

## FOREWORD

The Comprehensive Crime Prevention Program (CCPP) is one of three major crime prevention programs currently being sponsored by the Office of Community Anti-Crime Programs (OCACP) of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). The Comprehensive Crime Prevention Program, along with the Community Anti-Crime Program, designed to assist community groups, and the new LEAA/ACTION Urban Crime Prevention Program, designed to develop broad-based community coalitions, reflects OCACP's commitment to support a broad range of program efforts that address the diverse needs of our communities.

The 16 jurisdictions participating in the Comprehensive Crime Prevention Program are part of a national demonstration program to test the effect of establishing a well-planned, comprehensive approach to managing crime prevention programs in medium-sized local jurisdictions. Each jurisdiction is attempting to successfully integrate business, industry, citizen, civic, and neighborhood organizations with criminal justice and non-criminal justice governmental resources in a coordinated effort. It is hoped that this demonstration program will increase our knowledge about the management of crime prevention strategies and techniques so that other jurisdictions throughout the United States can benefit from the lessons learned through the Comprehensive Crime Prevention Program.

## PREFACE

The Comprehensive Crime Prevention Program (CCPP) Reference Handbook is designed to provide program participants with easy access to the wealth of information that is available from the 16 CCPP jurisdictions. The material was compiled from data provided by the participating jurisdictions themselves. Because several of the jurisdictions are still in the preliminary stages of project development, they were unable to provide all of the information requested at this time. However, this information will be updated as it becomes available. It is hoped that by making this information accessible, program participants will be encouraged to support each other's project efforts by further exchanging information and experiences about their own projects.

The handbook is divided into four sections:

- Section 1: CCPP Overview - This section provides a brief pictorial and narrative description of the Comprehensive Crime Prevention Program. The overview is intended specifically for those individuals who may be called upon to provide a general description of the program.
- Section 2: City/Project Profiles - This section provides a general demographic overview of the 16 CCPP jurisdictions and also identifies each of the projects' objectives and strategies. This information will enable program participants to identify those jurisdictions with similar characteristics and objectives to their own.
- Section 3: Resource/Skills Matrices - This section identifies those individuals and organizations with particular expertise in a variety of CCPP-related areas. It provides program participants with a directory of resources that can be called upon for information about topics of mutual interest and concern.

- Section 4: Key Participants - This section provides a directory of each jurisdiction's key participants by functional area (i.e., project management, police, agency and community representatives) as well as a listing of LEAA personnel and CCPP program consultants. Included are current titles, addresses and telephone numbers.







# CCPP PROGRAM OBJECTIVES




- TO TEST THE EFFECT OF ESTABLISHING WELL-PLANNED, COMPREHENSIVE, MULTIFACETED CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS IN MEDIUM SIZE LOCAL JURISDICTIONS
- TO GAIN INCREASED KNOWLEDGE ABOUT THE MANAGEMENT OF CRIME PREVENTION STRATEGIES AND IMPLEMENTATION TECHNIQUES

## PROBLEMS ADDRESSED



- THERE HAS BEEN A PROLIFERATION OF PROGRAMS IN THE CRIME PREVENTION FIELD. THESE PROGRAMS, CONDUCTED BY A VARIETY OF CIVIC GROUPS, NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZATIONS, GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES AND POLICE DEPARTMENTS ARE FREQUENTLY MORE PUBLIC RELATIONS ORIENTED THAN PROBLEM FOCUSED.
- THERE IS A WIDE DIVERSITY OF OPINION REGARDING WHAT WORKS AND WHAT DOES NOT WORK IN CRIME PREVENTION. THIS PROMOTES COMPETITION BETWEEN APPROACHES RATHER THAN COMPATIBILITY.
- THERE HAS BEEN AN ABSENCE OF CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT IN MANY OF THE CURRENT CRIME PREVENTION EFFORTS, BECAUSE OF A LACK OF COORDINATION AND COMMUNICATION BETWEEN PUBLIC AGENCIES AND PRIVATE GROUPS.


