FISCAL YEAR SUMMARY REPORT OF POPULATION MOVEMENT 1979

This bulletin summarizes the volume and movement of offender populations supervised by the Wisconsin Division of Corrections in fiscal year 1979. Five-year trends are presented for the major population groups — residents in Wisconsin correctional institutions, offenders supervised in the community under probation and parole, residents in the Bureau of Community Corrections Residential Centers, and absconders from probation and parole supervision. Appendix tables present information on counts at the beginning and end of the year, intake and separations during the year, and average daily populations.

Note: This bulletin is the companion publication of the C-60B, which reports the same information on a calendar year basis.

The total population supervised by the Division of Corrections rose by only 305 cases, or 1.2 percent, in fiscal year 1979, from 25,603 cases on July 1, 1978, to 25,908 cases on June 30, 1979. Institution populations declined 1.5 percent, from 4,011 to 3,952; community supervised populations rose 0.6 percent, from 19,050 to 19,162, and the number of absconders rose 9.9 percent, from 2,542 to 2,794. (These totals do not include institutionalized adult or juvenile offenders reported as absent in the footnotes to the appendix tables).

Table A shows the average daily population for all cases supervised by the Division of Corrections in both correctional institutions and the community for fiscal years 1975 through 1979. The total average population rose by almost 5,500 cases, or 27 percent, over the past five years, from 20,272 in 1975 to 25,754 in 1979. There were substantial increases in 1975 and 1976 followed by a decline in 1977 and slight increases in 1978 and 1979.

Table B shows the average daily population of the total population supervised in correctional institutions, including adult and juvenile institutions and Community Corrections Residential Centers. The total average population rose 22.7 percent, from 3,312 in 1975 to 4,065 in 1979. However, the rate of increase dropped each year until 1979, when institutional populations showed a 1.2 percent decline.

Table C shows the average daily population of all correctional institutions by type of institution and sex. The number of adults rose from 3,286 in 1978 to 3,432 in 1979, but the latter figure includes 69 persons who were committed as youthful offenders before the Youthful Offender Law was repealed on July 1, 1978. The juvenile population, which had remained relatively constant during the previous four years, dropped sharply in 1979. The number of juvenile males declined 12.9 percent, from 667 to 581, while the number of juvenile females declined 20.0 percent, from 65 to 52.

Table D shows the average daily population (based on end-of-month totals) of offenders under probation and parole supervision by the Division's Bureau of Community Corrections, including absconders. Offenders resident in Community Corrections Residential Centers administered by the Bureau are included in institution population counts.

The average population increased by 27.9 percent, from 16,960 in 1975 to 21,689 in 1979. The pattern of change from year to year was very similar to the pattern in Table A. The population increased by over 20 percent in 1975 and 1976, decreased by 5.1 percent in 1977, and then rose modestly in 1978 and 1979.

Table E shows the average end-of-month population of all cases under community supervision broken down by probation and parole, including absconders. More than 83 percent of the cases were supervised under probation. The probation population rose from 14,107 in 1975 to 18,025 in 1979, an increase of 27.8 percent, while the parole population rose from 2,853 in 1975 to 3,664 in 1979, an increase of 28.4 percent. Both probation and parole populations rose substantially in 1975 and 1976, declined in 1977, and then edged up again in 1978 and 1979.

Table F shows the average end-of-month populations under probation supervision by type and sex of population, including absconders. The great majority of probation cases were adult males and females. Adult male cases increased from 11,395 in 1975 to 14,209 in 1976, then declined for two years before increasing slightly in 1979 to 13,108, or 15.0 percent more than in 1975. By comparison, the number of adult female cases rose 43.0 percent, from 2,042 in 1975 to 2,920 in 1979.

Although the Youthful Offender Law, enacted in 1976, was repealed as of July 1, 1978, the number of males and females placed on probation as youthful offenders continued to increase through fiscal year 1979. This accounted in part for the relatively static number of adult probation cases since 1976.

The number of juvenile male probation cases has remained almost constant since 1975 except for an increase in 1978, while the number of juvenile female cases, after reaching 82 in 1975, hovered near 50 each year before dropping to 42 in 1979.

Prior to fiscal year 1977, absconders were not reported separately. The number of absconders increased from 2,076 in 1977 to 2,399 in 1979. Nearly 99 percent of absconders were adults.

Table H shows the average end-of-month population under parole and juvenile aftercare supervision by type and sex of populations, including absconders. Over 93 percent of all cases were males. Adult male cases rose 27.2 percent and juvenile male cases, 48.4 percent from 1975 to 1979. Adult female cases rose 30.8 percent but juvenile female cases declined 27.3 percent during the same period. The number of inter-state compact cases showed little year-to-year change.

Table I shows the average end-of-month number of absconders from parole and juvenile aftercare supervision by type and sex in fiscal years 1977 through 1979. The total number of absconders rose only slightly, from 269 in 1977 to 290 in 1979. While the number of adult absconders varied little, the number of juvenile male absconders jumped from 9 in 1978 to 23 in 1979.


