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1978 YEARLY STATISTICAL REPORT OF THE FURLOUGH PROGRAM

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ABSTRACT

The furlough program has been an integral part of the Massachusetts Correctional Institutions since the program began in November, 1972. A total of 50,625 furloughs were granted between the inception of the program and December 31, 1978. During that period, 477 of those furloughs resulted in escapes (a resident failing to return to his correctional facility within two hours of his designated time), thus yielding an overall escape rate of 0.9%. The present report contains a statistical description of the furlough program for the year 1978 as well as a trend analysis of the program since its inception in 1972.

An analysis of available statistics revealed that although the number of furloughs granted over the years has fluctuated, the escape rate has decreased from 1.9% in 1972 to 0.4 in 1978, remaining relatively stable during the last three years of that time period. It was also noted during that period that the number of furloughs granted from lower security pre-release centers increased, as fewer furloughs were granted from higher security correctional institutions. Finally, this report presents frequencies and escape rates of background characteristics for each furlough granted during 1978. Information included in these tables includes the nature of present offense, personal background characteristics, criminal history and furlough variables.

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INTRODUCTION

This report is a statistical description of the Massachusetts Department of Correction Furlough Program for the year 1978. Included is some trend analyses covering the program since its inception in 1972.

The report is divided into two sections. Section I provides a brief overview of the Massachusetts Furlough Program. Comparisons of furlough characteristics over the past six years are discussed. Section II contains escape rates on background variables of an individual for each furlough granted during 1978. The background variables include personal background characteristics, present offense variables, criminal history variables and furlough variables. The figures in the tables represent number of furloughs, not numbers of individuals; therefore, an individual may be counted more than once if he/she has had more than one furlough during 1978.

The data for the construction of the tables in this report were derived from the computerized data base developed by the Correction and Parole Management Information System (CAPMIS) and were produced on the Massachusetts State College Computer Network (MSCCN).

SECTION I: OVERVIEW

The furlough program for residents of Massachusetts correctional facilities has been extensively implemented since the program commenced operation in November of 1972. Between that time and December 31, 1978, a total of 50,625 furloughs have been granted. In 477 cases, inmates have failed to return to their respective correctional facility within two hours of their prescribed time of return. Thus since the inception of the program there is an overall escape rate of 0.9%.

Table I is a summary of furlough statistics for the years 1973 to 1978. For each of these years, information regarding the number of furloughs, the number of individuals furloughed, the number of escapes and corresponding escape rates is presented. The escape rates by furlough have decreased from 1973 to 1978 and range from 1.9% to 0.4%. Similarly, the escape rates by individuals have also decreased. Even though the number of furloughs has increased by 11% over the past two years, the escape rate dropped to 0.4%. Although the number of individuals furloughed has been decreasing, the number of furloughs granted has fluctuated over the years.

Table II gives furlough statistics by institution furloughed from for the years 1973 to 1978. The number of furloughs and the corresponding escape rates for each correctional institution is given. Although minor fluctuations have occurred at some institutions, the overall escape rates have been decreasing. There were no escapes on furlough during 1978 from Walpole, Norfolk, Plymouth, Charlotte, Brooke, Coolidge, Temporary Housing, Norfolk Pre-Release, 699 House, BOSP/METAC, Drug Rehabilitation, 577 House, Medfield and Park Drive. There has been a decrease in the number of furloughs granted from higher security institutions and conversely, more furloughs granted at the lower security pre-release centers. For example, at MCI-Norfolk, there were 1466 furloughs granted in 1974, compared to only 238 furloughs granted in 1978.

Finally, the number of inmates furloughed per month in proportion to the average populations for each institution is presented in Table III. As can be seen from this table, the institutions with the higher proportions are those of lowest security. Statewide, out of an average population of 2793, an average of 470 inmates received a furlough during a course of a month. This results in an average proportion of 16.8% of the inmate population being furloughed during the course of one month. This is 1.3 percentage points higher than that of last year.

SECTION II: ESCAPE RATES OF BACKGROUND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE FURLOUGH POPULATION

The tables which follow contain frequencies and escape rates of characteristics of an individual for each furlough granted during 1978. Information concerning an individual's present offense variables, personal background characteristics, criminal history and furlough variables are presented. It is important to note that the figures in these tables refer to the number of furloughs, not the number of individuals furloughed; therefore, an individual may be counted more than once if she/he has had more than one furlough during 1978.

In order to determine any significant relationships between the characteristics of the existing variables and their escape ratios, chi-square statistics were computed. Significant relationships were found in the following variables: institution of commitment, offense, known drug use, total number of court appearances, prior state or federal incarcerations, age at incarceration and age at first arrest. These relationships are described below.

Concord commitments have a significantly higher escape rate (0.8%) than commitments to other institutions (0.3%) [$x^2=5.3$; df=1; p<.05]. Inmates convicted for rape have a higher escape rate (2.0%) than inmates convicted for other offenses $(0.4\%)[X^2=17.6;df=1;p<.001]$. It should be noted however, that rapists constituted only 4% of the total number of furloughs granted. Inmates who have used heroin have a higher escape rate (0.7%) than those who have not (0.3%) $[x^2=4.4; df=1; p < .05]$. Those who have 16 or more prior court appearances have a higher escape rate (0.8%) than those who had 15 or less prior court appearances (0.3%) [X2=8.26;df=1;p < .01]. Individuals with prior state or federal incarcerations have a significantly higher escape rate (0.8%) than those with no prior state or federal incarcerations $(0.3\%)[X^2=6.46;df=1;p<.05]$. Inmates who were incarcerated at age 25 or younger have a higher escape rate (0.6%) than those aged 26 or older $(0.3\%)[X^2=4.36;df=1;p<.05]$. Also, those incarcerated at age 31 or older have an even lower escape rate $(0.1%)[X^2=7.36;df=1;p <.01]$. Finally individuals aged 16 or younger at the time of their first arrest have a significantly higher escape rate (0.6%) than those who were first arrested at age 17 or older (0.3%) [X²=6.46; df=1; p < .05].

The superintendent or his designee shall notify, forthwith, appropriate law enforcement officials of the escapee".
- 2. These figures may differ from prior departmental reports due to multiple counting of individuals furloughed from different institutions.
