

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#### FOREWORD

Volumes VII and VIII of the Final Report for the Criminal Justice Human Resources Planning Project contain the full technical documentation for system utilization. Volume VII provides the basic guide for system utilization and Volume VIII contains additional documentation and reference material.

Volume VII; modeled after the Bibliographic Retrieval Service (BRS) user's manual, provides two chapters. The first chapter is intended to permit the user quick access and ready knowledge of the rudiments of system operation. Chapter 2 provides in-depth information on each command and user option.

Volume VIII is organized into four sections. The first section contains the basic thesaurus listing developed for the bibliographic data base. Section II is a listing of user functions by paragraph label and content while Section III provides the operational definition for each of the 702 paragraph labels used in the system. The final section of Volume VIII contains the field layouts for the data bases.

The Julian date of the most recent addition or change to the document or record is provided in this paragraph.

#### Item 4. AN Accession Number

This paragraph contains a unique eight character number sequentially assigned to each record or document as it is entered into the system. Each number begins with a two-letter prefix:

- CJ This prefix indicates that the document is contained in the bibliographic database.
- LR This prefix indicates those records found in the legal reference database.
- NC This prefix indentifies records in the agency noncontract database.
- CL This prefix indicates the agency contract datebase.
- DM This prefix indentifies records in the demographic database.

The AN paragraph in the bibliographical file only may contain additional information such as the International Standard Book Number (ISBN), Library of Congress Card Number, ERIC number, International Standard Serials Number (ISSN), and a geographical code. The geographical code is as follows:

#### Item 9. TD Termination Date

This paragraph contains a date whenever the document has data which has an obsolescence or termination date. It is used primarily with contract and non-contract agency databases.

#### BIBLIOGRAPHIC

#### Item 10. TI Title

This is the full title of the report, document, article, book, etc.

#### Item 11. AU Author

Name(s) of the person(s) who wrote the report, document, article, book, etc.

#### Item 12. IC <u>Institution</u>

This is the three letter, five digit code from the ERIC Source Directory which specifies, if applicable, the institution with which the documents or author are associated.

#### Item 13. SA Sponsoring Agency

This is the three letter, five digit code from the ERIC Source Directory which specifies, if applicable, the agency which provided financial support for the production of the document, book, article, etc.

#### Item 14. DE Descriptors

These are "keywords" which are major descriptors of the contents of the article, book, document, etc.

#### Item 15. ID Identifiers

- 5

These are phrases, proper names, acronyms, etc., which are found in the document, book, etc., or reflect the content of the document, book, etc.

#### Item 16. PR cPrice of Document

This is the actual cost of the document.

#### Item 17. DN Description Note

This contains any cataloging information which might augment the document description such as, number of pages in a document, inclusive pages of a journal article, charts, maps, figures, etc.

#### Item 18. IS <u>Issue Number</u>

This is the issue number of the journal in which the article is found.

#### Item 19. AB . Abstract

This is a brief summery of the document which will give the reader enough information to judge whether or not it might be useful to obtain the document in its entirety.

#### Item 20. RP Report Number

This is a letter/digit combination for any unique number or numbers identifying the document which have been generated by the organization producing or disseminating the document.

#### Item 21. CO Contract Number

This is an alpha/numeric designation which identifies, if applicable, the contract which supported the publication of the document.

#### Item 22. GN Grant Number

This an alpha/numeric number which is indigenous to and unique to any grant which supported publication of a document.

#### Item 23. PN Project Number

This is an alpha/numeric number which is indigenous to and unique to any project out of which resulted the publication of a document.

#### Item 24. AV Availability

This specifies where and in what form the document is available.

#### Item 25. JC Journal Citation

This specifies full journal name, volumn number, issue number, inclusive page numbers and date.

#### Item 26. IN <u>Institution Name</u>

This specifies the full English name of the institution or organization represented by the code in the <u>Institution Code</u>.

#### Item 27. SN Sponsoring Agency

This specifies the full English name of the sponsoring agency as represented by the code in Sponsoring Agency Code.

#### Item 28. AT Annotation

This is a brief narative summary about the document.

#### Item 29. MI MARC Indicators

This code is used for books only, and contains up to eight subfields which specify the following:

#### Item 36. ES Edition Statement

Specifies the editor of the document and any other information about the edition.

