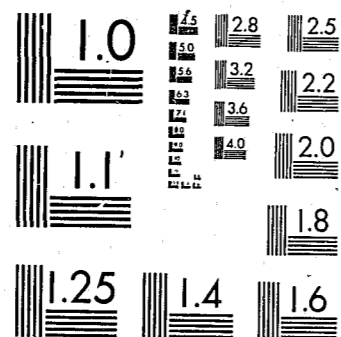


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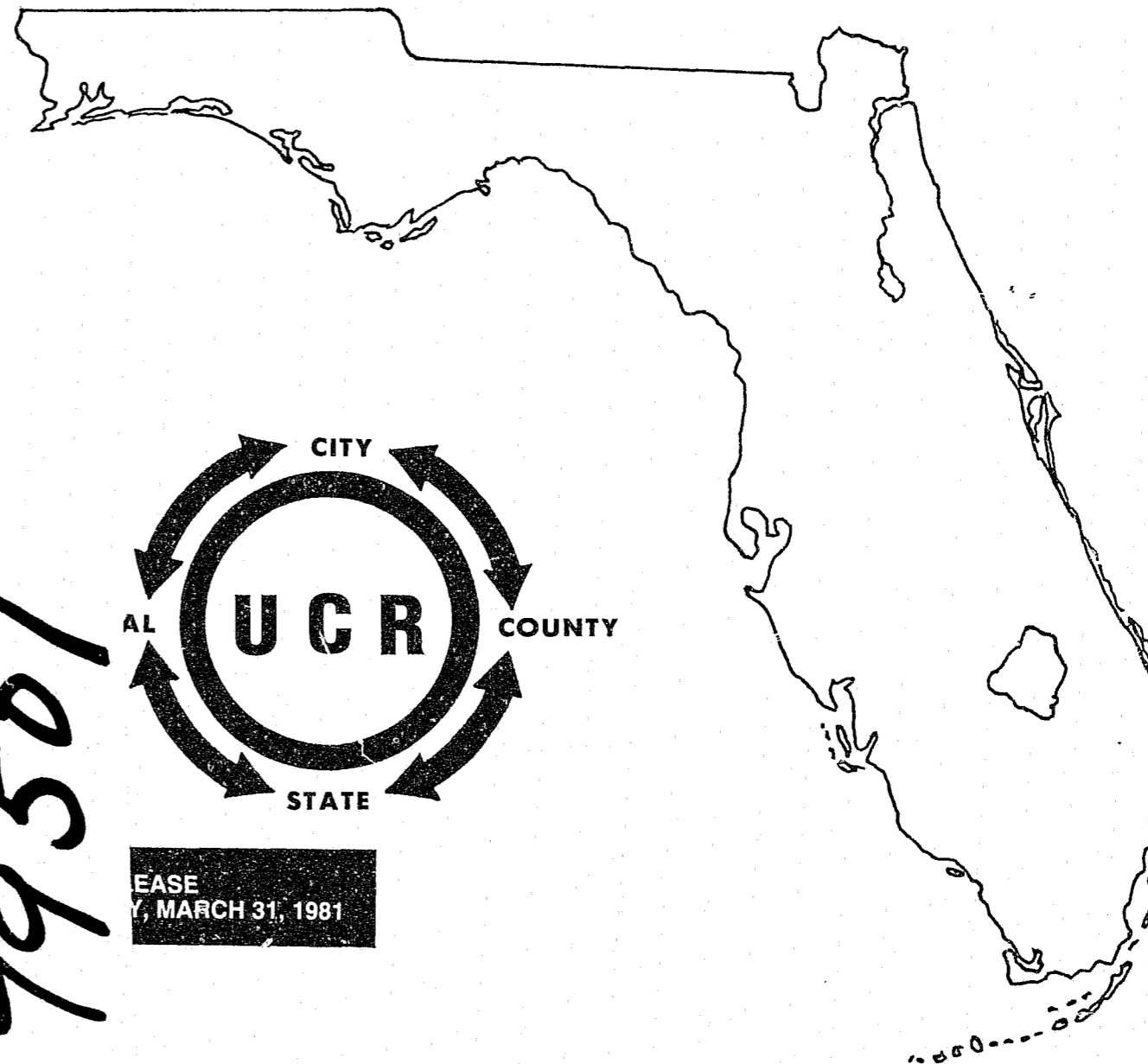

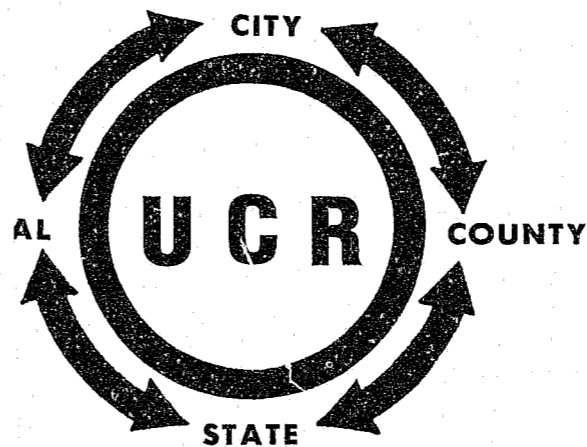

### Crime in Florida 1980 ANNUAL REPORT

Dear Governor Graham and Members of the Cabinet:

I am transmitting herewith the 1980 report on crime in Florida compiled by the Department of Law Enforcement.

Regretfully, I am required to report that the disturbing progression in the growth of crime in our state continues. Since 1977, the volume of index crimes has risen on an annual basis by 3.6, 6.8, 12.1 and now 18 percent.

The numbers authenticate a dangerous trend. Violent crimes of the kind that drive citizens behind locked doors are rising drastically. Last year, all violent crime went up 27 percent, murder increased 28 percent. Robbery, spurred by worsening economic conditions, leaped almost 54 percent.

Let me hasten to add that, although much of our attention during the past year has focused on a drastic problem in Miami and other metropolitan areas, this increase in crime is not confined to our larger cities. While crime in metropolitan areas has increased 24.1 percent, smaller cities reflect a 16.5 percent increase, suburban incorporated areas reflect a 15.2 percent increase, suburban unincorporated areas reflect a 19.0 percent increase, and even our rural areas are affected by a 14.3 percent increase in crime.

During the period cited above, police numbers in Florida remained at 1.9 per thousand population in spite of increasing crime. This is but one aspect of a criminal justice system suffering for want of adequate resources. Our failure to function as a cohesive system at least partially explains why the state prisons are under federal court order restricting inmate population, why some local jails must release one inmate before taking in another, why many state attorneys have less than two hours to prepare a prosecution before going to court, why the morale of law enforcement and corrections officers is at a nadir and public confidence in criminal justice is virtually nonexistent.

Records show that 77 percent of criminal cases filed in Circuit Court are being disposed of in a non-punitive manner, 18 percent with adjudication withheld. Only 3.5 percent of these cases are being carried through to guilt or acquittal.

Florida is fiscally conserving itself into a position where crime will become its hallmark before the rest of the nation and the world. I respectfully suggest that this report is a mandate for action at every level to bring all components of the criminal justice system to bear at full strength, and I urge you to consider the possibility of supplemental revenue sources aimed solely at supporting our criminal justice system.

The potential for a crisis in crime is fast approaching the probability stage.

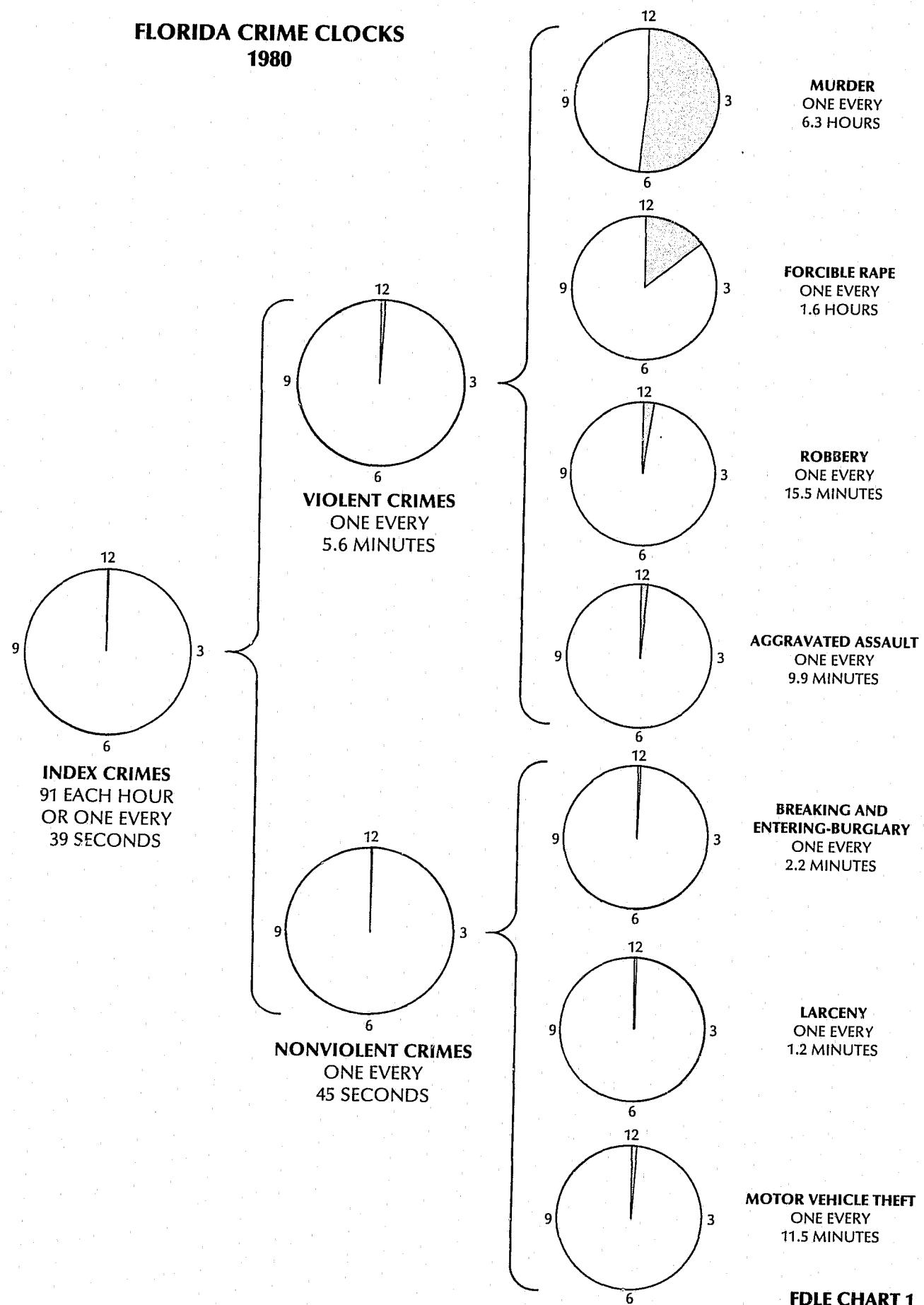
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**FLORIDA CRIME CLOCKS

**THE FLORIDA UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM**

**INTRODUCTION**

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has been actively assisting individual states in the development of statewide programs of law enforcement statistics compatible with the national Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. These statistical programs have been given impetus by development of statewide computerized law enforcement information systems, of which UCR is an integral part. Florida, in concert with the development of the Florida Crime Information Center (FCIC), has become one of the first states to develop its own statewide program of law enforcement statistics, the Florida Uniform Crime Reports Program.

In January 1971, the Uniform Crime Reports and Statistics Bureau of the Department of Law Enforcement, initially began the collection of monthly uniform crime reports from county and municipal law enforcement agencies. As mandated by the Florida Legislature, fifteen publications entitled *Crime in Florida* have previously been disseminated. This document is the tenth annual report, presenting statistical information collected and compiled through the year 1980.

**FLORIDA UCR PROGRAM**

The Florida Legislature, in establishing the Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) statute, mandated the responsibility and authority for UCR data collection and dissemination to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) as follows:

**FLORIDA STATUTES, CHAPTER 943**

Section 5. Division of criminal justice information systems.—

- (1) The division shall:
  - (c) Establish a system of uniform crime reports and statistical analysis.
- 1. All state, county and municipal law enforcement agencies shall submit to the department uniform crime reports setting forth their activities in connection with law enforcement.

- 2. It shall be the duty of the division, under the supervision of the executive director, to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations prescribing the form, general content, time and manner of submission of such uniform crime reports required pursuant to chapter 120, and shall have the force and effect of law. Willful or repeated failure by any state, county or municipal law enforcement official to submit the uniform crime reports required by this act shall constitute neglect of duty in public office.
- 3. The division shall correlate the reports submitted to it pursuant to subparagraph 1 and shall compile and submit to the governor and the legislature semiannual reports based on such reports. A copy of said reports shall be furnished to all prosecuting authorities and law enforcement agencies.

**PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES**

The quantitative statistical data derived from the UCR Program will provide assistance in determining the overall scope of the reported criminal activity in Florida and will aid in making effective management studies possible.

The fundamental objectives of the Florida UCR Program are:

- (1) Inform the governor, legislature, other governmental officials and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Florida, its magnitude and its trends.
- (2) Provide law enforcement administrators with criminal statistics for administrative and operational use.
- (3) Determine who commits crimes by age, sex, race, whether resident or nonresident, and other social attributes in order to find the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement.

- (4) Provide base data and statistics to measure the effectiveness of Florida's criminal justice system.
- (5) Provide base data and statistics to measure the effects of prevention and deterrence programs.
- (6) Provide base data and statistics for research to improve the efficiency, effectiveness and performance of criminal justice agencies.
- (7) Provide data to assist in the assessment of societal and other causes of crime for the development of theories of criminal behavior.
- (8) Provide the FBI with complete UCR data to be included in the national crime reports.

#### REPORTING PROCEDURE

Crime data and information submitted by municipal and county law enforcement agencies is collected on a daily, weekly, monthly and annual basis. Fingerprints of all adult arrests for felony and misdemeanor (nontraffic) offenses are collected daily. Finally, employee data for law enforcement agencies is collected and published annually.

Starting in January 1972, several minor modifications in reporting procedures were made in response to requests from local agencies and the FBI. Arrests for worthless checks and for narcotics paraphernalia are indicated separately. In January 1973, larceny under \$50 (including attempts) was added as an index offense. A program modification in 1975 involved the expansion of drug classifications and new, expanded property breakdowns. In January 1976, a new category under motor vehicle theft was added to classify motorcycles separately.

Commencing on January 1, 1976, the traditional method of collecting UCR data on a monthly basis was enhanced to a sophisticated offense-by-offense program in Florida. The collection process involves one of three submission methods for an agency: daily through terminal entries, weekly from paper code forms or monthly by computer tapes. With the capability of collecting more detailed data the

utility of Florida's UCR Program is enhanced from the contributor and state viewpoint for management, operational and crime trend analysis purposes. By virtue of this enhancement to Florida's UCR Program a more accurate assessment of reported criminal activity can be made. Municipal police and county sheriff departments report the individual offense data known to them in the following crime categories: murder, non-traffic manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, assault, breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. Offense data is taken from the records of complaints received by law enforcement agencies from victims, witnesses or other sources, or discovered by agencies during their own operations. Complaints determined by subsequent investigations to be unfounded are eliminated from the count. The resulting data on individual "offenses known to law enforcement officials" in these crime categories is reported, without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy or any other consideration. Municipal and county agencies also report supplemental offense information such as the number of victims, the value of property stolen and recovered, circumstances surrounding homicides and other pertinent data. Additionally, reports of persons arrested are submitted. These reports provide information concerning the age, sex, race and residency of all persons arrested by each individual law enforcement agency. Reports of persons arrested are separated as to adults and juveniles.

#### VERIFICATION

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics for law enforcement agencies throughout the state is the uniformity and accuracy of data received. Program aids such as guides and instructions do not necessarily guarantee the accuracy and correctness of the reports submitted by the contributors. Additional controls therefore are necessary.

Each individual offense report received by the Department is recorded, examined and verified for accuracy and for reasonableness. The verification process includes numerous checks to ensure the validity of information. The elimination of duplication of reporting by individual contributors

receives particular attention. Minor errors are corrected by telephone or FCIC terminal contact between UCR Field Representative and the reporting agency. Substantial variation and errors are adjusted through personal contacts with individual contributing agencies. The personal contacts are invaluable to the accuracy and quality of reporting. Field Representatives are engaged in a constant educational effort and provide a vital link between the UCR Program and the contributor.

#### INCIDENT REPORTING AND RECORDS MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

As an adjunct to the UCR Program, Field Representatives assist Florida law enforcement agencies as requested, in the development of an Incident Reporting and Records Management System (IRRMS). This system can enhance or replace a law enforcement agency's records system in its method of collecting, storing and retrieving all police service information pertaining to a particular criminal case or police activity. IRRMS can provide small and medium size law enforcement agencies a source of complete information that can be utilized by the entire criminal justice system and by administrators as a tool in decision-making policies.

#### CONTRIBUTING AGENCIES AND POPULATION

There are currently 339 law enforcement agencies throughout the state contributing directly to the Florida UCR Program — 66 county law enforcement agencies and 273 municipal agencies. In addition, 5 state law enforcement agencies and 9 campus police departments submit data to the program. Daily, weekly, monthly and annual uniform crime reports received from these agencies represent statistical data covering approximately 100 percent of the estimated Florida population.

