds to a "man down" call and provides heart massage to an apparent heart attack victim.

> An officer from your department responds to a "man down" call and upon arrival finds that another citizen is applying proper treatment to an apparent victim of some form of seizure. The officer summons an ambulance, provides additional assistance and crowd control.

Officers on routine patrol come across a local person known to have a mental problem who is wandering far from home, proper care, and attention.

# 76. Marine

Complaints relating to boating and water ways.

EXAMPLE: The department receives a complaint that power boats are frequently speeding thru a beach area clearly marked and designated for swimming only.

# 77. Traffic/Roads

Reports relating to moving traffic, parking, obstructed throughfares, etc. This code should not be used for the recording of traffic citations.

EXAMPLES: A local resident phones to advise that a parked car is blocking their driveway.

The department receives information that a traffic signal is stuck and is not changing colors - traffic is starting to back up.

# 78. Civil Complaints

Complaints relating to civil matters that may or may not involve the departments presence in an effort to mediate minor disputes or to keep the peace, etc.

EXAMPLES: Your department receives a complaint from a local resident that two other neighbors are involved in a heated argument over possession of apples from a tree growing on their property line.

A lady requests that an officer accompany her to a former husbands' residence because she wishes to pick up some property awarded to her as the result of divorce.

The manager of a local apartment house requests that an officer remove an guest of one of his tenants for violating building rules.

# 79. Vehicle Disposition

The release or discharge of vehicles within the custody of or held by the authority of the department.

# 81. Alarm

Complaints or observations of fire, burglary, robbery and similiar alarms.

NOTE: If it is subsequently determined that a criminal offense is involved an additional entry(s) for the particular offense is required.

# 99. Other

Miscellaneous complaints, actions, service, etc., not covered by preceding codes.

# STATISTICAL METHODS

# CALCULATION OF CRIME RATES

Quite often it is desired to compare the volume of crime occurrence, either totally or by individual offense, over a period of time for a selected group of agencies or jurisdictions. The geographical area being studied will undoubtedly consist of law enforcement agencies of various strengths and serving widely varying sizes of population. An agency equalizing factor must be developed, or in other terms, a common denominator is needed. To arrive at a valid comparison, the concept of rate is utilized.

The crime rate is defined as the number of offenses occurring per 100,000 population over the period of one year. The common denominator for any community, county, district, or state is obtained by dividing the population represented by 100,000. Once this denominator is determined, it becomes a relative constant until such time as the population of the community, county, district, or state changes appreciably. The crime rate can be calculated then by dividing the number of offenses by the denominator.

a. Population -100,000 = common denominator

b. Number of offenses - common denominator = crime rate

# Example:

Agency A serves a population of 50,000 and experienced a total of 2,500 Index offenses in 1976.

Index Crime Rate -

- a.  $\frac{50,000 \text{ (population)}}{100,000} = 0.50 \text{ (common denominator)}$
- b. <u>2,500 (number of offenses)</u> = 5,000 (crime rate) 0.50 (common denominator)

Therefore, the Index crime rate for Agency A in 1976 was 5,000 offenses per 100,000 population.

# Example:

Agency B serves a population of 128,750 and experienced a total of 13,500 robbery offenses in 1975.

Robbery rate -

a.  $\frac{128,750}{100,000} = 1.2875$ 

b.  $\frac{13,500}{1.2875} = 10,485$ 

The robbery rate for Agency B in 1975 was 10,485 offenses per 100,000 population.

# CALCULATION OF TRENDS

Crime trend information is a presentation of the fluctuation of data from one time period to another. Trends can be computed on the basis of volume (number of offenses, arrests, etc.) or rates (offenses, arrests, etc. per 100,000 population). The tradistic is then presented as a percent change. The statistical connotation for trend is usually based on data over a substantial length of time such as five or ten years (at least three); however, a comparison can be made between two years, months, weeks, etc.

To compute the trend, always take the difference between the number of offenses or rates of both periods of time, divide by the number for the prior period, and multiply by 100, thus yielding a percent change.

- a. Number of offenses (one period) Number of offenses (the other period) = difference
- b. Difference prior period x 100 = percent change

# Example:

Agency A showed an Index crime rate of 1,000 in 1975 and 1,250 in 1976. By visual inspection there was an increase.

# Change -

a. 1,250 (1976) - 1,000 (1975) = 250 (difference)

Thus the Index crime rate for Agency A increased 25 percent from 1975 to 1976.

# Example:

Agency B reported 1,850 burglaries in 1970 and 1,365 burglaries in 1975. By visual inspection there was a decrease.

Change -

- a. 1,850 1,365 = 485
- b.  $\frac{485}{1,850} \times 100 = 26.2\%$

Thus, the number of burglaries for Agency B showed a decrease of 26.2 percent from 1970 to 1975.

One point is important in calculating change from one period to another. If the number of offenses, arrests, etc. increases from zero for the prior period to a specific number for the current period, no change can be mathematically calculated.

# Example:

Agency A showed no burglary offense in 1975 and 100 offenses in 1976. The increase in  $\underline{not}$  +100 percent as may appear but cannot be determined.

Calculation -

- a. 100 0 = 100
- b.  $\frac{100}{0}$  = indeterminant number

Another example worth mentioning is the case where the number decreases from a specific number in the prior period to zero in the current period. The change is always -100 percent regardless of the number for the prior period.

# Example:

Agency B showed 175 robbery offenses in 1975 compared to no offenses in 1976.

Change -

- a. 175 0 = 175
- b.  $\frac{175}{175} \times 100 = 100\%$

Thus the number of robberies for Agency B showed a decrease of 100 percent from 1975 to 1976.

# THE CHI-SQUARE TEST

The Chi-square tests presented in Section 2 of this report indicate whether or not two or more frequency distributions are different enough statistically so that they could be considered independent of each other. For example, a Chi-square value is computed for males versus females on the various categories of robbery. Assume the Chi-square value was not significant at the customarily chosen 5 percent level of confidence. A non-significant value of Chi-square indicates that males and females have essentially the same distribution of arrests over the various categories of robbery. That is, the relative proportion of males in each category is the same as the relative proportion of females in the same category. No discussion concerning the calculation of a Chi-square value is presented in this report. There are numerous books available which explain various statistical methods in more detail.