This paragraph contains the United States Census Geographic Code for the state.

TI Name of State Item 38.

This section refers to the specific state whose bargaining laws are discussed.

STS State Summary of Public Employee Bargaining Legal Information This section refers to a summary of the laws on public employee Item 39.

bargaining in a particular state. It presents a good overview of that state's laws.

SRG State Statutes and Regulations Item 40.

This section refers to the full texts of state and local statutes and regulations governing public sector collective bargaining for a particular state. In each state, laws of general application, if any, appear first. Laws relating to specific types of employees or to specific geographical areas follow those of general interest.

SCV State Coverage Item 41.

This section refers to the various public sector bargaining laws for a particular state and the types of employees covered by a particular law are identified.

SUR State Union Recognition-Elections Item 42.

This section refers to union recognition and election procedure under the various public sector bargaining laws of a particular state. Court decisions and agency rulings in the various states are also covered.

Item 43. SBU State Bargaining Units

> This section refers to the bargaining unit provisions under the various public sector bargaining laws in a particular state. Court and agency rulings in the various states are also covered. It specifies what constitutes an appropriate unit for collective bargaining by state and local government workers.

Item 44. SBG State Bargaining or Meet to Confer

This section refers to whether there is true collective bargaining, or simply an obligation for a public employer to listen to a union in a particular state. Item 46. SBN State Bargaining Negotiations

The duty to bargain entails the mutual obligation of the parties to meet at reasonable times and to confer in "good faith" with respect to appropriate subjects of bargaining.

Although resolution of conflict disputes vary from state to state, all of them are designed to bring about a fair settlement of issues without a strike--usually through mediation and arbitration.

Item 48. State Working Conditions: Grievance-Awards

This section refers to the statutory and decisional law on the resolution of individual grievances in a particular state.

#### Item 49. SUS State Union Security

This section refers to the statutory and decisional law on union security in a particular state. The term "union security" refers generally to devices developed by labor organizations to protect their status as exclusive representatives.

#### Item 50. SUP State Unfair Practices Employer-Union

This section refers to employer and union unfair practice statutory provisions under the various sector bargaining laws in a particular state. Court and agency rulings in the various states are also covered. It explains what are protected activities by employers or unions in a particular state.

#### Item 51. SSP State Strikes-Picketing

This section refers to statutory and decisional law on strikes and picketing in a particular state.

#### Item 52. SET State Enforcement Tools

This section refers to statutory and decisional law on the enforcement of state bargaining provisions in a particular state. Included in the discussions are such matters as the handling of unfair labor practice cases by state labor agencies, remedial powers of the state agencies, court review of agency decisions and arbitration awards, strike injunctions and penalties, and private suits to enforce collective bargaining agreements.

#### Item 53. SFD Other Devices with Possible Impact

This section refers to decisions of federal courts, particularly the U.S. Supreme Court, which might have a possible impact on the public employee bargaining laws of a particular state.

#### CONTRACT

#### Item 54. TI Title

The title of the bargaining agreement, most often will give the organization names of both management and labor and will specify the type of agreement.

#### Item 55. LO Location

This will specify the United States Census Geographic Code for the jurisdiction involved in the contract.

#### Item 56. LR LEAA Region

This will specify the LEAA region for the jurisdiction involved in the contract.

#### Item 57. AT Annotation

This will be a brief indication of the names of the parties involved in the contract, inclusive dates of the contract, and will indicate what type of agreement is in force.

### Item 58. AXB Type of Agreement

This will specify the type of agreement in force, i.e. collective bargaining, letter of understanding, memorandum of understanding, etc.

#### Item 59. BX Bargaining Unit Name

This will specify the full name of the union, association, or organization implicitly recognized in the contract.

#### Item 60. LA Length of Agreement

This will specify, in months, the length of time the agreement is in force.

#### Item 61. PA Purpose/Intent of Agreement-Preamble

This provision is generally found at the beginning of a labor contract if it's going to be contained in the agreement at all and includes a statement to the effect that the joint objectives of the parties to the agreement are the promotion of harmonious relationships between them, establishment of a method by which differences may be settled, loosely define the scope of the contractual agreement and set forth the enabling statute under which the contract has been concluded.

#### Item 62. RL Recognition of Labor Organization (Union or Association)

The recognition provision is the portion of the labor contract in which the employer (state, county, city, etc.) states that it recognizes the association or union officially for the purposes of collectively bargaining or other defined labor relation purposes. This provision may include wording giving the right to exclusive negotiation for the bargaining unit and will most often contain the definition of the bargaining unit.

#### Item 63. US Union Security

Perhaps one of the most important provisions for the police union or association is that relating to union security. The provision will, generally speaking, be captioned "Union Security" and will deal with the requirement that employees become a member of the union or association or pay a representation fee to the association in exchange for the benefits they receive as the union collectively bargains on their behalf. It may include wording which prohibits management from bargaining with another union, as well as containing the provision allowing dues check-off and the hold harmless provision.

#### Item 64. BD Bargaining Unit Definition

Bargaining unit definitions will frequently be found within the recognition or union security provision of the labor contract. In some cases, however, bargaining unit definitions are contained as a serarate paragraph unto themselves and are simply statements of a definitive nature in which the employees on whose behalf the union or association is bargaining are set forth by class, rank, or other means. In a police agency it is conceivable that there may be as many as three or more bargaining units; a police benevolent association representing patrolmen, a sergeants protective association representing officers of the rank of sergeant, and senior officers association representing those of the rank of lieutenant and above. Any single contract will generally deal only with one bargaining unit as defined therein.

#### Item 65. DI Pledge Against Discrimination

This provision generally speaks to the fact that the employer will not discriminate against any employee because of membership or non-membership in the employee organization or by reason of ethnic or racial background. It may also contain specific wording on affirmative action.

#### Item 66. MR Management Rights

The management rights provision in a labor contract is that portion of the agreement in which management retains certain rights to administer the department and is generally coached in broad general terms. The provision most frequently speaks to those rights which are not specifically addressed elsewhere in the labor agreement. It may also include the responsibilities of management.

## Item 67. IR Individual Rights of Members of Bargaining Unit

This clause is generally captioned members rights and may contain any number of provisions dealing with the individual rights of police officers within the bargaining unit. Most frequently, this clause contains wording dealing with rights of officers pertaining to internal affairs investigations such as the right to counsel during internal affairs investigations, the right to notification upon the filing of a citizen complaint against the officer, etc. In some contracts the individual rights or members rights clause is a more general statement of the rights conferred upon the members of the bargaining unit. It may include a provision for legal counsel for the employee, provided by the employer and the right to join the union.

## Item 68. UR Union/Association Rights

These provisions enumerate the rights and privileges of the employee organization with respect to activities in furtherance of the union/association business. It may also include the responsibilities of the union.

## Item 69. SU Conduct Towards Superiors

This seldom used provision specifies that employees covered by the collective bargaining agreement will maintain a professional and courteous attitude toward their superior officers during the course of the performance of their duty. In some cases, the provision is more extensive and requires certain military formalities with respect to superior officers.

#### Item 70. UD Union Dues

Infrequently, the contract will specify the amount of union dues to be paid by members. Since the payment of dues on the part of employees to their organization is a metter between them and the association, this provision is infrequently found in a collective bargaining agreement.

#### Item 71. UC Dues Check-Off

The dues check-off provision is one of the most important to any labor organization inasmuch as it insures a continued source of income in the form of dues automatically deducted from each employee's paycheck. In some cases, this will deal with payroll deductions for union dues as well as for special assessments and fines, and may include a hold harmless provision.

#### Item 72. HH Hold Harmless

The hold harmless provision may vary in terms of its wording. However, the intent thereof is to protect the employer for two specific areas. The first area deals with the discharge of an employee who does not meet the membership requirements as set out in clause three under Union Security. In the event the union certifies to the employer that a particular member has failed to maintain his membership in accordance with the union security provision, the employer may be duty bound to terminate that employee. The hold harmless provision protects the employer in the event of an error on the part of the union in making the certification to the employer. The second area of concern deals with dues check-off and confers a degree of protection upon the employer in the event that dues check-off is erroneously initiated for a particular employee or maintained against his wishes.