The 1980 population figures for the State of Florida, county and municipalities were provided by the United States Bureau of the Census. The 1980 population counts were compiled in the census district offices and represent preliminary figures as of December 23, 1980.

The relative statewide estimates reflect populations of 9,579,497 for the year 1980 and 9,245,231 for the year 1979.

#### SMSA CONCEPTS

The Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA) have been designated for data uniformity among government agencies and between these agencies and the public to include industry and state and local governments. The general concept of SMSA is one of an integrated economic and social unit with a recognized population nucleus. To be more specific, in designating any county as belonging to SMSA, the National Bureau of Standards applies certain prescribed criteria when making this determination.

A Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area always includes a city (cities) of specific population which constitutes the central city and the county (counties) in which it is located. A Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area also includes contiguous counties when the economic and social relationships between the central and contiguous counties meet specified criteria of metropolitan character and integration.

1. Each Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area must include at least:
  - (a) One city with 50,000 or more inhabitants, or
  - (b) A city having a population of at least 25,000 which, with the addition of the population of contiguous places, incorporated or unincorporated, which have a **population density** of at least 1,000 persons per square mile, and which together constituted for general **economic** and **social** purposes, a single community with a combined population of at least 50,000 provided that the county or counties in which the city and contiguous places are located has a total population of at least 75,000.
2. A contiguous county will be included in a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area if:
  - (a) At least 75.00% of the resident **labor force** in the county is in the nonagricultural labor force, and

(b) At least 30.00% of the employed workers living in the county **work in the central county** or counties of the area.

3. A contiguous county which does not meet the requirements of Criterion 2 will be included in a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area if at least 75.00% of the resident labor force is in the nonagricultural labor force and it meets two of the following additional criteria of metropolitan character and one of the following criteria of integration.

(a) Criteria of Metropolitan Character.

(1) At least 25.00% of the **population is urban**.

(2) The county had an increase of at least 15.00% **in total population during the period** covered by the two most recent Census of Population.

(3) The county has a population **density** of at least 50 persons per square mile.

(b) Criteria of Integration.

(1) At least 15.00% of the employed workers living in the county **work in the central county** or counties of the area, or

(2) The number of people working in the county who live in the central county or counties of the area is at least 15.00% of the employed workers living in the county, or

(3) The sum of workers **commuting** to and from the central county or counties is equal to 20.00% of the employed workers living in the county.

From this the following all-inclusive and non-overlapping groupings of the entire state population were established. These groups, referred to as Community Types, are as follows:

1. Metropolitan — Municipalities of over 250,000 population.

2. Cities — Municipalities of 50,000 to 250,000 population.

3. Suburban — Municipalities under 50,000 and unincorporated jurisdictions in SMSA counties.

4. Non-Suburban — Incorporated jurisdictions under 50,000 in non SMSA counties.

5. Rural — Unincorporated jurisdictions in non SMSA counties.

These five major Community Types can be compared directly, one against the other, or further reduced to their lowest common population grouping, to compare each Community Type internally. This method of grouping population entities fits well with the system used by the FBI in dividing the population types in the United States, and provides a common base for development of all future statistics on crime information. Although the primary emphasis of all future crime analysis will be made on the basis of the five Community Types, there will be occasions when other population groupings will more readily fit the analysis criteria. Generally speaking, these additional needs can be met by dividing the state into zones, based on a social and economic likeness of individuals within, and then splitting these groups into Community Types or counties for the final analysis. It is felt that additional research may reveal additional or more precise grouping patterns.

#### CLASSIFICATION AND LISTING OF UCR OFFENSES

Offense data consists of information that has been extracted from reports of Part I crimes that have come to the attention of Florida law enforcement agencies. They consist of the following offenses:

1A. **Murder** — The willful (nonnegligent) killing of a human being.

1B. **Manslaughter** — The killing of a human being by the act, procurement or culpable negligence of another.

2. **Forcible Rape** — The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

3. **Robbery** — The felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence and/or putting him in fear.

4. **Aggravated Assault** — An attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.

5. **Breaking and Entering — Burglary** — An unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.

6. **Larceny (Except Motor Vehicle Theft)** — The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to permanently deprive him of ownership.

7. **Motor Vehicle Theft** — The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle.

Part II offenses are made up of all other crimes not classified as Part I crimes. Information on Part II offenses is reported only when an arrest has been made. Part II crimes for UCR purposes are as follows:

8. **Other Assaults — Not Aggravated** — Assaults and attempted assaults which are simple and minor in nature.

9. **Arson** — Willful or malicious burning with or without intent to defraud. Includes attempts.

10. **Forgery and Counterfeiting** — Making, altering, uttering or possessing, or attempts to make, alter, utter or possess with intent to defraud. Anything false which is made to appear true.

11A. **Fraud** — Fraudulent conversion of another's money or property by false pretenses.

11B. **Worthless Checks** — Fraudulent conversion through bad checks — excludes forgery and counterfeiting.

12. **Embezzlement** — Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

13. **Stolen Property** — All offenses of buying, receiving and possessing stolen property,

as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

14. **Vandalism** — Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

15. **Weapons: Carrying, Possession, etc.** — All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers and all attempts to commit any of the offenses.

16. **Prostitution and Commercialized Vice** — Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, and all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

17. **Sex Offenses (Except Forcible Rape, Prostitution and Commercialized Vice)** — Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like. Includes attempts.

18. **Narcotic Drug Laws** — Includes all arrests for violations of State and Local Ordinances specifically those relating to the unlawful possession and sale of narcotic drugs.

19. **Gambling** — Promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling.

20. **Offenses Against the Family and Children** — Nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

21. **Driving Under the Influence** — Driving or operating any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or drugs.

22. **Liquor Laws** — State or local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence."

23. **Disorderly Intoxication** — Drunk and disorderly.

24. **Disorderly Conduct** — Breach of peace. (Disorderly persons.)

25. **Vagrancy** — Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

26. **All Other Offenses** — All violations of state and local laws except classes 1-25 and 28-29.
27. **Suspicion** — Not reported in Florida.
28. **Curfew and Loitering Laws (Juveniles)** — Offenses relating to local curfew or loitering ordinances, where such laws exist.
29. **Runaway (Juveniles)** — Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody who have run away from the reporting jurisdiction.

#### UCR USAGE

There are inherent limitations in current crime reporting practices. Of primary importance is the question of how much crime is being reported. Law enforcement agencies are only capable of reporting crimes known to them. In many instances, citizens do not report crimes directly to these agencies but may report them to the prosecuting authorities. A considerable volume of crime is not reported to law enforcement agencies because the victims may consider the offenses against them to be of very little consequence; they believe there is nothing the police can do about them; they fear retaliation from offenders or have shared willingly in such offenses as illegal sex acts, gambling or drug usage. Consequently, information concerning some offenses is never entered in the present statistical reporting system.

Furthermore, only arrest data is submitted on Part II crimes, therefore, current UCR statistics do not necessarily measure the true incidence of crimes or the actual economic loss incurred by victims.

Crimes and arrests should not be compared on a one-to-one basis, as a crime is an event and an arrest relates to an individual. For example, several crimes may be solved by one arrest or many persons can be arrested for committing one crime.

Crime clearances, the value of property stolen and recovered, and arrests, reflect the current year's activity and will include data related to crimes reported in prior years.

#### SUMMARY

Set forth below are some additional conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place. These same conditions will also affect the amount of crime actually reported.

1. Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
2. Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
3. Economic status and mores of the population.
4. Relative stability of population including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.
5. Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
6. Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
7. Effective strength of the police force.
8. Standards governing appointment to the police force.
9. Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
10. Attitude of the public towards law and enforcement problems.
11. The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

The information collected for this report portrays the most accurate and realistic assessment available of the crime situation in Florida. UCR statistics are not designed as an indicator of agency activity for use in direct comparisons but pertain to a specific geographic area. A casual relationship exists between crime and a great many socio-economic factors, although presently no definite theories exist. However, reported crime activity is a measurable quantity and, as such, should be used to present the clearest possible picture of the dimensions, fluctuations and impact of crime in the State of Florida.

On March 31, 1981, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement released its tenth Annual Florida Uniform Crime Report, reflecting a general overview of reported crime and related data during 1980.

**CRIME VOLUME**

The volume of reported index crimes (Violent: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault; Non-violent: Breaking and Entering — Burglary, Larceny and Motor Vehicle Theft) increased 18.0 percent from 1979.

**RATIO OF LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEES**

As of October 31, 1980, the number of full-time law enforcement employees (sworn and civilian) in Florida increased 4.7 percent over 1979 to 26,552. In 1980, there were 18,308 sworn officers in Florida; the rate per 1,000 residents was 1.9 sworn officers, reflecting no change over the 1979 rate. This does not include state law enforcement or campus police employees.

**1980 MODIFIED RATES FOR FLORIDA USING TRANSIENT POPULATION DATA**

Since 1930, when the Uniform Crime Reports Program was undertaken, the method used to display crime data in an equitable manner has been based on the population of an agency's jurisdiction. The rates, as calculated, provide the agency the capability of measuring the current magnitude of the crime problem that exists in their jurisdiction as it relates to the number of people living there.

These rates do not take into account the variety of other factors which will cause changes in reported crime from location to location. One factor, especially important in Florida, is the transient population groups that are in the state each year. Major population groups of this type include tourists, migrant labor workers, out-of-state university students and non-Florida residents in the state for business trips. Statewide totals for a modified crime, arrest and sworn personnel rate are computed below utilizing the four population groups listed above. Since there is no accurate method of determining where these individuals are located and how long their visit will be, rates as shown below cannot be calculated for individual law enforcement jurisdictions. However, further study and research is being conducted in the use of transient population data in computing modified rates for various aspects of crime in Florida. In the future, modified rates may be calculated for indi-

vidual agencies throughout the state for inclusion in future editions of the annual report, *Crime In Florida*.

**Method of Calculation Using Transient Population**

**Data**

The modified crime rate and the modified arrest rate is computed per 100,000 population, whereas the modified sworn personnel rate is computed per 1,000 population.

Estimates for the transient populations listed were obtained from the Division of Tourism, Department of Labor and Employment Security and the Board of Regents.

