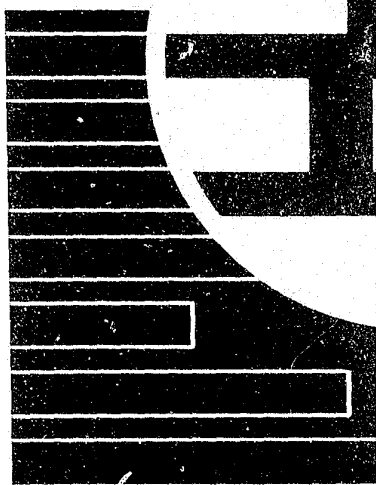

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Introduction

The Illinois Uniform Crime Reports (I-UCR) program has changed since its inception. The scope of the information gathered by the Illinois Department of Law Enforcement (DLE) has been expanded and refined each year from 1972 to the present. As it grew more and more detailed, it became better suited to meet the needs of Illinois law enforcement agencies than its parent, the national Uniform Crime Reports.

In addition to having more detailed information, the I-UCR involved an increasing number of law enforcement agencies in the reporting process. At first many of the smaller agencies reported their data through local sheriffs' offices. As the I-UCR program developed they began to report their own data and, therefore, to receive summary management reports on their activities from DLE.

An increasing number of agencies are reporting their I-UCR data using the incident based Set 2 format. This provides the user with a richer source of information as well as increasing the number of statistical techniques which may be employed. This trend is linked in part to the rise in use of LEADS (Law Enforcement Agencies Data Systems) terminals for reporting I-UCR data to DLE via direct communication lines.

Although most of the change in the I-UCR program took place in its early years a few adjustments are made each year. In light of these annual changes and the need for a systematic source of information on the I-UCR data and on using the Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) edition of the data, annual updates like this one will be produced by SAC. For those wishing to use the SAC edition of the I-UCR database, the primary source of information remains the Illinois Uniform Crime Reports User's Guide and Codebooks, available from SAC. The annual updates are intended as supplements to that document.

The 1977 I-UCR Data -- SAC Edition

The 1977 I-UCR data are now available in SPSS¹ system files from SAC. The data are organized like the 1972 through 1976 data files. The information regarding the 1976 data in the I-UCR User's Guide and Codebooks applies to the 1977 data as well.

The file formats have not changed. They include county-yearly and agency-monthly totals for offenses, arrests and police officers killed or assaulted. Also included are incident based files for property loss offenses, arrests and supplemental information on homicides. Other formats can be created for analysis projects as required.

Data for all county sheriff's and municipal police departments which report directly to DLE may be found in the files. In addition, other agencies referred to as "auxiliary police departments" have data in the I-UCR files. These agencies are railroad company police, university police and similar organizations. They report their data directly to DLE so that they can receive separate summary reports. However, the data for some of them are also reported to DLE by the local county or municipal police and should be excluded in the calculation of any county, regional or statewide totals. SAC excludes the duplicate data in the production of its county files. In the agency and incident level files these agencies may be identified by using the variable AUXPD (the SPSS variable name).

Also reporting separately in 1977 are several state police district posts. Their data are also identifiable using the variable AUXPD. It is now uncertain whether their data are duplicated. As in previous years, the data for Chicago are not available in the same format as the data for the rest of the state. Strict restrictions remain on how these CPD data may be used. These will be discussed later.

Contains, for each crime code, the total number of offenses reported, founded, and cleared; totals for various types of clearances of offenses and dispositions of arrests in each county each year.

INCIDENT DATA:

I. TYPE 1: PROPERTY LOSS INFORMATION.

Contain, for property loss crimes and murder and rape, the method, place and time of the offense, and type and value of property lost. All records (cases) in the data represent one criminal incident except those of Chicago. These files also contains information on recovery of property. These files also contain management data for those agencies choosing to submit them. These data include day of week and day of the month on which the offense occurred, the number of manhours worked on the incident and locally defined identifiers for individual police officers. Set 2 agencies report this information for all offenses not just property loss offenses.

II. TYPE 2: ARREST BY AGE, SEX AND RACE.

Contains the age, sex, race and crime of each person arrested. In recent years offender residence and police disposition variables have been added. Except for Chicago each record represents one person who was arrested (i.e., NARRST = 1). Refer to the Aggregate Data section above for information on files containing total arrests for age, sex and race groupings and see the "Warnings" section of the I-UCR User's Guide and Codebooks (pp. 13-89) before using the Chicago data.

