REPORT OF FELON ESCAPES FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1978

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PREFACE

The information in the following annual statistical report was compiled by the Department of Corrections, Research & Reporting Unit. All questions, remarks or requests relating to the report should be directed to this agency.

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REPORT OF FELON ESCAPES DURING THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1978

The data compiled in this statistical report of escapes occurring in fiscal year 1978 were extracted from the felon files maintained by the Department of Corrections, Division of Institutional Services, Classification and Records Unit. Statistics are not tabulated for felons whose escape charges were dismissed or nol-prossed in court.

NUMBER OF ESCAPES:

There were eighty felon escapes from the Virginia Correctional System during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1978. This was a decrease of 14.9 percent from the 94 escapes which occurred in the previous fiscal year. The average number of escapes per year during the past ten years is 238.

RACE AND SEX:

Of the escapees, 51 or 63.7 percent vere white males and 25 or 31.3 percent were non-white males. Among the females there very two white women (2.5 percent) and two non-white women (2.5 percent) who escapes aring the fiscal year. This compares to the total felon population on June 30, 1978 of 37.9 percent white males, 58.9 percent non-white males, 1.1 percent white females and 2.1 percent non-white females. The proportion of white males to total escapees increased slightly from 60.7 percent in fiscal 1977 to 63.7 percent in fiscal 1978.

MONTH ESCAPED, TIME OF DAY ESCAPED AND ASSIGNMENT:

The largest number of escapes during the fiscal year occurred during the month of June. This reverses the trend for the past six fiscal years when the month of August accounted for the largest number of escapes. The months of June through August accounted for 45.0 percent of all escapes in fiscal 1978. As in fiscal 1977, more than half of the escapes again occurred between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. (44 escapes or 55.0 percent). The largest number of escapes (23 or 28.7 percent) occurred while inmates were working on the highway. Escapes from correctional field units or major institutions, which had represented the largest number of escapes in fiscal 1977, was a close second this year, accounting for 21 escapes or 26.3 percent. Escapes committed by prisoners on furlough accounted for only two escapes or 2.5 percent of all escapes. This represents a significant decrease since fiscal year 1974 when prisoners on furlough accounted for 23.4 percent of all escapes.

PAROLE STATUS:

Over forty percent of all escapees (33 or 41.3 percent) were not yet eligible for parole at the time of the escape. Thirty-nine escapees (48.7 percent) had been denied parole prior to their escape, of which 22 or 27.5 percent had been denied three or more months prior to the escapes. Only two or 2.5 percent were parole violators.

LENGTH OF SENTENCE:

During fiscal year 1978, the largest number of escapees were serving sentences of between six and ten years, accounting for 21 escapes or 26.2 percent of all escapes. The above once again renews the trend started in fiscal 1975 when the most frequent escapees were serving sentences between six and ten years. Twenty years or more was the most frequent sentence being served by escapees in fiscal 1977. Escapees with sentences between six and fifteen years accounted for a total of 38 escapes or 47.5 percent of all escapes in fiscal 1978. In the total felon population, 1,312 felons or 17.6 percent were serving sentences between six and ten years, while 2,540 or 34.1 percent were serving sentences between six and fifteen years.

TIME SERVED PRIOR TO ESCAPE:

Of the escapes, 41.3 percent occurred between the first and second years of confinement and 82.5 percent occurred within the first three years of confinement.

TIME LEFT TO SERVE AT TIME OF ESCAPE:

At the time of escape, fifty or 62.5 percent of the escapees had less than four years remaining to serve. Of these, 39 or 48.8 percent had less than three years to serve and 28 or 35.0 percent had less than two years to serve. Twelve escapees or 15.0 percent had detainers or were to be tried for other offenses.

AGE OF ESCAPEES:

As in fiscal 1977, this year the largest proportion of all escapes, 31 or 38.8 percent, occurred in the age group between twenty and 24 years. Fifty-eight escapees or 72.5 percent were under the age of thirty. There was only one escapee who was fifty years of age or older.