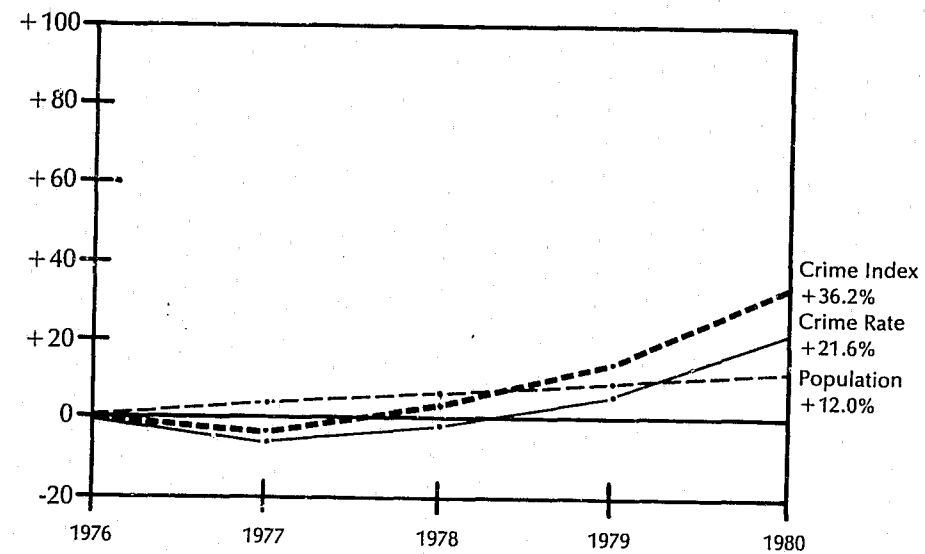

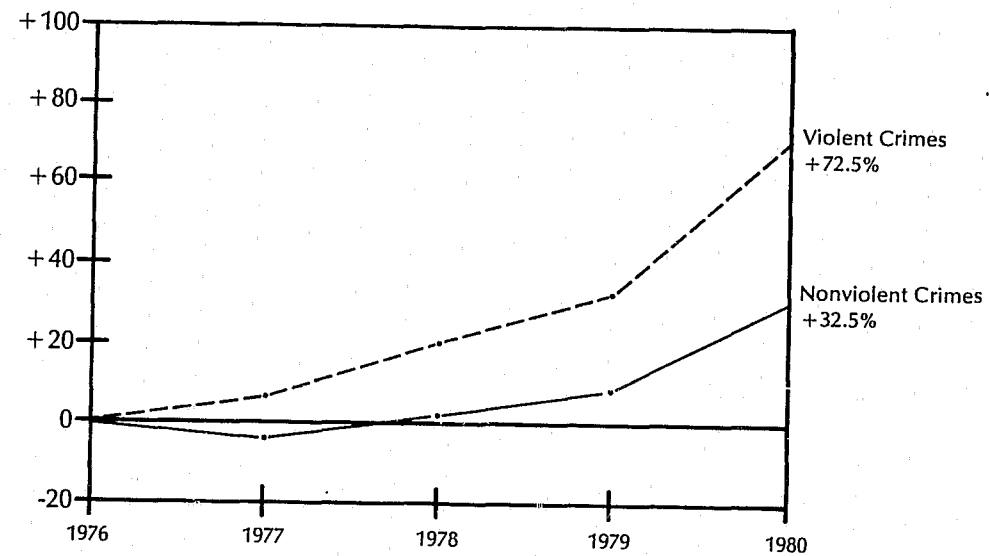

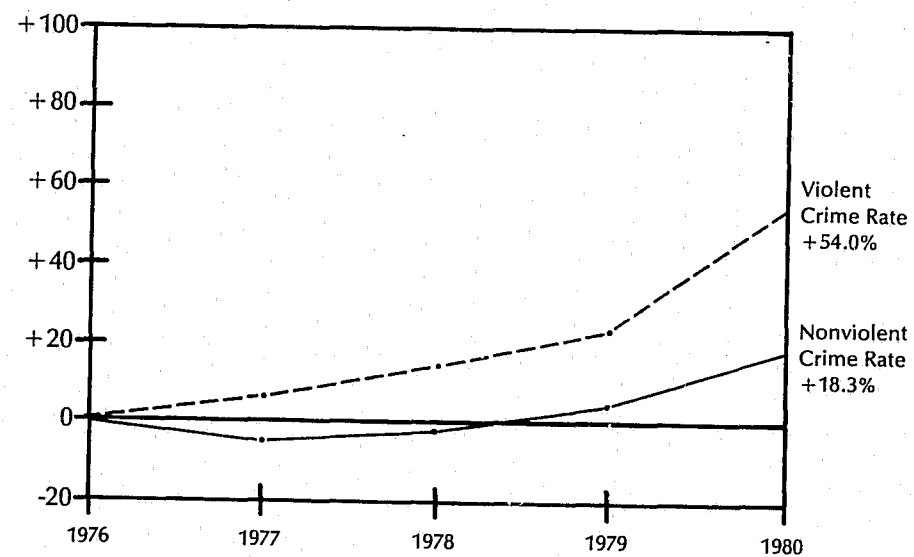

Percent Change over 1976**



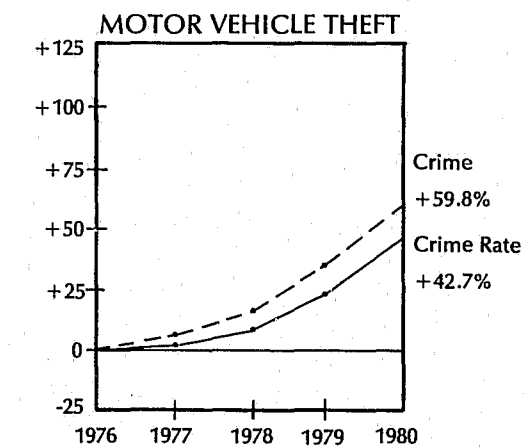
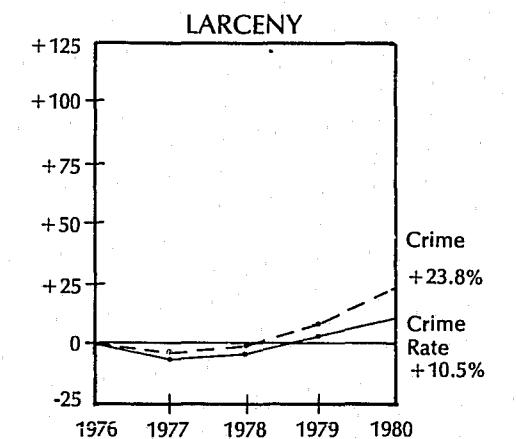
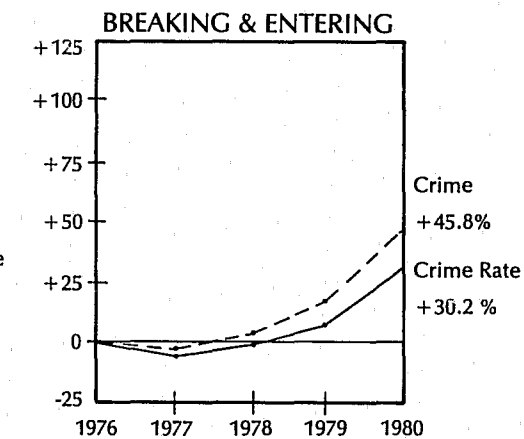
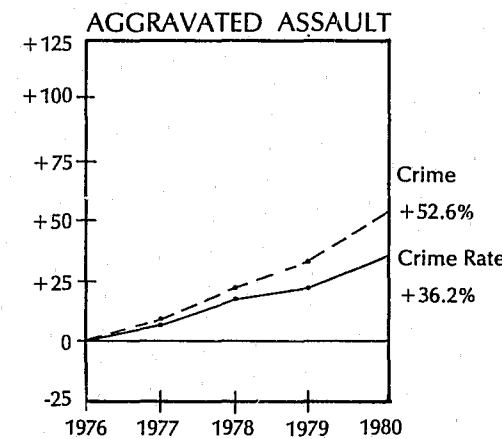
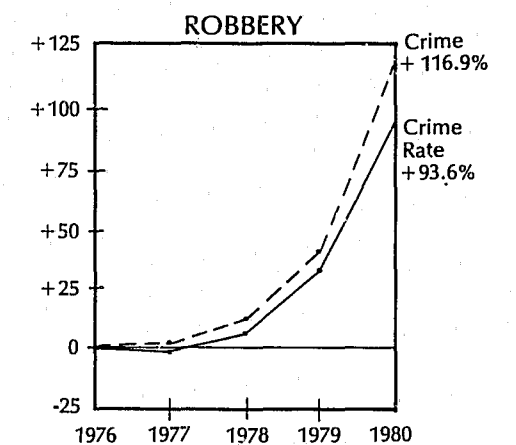
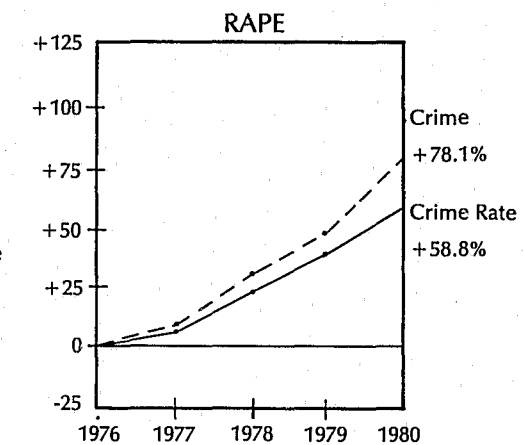
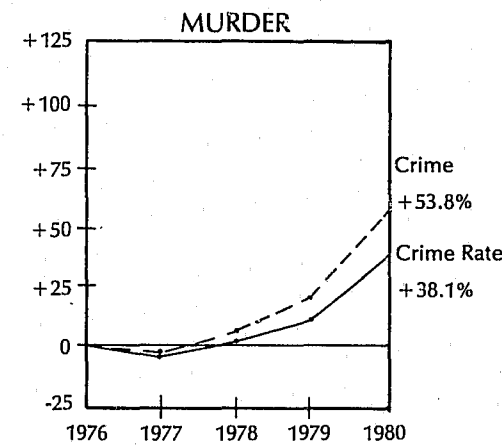

## FLORIDA CRIME INDEX

The figures presented in the tables, graphs, and charts in this publication indicate the volume, fluctuation and distribution of crime in Florida on the basis of a Crime Index. These crime figures are categorized by municipal, county, statewide, SMSA and Judicial Circuit totals. The seven offenses comprising the Index Crimes are:

- Murder
- Forcible Rape
- Robbery
- Aggravated Assault
- Breaking and Entering — Burglary
- Larceny
- Motor Vehicle Theft

These crimes were selected for use as an Index on the basis of their serious nature, their frequency of occurrence and the reliability of reporting from citizens to law enforcement agencies. The Crime Index is used as a basic measure of crime. The Crime Index is the total number of Index Crimes that come to the attention of law enforcement agencies. During the year 1980, a total of 803,509 index offenses was reported. This represents an increase of 122,613 offenses, or a 18.0 percent increase from 1979.

In reviewing crime index figures the reader should keep in mind that there is currently no way of determining the total number of actual crimes committed. The Crime Index has been established to measure only the instances of crime which come to the attention of law enforcement agencies. However, to be a true index, its relationship to total crime reported or unreported must be known. This relationship unfortunately has never been conclusively established and therefore, fluctuations in the Crime Index may or may not adequately reflect changes in the total crime picture. It is important to remember in reviewing the tables and graphs in this report that the volume of crime in a given area or municipality is directly related to the crime factors previously listed in this report.

## VOLUME AND DISTRIBUTION OF CRIME INDEX OFFENSES

The Crime Index merely identifies the number of actual incidents known to law enforcement agen-

cies, not the number of criminals who committed them or the number of injuries they caused. The seven Crime Index offenses are grouped into two categories — violent crimes and nonviolent crimes.

### Violent Crime

Crimes of violence include murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Violent crimes involve the element of personal confrontation between perpetrator and victim and because of their very nature, are more serious than non-violent crimes. These offenses for the year 1980 made up 11.7 percent of all reported index offenses. For the year 1980 violent crimes as a group rose 27.4 percent from 1979.

### Nonviolent Crime

For Uniform Crime Reports purposes, nonviolent crimes include the offenses of breaking and entering — burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft. The number of nonviolent crimes reported for 1980 was more than 7 times the number of violent crimes, amounting to 88.3 percent of all Index Crimes reported. Nonviolent crimes as a group recorded an increase of 16.9 percent from the number reported for the year 1979.

## VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED

Supplementary data relating to the crimes of murder, forcible rape, robbery, breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft is collected and analyzed. The resultant figures provide information concerning the value of property stolen and recovered by type of property. The total value of property stolen in Florida during 1980 was \$534,051,788. This amounts to an increase of \$193,232,050, or an increase of 56.7 percent from the year 1979. Law enforcement agencies were successful in recovering 21.0 percent of the loss or \$112,370,439. Locally stolen motor vehicles accounted for the highest dollar loss, amounting to \$150,752,211 for 1980. This figure represents an increase of 33.5 percent from 1979.

## CRIME RATES

The crime rate equals the number of Index Crimes per unit of population, generally per 100,000. It should be noted that the crime rate only takes into consideration the numerical factor of population and does not incorporate any of the other elements which contribute to the amount of crime in a given community. The effect of changes in population on rates should be kept in mind when attempting to make a comparison of crime rates.

The Crime Index rate for Florida for the year 1980 is 8,387.8 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants, a 13.9 percent increase from the year 1979.

For the year 1980, violent crimes accounted for 982.2 offenses per 100,000 population, while the nonviolent crime rate amounted to 7,405.6 offenses per 100,000 population, reflecting a rate increase of 22.9 percent for violent crimes and a 12.8 percent increase for nonviolent crimes.

## CLEARANCE RATES

For crime reporting purposes, a crime index offense is cleared when a law enforcement agency has identified the offender, there is enough evidence to charge him and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of clearing one crime.

Crime solutions are also recorded in exceptional circumstances when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes formal charges against the offender.

For 1980, 20.7 percent of all Index Crimes were cleared. The percentage of violent crimes cleared was 46.7 percent, while the clearance rate for non-violent crimes was 17.2 percent. This compares with a 1979 total clearance rate of 22.3 percent and violent crime and nonviolent crime clearance rates of 54.4 and 18.4 percent, respectively.

## NON-INDEX OFFENSES

Three offense classifications of reported crime do not fall into the makeup of the Index Crimes. These offenses are manslaughter by negligence, non-aggravated assault and arson. In 1980 there were 20 non-traffic manslaughters by negligence; 15 of the total non-traffic manslaughters were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared.

There were 67,967 non-aggravated assaults reported for the year 1980 in Florida. Of these offenses, 41,842 or 61.6 percent were cleared by arrest or by exception. Of these 41,842 total clearances, 89.8 percent were cleared through the involvement of persons aged 18 and above, while the other 10.2 percent involved persons aged 17 and under.

During 1980, there were 3,961 offenses of arson reported with \$31,496,922 in property damage. The highest single category of arson, 1,089 reported, was single occupancy residential. Of the 3,961 arsons reported, only 683 or 17.2% were arsons of abandoned structures. The clearance rate for arson was 17.9%. There were 1,450 reported arsons of all types of residences, 619 of commercial structures and 1,035 of motor vehicles. The remaining 857 arsons were of other structures, other mobile property and miscellaneous.

# MURDER

Murder is defined as the willful (nonnegligent) killing of a human being. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime is included. This index offense is scored by law enforcement officials on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court or jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable or excusable homicides are also excluded.

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 949 murders was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida for the year 1978.

Murders accounted for 1.4 percent of all violent crimes and 0.2 percent of all index offenses reported.

The murder rate for the reporting period was 10.6 per 100,000 population.

There were 727 murders cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, amounting to a 76.6 percent clearance rate statewide.

The age group 25-29 accounted for 17.8 percent of persons arrested for murder. Males accounted for 82.3 percent of all persons arrested for murder.

Of all persons arrested for murder, 45.4 percent were white, 54.4 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

Of all murder victims, 54.2 percent were white, 45.3 percent were black and 0.5 percent of other races were murdered. Of all murder victims, males represented 71.0 percent.

Firearms were employed in 57.1 percent of all reported murders. The use of a knife or other cutting device was involved in 17.6 percent of the murders.

The murder of one family member by another accounted for 183 or 19.3 percent of all murders. Of these, 121 murders or 66.1 percent resulted from one spouse killing the other.

Altercations or quarrels between the victim and perpetrator, including money quarrels, lovers quarrels and drinking quarrels, accounted for 26.4 percent of all murders reported during the year 1978. Lovers quarrels recorded the highest involvement, accounting for 11.2 percent of the total murders.

## 1979 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 1,084 murders was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida for the year 1979.

Murders accounted for 1.5 percent of all violent crimes and 0.2 percent of all index offenses reported.

The murder rate for the reporting period was 11.7 per 100,000 population.

There were 773 murders cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, amounting to a 71.3 percent clearance rate statewide.

The age group 25-29 accounted for 18.1 percent of persons arrested for murder. Males accounted for 83.5 percent of all persons arrested for murder.

Of all persons arrested for murder, 51.3 percent were white, 48.3 percent were black and 0.4 percent were of other races.

Of all murder victims, 57.5 percent were white, 42.4 percent were black and 0.1 percent of other races were murdered. Of all murder victims, males represented 73.3 percent.

Firearms were employed in 60.0 percent of all reported murders. The use of a knife or other cutting device was involved in 17.2 percent of the murders.

The murder of one family member by another accounted for 193 or 17.8 percent of all murders. Of these, 116 murders or 60.1 percent resulted from one spouse killing the other.

Altercations or quarrels between the victim and perpetrator, including money quarrels, lovers quarrels and drinking quarrels, accounted for 23.3 percent of all murders reported during the year 1979. Lovers quarrels recorded the highest involvement, accounting for 9.7 percent of the total murders.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 1,387 murders was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida for the year 1980.

Murders accounted for 1.5 percent of all violent crimes and 0.2 percent of all index offenses reported.

The murder rate for the reporting period was 14.5 per 100,000 population.

There were 898 murders cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, amounting to a 64.7 percent clearance rate statewide.

The age group 25-29 accounted for 18.7 percent of persons arrested for murder. Males accounted for 87.6 percent of all persons arrested for murder.

Of all persons arrested for murder, 50.1 percent were white, 49.2 percent were black and 0.7 percent were of other races.

Of all murder victims, 57.9 percent were white, 41.3 percent were black and 0.8 percent of other races were murdered. Of all murder victims, males represented 76.4 percent.

Firearms were employed in 60.5 percent of all reported murders. The use of a knife or other cutting device was involved in 18.4 percent of the murders.

The murder of one family member by another accounted for 190 or 13.7 percent of all murders. Of these, 114 murders or 60.0 percent resulted from one spouse killing the other.

Altercations or quarrels between the victim and perpetrator, including money quarrels, lovers quarrels and drinking quarrels, accounted for 20.6 percent of all murders reported during the year 1980. Lovers quarrels recorded the highest involvement, accounting for 9.2 percent of the total murders.

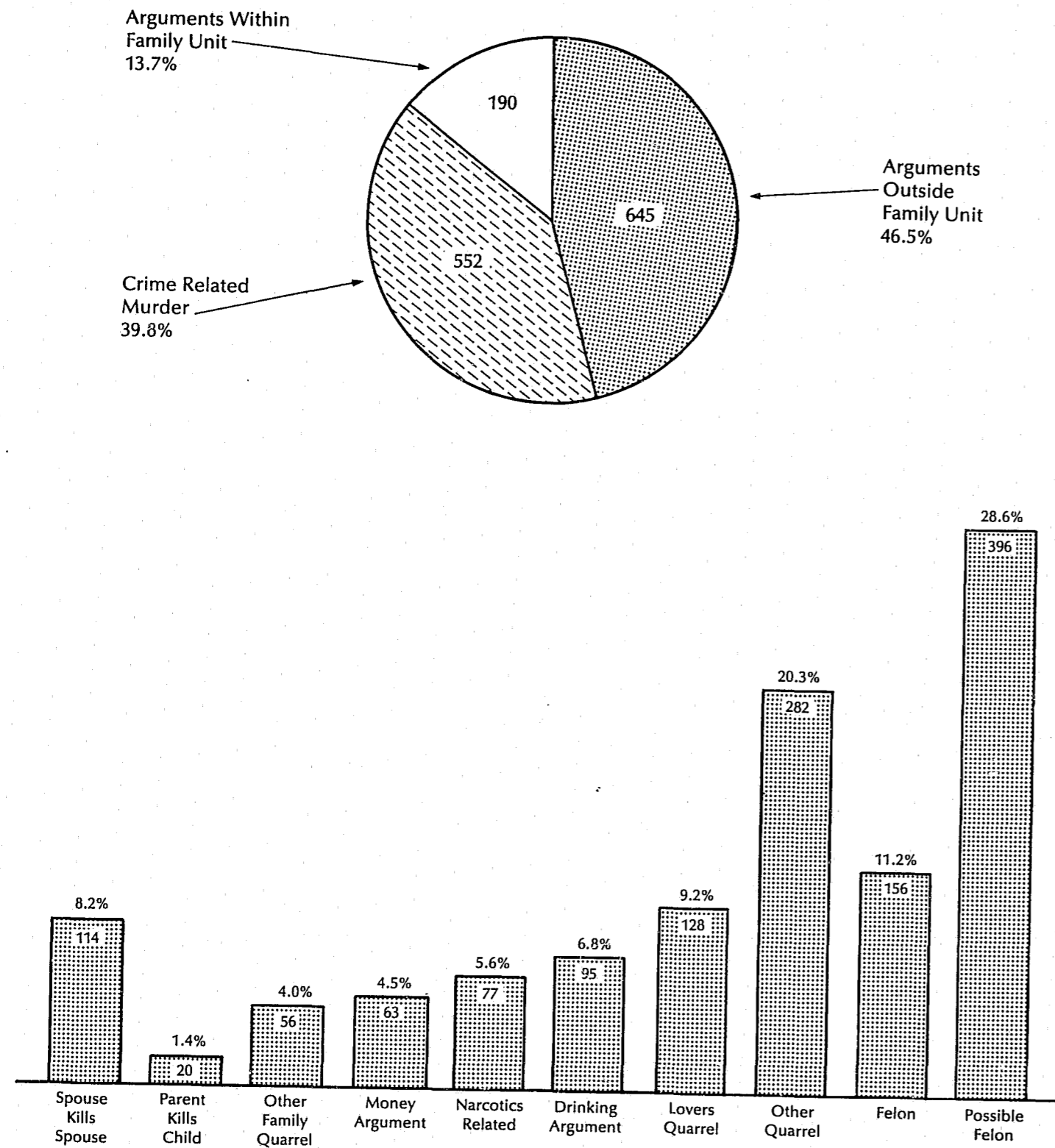

# FORCIBLE RAPE

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. For the purposes of Uniform Crime Reports rape is divided into two categories: (1) rape by force; and (2) attempted rapes. Carnal abuse without force (statutory rape), and other sex offenses are not counted.

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 3,960 forcible rapes (including attempts) was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida for the year 1978. Of all rapes, 3,024 were by force and 936 were attempted rapes.

Forcible rapes accounted for 6.0 percent of all violent crimes and 0.7 percent of all index offenses reported.

The forcible rape rate for the year 1978 amounted to 44.2 rapes for every 100,000 persons in the state.

There were 2,079 forcible rapes cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, amounting to a 52.5 percent clearance rate statewide.

Of the reported arrests for forcible rape during the year 1978, 51.0 percent were of persons under the age of 25.

Of all persons arrested for forcible rape during the year 1978, 52.5 percent were white, 47.1 percent were black and 0.3 percent were of other races.

## 1979 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 4,573 forcible rapes (including attempts) was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida for the year 1979. Of all rapes, 3,541 were by force and 1,032 were attempted rapes.

Forcible rapes accounted for 10.4 percent of all violent crimes and 0.7 percent of all index offenses reported.

The forcible rape rate for the year 1979 amounted to 49.5 rapes for every 100,000 persons in the state.

There were 2,350 forcible rapes cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, amounting to a 51.4 percent clearance rate statewide.

Of the reported arrests for forcible rape during the year 1979, 52.8 percent were of persons under the age of 25.

Of all persons arrested for forcible rape during the year 1979, 53.8 percent were white, 45.8 percent were black and 0.4 percent were of other races.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 5,435 forcible rapes (including attempts) was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida for the year 1980. Of all rapes, 4,230 were by force and 1,205 were attempted rapes.

Forcible rapes accounted for 5.8 percent of all violent crimes and 0.7 percent of all index offenses reported.