#### Item 73. RR Departmental Rules and Regulations

Frequently, the police labor organization will attempt to elicit in collective bargaining, an agreement from the police department that departmental regulations and rules shall be construed to be a part of the labor contract. Alternatively, they may attempt to include a statement to the effect that departmental rules and regulations may not be utilaterally modified, altered, changed, etc., by the police department for the posting and issuance of new rules and regulations and the procedure for the resolution of complaints about new rules and regulations.

# Item 74. IA Disciplinary Procedure/Internal Affairs Procedure

This clause deals with the procedures by which an internal affairs investigation and desciplinary action may be taken against a member of the bargaining unit. Frequently, this will contain elements of the members rights provision. However, the primary thrust of the provision deals with the receipt and processing of citizen complaints against the police, the conduct of internal affairs investigation, and the method by which internal discipline will be administered. These provisions may also include the wording or process of dealing with employee discharge.

#### Item 75. FX Personnel File Review

In many cases, this provision of a union contract will be found under the members rights provision and confers upon individual members of the bargaining unit, the right to examine upon providing reasonable notice to the employer, copies of their personnel file. This may also include the right to not have personal information divulged to others and the right to include a signed refutation in the personnel file.

## Item 76. BR Police Officers Bill of Rights

The police officers bill of rights is a document which contains certain rights and privileges for law enforcement officers which has been reduced to statutory language and enacted as such in several states. In those states in which the bill of rights is not law, unions have attempted to include language covering the bill of rights in labor contracts. The bill of rights may be contained within an individual contract under a heading by that name or may be found under the members rights provision, or may be called employee rights.

#### Item 77. GR Grievances

The grievance provision within a police labor contract generally provides for the definition of a grievance and, subsequently, a multi-step process by which that grievance will be resolved.

#### Item 78. PB Probation

The probation portion of the labor contract merely states that during the period of probation established by the employer, certain rights contained within the labor agreement may or may not be conferred upon probationary employees.

#### Item 79. CA Uniforms and Clothing Allowances

The uniforms provisions in the police labor agreement may contain several elements ranging from recommendations for uniform style to conditions under which the uniform would be worn and, finally, the furnishing of either items of uniform apparel, or a sum of money designed for the payment of the expense of procurring and wearing satisfactory police uniforms. In most contracts, provisions dealing with uniforms are captioned either simply Uniforms, Uniform Allowances, Uniform Maintenance or in some similar fashion. In many cases, these provisions also address the area of equipment.

#### Item 80. EQ Equipment

Equipment provision within police labor contracts deal with items of non-uniform equipment and may include provisions regarding police weapons, protective equipment, such as bullet-proof vests and helmets, and other police equipment items. Often this provision is found coupled with uniform/clothing allowance provisions.

#### Item 81. PV Police Vehicles

Provisions dealing with police vehicles most often cover the area of unsafe police vehicles, designation of police vehicles, police vehicle equipment, and operational police vehicles. Wording may also be included which addresses the policy on use of private vehicles.

#### Item 82. HW Hours of Work

This clause generally sets forth the work day and work week and may, depending on the draftsman, include other provisions related to work hours such as overtime policies, work schedules, duty assignments, exchanging days, and wage information associated with special assignments and overtime.

#### Item 83. SS Schedules

Work schedule clauses may be contained within the hours of work provision or may be set out seperately within the contract. Schedule provisions include, in some cases, a statement to the effect that schedules must be made available at some period of time in advance of their becoming effective, or may specify the type of work schedule to be utilized by the department for the contractual period.

#### Item 84. DA <u>Duty Assignments</u>

Clauses of this type deal simply with the type and duration of assignments within the police department. They may also include a provision allowing officers to choose their partners for working purposes, and a description of duties not to be performed by members of the bargaining unit.

#### Item 85. MP Minimum Personnel

These provisions most often address minimum personnel for the police department as a whole, for a watch or shift period, and for police vehicles.

#### Item 86. WG Compensation

These provisions are found throughout the contract and usually address all reimbursement areas including overtime payment/policy, education/ training wage incentives, longevity, mileage reimbursement, temporary assignment, cost of living, special duty pay, etc. It is often appropriate to review the modification to contract (LC) provision for additional changes in the compensation area which may up-date some of these provisions found in the main body of the contract. These provisions generally include all wording which relate to policy which can ultimately effect the amount of compensation going from the agency to the employee.