These files contain management data for those agencies choosing to submit them. These data include day of week and day of the month on which the arrest was made, the number of manhours worked on the arrest and locally defined identifiers for individual police officers.

III. TYPE 3: SUPPLEMENTAL HOMICIDE REPORTS.

Contains the following information on homicide victims and offenders: age, sex, race, relationship between victim and offender, weapon used and circumstances of the homicide incident.

Agencies First Reporting Directly to DLE in 1977

The municipal police departments listed below reported their I-UCR data directly to DLE for the first time in 1977. Previously, they had reported through their respective county sheriff's offices. Also listed are the code values for three variables used to identify the agency in the SAC edition of the I-UCR data files. The variable AGENCYID was created by SAC to enable the user to address a single agency using only one variable rather than two (COUNTY and AGENCY). The variable AGENCY must be used in conjunction with the variable COUNTY in order to uniquely identify an individual reporting agency since the code value of AGENCY is unique only within a given county (see Appendix B of the Users' Guide and Codebooks for coding schemes).

Auxiliary Police Departments

The agencies listed below are auxiliary police services, such as university police, railroad police and park district police, reporting directly to DLE in 1977 for the first time. The data reported by them may also be reported to the local sheriff or municipal police and may be included in the data reported by the sheriff or municipal police. Because of this they are excluded in the calculation of yearly totals for Illinois counties in the SAC files and should be excluded from calculation of state or regional totals. The variable AUXPD may be used to identify all auxiliary police department data. A list of the other auxiliary police agencies may be found in Appendix G of the User's Guide.

State Police Offices Reporting Directly to DLE

The state police district posts listed below reported I-UCR data directly to DLE for the first time in 1977. Their data may also be included in the data reported by other agencies. They will not be included, therefore, in the calculation of county, regional or state totals. They are coded as "auxiliary police" in the SAC edition of the files so that they may be excluded easily from analysis.

Changes in the Coding of Individual Variables

In each year from 1972 through 1976 there were significant changes in the coding procedures for some variables. Most notable was the expansion of the codes in the property loss files (Type 1). The codes describing the place a crime occurred or the type of property stolen and the method of larcenies and thefts were enlarged each year. These changes are shown in the Type 1 codebook in the User's Guide and Codebooks. There were also changes in the coding of the I-UCR offense classification (CRIME). Those changes are shown in Charts 5 and 6 on pages 81 and 88 of the User's Guide.

For 1977 there were no coding changes for any of those variables and so the 1976 codes (as shown in the User's Guide and Codebooks) still apply to all types of data.

Restrictions on Analysis of Chicago Data

The Chicago Police Department (CPD) reports crime data to the Illinois Department of Law Enforcement (DLE) on forms completely different from those used by the other law enforcement agencies in Illinois. These differences are explained in detail in the User's Guide for 1972 through 1976. The 1977 CPD reporting procedures are summarized here. (See CPD reporting forms on pages 34-31).

Type 0 Data -- Offense and Clearance Totals. CPD reports offense and clearance totals on the FBI-UCR form Return A (p. 35) for thirteen equal length reporting periods. The value of the variable, report month (REPMTH), ranges from one to twelve. The last two of the thirteen CPD reporting periods are coded twelve for report month. Because of this reporting procedure CPD data cannot be studied for calendar months nor compared to or combined with data from other agencies for study of any but yearly totals.

Because it uses Return A rather than the I-UCR forms, CPD uses a different crime classification system. The CPD categories are shown on the sample forms at the end of this section, and also below with the I-UCR crime classification code values used by DLE for Chicago data.

¹Included under these code values are completed and attempted robberies of each type. For example, the total given in a Chicago record coded 311 would be comparable to the sum of records coded 311 and 330 (attempted robbery with a firearm) for other agencies.

²Included under these code values are totals which correspond to three Illinois crime classifications--aggravated assault, aggravated battery and attempted murder (see CRIME codes 120-124, 410-440 and 510 to 540).

³Simple assault includes simple battery as defined in Illinois law. Also included in this category are assaults or batteries upon public officials or employees. This total, therefore, is the equivalent of the sum of codes 445, 460, 545 and 560 for other Illinois agencies.