The forcible rape rate for the year 1980 amounted to 56.7 rapes for every 100,000 persons in the state.

There were 2,611 forcible rapes cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, amounting to a 48.0 percent clearance rate statewide.

Of the reported arrests for forcible rape during the year 1980, 50.4 percent were of persons under the age of 25.

Of all persons arrested for forcible rape during the year 1980, 53.0 percent were white, 46.6 percent were black and 0.4 percent were of other races.

# ROBBERY

Robbery is the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or putting the person in fear. For a crime of robbery to take place, the victim must be present. Robbery is further separated into two categories: (1) Armed Robbery — any weapon. Any object which is so employed as to constitute force or threat of force is considered a weapon; and (2) Strong-arm — no weapon (includes muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used and strong-arm tactics are employed to deprive the victim of his property. This is limited to hands, feet, arms, fists, etc.).

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 17,700 robberies was reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Florida for the year 1978.

Robberies accounted for 26.9 percent of all violent crimes as a group and 2.9 percent of the total crime index.

The robbery rate amounted to approximately 197.4 robberies for every 100,000 persons in the state.

There were 5,365 robberies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 30.3 percent statewide.

The age group 25-29 accounted for 15.6 percent of persons arrested for robbery. Males accounted for 92.8 percent of all persons arrested for robbery.

Of all persons arrested for robbery, 41.0 percent were white, 58.9 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

The largest number of actual offenses of robbery, 7,548 in number, occurred under the Highway category, which represents 42.6 percent of all offenses of robbery reported during 1978. The armed robber was responsible for over 56.3 percent of the reported offenses.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of robbery totaled \$11,173,990 or 4.5 percent of the total value of property stolen during the year. The highest average loss, amounting to \$4,518 occurred in bank robberies. The lowest average loss \$209, occurred in convenience store robberies.

## 1979 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 22,097 robberies was reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Florida for the year 1979.

Robberies accounted for 29.9 percent of all violent crimes as a group and 3.2 percent of the total crime index.

The robbery rate amounted to approximately 239.0 robberies for every 100,000 persons in the state.

There were 6,200 robberies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 28.1 percent statewide.

The age group 25-29 accounted for 13.2 percent of persons arrested for robbery. Males accounted for 92.6 percent of all persons arrested for robbery.

Of all persons arrested for robbery, 44.8 percent were white, 55.0 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

The largest number of actual offenses of robbery, 10,502 in number, occurred under the Highway category, which represents 47.5 percent of all offenses of robbery reported during 1979. The armed robber was responsible for over 55.7 percent of the reported offenses.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of robbery totaled \$15,110,522 or 4.4 percent of the total value of property stolen during the year. The highest average loss, amounting to \$5,552 occurred in bank robberies. The lowest average loss, \$172, occurred in convenience store robberies.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 34,015 robberies was reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Florida for the year 1980.

Robberies accounted for 36.2 percent of all violent crimes as a group and 4.2 percent of the total crime index.

The robbery rate amounted to approximately 355.1 robberies for every 100,000 persons in the state.

There were 7,507 robberies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 22.1 percent statewide.

The age group 25-29 accounted for 14.4 percent of persons arrested for robbery. Males accounted for 92.7 percent of all persons arrested for robbery.

Of all persons arrested for robbery, 43.3 percent were white, 56.6 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

The largest number of actual offenses of robbery, 17,779 in number, occurred under the Highway category, which represents 52.3 percent of all offenses of robbery reported during 1980. The armed robber was responsible for over 55.1 percent of the reported offenses.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of robbery totaled \$26,480,024 or 5.0 percent of the total value of property stolen during the year. The highest average loss, amounting to \$4,511 occurred in bank robberies. The lowest average loss, \$203, occurred in convenience store robberies.

# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Assault is defined as an attempt or offer with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another. An aggravated assault may be committed by a gun, knife, or other cutting instrument, other dangerous weapons such as clubs, or through the aggravated use of hands, fists, or feet. Assault with intent to commit a murder is also reported as aggravated assault.

All assaults, where no weapon is used, which result in minor injuries are classified as non-aggravated assaults and are not counted in the Crime Index totals.

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 43,175 aggravated assaults was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1978.

Aggravated assaults accounted for 65.6 percent of all violent crimes and 7.1 percent of all index crimes reported.

The rate of aggravated assaults amounted to 481.5 assaults for each 100,000 persons.

There were 28,273 aggravated assaults cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared which represents a clearance rate of 65.5 percent statewide.

Persons under the age of 30 accounted for 61.5 percent of the arrests for aggravated assault. Arrests of males for aggravated assault outnumbered females by a 5 to 1 margin.

Analysis of aggravated assault arrests by race indicates that 52.3 percent of all persons arrested were white, 47.5 percent were black and 0.2 were of other races.

The use of firearms represented 10,623 offenses and comprised 24.6 percent of all aggravated assaults.

## 1979 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 46,112 aggravated assaults was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1979.

Aggravated assaults accounted for 62.4 percent of all violent crimes and 6.8 percent of all index crimes reported.

The rate of aggravated assaults amounted to 498.8 assaults for each 100,000 persons.

There were 30,881 aggravated assaults cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared which represents a clearance rate of 67.0 percent statewide.

Persons under the age of 30 accounted for 63.5 percent of the arrests for aggravated assault. Arrests of males for aggravated assault outnumbered females by a 5 to 1 margin.

Analysis of aggravated assault arrests by race indicates that 56.6 percent of all persons arrested were white, 43.2 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

The use of firearms represented 12,331 offenses and comprised 26.7 percent of all aggravated assaults.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 53,251 aggravated assaults was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1980.

Aggravated assaults accounted for 56.6 percent of all violent crimes and 6.6 percent of all index crimes reported.

The rate of aggravated assaults amounted to 555.9 assaults for each 100,000 persons.

There were 32,944 aggravated assaults cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared which represents a clearance rate of 61.9 percent statewide.

Persons under the age of 30 accounted for 63.6 percent of the arrests for aggravated assault. Arrests of males for aggravated assault outnumbered females by a 6 to 1 margin.

Analysis of aggravated assault arrests by race indicates that 58.3 percent of all persons arrested were white, 41.5 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

The use of firearms represented 15,508 offenses and comprised 29.1 percent of all aggravated assaults.

# BREAKING AND ENTERING—BURGLARY

Breaking and Entering — Burglary is any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft, even though force may not be used to gain entrance.

Breaking and Entering — Burglary is divided into three categories: (1) Forcible entry, (2) Unlawful entry — no force, and (3) Attempted forcible entry.

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 170,020 burglaries was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1978.

Burglaries accounted for 31.4 percent of all nonviolent crimes and 28.0 percent of all index offenses reported.

The burglary rate for the reporting period was 1,896.0 per 100,000 population.

There were 32,290 burglaries cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This amounts to a clearance rate of 19.0 percent statewide.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for burglary, 11.0 percent, occurred in the age 15 category. Males accounted for 93.5 percent of persons arrested for burglary.

Of all persons arrested for burglary, 67.5 percent were white, 32.4 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

Of the three categories of burglary, forcible entry was the most prevalent, with 128,887 offenses. This figure represents 75.8 percent of the total burglaries committed. Unlawful entry (no force) accounted for 15.4 percent, while 8.8 percent were attempts.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of burglary totaled \$80,793,004 or 32.3 percent of the total value of property stolen during the year.

Residential burglaries accounted for 62.5 percent of the total offenses reported, with a total dollar loss of \$51,585,713. Where time could be determined, 46.7 percent of residential burglaries occurred during the night hours.

## 1979 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 190,848 burglaries was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1979.

Burglaries accounted for 31.4 percent of all nonviolent crimes and 28.0 percent of all index offenses reported.

The burglary rate for the reporting period was 2,064.3 per 100,000 population.

There were 33,993 burglaries cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This amounts to a clearance rate of 17.8 percent statewide.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for burglary, 10.7 percent, occurred in the age 16 category. Males accounted for 93.6 percent of persons arrested for burglary.

Of all persons arrested for burglary, 66.5 percent were white, 33.4 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

Of the three categories of burglary, forcible entry was the most prevalent, with 145,085 offenses. This figure represents 76.0 percent of the total burglaries committed. Unlawful entry (no force) accounted for 15.2 percent, while 8.7 percent were attempts.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of burglary totaled \$110,443,398 or 32.4 percent of the total value of property stolen during the year.

Residential burglaries accounted for 61.5 percent of the total offenses reported, with a total dollar loss of \$70,961,514. Where time could be determined, 45.1 percent of residential burglaries occurred during the night hours.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 239,782 burglaries was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1980.

Burglaries accounted for 33.8 percent of all nonviolent crimes and 29.8 percent of all index offenses reported.

The burglary rate for the reporting period was 2,503.1 per 100,000 population.

There were 38,145 burglaries cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This amounts to a clearance rate of 15.9 percent statewide.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for burglary, 10.4 percent, occurred in the age 17 category. Males accounted for 94.0 percent of persons arrested for burglary.

Of all persons arrested for burglary, 65.7 percent were white, 34.1 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

Of the three categories of burglary, forcible entry was the most prevalent, with 185,880 offenses. This figure represents 77.5 percent of the total burglaries committed. Unlawful entry (no force) accounted for 14.3 percent, while 8.2 percent were attempts.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of burglary totaled \$207,421,483 or 38.8 percent of the total value of property stolen during the year.

Residential burglaries accounted for 64.8 percent of the total offenses reported, with a total dollar loss of \$146,516,154. Where time could be determined, 42.3 percent of residential burglaries occurred during the night hours.

# LARCENY

Larceny is the taking of the personal property of another with intent to permanently deprive him of ownership.

All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting, larceny from a motor vehicle, larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories, theft of bicycle, larceny from buildings and from any coin operated machines are included in this category. Embezzlements, illegal conversions, larceny by a bailee, frauds or bad check cases are not included.

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 338,095 larcenies was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1978.

Reported larcenies accounted for 62.4 percent of nonviolent crimes and 55.7 percent of all index offenses reported.

The larceny rate for Florida for the year amounted to 3,770.3 per 100,000 population.

There were 64,171 larcenies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This represents a clearance rate of 19.0 percent statewide.

The age group of 25 to 29 years was responsible for 8.6 percent of persons arrested for larceny. Males accounted for 66.2 percent of persons arrested for all categories of larceny.

Of all persons arrested for larceny, 66.0 percent were white, 33.8 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

During the year 1978, the value of property stolen in actual offenses of larceny totaled \$80,047,516. This constitutes 32.0 percent of the total value of property stolen.

## 1979 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 377,896 larcenies was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1979.

Reported larcenies accounted for 62.3 percent of nonviolent crimes and 55.5 percent of all index offenses reported.

The larceny rate for Florida for the year amounted to 4,087.5 per 100,000 population.

There were 69,820 larcenies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This represents a clearance rate of 18.5 percent statewide.

The age group of 25 to 29 years was responsible for 8.8 percent of persons arrested for larceny. Males accounted for 68.1 percent of persons arrested for all categories of larceny.

Of all persons arrested for larceny, 67.3 percent were white, 32.4 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

During the year 1979, the value of property stolen in actual offenses of larceny totaled \$106,707,831. This constitutes 31.3 percent of the total value of property stolen.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 423,962 larcenies was reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1980.

Reported larcenies accounted for 59.8 percent of nonviolent crimes and 52.8 percent of all index offenses reported.

The larceny rate for Florida for the year amounted to 4,425.7 per 100,000 population.

There were 75,636 larcenies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This represents a clearance rate of 17.8 percent statewide.

The age group of 25 to 29 years was responsible for 10.1 percent of persons arrested for larceny. Males accounted for 69.8 percent of persons arrested for all categories of larceny.

Of all persons arrested for larceny, 66.2 percent were white, 33.5 percent were black and 0.3 percent were of other races.

During the year 1980, the value of property stolen in actual offenses of larceny totaled \$157,595,760. This constitutes 29.5 percent of the total value of property stolen.

# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Motor vehicle theft is the larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as such in the state. "Joyriding" thefts are included under this category.

## 1978 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 33,392 motor vehicle thefts was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida during 1978.

Motor vehicle thefts made up 6.2 percent of all nonviolent crime and 5.5 percent of all index offenses reported.

The statewide motor vehicle theft rate for the year amounted to 372.4 per 100,000 population.

There were 7,951 motor vehicle thefts cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 23.8 percent statewide.

The age group responsible for the highest percentage of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 14.6 percent, occurred in the 16

year old age category. Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 91.9 percent were males.

Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 77.4 percent were white, 22.5 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

The average value of a motor vehicle theft during the reporting period was \$2,337.

Motor vehicles reported stolen during the commission of any Part I offense totaled \$80,875,899; \$49,939,455 was recovered which constitutes a 61.7 percent recovery rate in value. Of the total number of motor vehicles recovered, 71.4 percent had originally been stolen from the same jurisdiction.

## 1979 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 38,286 motor vehicle thefts was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida during 1979.

Motor vehicle thefts made up 6.3 percent of all nonviolent crime and 5.6 percent of all index offenses reported.

The statewide motor vehicle theft rate for the year amounted to 414.1 per 100,000 population.

There were 7,962 motor vehicle thefts cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 20.8 percent statewide.

The age group responsible for the highest percentage of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 13.7 percent, occurred in the 16

year old age category. Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 91.2 percent were males.

Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 74.8 percent were white, 25.0 percent were black and 0.1 percent were of other races.

The average value of a motor vehicle theft during the reporting period was \$2,832.

Motor vehicles reported stolen during the commission of any Part I offense totaled \$112,925,340; \$60,973,585 was recovered which constitutes a 54.0 percent recovery rate in value. Of the total number of motor vehicles recovered, 72.2 percent had originally been stolen from the same jurisdiction.

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 45,677 motor vehicle thefts was reported by law enforcement agencies in Florida during 1980.

Motor vehicle thefts made up 6.4 percent of all nonviolent crime and 5.7 percent of all index offenses reported.

The statewide motor vehicle theft rate for the year amounted to 476.8 per 100,000 population.

There were 8,399 motor vehicle thefts cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 18.4 percent statewide.

The age group responsible for the highest percentage of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 14.0 percent, occurred in the 16

year old age category. Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 90.7 percent were males.

Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 71.1 percent were white, 28.7 percent were black and 0.2 percent were of other races.

The average value of a motor vehicle theft during the reporting period was \$3,112.

Motor vehicles reported stolen during the commission of any Part I offense totaled \$150,752,211; \$77,670,960 was recovered which constitutes a 51.5 percent recovery rate in value. Of the total number of motor vehicles recovered, 71.1 percent had originally been stolen from the same jurisdiction.

# ARSON

Arson — is any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

(Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.)

## 1980 — SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 3,961 arsons was reported by Florida law enforcement agencies for the year 1980.

The number of arsons committed per 100,000 persons was 41.3.

There were 710 arsons cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This represents a statewide clearance rate of 17.9 percent.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for arson was the 25-29 bracket with 12.0 percent. Of all persons arrested for arson, 85.5 percent were males.

Of all persons arrested for arson, 78.0 percent were white, 21.7 percent were black and 0.3 percent were of other races.

Of all property classifications, single occupancy residential accounted for the largest number of arsons with 1,089 offenses or 27.5 percent of all arsons. The percentage of arsons involving structures was 63.7 percent as compared to 27.9 percent for mobile property. The remaining percentage involved destruction of crops, timber, signs and other miscellaneous property. Offenses involving uninhabited structures were 683 or 17.2 percent of all arsons.

The value of property damaged by arson totaled \$31,496,922. Other residential consisted of 3.8 percent of the total amount or \$1,201,664. Mobile Property consisted of 7.7 percent of the total amount damaged or \$2,418,452.