#### Item 87. LV Leave

Leave provisions within police contracts generally address such areas as annual leave, sick leave, leave without pay, disability leave, funeral leave, professional advancement leave, military leave, personal leave, maternity leave, and compensatory leave. These provisions may occasionally address compensation policy associated with the various leave types.

#### Item 88. HO Holidays

This provision generally contains a list of those days designated as holidays for contractual purposes. Additionally, these provisions may deal with the payment to be made for those individuals required to work on holidays or whose regularly sheeduled day off falls on a holiday.

#### Item 89. TE Training and Education

This provision generally contains a provision detailing the nature and extent of professional training to be provided members of the bargaining unit during the duration of the contract. Also included may be wording which addresses compensation associated with training and education.

#### Item 90. RC Roll Call

This provision contains a requirement that individuals in the bargaining unit report to their duty station at some prearranged time prior to assuming act of duty for the purpose of pre-duty briefings and training. The term roll call may be utilized along with others of the similar nature such as briefings, pre-duty inspection, etc.

#### Item 91. RE Retirement

In many jurisdictions, the issue of retirement is controlled by state and local law, however, in some contracts a provision will be contained detailing the retirement provisions for the department. These provisions may also include wording which addresses separation/death, disability retirement and widows benefits.

#### Item 92. IX Insurance

Provisions relating to insurance most often cover the areas of hospitalization, life insurance, disability insurance, dental insurance, professional liability insurance, and workman's compensation.

#### Item 93. PL Productivity/Proficiency Levels

This provision is an innovative one which has been negotiated by employers and is in effect a requirement of minimum acceptable performance with some sanctions for non-compliance.

#### Item 94. PZ Physcial/Psychological Fitness

This provision requires all members of the bargaining unit to remain physically and psychologically fit during the course of the contract and provides for periodic physical and psychological examinations to insure that fitness.

#### Item 95. NS No-Strike

The no-strike provision in a contract is an attempt to maintain a continuity of police services during the duration of the agreement and is an affirmation on the part of the labor organization not to strike or engage in any job action in the form of slow down, selective enforcement, sick-in or blue flu, etc. during the term of the contract. Frequently the no-strike provision will also contain a no-lockout provision which provides that the city agrees that it will always make work available for members of the bargaining unit and will not preclude them from performing their duties.

#### Item 96. BY Secondary Boycotts

This provision is a new one in many contracts negotiated by national labor organizations on behalf of the police clientele. Secondary boycotts are those strikes which are conducted by a union in sympathy with or in support of another local labor organization engaged in a strike.

#### Item 97. EM Secondary Employment

This provision related to the part-time, off-duty employment of police officers. The provision may eliminate or prohibit secondary employment completely or may place conditions upon that employment in the form of type of a job which may be engaged in, etc.

#### Item 98. GS Grooming Standards

Once an issue of great concern to the labor rank and file, grooming standards are now found frequently in police contracts and deal with the style and length of employees hair, mustaches and beards.

#### Item 99. HS Health and Safety Standards

This provision may deal with a myriad of issues related to the maintenance of health and safety of numbers of the bargaining unit, however, does not relate to safety as it pertains to motor vehicle equipment or usage. Most frequently health and safety standards deal with other equipment provided to the police officers and the condition of the police building and physical facilities.

# Item 100. EE Damage to Personal Property of Employees

This provision relates to the compensation of employees for personal property which may be damaged during the course of the discharge of police duties such as eye glasses, wrist watch, etc. In some instances, this may include wording covering policy relating to injury of an employee.

## Item 101. ER Damage to Property of Employer

On occasion a contract will have provisions relating to policy governing the reimbursement by the employee for property damaged by the employee.

## Item 102. SR Seniority

This provision relates to the grant of benefits or privileges to an officer on the basis of seniority alone. Included in the clause may be provisions relating to promotion, job assignment, lay-off, leave, etc.

# Item 103. LY Lay-Offs/Recalls

This provision includes language spacifying the basis upon which lay-offs will be made should it become necessary and relates directly to the seniority provision in the afore said clause. It may include consolidation or elimination of jobs and the right of the union to prior notification.

## Item 104. PX Promotion

This provision contains wording as to the method by which promotional vacancies will be filled during the duration of the agreement. The provision may also contain material relating to seniority as a factor for promotional consideration.

