This supplement gives detailed information about patients examined by METFORS' staff during 1977. From these figures the reader should be able to gain a clear understanding of the population we serve. It is necessary that this information form part of the METFORS' record since it will prove valuable for planning purposes in the years to come. METFORS was established with the expectation that similar assessment programmes will be developed eventually in other parts of the Province. The data given here may prove useful when the time comes to create new assessment programmes.

As might be expected, there are as yet several deficiencies in our record-keeping system. Data of the sort given in the following pages can only be produced if there is reliable information to work from. Obtaining reliable information from court and police records, and hospital records as well as from the patient himself is made much easier if appropriate forms exist to guide the person responsible for consolidating the material. In establishing the three programmes described here we were fortunate to have available certain forms from the Clarke Institute of Psychiatry. These were augmented by forms

developed by ourselves and designed to meet our own needs. Not only did we have to create new forms but it became necessary to modify them almost every month. The result is that we have within the tables a certain amount of inconsistency. As the format of the report instruments was altered it became necessary to change the summarizing tables. Also we added new questions to our forms as time went on. There is as a result a certain uneveness in the work.

We expect to continue to refine and change our statistical reporting over the next few years. This is especially so since we shall be developing new research projects which will require us to collect new and different types of information.

Before proceeding to give information on each programme, we show in Figure 1 on the following page, the total number of persons seen by METFORS' staff according to programme. This information is the only statistical data to appear in the main Annual Report.

1. It is perhaps worth noting that while some 43 percent of the present population admitted to excessive use of alcohol and drugs, this is likely a low estimate. In many cases the examining psychiatrist will not have had full opportunity to explore this area with their clients many of whom may have been reluctant to disclose the full extent of their drug use.

1. These figures are striking in that over half of this group admitted to excessive use of alcohol and drugs during a brief psychiatric interview (i.e., these are probably low estimates.)

It is interesting to observe that 4 out of the 11 patients recommended at brief assessment for 30 - 60 day admission to METFORS admitted to excessive use of alcohol and/or drugs. This finding if substantiated over the next month or two ought to have implications for the design of research-oriented treatment/assessment programmes.