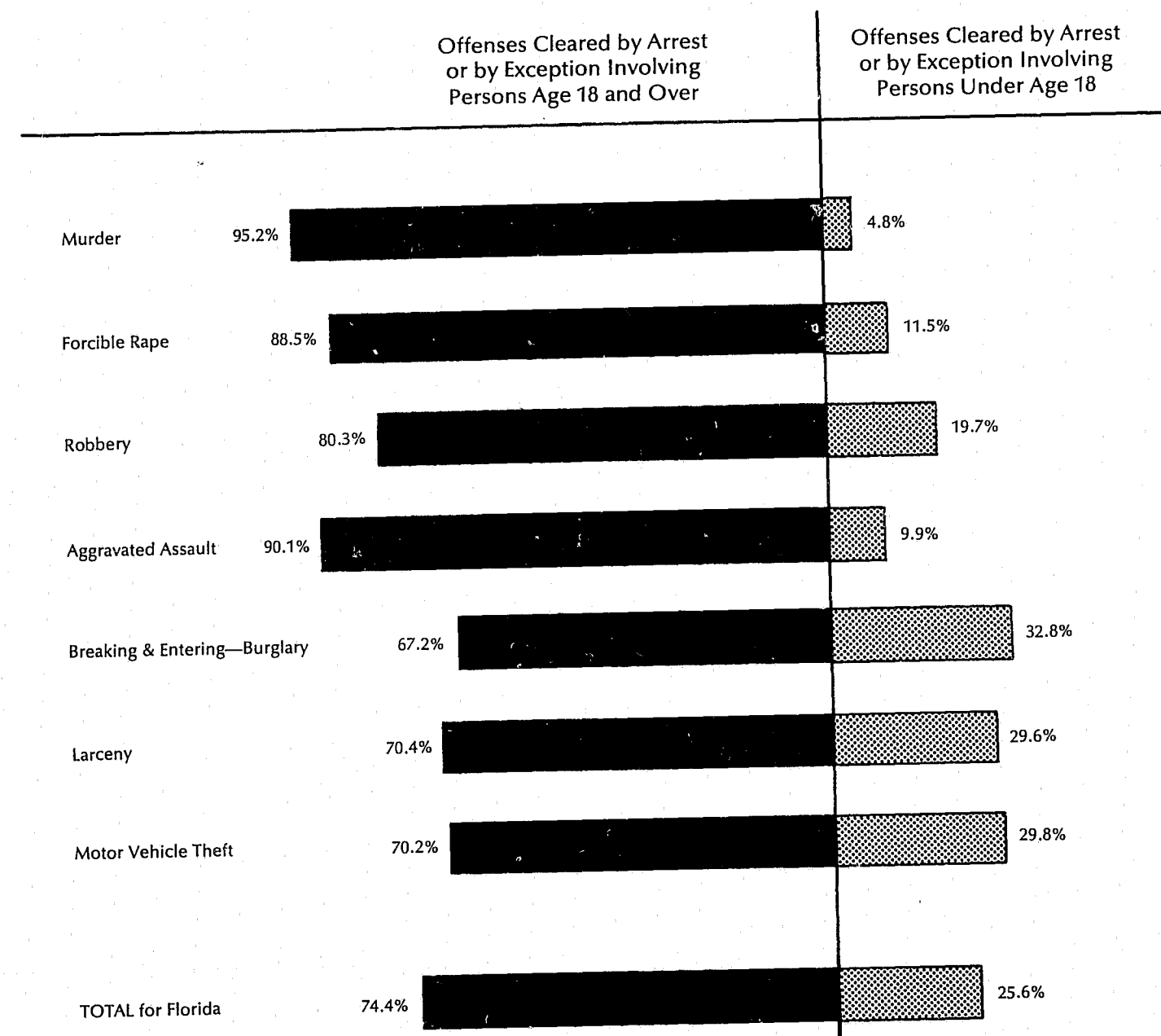

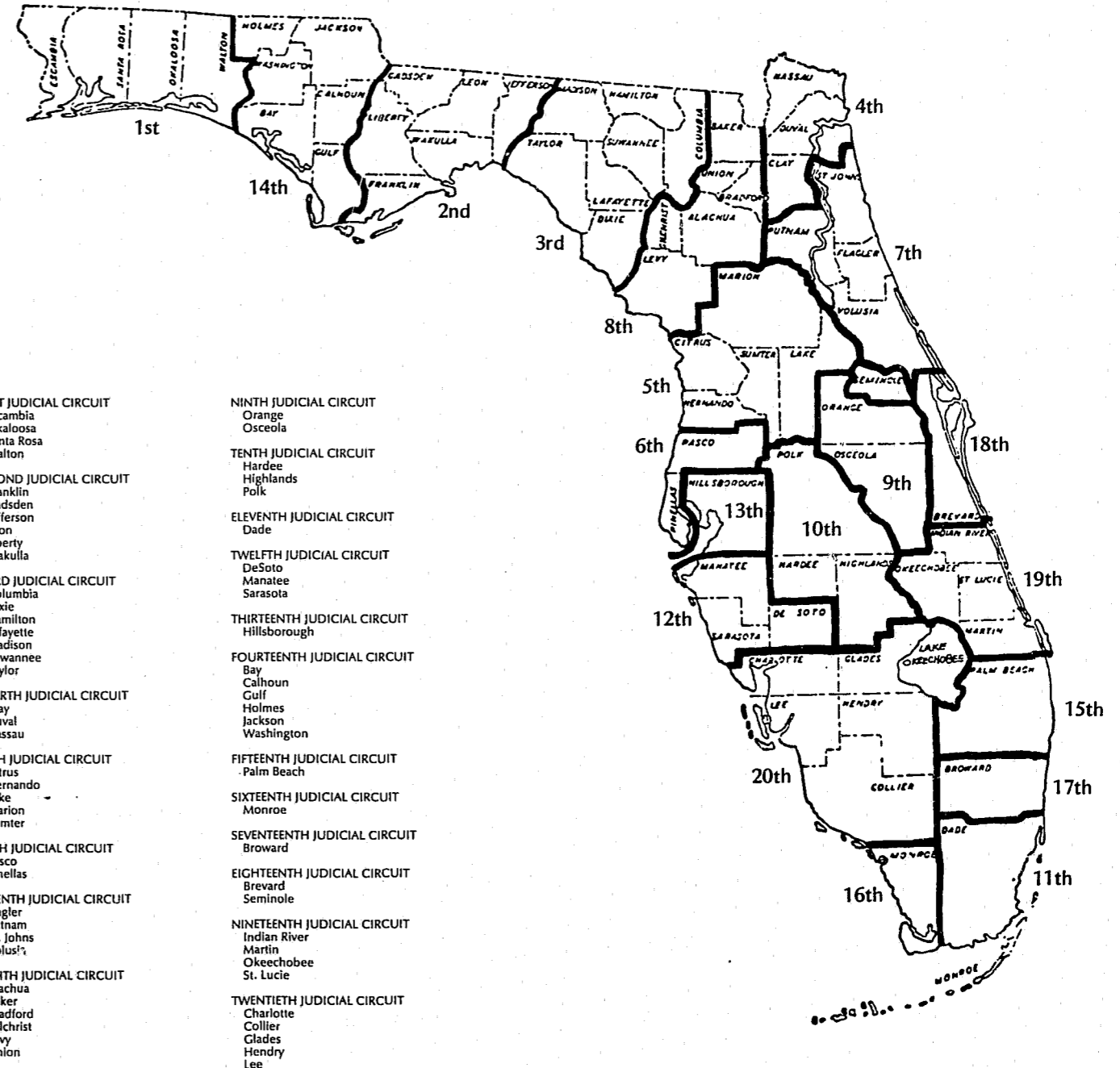

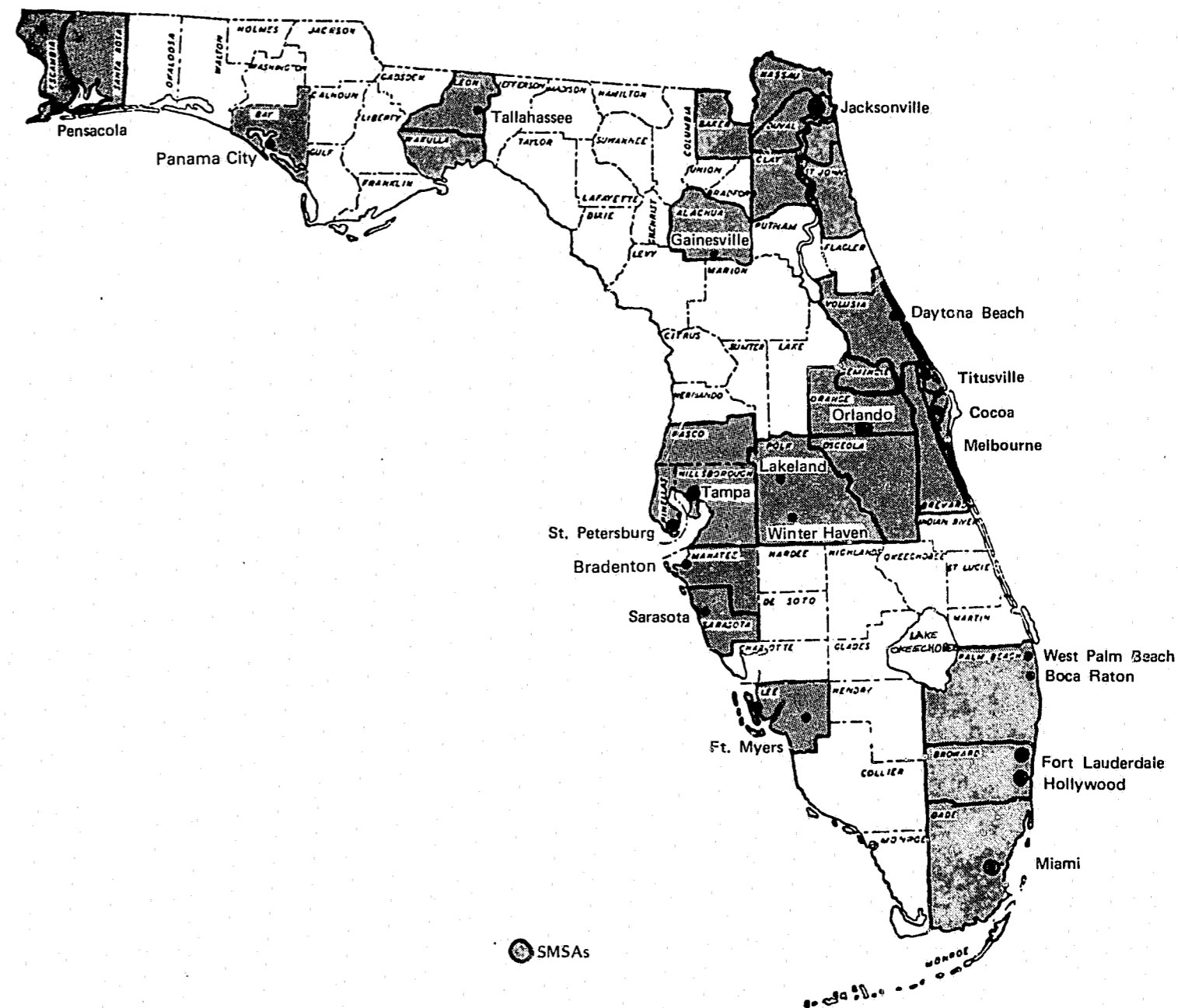

## FLORIDA ARREST INFORMATION

The Florida Uniform Crime Reports Program requires the periodic reporting of data concerning persons arrested in the state. A record of total arrest activity for criminal acts in both Part I and Part II crime classes is received from 339 county and municipal law enforcement agencies in Florida and is analyzed and arranged according to age, sex, race and residency of persons arrested. Traffic arrests, except Driving Under the Influence, are not reported. A total of 435,222 arrests for Part I and Part II criminal acts were reported during the year 1980, up 9.2 percent from the 398,395 arrests reported for the year 1979. Based on 1980 population estimates, this amounts to a statewide arrest rate for the year 1980 of 4,543.3 arrests for each 100,000 persons in Florida.

A person is counted each time he is arrested or summoned. It should be kept in mind that the volume of arrests may vary from time to time due to differences in local arrest procedures and policies. A juvenile is counted as "arrested" when the circumstances are such that if he or she were an adult, an arrest would be counted or when law enforcement or other official action beyond a mere interview, warning or admonishment is taken.

When reviewing arrest figures it should be remembered that arrest counts do not reflect the specific number of persons arrested since one individual person may be arrested several times during any given year for the same or different offenses. This occurs frequently for such crimes as disorderly intoxication, disorderly conduct and similar violations. However, arrest data is useful in measuring the extent of law enforcement activity in a given geographical area as well as providing an index for measuring involvement in criminal acts by the age, sex, race and residence of the perpetrators.

Analysis of reported arrests for the year 1980 indicates that 31.8 percent of all arrests during the year were for Part I offenses (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft). Arrests for larceny comprised the highest percentage of arrests for Part I crimes, amounting to 48.2 percent. The highest percentage of arrests for Part II offenses,

excluding the all other category, was driving under the influence which constituted 10.8 percent.

## VIOLENT CRIME ARRESTS

During the year 30,901 arrests for crimes of violence (murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) on a statewide basis amounted to 22.3 percent of all arrests for the Part I offenses and 7.1 percent of the total arrests for all offenses. Arrests for aggravated assault were the most frequent, representing 66.0 percent of the total arrests for violent crimes. During 1979, violent crime arrests amounted to 22.1 percent of all Part I arrests and 7.0 percent of all arrests.

## NONVIOLENT CRIME ARRESTS

Nonviolent crime arrests (breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft) comprised 77.5 percent of all Part I arrests and 24.7 percent of all arrests reported during the year 1980. The highest percentage of nonviolent crime arrests, 62.1 percent, occurred in the larceny category. During 1979, nonviolent crime arrests amounted to 77.8 percent of all Part I arrests and 24.6 percent of all arrests.

## NONRESIDENT ARRESTS

Upon arresting an offender for a criminal violation committed within a community, the responsible law enforcement agency may find that the perpetrator's residence is in another community or even another state. The Florida Uniform Crime Reports Program provides for the collection of residency data of those arrested in order to measure the criminal mobility factor in Florida.

It was found that during 1980, of the total arrests reported by county and municipal law enforcement agencies for their respective jurisdictions, 7.1 percent of those arrested resided outside the state of Florida and 8.3 percent resided in a county (within Florida) other than the one in which the offense was committed.

The total volume of out of state resident arrests for the year 1980 increased by 1.6 percent, while out of county resident arrests increased by 17.6 percent over the year 1979.

The highest percentage of nonresident arrests reported during the year occurred in the motor vehicle theft category for Part I offenses and the liquor law category for Part II offenses, amounting to 18.9 percent and 37.6 percent respectively.

## AGE ANALYSIS

The distribution of those persons arrested by age categories during the year 1980 continues to illustrate the involvement in criminal activity by the youth of Florida. Nearly 7.2 percent of all persons arrested for the year were under the age of 15, 21.9 percent were under 18 and 37.5 percent of all persons arrested were under the age of 21.

An evaluation of reported Part I arrests indicates that 37.4 percent of persons arrested for such crimes were under the age of 18. The most frequent Part I juvenile arrests during the year were for larceny amounting to 50.4 percent of the total reported Part I juvenile arrests.

Total juvenile arrests for all offenses decreased by 5.5 percent from the reported figure for the year 1979. Adult arrests showed an increase of 14.2 percent from the figures for the year 1979.

Arrests of persons age 18 and over amounted to 78.1 percent of the total number of Part I and Part II arrests reported. Of the total adult arrests, 18.3 percent occurred in the 25 to 29 age group.

## SEX AND RACE ANALYSIS

A percentage distribution by sex of all reported arrests for the year 1980, reveals that 83.0 percent of all persons arrested were male. Males were involved in 80.9 percent of all arrests for Part I offenses, with primary involvement in the crime of larceny. Total male arrests increased by 9.4 percent over the year 1979. The largest increase in male arrests for Part I offenses was registered in the murder category, up 29.6 percent from the year 1979.

Female arrests amounted to 17.0 percent of the total arrests reported and 19.1 percent of all arrests for Part I offenses. Further evaluation of arrest data for Part I offenses discloses that females were primarily involved in arrests for larceny, accounting for 30.2 percent of the total arrests for this offense. Total female arrests increased by 8.3 percent over

the year 1979. Part I female arrests registered the largest increase in the manslaughter category, up 70.6 percent over the year 1979.

An analysis of arrests for violent and nonviolent crime classes for the reporting period shows that 88.2 percent of all reported arrests for the violent crimes of murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault involved males. Females accounted for 11.8 percent of total violent crime arrests. Female arrests comprised 21.2 percent of the nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft, while 78.8 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests for the year involved males.

A distribution analysis of total arrests by race for the year 1980 indicates that 73.5 percent of all arrested persons were white, 26.2 percent were black, with the remaining 0.3 percent of other races.

With regard to violent crimes within the Part I offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault), 54.0 percent of those arrested were white, 45.8 percent were black and the remaining 0.2 percent of other races.

A comparison of arrest data for the nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft indicates that 66.3 percent of those arrested were white, 33.5 percent were black, with the remaining 0.2 percent of other races.

## DISPOSITION OF JUVENILES

The Florida UCR Program requires that contributing agencies provide specific disposition information on all juveniles arrested. The UCR Program specifies five basic information categories for use by law enforcement agencies in reporting juvenile arrest dispositions. Juveniles may be (1) *handled within the department and released*, (2) *referred to juvenile court, juvenile authorities or probation department*, (3) *referred to a welfare agency*, (4) *referred to another law enforcement agency*, or (5) *referred to criminal or adult court*.

During the year 1980, on a statewide basis, approximately 72.9 percent of all juveniles arrested

were referred to juvenile court or probation department, 24.6 percent were handled directly by law enforcement agencies and released, 0.7 per-

cent were referred to welfare agencies, 1.6 percent were referred to criminal or adult court and the remaining 0.2 percent were referred to other law enforcement agencies for disposition.