## Item 105. TR Transfers

This provision contains wording dealing with the issue of transfer of personnel which becomes an issue when considering employment conditions of a state police agency in which transfers will require great physical hardship to conclude. Most frequently the transfers provision will stipulate that no disciplinary transfer may be made except in accordance with the disciplinary provisions of the contract and no transfer may be made except upon providing adequate written notice to the employees affective thereby.

# Item 106. RQ Residency Requirement/Conditions

This provision contains wording to the effect that members of the bargaining unit will be required to reside either within the jurisdiction or within a certain predetermined geographical area so as to be available in the event of public emergency.

# Item 107. BF Maintenance of Benefits

This provision is found with increasing frequency and in effect requires the employer to maintain all conditions, benefits, etc., in existence as of the time of the negotiation and conclusion of the contract for the period of the contract term. This means then, that the employer may not change any general orders or regulations or other the employer may not change any general orders or regulations or other procedures effecting employees without negotiating them with the union.

## Item 108. CM Members Copy of Contract

This provision simply requires management to provide copies of the labor agreement to all members of the bargaining unit.

## Item 109. LM Labor Management Committee

This provision establishes a committee to be comprised of members of the labor organization and of mamagement for the purpose of meeting periodically and resolving issues and controversies pertaining to the interpretation of the contract.

# Item 110. LC Modifications to Labor Contract/Letters of Understanding

These provisions provide for a method by which unworkable provisions of the labor contract may be reviewed and modified and subsequent letters of understanding executed for the purpose of effecting such modifications. It may outline procedure for the conduct of arbitration hearings, include process by which contract is modified, and include policy by which the contract is administered. Of special importance is the consideration that such letters of understanding/arbitration awards may modify the body of the contract, therefore, the user should determine if there have been such modifications thereby insuring the most accurate representation of what the current agreement is between labor and management.

# Item 111. WN Waiver of Further Negotiations (The Zipper Clause)

This provision contains a specific agreement on the part of both parties to waive their continuing right to negotiate regarding matters of hours, wages and working conditions during the period of the contract. This provision may be referred to as the complete agreement provision.

## Item 112. SG Savings Clause

This clause provides that in the event any portion of provision of the existing contract is determined to be unlawful or void as against public policy, that ruling shall not of itself void the entire agreement. This provision may be referred to as the separability provision.

## Item 113. DV <u>Duration of Contract</u>

This provision specifies the effective dates of the labor contract. It may also include a specific time for future negotiations.

#### Item 114. FU Future Negotiations

Provides that the parties shall, upon giving written notice, agree to enter into future negotiations prior to the expiration of the current agreement. It may include wording relating to the administration of the agreement.

#### Item 115. SX Specific Clause Reopener

In some contracts a provision is contained to the effect that while the agreement is a multi-year contract, at the end of the first year, certain clauses may be reopened for negotiation while the remainder of the agreement shall remain in force during the duration of the time periods specified.

# Item 116. AE <u>Automatic Extension of Contract Beyond Original Termination</u> Data Pending Negotiations

This provision provides that the executed labor contract shall continue in force in effect beyond the original termination date until future negotiations are concluded leading to a new labor agreement.

#### Item 117. EV Periodic Performance Evaluation

This provision requires that the employer periodically evaluate the proficiency of members of the bargaining unit for some stated purpose.

#### Item 118. OB Other Remunerative Fringe Benefits

In this category fall any other fringe benefit of a renumerative nature which has not been described in other contract provisions.

#### Item 119. CW Other Working Conditions

In this category fall any other provision over contract dealing with working conditions not otherwise specified.

#### Item 120. OT Other Clauses

In this category fall any other provisions in a labor contract not falling into a category mentioned heretofore. It would be useful for the user to review this category to insure a complete review of the relationship between management and labor.

# Item 121. AXG Wage Schedule

This category provides a review of the wage scale for members of the bargaining unit. Occasionally other members outside the bargaining unit will be included in this schedule.

# Item 122. AXH Contents/Index

This reflects the contents or index when a contract has such information.

# Item 123. AXI Headings

This category is for system accounting purposes only and has no user utility.

# Item 124. AXJ Signatures

This provision reflects the actual signatures of those individuals whose responsibility it is to sign the agreement.