⁴Larceny-theft as defined on Return A corresponds to the sum of the data in the I-UCR files for larceny-theft and burglary from a motor vehicle. Comparable data for this category would be the sum of data coded 810, 820, 850 and 710, 720, 758.

⁵Included under these code values are completed and attempted motor vehicle thefts of each type. For example, the total given in a record coded 910 would be comparable to the sum of the records coded 910 and 920 for other agencies in Illinois.

In addition to total offenses the I-UCR forms Offense and Clearance Report and Offense Summary include totals for unfounded complaints, offenses referred to a different jurisdiction, offenses for which no complaint was filed, other exceptional clearances and offenses cleared by arrest. For the last three of these totals, separate figures are reported for adults and juveniles (see sample forms at the end of this section). Return A used by CPD includes totals for "unfounded" complaints, "total offenses cleared by arrest or by exceptional means" and "number of clearances involving persons under eighteen years of age." The second of these, "cleared by arrest or exceptional means," corresponds to the last three types of I-UCR clearances. The column headed: clearances involving persons under eighteen, although available on Return A is not used by CPD in reporting to DLE.

In order to enter CPD's data into the I-UCR type Ø files, DLE includes the total "offenses cleared by arrest or exceptional means" under the I-UCR variable "cleared by the arrest of an adult." The Chicago data in this category are comparable to the sum of the data in all six I-UCR clearance variables for other Illinois agencies.

CPD reports no police disposition data to DLE. All disposition variables contain zeros for Chicago records, and Cook County records in the county files contain disposition totals for suburban Cook County only.

Type 1 data--offense and property loss analysis. The type 1 data for Chicago are reported using a format so different from the standard I-UCR format that valid analyses are extremely limited. Statewide analysis should be done only at the analysis level represented on the FBI-UCR forms used by CPD.

On that form, Property Stolen by Classification (p. 38), the number of offenses and value of property stolen are reported as totals for thirteen equal length reporting periods. Both totals are reported for six crime categories and place, time and method used are reported as sub-categories for some of the crime categories.

On the form Supplement to Return A (p. 36), CPD reports the value of property stolen or recovered for eleven property categories. These figures are totals for all types of crimes together and are reported for each of the thirteen reporting periods.

A comparison of these forms with the I-UCR Type 1 forms, Offense Analysis (p. 22) and Offense Summary (p. 29) demonstrates the differences. A detailed description of these differences may be found in the I-UCR User's Guide and Codebooks, available from SAC.

The Chicago Police Department reports totals for thirteen equal length reporting periods for Type 1 data. The variable report month (REPMTH) is coded twelve for both the twelfth and thirteenth reporting periods, and these periods cannot be distinguished. Chicago data for a single reporting period should not be compared to a month's data for another police department because of the differences.

The charts which follow show the code values assigned to the CPD categories in the I-UCR files for the variables crime classification (for 1977) and place of occurrence, type of property stolen and method of theft or larceny (CRIME, PLACE, PROPCODE, METHOD) for 1972 through 1977.

¹Comparable codes are all codes defined in the I-UCR which fall into the crime categories as shown in FBI-UCR used by CPD.

²The assignment of the data into these two categories is based on the figures reported on Return A (Type Ø data).

³Attempts are included with completed crimes in these CPD categories.

⁴The amount stolen categories differ from the I-UCR amount stolen categories.

Coding of Variable PLACE for Chicago Data 1972-1977

As may be seen on the form, Property Stolen By Classification (p. 38), CPD does not report the place where an offense occurred for every type of crime for which it reports property data. Rather, it reports a small number of place categories for robberies and two for burglaries. Place categories are summarized here for the years 1972 through 1977. The numbers in parentheses are the I-UCR code values for the variable PLACE which were actually used in the I-UCR file. For burglary data except 1972 only residence and other categories are used.

Coding of Type of Property Stolen for CPD Data 1972-1977

CPD reports the total value of property stolen and recovered for eleven property categories. These are not identified by crime, but are totals for all types of offenses. They should not be studied for each type of crime and cannot be compared with monthly summaries of data for other agencies. The chart below shows which I-UCR property type code was assigned to each CPD property category for the variable PROPCODE from 1972 through 1977.