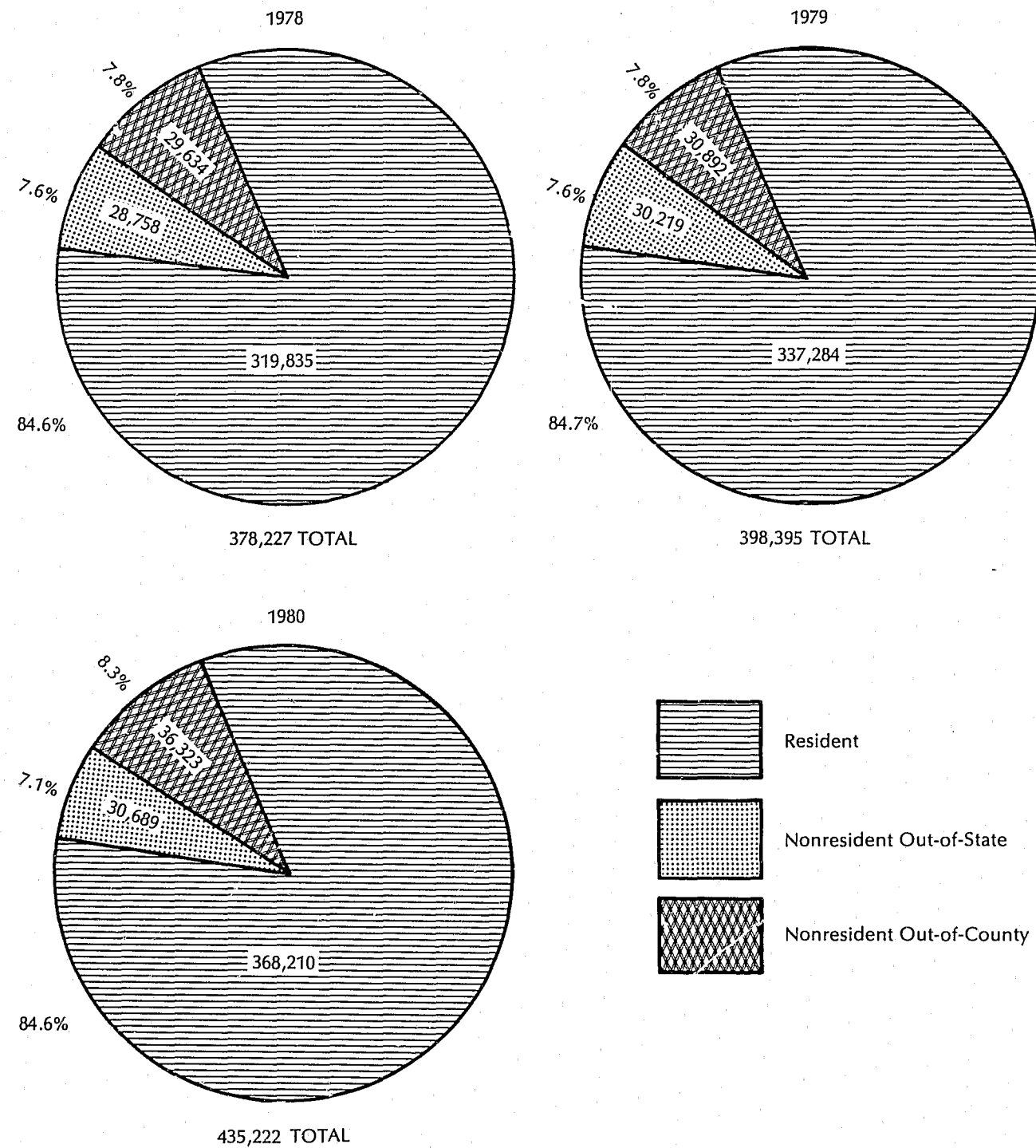

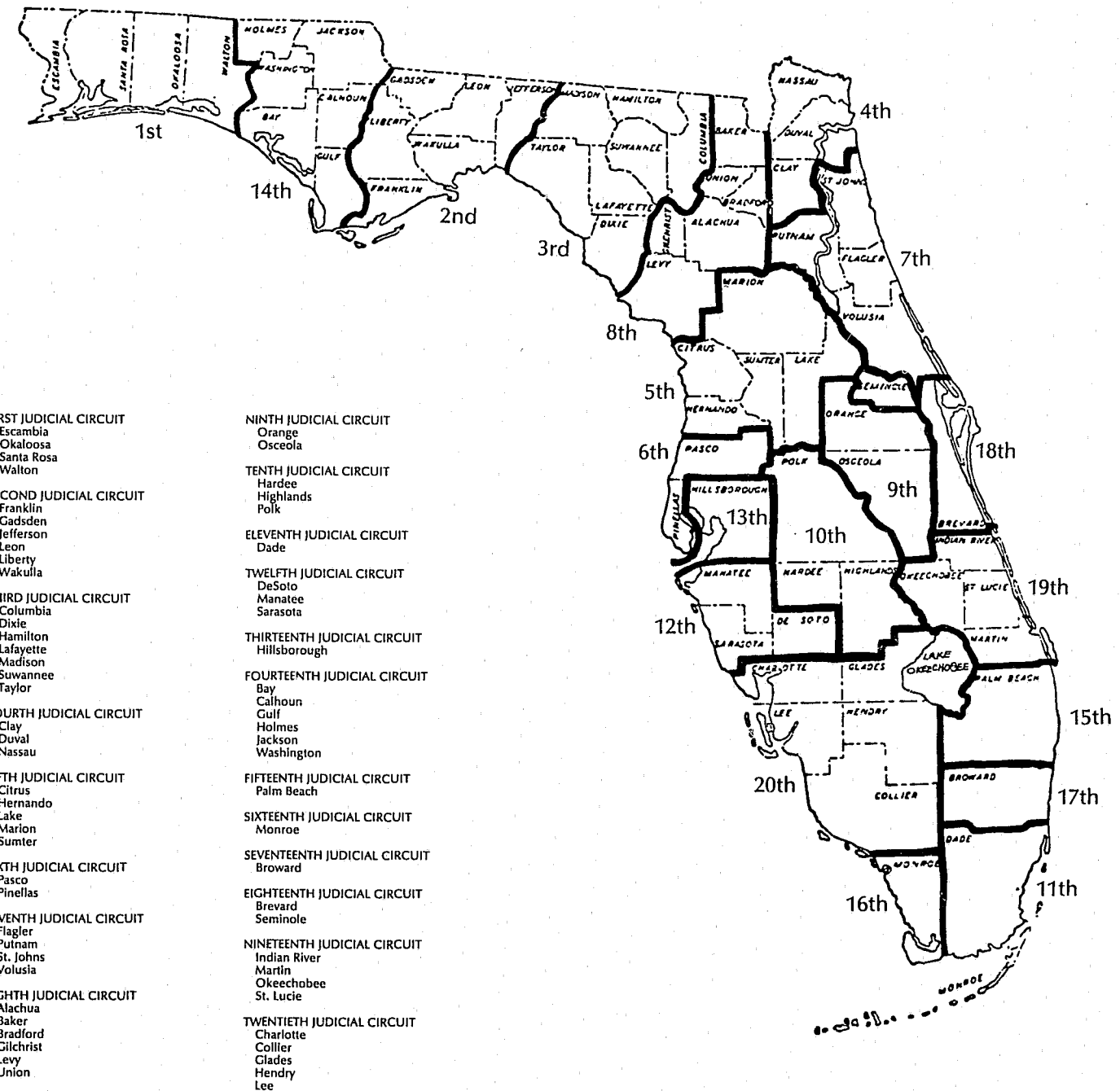

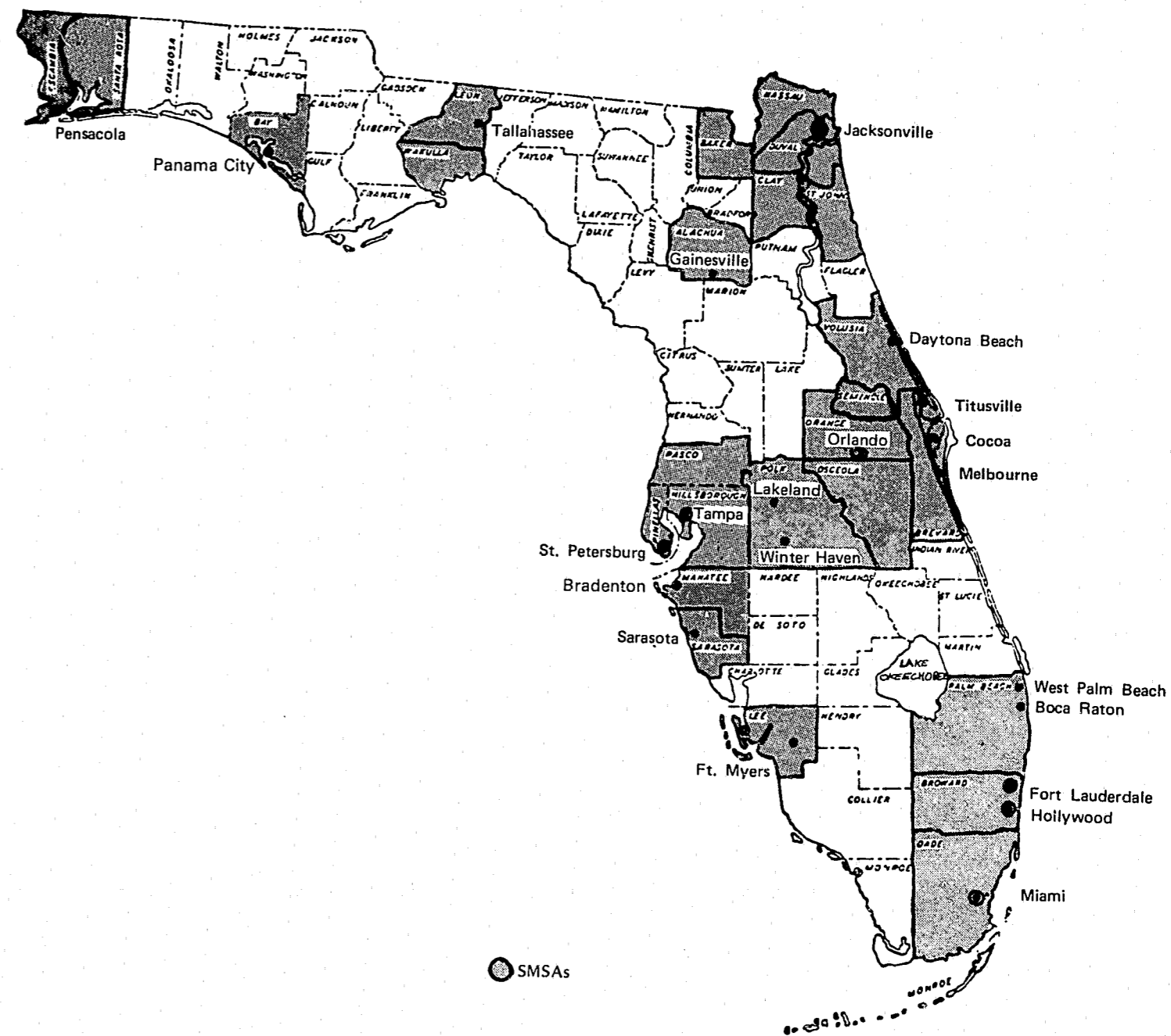

## Narcotic Drug Law and Gambling Arrests

### NARCOTIC DRUG LAW ARRESTS

Information concerning arrests for narcotic drug law violations is collected and analyzed in Florida according to specific drug categories and by sale or possession violations. Evaluation of arrest data reported for the year 1980 disclosed that 39.5 percent of all persons arrested for narcotic drug law violations were under the age of 21. Persons under age 18 accounted for 17.9 percent of all persons arrested for narcotic drug law violations. A breakdown of arrests by type indicates that 86.9 percent were for possession violations and 13.1 percent were for sale violations. Analysis of individual drug categories (sale and possession together) showed that the highest percentage of all arrests, 73.7 percent, involved marijuana. The lowest percentage of arrests occurred in the methadone narcotics category, amounting to only 0.6 percent of the total reported narcotic arrests.

Reported arrests for narcotic drug law violations showed an overall numeric volume increase of 3,476 arrests, or a 12.2 percent increase over the year 1979.

### GAMBLING ARRESTS

Arrests for gambling offenses during the year 1980 amounted to 0.4 percent of all reported arrests for Part I and Part II offenses. Males accounted for 90.1 percent of those persons arrested for gambling offenses. Persons under the age of 18 made up only 1.9 percent of all gambling arrests. The age category 25 to 29 made up 16.4 percent of all gambling arrests.

Total reported arrests for gambling offenses during the year 1980 decreased 19.2 percent over the year 1979.

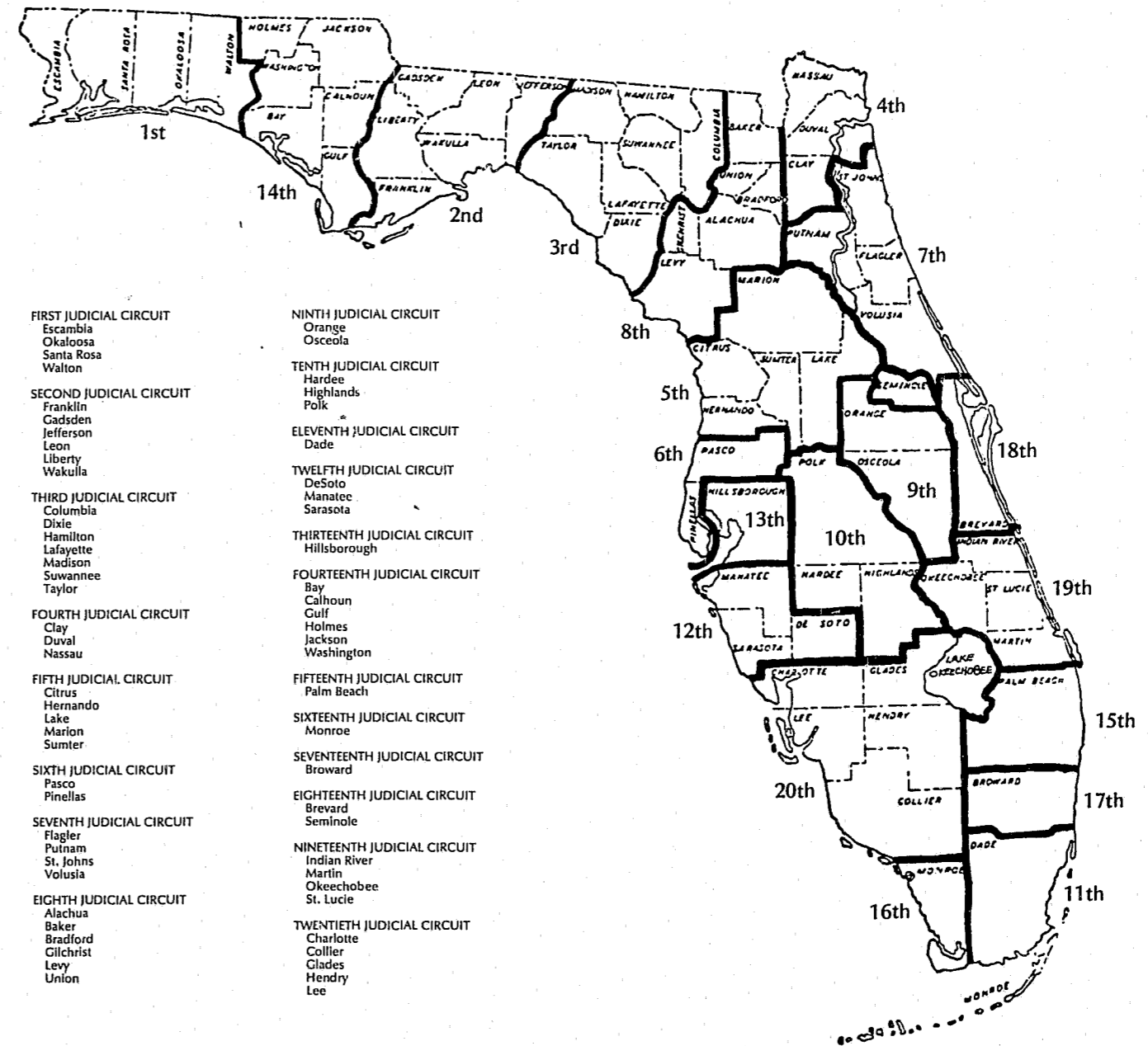

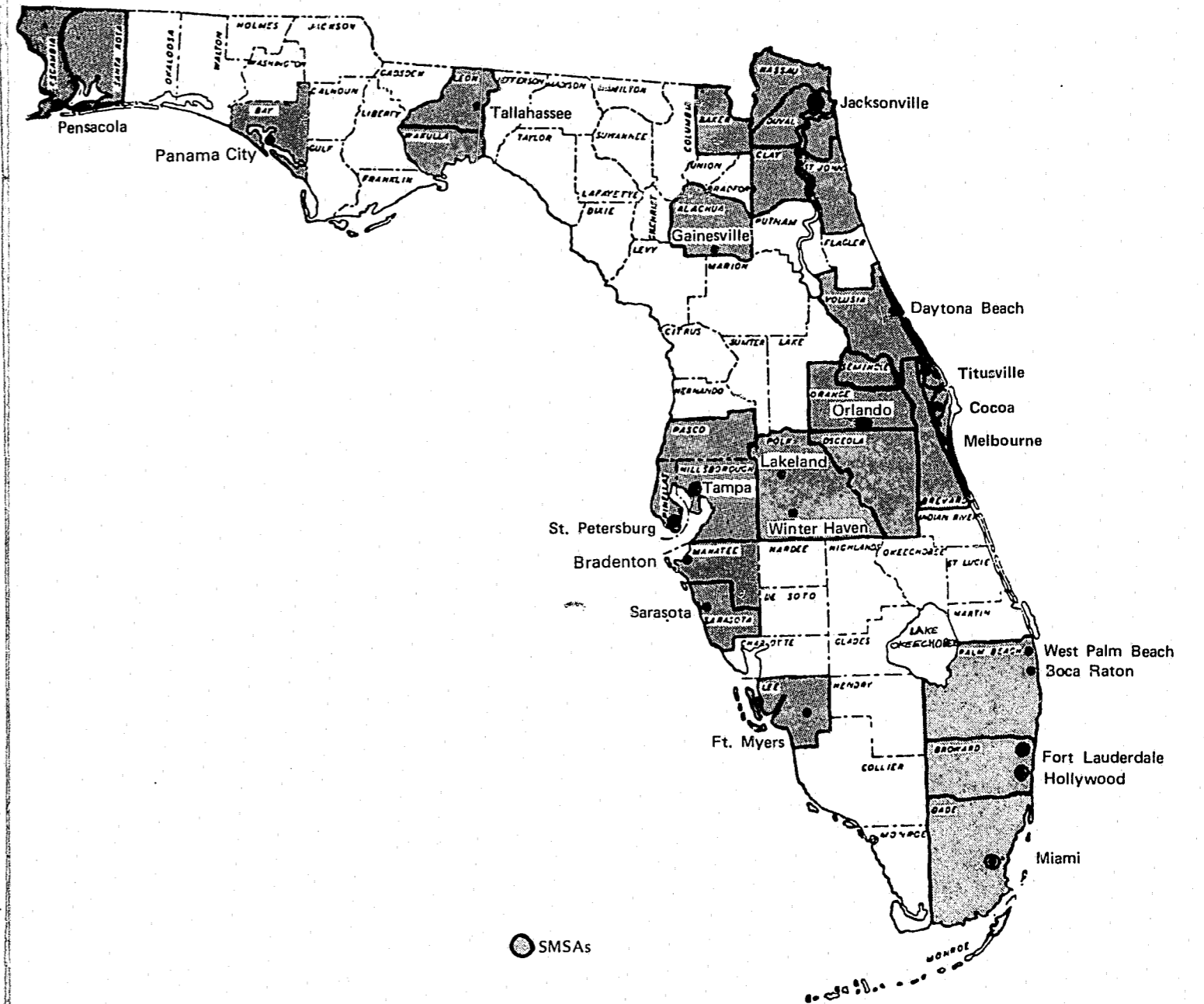

**FLORIDA DRUG SEIZURES**

**BACKGROUND**

Over the past several years, illegal drugs entering Florida have become an increasing problem and concern for Florida law enforcement personnel. By way of response to this concern, enacted legislation in October, 1979 placed a requirement for mandatory sentencing for convictions based on large quantity possession and sale of various narcotics and other controlled substances.