# Item 125. AXN Legislative Clause

Occasionally a contract will contain this provision which makes certain provisions of the contract being contingent upon legislative approval or enabling legislation being passes.

# Item 126. AXM Agreement

This provision is often found as the first paragraph of the contract. Most often it is a brief statement identifying the parties involved in the agreement and may cite the law enabling collective bargaining.

# Item 127. AXL Definition of Terms

Occasionally a contract will contain a listing of terms used in the contract along with operational definitions for those terms.

# Item 128. AXK Separation/Demotion

These provisions outline the policy associated with the areas of demotion, termination, quiting, firing, reduction in rank and suspension.

#### NON-CONTRACT AGENCY BENEFITS

Item 129. TI <u>Title</u>

Specifies the complete agency name.

Item 130. LO Location

Specifies the census geographic code for the jurisdiction involved.

Item 131. LR <u>LEAA Region</u>

Specifies the LEAA Region code the jurisdiction falls in.

Item 132. AT / Annotation

When applicable, contains brief narrative summary about agency benefits.

Item 133. NWS Non-Contract Wage Schedule

Contains the most recently available wage schedule for the agency involved.

Item 134. NLP Non-Contract Longevity Pay

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's longevity pay practices.

Item 135. NCP Non-Contract College/Educational Pay

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's college/educational pay.

Item 136. NHP Non-Contract Hazard Pay

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's hazard pay.

Item 137. NSP Non-Contract Specialty Pay

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's specialty pay.

# Item 138. NOP Non-Contract Other Pay

Contains the most recently available information about pay categories other than those mentioned above.

Item 139. NSL Non-Contract Sick Leave

· Contains the most recently available information about the agency's sick leave polices.

Item 140. NVL Non-Contract Vacation Leave

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's vacation leave practices.

Item 141. NHL Non-Contract Holiday Leave

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's holiday leave practices .

Item 142. NPL Non-Contract Personal Leave

Contains the most recently available information about the agency's personal leave practices.

#### DEMOGRAPHIC

Item 143. LO Location

Provides name of jurisdiction.

Item 144. LR LEAA Region

Code for region as applicable:

#### Item 146. AT Annotation

A brief, usually 50 words on less, summary of the demographic record.

#### AGRICULTURE, 1974

Items 147 - 172. (General Note)

The agriculture statistics presented here are based on results of the 1974 Census of Agriculture conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Farms are defined to include all land on which agricultural operations were conducted at any time of the Census year under the day-to-day control of an individual management and from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or were normally expected during the Census year. This data is only available for state, county and city.

Item 147. UJ Total Farms

Total count of farms as defined above.

Item 148. UK Percent Change in Farms, 1969 - 1974

Change refers to the simple percent change in the number of farms over the five year period. Because of definitional changes from 1969 - 1974, the percent change figures should be treated with caution.

Items 149 - 150. Farm Operators (General Note)

The term "farm operator" designates a person who operates a farm, either doing the work himself or directly supervising the work. For Census purposes, the number of farm operators is the same as the number of farms.

Item 149. UL Percent Residing on Farm Operated

Total amount of those operators who reside on the farm they operate.

Item 150. UN Percent Working 100 or More Days Off Farm

Total amount of farm operators working in non-farm jobs, businesses or professions, for 100 or more days off the farm they operate.

Items 151 - 155. Land in Farms (General Note)

Acreage designated as land in farming consists primarily of agricultural land used for crops, pasture, or grazing and includes woodland and wasteland provided it was part of farm operator's total operation.

Item 151. UO Total Acreage In Farms (000)

Combination of total number of acres operated as a farm unit. Data is reported in 1,000's.

Item 152. UQ Percent Change in Acreage, 1969 - 1974

Change between 1969 - 1974 refers to the simple percent change in farm acreage over the five year period.

Item 153. UU Percent in Farms of Total Land

The proportion of all land represented by land in farms is based on the approximate total land area of counties and states as of January 1, 1970.

Item 154. UV Total Crop Land (000)

Total crop land consists of land from which crops are harvested, hay was cut, pastures, cover crops, land on which all crops failed and fallow or idle crop land. Data reported in 1,000's of acres.

Item 155. UW Percent Harvested

Crop land harvested includes all land from which crops were harvested or hay was cut, and all land in orchards, citrus groves, vineyards, and nursery and green house products.




