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1976 YEARLY STATISTICAL REPORT OF THE FURLOUGH PROGRAM

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INTRODUCTION

The following report is a statistical description of the Massachusetts Department of Correction furlough program for the year 1976. Included is some trend analyses covering the program since its inception in 1972.

The report is divided into two sections. Section I provides a brief overview of the Massachusetts furlough program. Comparisons of furlough characteristics over the past four years, as well as monthly escape rates and proportions for 1976, are discussed.

Section II contains frequency distributions on personal background characteristics, present offense and criminal history variables for the year 1976. It is important to note that these figures refer to the number of furloughs (not the number of individuals) in each corresponding category. Included in this section are two crosstabulation tables. One compares type of furlough with institution furloughed from; the other, type of furlough with outcome of furlough.

The tables for this report were derived from the computerized data base developed by the Correction and Parole Management Information System (CAPMIS) and produced by the Research Unit of the Massachusetts Department of Correction on the Massachusetts State College Computer Network (MSCCN).

SECTION I: Overview

OVERVIEW

The furlough program for residents of Massachusetts correctional facilities has been extensively implemented since the program commenced operation in November 1972. Between that time and the end of 1976, a total of 33,187 furloughs have been granted. In 398 cases, inmates have failed to return to their respective correctional facility within two hours of their prescribed time of return. Thus since the inception of the program there is an overall escape rate of 1.2%.²

Upon analyzing the furlough statistics on a yearly basis (see Table I) it can be noted that the furlough escape rate has been consistently decreasing over the years from 1973 to 1976. In particular, the escape rates range from 1.9%, 1.5%, 1.0% to 0.5% respectively. More particularly, the escape rates between 1975 and 1976 dropped by 50%; however, it should be noted that the number of furloughs granted between these two years also decreased from 8,565 in 1975 to 7,985 in 1976 which results in an approximate 1% decrease.

1/1/75 2363 1/1/76 2792 In comparing the number of escapes to the number of furloughs granted between the years 1975 and 1976, there exists a significant decrease in the number of escapes $(X^2=14.7;df=1;p \ \ .001)^4$. A comparison between the number of furloughs to the prison population yields a significant decrease over the years 1975 and 1976 $(X^2=55.0;df=1;p \ \ .001)$. Similarly, a significant decrease also exists between the number of individuals furloughed relative to the prison population for these same two years $(X^2=40.0;df=1;p \ \ .001)$. However, there is no significant change between the number of furloughs to the number of individuals furloughed $(X^2=1.2;df=1;p \ \ .2)$. Thus, the decrease may be attributed to a stricter selection factor in the furlough granting process.

The monthly escape rates for 1976 ranged from a low of 0.0% during the months of June, July, September and November; to a high of 1.3% in April (See Table III). It should be noted that the Department issued a statewide moratorium on granting furloughs between May 24, 1976 to June 14, 1976. This helps account for the substantial decrease in the number of furloughs granted during those months. Also noteworthy is the apparent decrease in the escape rates by month for 1976. A statistical test⁵ was computed which concluded a significant decrease in these rates; (i.e., the escape rates by month were not random). This decline may be due to the aforementioned moratorium and consequent alterations of the furlough program regulations upon its re-commencement. A monthly average of 665 individuals and 3 escapes resulted in an average monthly escape rate of 0.5%.

Finally, Table IV denotes the average number of inmates furloughed, the average daily population, and this proportion for each institution during 1976. As can be seen from this table, the institutions with the higher proportions of furloughs are those of lowest security. Statewide, out of an average daily population of 2571 inmates, an average of 377 individuals received a furlough during the course of a month. The results were that an average of 14.7% of the inmate population were furloughed each month during 1976.

FOOTNOTES

- There exists a slight discrepancy between the number of furloughs and escapes during past reports and other departmental documents. This is due to late reporting and the consequent updating of this new information.
- The Department of Correction furlough statistics define an "escape from furlough" in accordance with Department Order 46701, entitled "Furloughs-rules and regulations." According to section 10.4(c): "Failure of the resident to return to the correctional facility after the two hour period set forth in section 10.4(b) shall be considered an escape regardless of prior notification to the facility by the resident that he would be late. The superintendent or his designee shall notify, forthwith, appropriate law enforcement officials of the escapee".
- The figures in this table represent corrected figures from prior departmental data records. CAPMIS has attributed these discrepancies as follows:
 - (a) The number of furloughs in 1975 has been increased slightly as a result of the correction of a reporting error. Previously two or more furloughs of several hours each on consecutive days were reported as one furlough rather than the actual number.
 - (b) A second error occurred in the reporting of the number of individuals furloughed due to a system problem whereby certain furloughs were attached to the wrong computer records. These errors have been corrected for 1975 and prior years and these figures have now increased.

Therefore, above figures are somewhat different than those of prior reports.

- There also exists a significant decrease between the number of escapes and the number of individuals furloughed 1975 $(X^2=12.6;df=1;p \ \ .001)$
- A "Runs Test" was computed yielding the following parameters: X=.4 nl=4 n2=7 R=2 and $\alpha=.05$

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