A drug survey form was developed whereby pertinent data could be collected on specified large volume drug related offenses to provide input as to the nature and magnitude of these operations in the State of Florida. The results of this survey involve only those seizures in which 100 pounds or more of marijuana, 28 grams or more of cocaine or 4 grams or more of heroin or its derivatives were confiscated. The data collected were forwarded on a voluntary basis by local UCR contributing agencies. Rules regarding geographic jurisdiction, as used for regular UCR data, were employed in submitting the survey information and unless local agencies assisted in

seizures by Federal agencies, the data from those seizures will not be included in this compilation.

For simplicity, statistical data will be presented for only three distinct types of drug seizures. They are marijuana, cocaine, and heroin seizures. Joint seizures where more than one drug has been confiscated are grouped under the appropriate category of that drug which had the most poundage seized.

**SUMMARY — ANALYSIS**

Of the 270 Florida drug seizures reported, 154 seizures or 57.0% were marijuana, 110 seizures or 40.7% were cocaine and 6 or 2.2% were heroin. Of the total seizures that occurred, 150 or 55.6% were outside the city limits and 180 occurred between the hours of 12:01 P.M. and 12 Midnight.

Florida residents accounted for 79.3% of the total persons arrested. The largest number of arrests took place in Broward County with 139 or 22.5% of the total. Collier County had the next highest number of arrests with 53 or 8.6%.

With \$6,061,624 worth of property seized, aircraft consisted of 46.9% of the total amount or \$2,844,145. The largest number of any one type of item confiscated was that of trucks even though they constituted only 12.0% of the total property value seized.

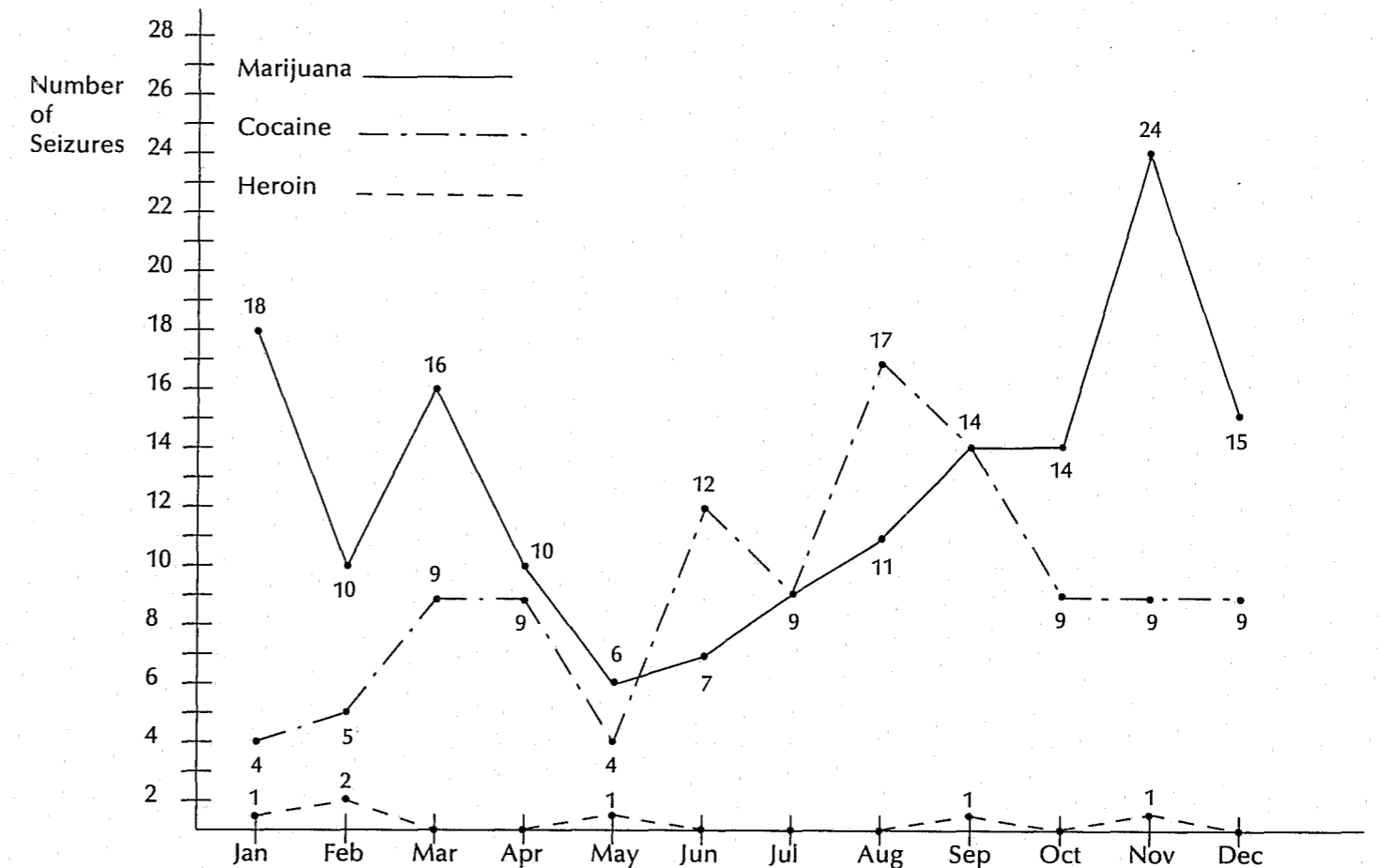

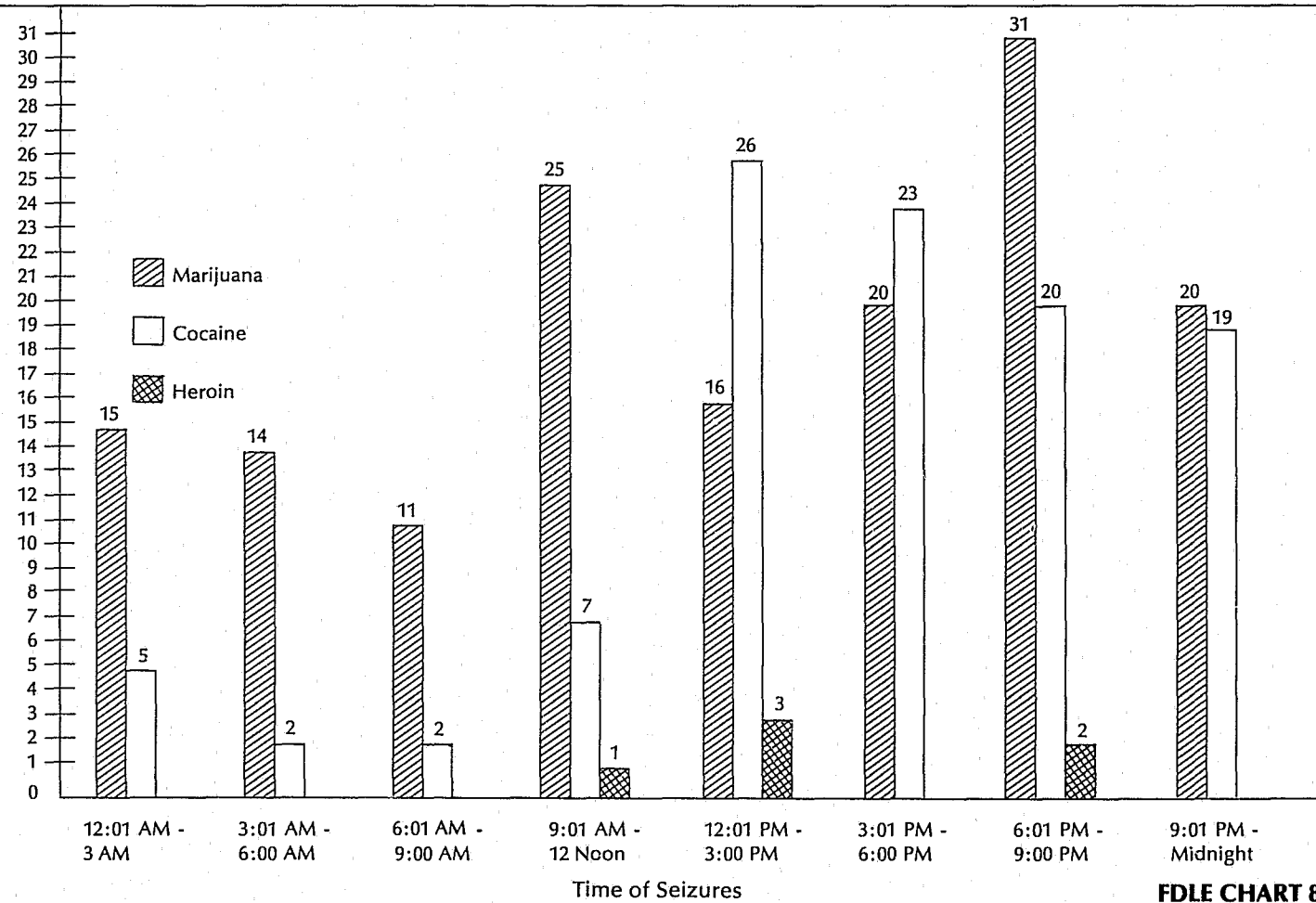

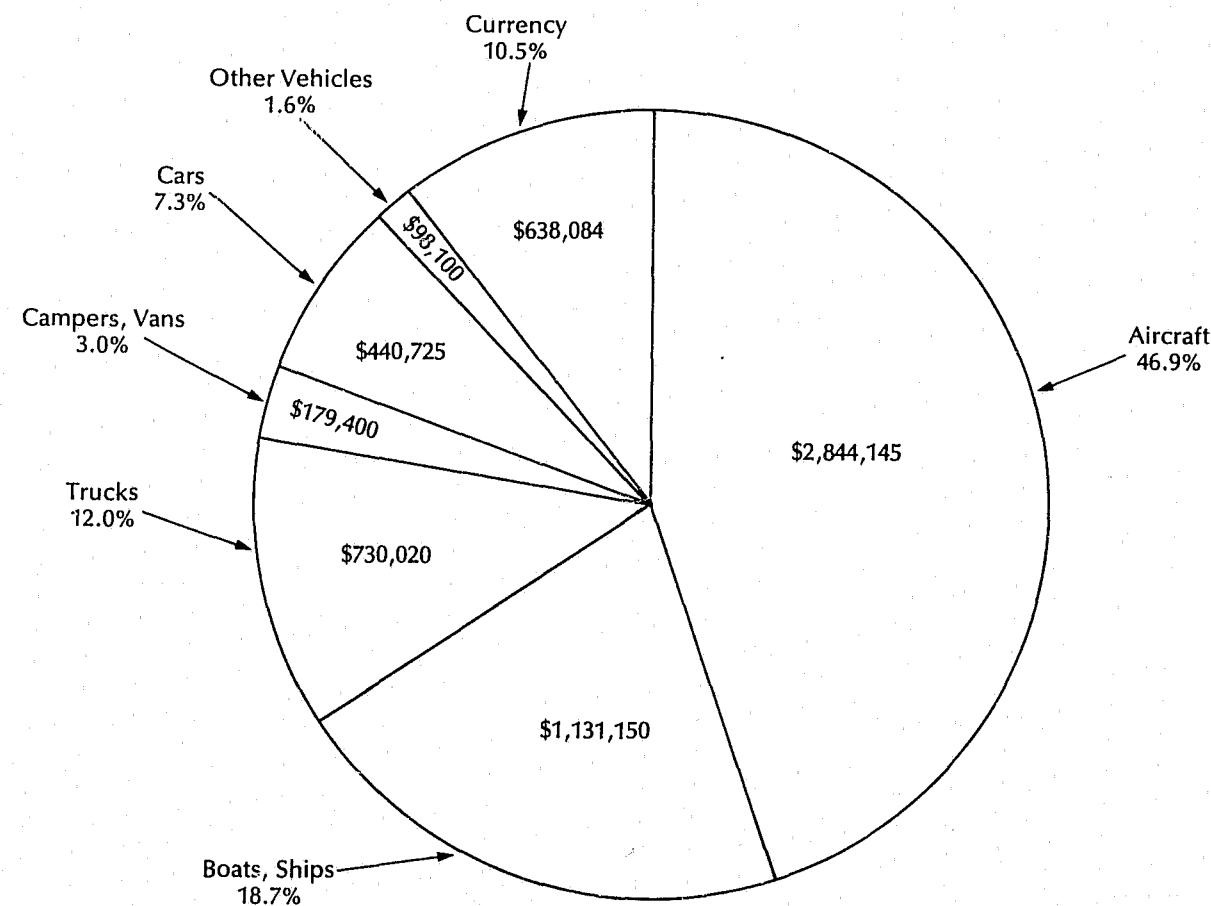

### LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL KILLED OR ASSAULTED

The Florida Uniform Crime Reporting Program requires the monthly compilation of statistical information relating to law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty and the number of assaults made on law enforcement officers.

The killing or assault of a law enforcement officer is an increasingly serious problem faced by the law enforcement administrator and should be of the gravest concern to the public at large. Such acts directly affect the functioning of proper law enforcement operations and thus reduce the ability of our law enforcement agencies to combat crime and maintain law and order. It is a deplorable situation when those persons who have chosen a career in law enforcement must assume the risk of being killed or assaulted by a member of the society they have sworn to protect.

### LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED

Seven law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty in Florida during 1980.

This is three more than were killed in 1979. From 1966 through 1980, there have been sixty-two officers killed in the line of duty. All of the offenses have been cleared by arrest or by exceptional means.

On March 15, 1980, a deputy with the Broward County Sheriff's Office was killed with a .32 caliber revolver after confronting four suspects who were selling stolen weapons.

On April 29, 1980, a deputy with the Escambia County Sheriff's Office was killed with a .38 caliber revolver while he was assisting another officer in arresting a suspect who had held hostages in an armed disturbance.

On August 17, 1980, the Sheriff of the Hendry County Sheriff's Office was killed with a knife as he was investigating noises he heard in an alley behind his home.

On August 18, 1980, a detective with the St. Petersburg Police Department was killed with a .38 caliber revolver as he prepared to buy narcotics in an undercover capacity outside of a motel. The suspect also stole 65,000 dollars in cash, which the

victim officer had in his possession for the purchase.

On September 12, 1980, a police officer with the Pensacola Police Department was killed with a 12 gauge shotgun while investigating a disturbance call. A second officer was wounded in this incident.

On November 5, 1980, a police officer with the North Miami Police Department was killed with a .25 caliber handgun while arresting a suspect who had fled on foot into the woods. The suspect had been stopped for driving a stolen motor vehicle.

On December 25, 1980, a police officer for the Daytona Beach Police Department was killed with a .357 caliber handgun while investigating a disturbance call of shots being fired in an apartment. A second officer was wounded in this incident.

Five of the victims were killed from a range of less than 6 feet, and two at 6 feet. All of the deaths except for one occurred without any warning alerting the officers to immediate danger.

The officers killed had 12 years, 8 years, 20 years, 6 years, 17 months, 9 years, and 12 years of law enforcement experience, respectively. Their ages were 30, 34, 39, 41, 42, 49, and 59. The ages of the suspects were 15, 16, 18, 19, 20, 21, 23, 28, 32 and 35.