PREVIOUS RECORD:

Prior felony or misdemeanant sentences had been served by 34 escapees or 42.5 percent. An additional twenty felon escapees had an adult record but had not previously served a felon or misdemeanant sentence in a state correctional institution. Escapees with a juvenile record comprised 65.0 percent of the total, while only 15.0 percent had no prior record of any kind. Comparison to the total felon population shows that 2,533 felons or 34.0 percent had served prior felony sentences. Among the felon population, 737 felons or 9.9 percent had served prior misdemeanant sentences but had no prior felony records, and 4,000 felons or 53.6 percent had juvenile records.

PRIOR ESCAPES:

Escapees with a history of one or more escapes numbered nineteen or 23.8 percent of all escapes. Two escapees had a history of two prior escapes, while only one escapee had a prior history of four escapes.

OFFENSE:

At the time of escape, 46 escapees or 57.5 percent were serving sentences for offenses against property, while thirty escapees or 37.5 percent were serving sentences for offenses against persons. The most frequent offense category among the total felon population on June 30, 1978 was offenses against persons, representing 55.5 percent of the total felon population.

MARITAL STATUS:

Among the felon escapees, 47 or 58.8 percent were single and twenty or 25.0 percent were married. This compares with the total felon population on June 30, 1978 in which 59.5 percent were single and 21.5 percent were married.

MILITARY SERVICE AND AWOL RECORDS:

Of the 23 escapees who had military service, 47.8 percent had a history of being AWOL one or more times.

CUSTODY STATUS:

More than half, 45 or 56.2 percent, of the total escapes were committed by inmates in under gun status.

EDUCATION AND INTELLIGENCE:

Educational level of fifth grade or higher was reported for 57 escapees or 81.4 percent of the seventy escapees who had been tested. An I.Q. of ninety (normal) or above was reported for 78.5 percent of the 79 escapees who were tested. In comparison, 74.1 percent of the total felon population on June 30, 1978 who had been tested were fifth grade level or higher and 66.8 percent tested an I.Q. of ninety (normal) or above.

INSTITUTION:

Inmates assigned to the correctional field units at the time of their escape accounted for 44 or 55.0 percent of all felon escapes. In comparing the total felon population to the correctional field units population we find that on June 30, 1978, 30.5 percent of the felon population was assigned to field units. Among the major institutions, the State Farm (Powhatan Correctional Center and James River Correctional Center) experienced the largest number of escapes, with ten.

TIME ESCAPEE REMAINED FREE:

Within 24 hours, 37 or 46.3 percent of the escapees were captured or surrendered. Within 29 days, an additional fifteen inmates or 18.8 percent were taken back into custody, resulting in 52 inmates or 65.0 percent being captured or surrendering within thirty days. On June 30, \$978, twenty escapees or 25.0 percent remained at large.

CRIMES COMMITTED WHILE AT LARGE:

Only seven or 8.8 percent of all escapees committed crimes while at large. Robbery (armed and unspecified) and Auto Theft were the most prevalent crimes committed, accounting for three and two crimes respectively.

STATUS OF PARENTS:

The parents of 21 or 26.2 percent of the escapees were married or living together. Twenty-five escapees or 31.3 percent came from homes where the parents were either divorced or separated, while 21 escapees or 26.2 percent came from homes where one parent had died. It should be noted that all of these categories reflect parental status at the time the escapee was originally committed and not the status at the time of the escape.


SUBSTANCE ABUSE:

There were 44 escapees or 55.0 percent who had a history of liquor habits and drug use. Ten escapees or 12.5 percent were heavy drinkers who did not use drugs. There were fifteen escapees or 18.8 percent who had been addicted to drugs. Sixty-five escapees (81.3 percent) had some history of drug use.

EMPLOYMENT HISTORY:

Prior to confinement for their felony offense, thirty escapees or 37.5 percent had been steady workers, whereas 29 escapees or 36.3 percent had only worked intermittently (less than six months employment in the twelve months prior to arrest). Fifteen escapees or 18.7 percent were nomadic in their work habits, but usually steadily employed (four jobs or more in the twelve months prior to arrest). It is significant to note that the number of escapees who were steady workers prior to the felon confinement, decreased sharply from 75.5 percent in fiscal 1977 to 37.5 percent in fiscal 1978, a 38.0 percentage point decrease from fiscal 1977. It should also be noted that in comparing fiscal 1978 to fiscal 1976 there was a 10.7 percentage point decrease from the 48.2 percent of escapees who were steady workers prior to their confinement in fiscal 1976, to 37.5 percent in fiscal 1978.


