

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



1. Approval or revocation of peace officer training schools.....

Minimum courses of study and attendance requirements. . . .

Minimum qualifications for instructors. . . .

Minimum basic training which peace officers appointed for probationary term shall complete and time within which such training shall be completed.....

Minimum basic training which peace officers appointed on other than a permanent basis shall complete and the time within which such training shall be completed....

7. Rules permitting persons previous appointed and commissioned as railroad policemen to attend approved peace officer training schools.....

Summary

2027 officers were awarded basic training certificates which is a decline of 368 since 1978. 1044 certificates were earned by persons in private security which is a decrease of 213 since 1978. It is believed this indicates an actual decrease in the number of public officers being appointed, however, no conclusion can be drawn for private security since the training program is voluntary.

These personnel received training in 111 basic training schools and 72 private security schools.

3161 officers attended 177 training courses at the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy. This a decrease of 124 officers insch 1978. The decrease was caused solely by the unavailability of Federal funds to pay tuition for students from departments withough such funds in the department budget. Enrollment was well ahead of 1978 in the first guarter of 1979, however, when Federal funds became unavailable, the enrollment for 1979 slid below 1978 slightly for the 2nd quarter and was greatly behind in the 3rd and 4th quarters.

Every county had officers attend the Academy with the enrollment ranging from 1 officer each from Morgan, Noble and Carroll counties, to a high of 189 from Franklin and 265 from Cuyahoga.




Basic Training Certificates Issued – Peace Officer and Private Security




2027 Total Certificates Issued.





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


Program Evaluation

Informal evaluation feeedback from the law enforcement community is highly favorable.










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
The decline in enrollment during the third and fourth quarters is probably attributable to a lack of tuition funds.




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







Courses by Quarter





The average use per month of available bed space was 71%. Classes were not in session during the first week of July and the last week of December due to holidays during those weeks.