The time of occurrences were: 1:00 A.M., 1:24 A.M., 2:25 A.M., 2:45 A.M., 9:10 A.M., 6:22 P.M., and 7:02 P.M.

### ASSAULTS ON LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

The attitude of disrespect for law enforcement officials and the failure of citizens to come to the aid of the officers being attacked as they attempt to perform their lawful duties is one of the serious problems facing law enforcement today. A total of 4,788 assaults on state, county and municipal law enforcement officers in Florida were reported during the year 1980. This represents a 1.9 percent decrease over the 4,882 assaults reported for the year 1979. While every assault does not result in personal injury to the officers involved, many of them did result in physical harm to the officer and loss of duty time in many cases. During 1980, 1,342 or 28.0 percent of these assaults resulted in personal injury to some extent, while 1979 showed a 24.4 percent physical injury rate.

#### **LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEE DATA**

The Florida Uniform Crime Reporting Program, in addition to collecting basic offense and arrest information, provides for the annual compilation of statistical information relating to county and municipal law enforcement employees.

Specific information concerning the number of law enforcement employees reflects that there are 26,552 full-time sworn and civilian employees as of October 31, 1980, excluding the 3,551 state law enforcement employees and campus police employees. This reflects an increase of 4.7 percent over the 25,372 reported as of October 31, 1979.

#### **LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEE RATES**

The rate of law enforcement employees per 1,000 population in any given community is influenced by a number of factors, much the same as the crime rate. Employee rates differ among agencies since, in particular, there is a wide variation in the responsibilities and level of activity within the various law enforcement agencies. The determination of law enforcement strength for a given county or municipality is based on factors such as population density, size and character of the community, geographic location and other conditions which exist in the area generating the need for law enforcement services. The relative stability of population factor, for instance, is particularly evident in Florida, with its numerous resort areas having high mobile and seasonal populations. Obviously, the need for law enforcement services in such areas is different from that of locales with a relatively fixed population.

In 1980, the average number of full-time law enforcement employees (both police and sheriff employees), including civilian personnel, amounted to 2.8 employees for each 1,000 inhabitants of the State. This represents a 3.7 percent increase over the 1979 rate. The rate based on sworn personnel only (excluding civilian employees) amounted to 1.9 per 1,000 population, which reflects no change over the 1979 rate. The reader is reminded that the employee rates, expressed here and within the various charts, should not be construed as representing recommended ratios for Florida law enforcement agencies. These rates do not take into account the previously mentioned factors and merely represent an average based on county and municipal totals. This rate does not include the

state law enforcement or campus police employees.

#### **COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENTS**

As of October 31, 1980, there were 11,809 persons (sworn and civilian) employed full time in Florida's 66 countywide law enforcement agencies (Office of the Sheriff — Jacksonville is included in the municipal figures). Of these, 7,546 were sworn sheriffs and deputies amounting to a rate of 1.7 sworn personnel per 1,000 population, reflecting no change from the number of sworn officers in 1979. The 1980 civilian employees constitute a 0.9 rate of employees per 1,000 estimated population. The computation of the personnel ratios is based on the estimated population of the unincorporated areas of the counties and not on the entire county estimate. This does not include the state law enforcement or campus police employees.

In an attempt at comparisons of employment levels of individual sheriff's departments with other agencies, consideration must be given to certain functions that are peculiar to a sheriff's department. In addition to their active role in criminal matters, they may serve civil process, administer major jail facilities and furnish a bailiff staff for the courts. These functions are usually performed by sworn personnel, thereby presenting a misleading picture of the actual enforcement strength of the department.

#### **MUNICIPAL POLICE DEPARTMENTS**

Of the 14,743 full-time employees (sworn and civilian) employed by 273 municipal police departments in Florida as of October 31, 1980, 10,762 were sworn personnel. This amounts to a rate of 2.1 sworn personnel per 1,000 estimated inhabitants. The number of municipal sworn employees increased 1.5 percent from 1979, and the rate reflected no change over the 2.1 per 1,000 population in 1979. The 3,981 civilian employees constituted a 0.8 rate of employees per 1,000 population. This does not include the state law enforcement and campus police employees.

#### **SEX OF LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEES**

The year 1972 represented the first year that information was collected on a statewide basis concerning the sex of sworn and civilian full-time em-

ployees. Male-female breakdowns are now required on both civilian and sworn employees as well as the total law enforcement employees. As of October 31, 1980, males constituted 76.6 percent of all employees while there existed 23.4 percent full-time female employees. Of the sworn personnel, 93.7 percent were male and 6.3 percent were

female employees. These sworn rates differed markedly from the staff function rates as males made up 38.6 percent of the civilian employees while 61.4 percent were females. This does not include the state law enforcement and campus police employees.

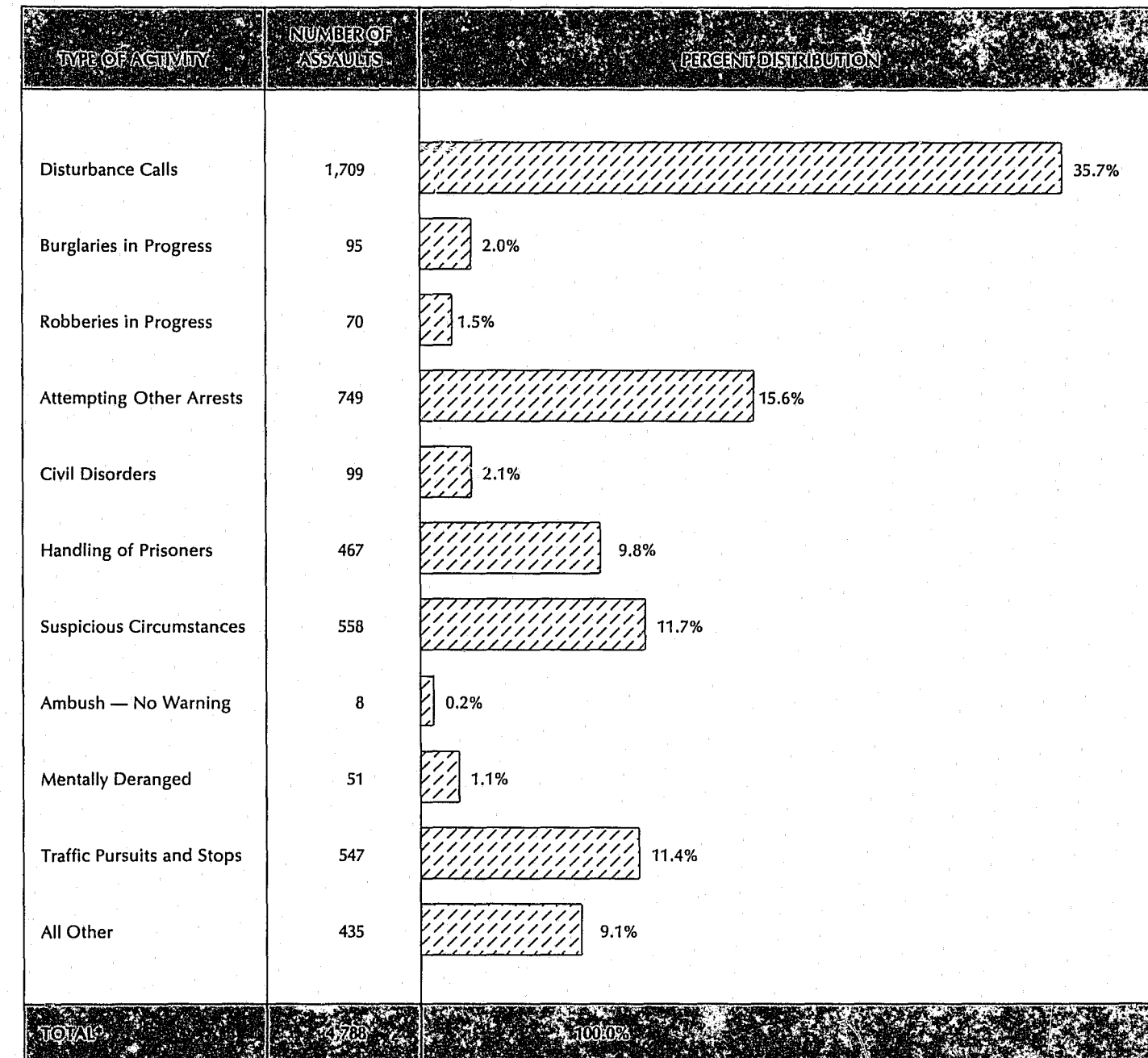

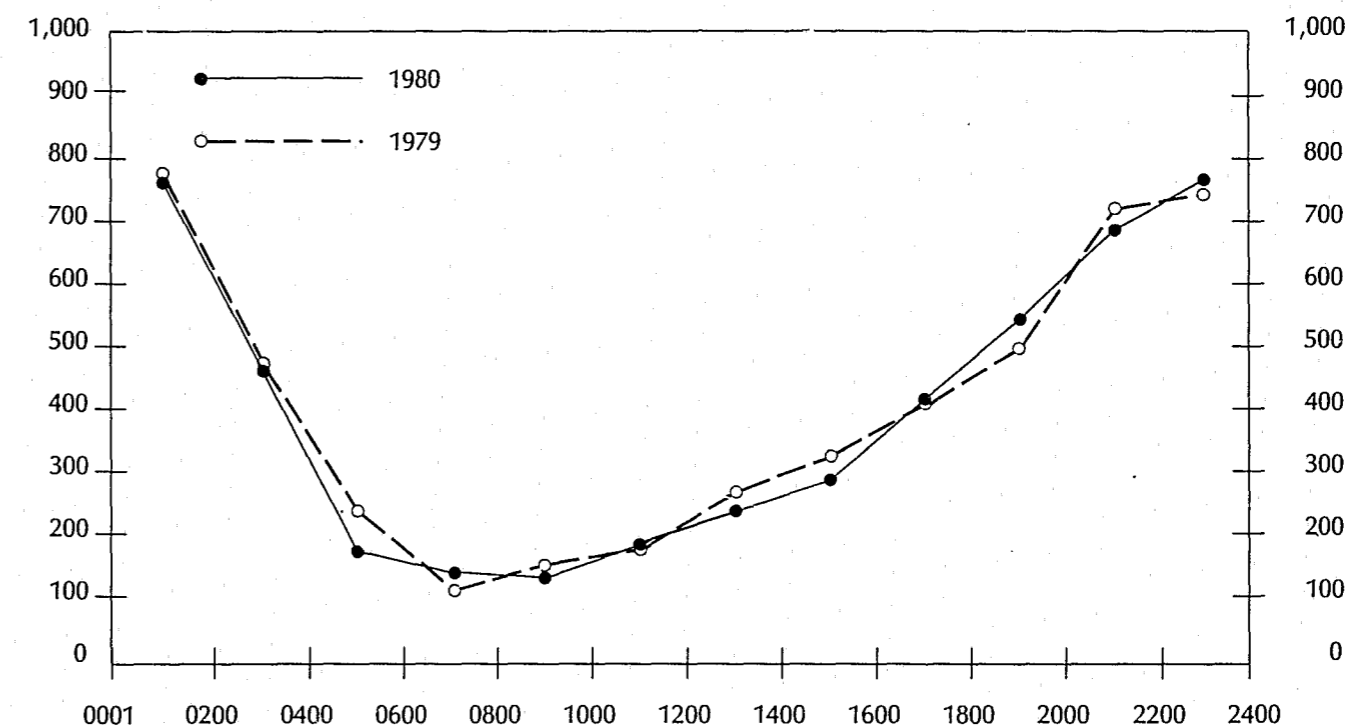

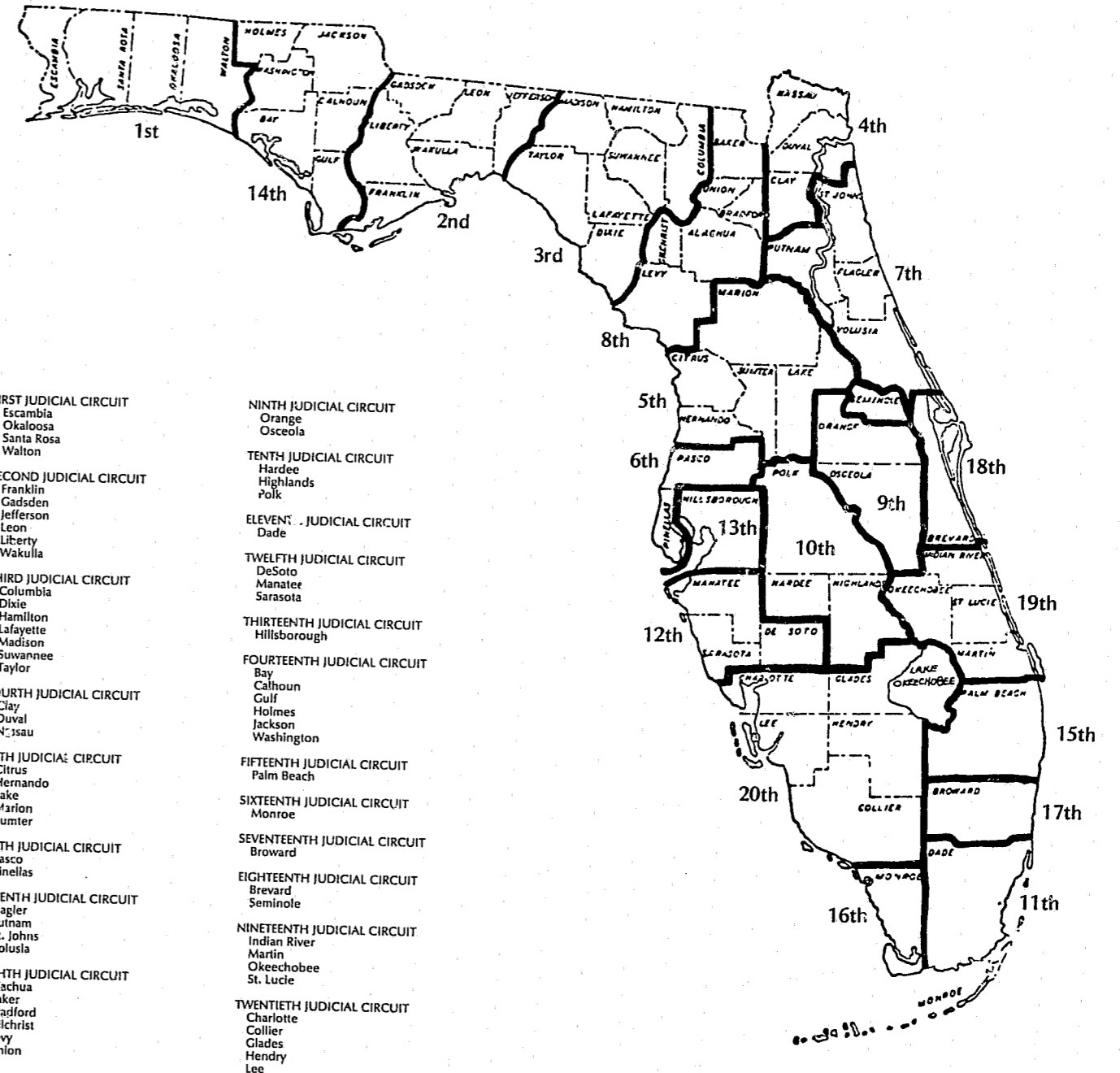

## Glossary of Terms



## GLOSSARY OF TERMS

**ADULT** — For Florida Uniform Crime Reports purposes, a person age 18 or above.

**ARREST RATE** — The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 100,000. Arrest rates are computed in the same manner as crime rates.

**CLEARED BY ARREST** — For crime reporting purposes, an offense is cleared by arrest or solved when at least one person is (1) arrested, (2) charged with the commission of the offense and (3) turned over to court for prosecution.

**CRIME FACTORS** — Conditions which affect the amount and type of crime that occurs in a geographical area. (See page 6 for list of Crime Factors.)

**CRIME INDEX** — The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a given geographical area. Crime classifications used in the Index are: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Breaking and Entering — Burglary, Larceny and Motor Vehicle Theft. Each of these offenses is referred to as an "Index-Offense."

**CRIME RATE** — The number of Index Offenses reported for each unit of population, generally per 100,000. Crime rates are computed for communities with varying populations by dividing the number of Index Crimes by the population and multiplying the answer by 100,000. (Example: 500 Index Offenses — 10,000 population  $\times$  100,000 = 5,000 Crime Rate.)

**EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE** — A crime solution or clearance recorded when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against an offender.

**JUVENILE** — For Florida Uniform Crime Reports purposes, a person under the age of 18.

**NONRESIDENT OUT OF COUNTY, ARRESTED** — An arrested person who resides within the State of Florida, but outside the county in which the arrest report is made.

**NONRESIDENT OUT OF STATE, ARRESTED** — An arrested person who resides outside the State of Florida, but committed crime(s) in the State of Florida.

**NONVIOLENT CRIME** — Consists of the Index Offenses of breaking and entering — burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft.

**PART I OFFENSES** — The first of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part I offenses are by their nature more serious and/or occur most frequently. The tabulation of Part I offenses provides a count of "offenses known." (See page 4 for a listing of these offenses.)

**PART II OFFENSES** — The second of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part II offenses are generally less serious in nature and/or occur less frequently. Tabulations of Part II offenses are limited to arrest information only.

**VIOLENT CRIME** — Consists of the Index Offenses of murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault.