Coding of the Variable METHOD for Chicago Data 1972-1977

The variable METHOD is used with larceny-theft and burglary from a motor vehicle data. In data for other I-UCR agencies these are reported separately. In the Chicago data they are treated as one crime, larceny-theft. The variable METHOD is used only for crime codes in the 800 series in Chicago data. (In other agencies' data the 700 series crime codes would also use METHOD).

Not all available METHOD categories are used in the Chicago data. Those that are used are indicated below. The numbers in parentheses are the code values actually used. The categories do not directly correspond to categories for the rest of the I-UCR data, however. Before using the variable METHOD in analysis, the CPD forms should be compared with the I-UCR forms for the year of interest.

Type 2 data--arrests. The coding of arrest data for Chicago in 1977 was exactly as described in the I-UCR User's Guide and Codebooks. The user should remember that the data consist of annual totals by crime, and that the crime categories for Chicago differ from those of the I-UCR program.

Totals for racial categories may be studied alone, but are invalid in combination with either age or sex. Zeros have been entered in the Type 2-A files for race-sex and race-age combination variables for Chicago, and in the county files those variables contain suburban Cook County data only.

User's should feel free to contact SAC for assistance prior to attempting any analysis of Chicago arrest data.

A. Currency, Notes, Etc.—Property stolen in this category should include those items of currency and legal documents which are interpreted as being negotiable in the open market. This category does not include checks which are not negotiable unless they have been properly countersigned. Credit cards, illegally used, are not counted.

B. Jewelry and Precious Metals—Items to be considered in this category are watches, bracelets, rings, necklaces and other items which have real value and are generally used for the adornment of the person. Also included are metals that, in and of themselves, have a high intrinsic value such as gold, silver and platinum. Common metals such as iron, aluminum and copper are not considered as precious metals.

C. Clothing and Furs—All items of wearing apparel for human use including pelts or skins to be used as wearing apparel should be counted in this category; include accessories such as purses, belts, wallets, etc.

D. Locally Stolen Motor Vehicles—Motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the land surface and not on rails. Items in this category will include automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, etc.

E. Office Equipment—This item will include such devices as typewriters, adding machines, cash registers, mimeograph machines, duplicating devices, etc.

F. Televisions, Radios, Cameras, Etc.—All items that are designed for the specific purpose of reproducing photographic images or sound should be counted in this category. Examples are television cameras and receivers; still picture cameras; motion picture cameras and projectors; radios, re-

ceiving and sending; record players; tape recorders; records; tapes; etc.

G. Firearms—Items covered in this category are weapons that fire a shot by the force of an explosion. Include all handguns, rifles, shotguns, and other such devices commonly referred to as a firearm. Notable exceptions to this category are BB guns and pellet-type weapons.

H. Household Goods—General household items such as beds, sofas, chairs, washers, dryers, furnaces, desks, tables, bookcases, air conditioners, etc., should be counted here. Location of the theft is not necessarily a consideration for listing in this category. Household goods may be stolen from a truck, a residence, a business establishment, or other location.

I. Consumable Goods—In this category, items such as liquor, meat, perishable foods, canned foods, cigarettes, gasoline, etc., would be listed. Other items that should also be considered in this category are deodorants, after shave lotion, perfume, beverages, etc. Consumables should broadly be defined as those items used by humans for nutrition, enjoyment or hygiene and that no longer exist in the same form after use.

J. Livestock—Such items as live cattle, hogs, horses, sheep, goats, and other mammals commonly raised as farm stock would be listed in this category. Common household pets such as dogs, cats, and birds should be counted in the miscellaneous category.

K. Miscellaneous—Items that are not accounted for in the above listing would fall into this category. Some general examples are shrubbery, vehicle parts, boats, trailers, airplanes, books, household pets, etc.

Set 1 agencies report offenses and clearances in monthly tallies or counts as opposed to detailed descriptions of individual incidents. Incident level data are submitted by Set 1 agencies only for property loss crimes (plus murder and rape) and for arrests.

Set 2 agencies report incident level information for all offenses and arrests. This provides more detailed data and permits the reporting of police activity information such as man hours, shifts, etc. for individual investigations or arrests.

The sample I-UCR report forms which begin on page 21 show more clearly the differences in information reported by Set 1 and Set 2 agencies.
