

Background and Methodology

A telephone survey was conducted of State Planning Agency Corrections Specialists during September, 1977. The purpose of the survey was to update and verify the priority corrections technical assistance needs in each state. National technical assistance needs were identified and prioritized by the Office of Regional Operations, Technical Assistance Plan in February, 1977. Since ORO's plan and priorities were based upon Regional Office Plans SPA Plans: which were at least a year old, an update survey was deemed necessary. A sample of the SPA Telephone Interview Form is attached to this report.

There are fifty-five (55) State Planning Agencies and our survey interviewed officials of fifty (50) SPA's. We did not attempt to contact SPA officials in Guam, American Samoa, Hawaii and the Virgin Islands. In addition, we were unable to make contact with SPA officials in Idaho.

There were a few interviews conducted with SPA officials which could be considered "unsuccessful" for various reasons. In Alabama, the SPA has lost their Corrections Specialist and after we conferred with several SPA officials they referred us to the Commissioner of the Board of Corrections. California has experienced a severe reduction in SPA staff and "can't afford" a Corrections Specialist; the interview with the Acting Corrections Specialist proved fruitless. The Colorado SPA has a vacant correction specialist position and the Director of Planning will have to meet with staff to answer our survey questions. Finally, in Mississippi and New Hampshire due to changes in administrations there would be policy changes forthcoming in the corrections area.

Analysis of Survey Information

ORO established the following priorities in their 1977 T.A. Plan.

1. Overcrowding in State Correctional Facilities;
2. Probation Services, Reorganization Management and Program Issues;
3. Jails - Upgrading, Alternatives and Overcrowding;
4. Restitution;
5. Recruitment, Selection, and Retention of Women and Minorities;
6. Management of Jail Facilities;
7. Health Care in Correctional Institutions;
8. Prison Industries.

Since ORO has identified the top two priorities as overcrowding and probation management and the NCTAP contract is required to spend 60% of its resources on the top two priorities, an overall analysis was made of the top priority issues. The top priority issues were further analyzed by region and population group to determine if there were any patterns or variations. Finally, an analysis of "probable T.A." areas was made. This includes T.A. which might fall under the "brokered" or "ad hoc" areas.

I. Overall Analysis

Our survey information verifies that the top two priority areas for corrections T.A. nationally are still the same as identified by ORO's 1977 T.A. Plan, overcrowding and probation management. The respondents to the survey were not asked if probation management and overcrowding were the top priorities in their state, but were asked if overcrowding or probation management had been identified as one of their priority T.A. needs. The following results were obtained:

II. Regional Variations

An analysis of the survey information on the basis of regional groupings was made. Five regional groupings were established as follows:

Northeast, North Central, South, Mid-West and West. Figure 2 below defines the regions and summarizes the results. (See Table 2 for a list of states) The analysis shows that the overcrowding issue is most prevalent in the South where 69% of the SPA's identified it as a priority. The North Central states follow closely with 66%. The need for T.A. in probation management is highest in the North Central (66%) and North Eastern states (50%).

III. Variations in Top Priority T.A. Need by Population Group

Four population groupings were established for SPAs (see Table 3). Analysis of the two top priority areas on the basis of state population indicates that, in the area of overcrowding, almost all states in the 4 - 10 million population group (11 of 12 or 91%) identified this as a priority need.

The need for T.A. in probation management appears to be spread out evenly among population groups. The following summarizes the data:

Analysis of Probable Areas of T.A. Need

During the SPA Survey the respondents were asked what probable areas of T.A. need are there besides overcrowding and probation. The attached tables 4 and 5 indicate what those needs are by state and tabulate the results by subject area. There were 27 areas of probable need identified. No attempt has been made to group those areas into broad categories in order to reduce the number of areas. Most areas were raised only once or twice. Three areas of probable need stood out above the others, they were as follows:
