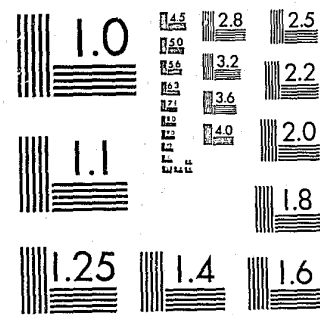


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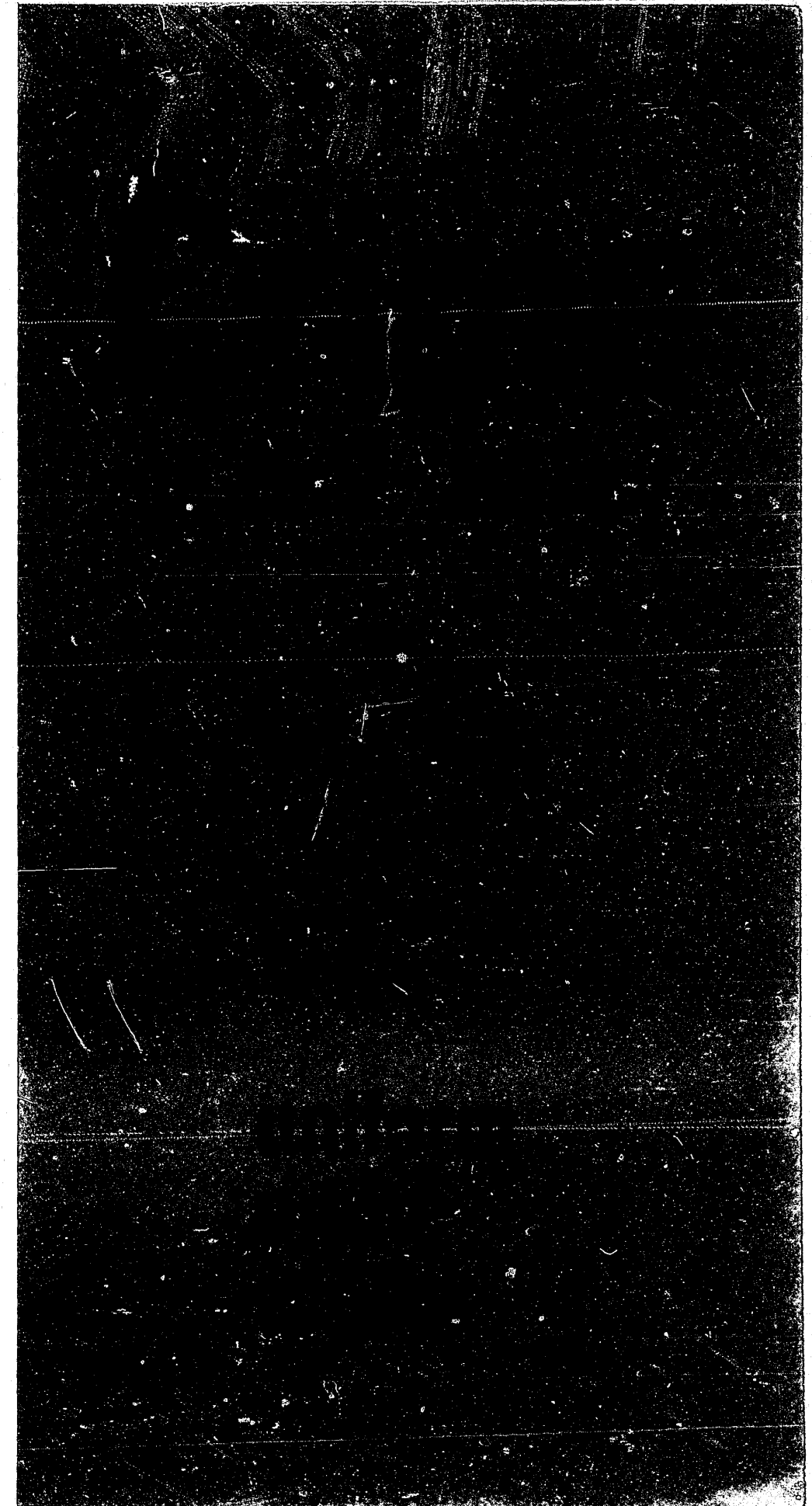
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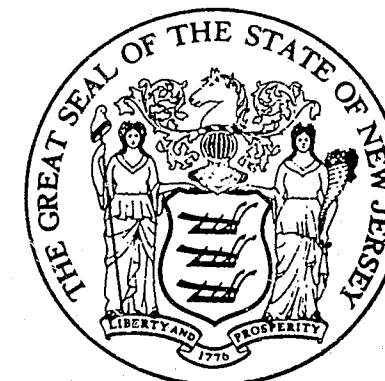

SECTION I
SYNOPSIS
UNIFORM CRIME
REPORTING PROGRAM

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINED

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System involves the uniform compilation, classification, and analysis of crime statistics reported by all police agencies of the state pursuant to guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The statute which establishes the Uniform Crime Reporting System (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) empowers the Attorney General to collect, gather, assemble, and collate information which will be of assistance in the proper administration of criminal justice. The Attorney General and the New Jersey State Police (the agency designated by the Attorney General to establish the Uniform Crime Reporting System), in an attempt to achieve uniformity with the FBI reporting system and to establish a broad base for the collection of data involving anti-social behavior, and other relevant information with respect thereto, have defined the word "crime" to include acts which technically, within our state, are not considered crimes. In this reporting system, the word "crime" includes some "disorderly persons offenses." It also includes, in a category entitled "all other offenses," violations of municipal ordinances. References to the relevant tables which set forth the Class I and Class II offenses contained in this report clearly indicate what is covered.

PURPOSE

Effective law enforcement requires the coordination of the law enforcement activities within and among political subdivisions. Special attention must often be devoted to a selective and concentrated effort both geographically, as well as in terms of a specific pattern and type of criminal behavior. Selective and coordinated enforcement becomes possible only when the type and volume of crime can be analyzed on the basis of accurate information comprehensively developed and systematically collated. Information revealing the location, frequency, and nature of crime is essential to this purpose. It is for these reasons that New Jersey's Uniform Crime Reporting System was developed.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law was enacted on May 16, 1966 and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. After passage of the law, the Attorney General, as provided by the statute, designated the New Jersey State Police as the agency to collect, gather, assemble and collate information from the law enforcement jurisdictions within the state.

Prior to the enactment of the law, and at the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police conducted research and study of crime reporting systems then operational throughout the country. Study results established that adoption of a reporting program paralleling that of the federal system of Uniform Crime Reporting would be the soundest approach toward development of a state system. The obvious advantage found in the adoption of the federal system included the desirability of having compatible state and federal systems thereby allowing absorption of state crime data into the national level.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions made by this committee have proven invaluable and indeed, insured the success of the program. This

body continues to work closely with the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the New Jersey State Police to improve further the quality of reporting and to recommend additional program standards, policies and procedures.

During the development phase of the program a study of the federal and various state systems of crime reporting revealed the importance of a sound internal police records system, if accurate crime statistics were to be forthcoming. Upon recognition of this factor, the State Police revised completely their method of internal reporting in order to meet the requirements of the Federal System of Uniform Crime Reporting. This step not only hastened program development but also proved invaluable throughout the operational phase.

Education of contributors to the program in the areas of mechanics, methods and concepts must be a constant operational requirement, if continued system adherence and valid statistics are to be expected. This vital need is satisfied by the personal contact between the four State Troopers assigned as Field Representatives, and the contributing agencies.

The vitally important task of maintaining close liaison is obvious when it is realized that services now are extended to the 583 law enforcement agencies of the state. Although each contributor to the program is supplied with the "Uniform Crime Reporting Guide" describing system procedures and mechanics, personnel changes within reporting departments and program refinements make the educational phase a continuing one.

As an adjunct to the program, the New Jersey State Police has offered its revised method of internal reporting to those police departments who wish to adopt it. In all cases of report adoption and record up-dating, necessary guidance and instruction is provided by the Field Representative. The personal contact between the Field Representative and the contributor not only serves as a rapid means to resolve areas of report error, but also provides the opportunity to discuss other areas of mutual interest, thus establishing an additional communication link between municipal, county and state law enforcement agencies.

PROGRAM EVALUATION

The scope of mandatory crime reporting in New Jersey extends far beyond the stated purpose of the initial program. The compilation and publication of an annual report, which identifies and offers analysis of the extent and nature of crime on a state, county and municipal level, may be considered an end in itself. However, practical application of such data must be made before the program can be judged substantive.

Police executives throughout the state are making increased use of this data in administrative, planning and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. During 1977, the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit rendered operational assistance to municipal police agencies by providing individual analysis of statistics as they related to specific crime problems and for use in identifying necessary police manpower and equipment needs. Program requirements have also increased police efficiency in the areas of reporting and recordkeeping. Examples of program application, as discussed here, aid police in their day to day operations and contribute toward the constant effort of upgrading the quality of police services in the community.

The State Law Enforcement Planning Agency, which was established in August of 1968 to conform with the provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, has the responsibility of improving law enforcement throughout the state. Since its inception, in all of its determinations as to application of allocated funds, this agency has used analyzed crime data obtained through the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. The establishment of crime rates on state, county and municipal levels with identification of specific crime problems allows the agency to construct priorities, formulate plans and implement these plans to the benefit of the state and all units of local government. This administrative application of such crime data illustrates the far-reaching effect the program has on all efforts to combat crime in the state.

Since 1967, many states have studied the New Jersey system for adoption within their respective states. Several of these presently have ongoing programs based on the New Jersey system and many more of the remaining states are in the process of implementing similar programs.

The element of compatibility of crime statistics between state and federal programs is vital, and evaluation must include consideration of the degree of that compatibility. The Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the State Police has worked closely with the members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who administer the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Invaluable aid and assistance given by the FBI has allowed the New Jersey program to become compatible with that of the national program. This compatibility allows absorption of state crime data into the national system without lengthy and costly conversion processes.

On January 1, 1969, the FBI, the sole collector of National Uniform Crime Reports in the states and counties since 1930, eliminated the direct collection of National Uniform Crime Reports from the police of New Jersey. This procedure change followed a two-year evaluation of the New Jersey program by the FBI, and resulted in an agreement wherein uniform crime reports for each municipality of the state are now being submitted to the national program by the State Police.

REFINEMENT OF THE SYSTEM

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey, is recognized as an effective vehicle to increase the efficiency of police operations in every municipality of the state. Originally, the System was designed to fulfill the need for accurate crime statistics for use in police administration, planning and operations. In its current status it does answer these needs to a great degree, but has not yet reached full potential as an operational tool.

The collection of meaningful data to supplement that which is normally collected is a vital element of the system. This supplemental information regarding crime and the criminal enters the system by way of special surveys and samplings. Periodic collection of such information enables better identification of specific crime problems and those factors which contribute to them. Analysis of refined information and dissemination to contributors provides additional intelligence upon which more effective police action can be based.

Criminal mobility had been surveyed during the earlier stages of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, however, the mobility of criminals in the state had not been addressed since the advent of New Jersey's extensive Federal Interstate Highway System. To investigate this concern, a sample survey of thirty-nine municipalities traversed by Interstate 80 and 280 was performed, and the subsequent results of this Uniform Crime Reporting Survey confirmed the fact that interstate roadways afford criminals swift avenues to and from municipalities previously difficult to reach.

Based on the current Uniform Crime Reports submitted by the police departments throughout the state, a monthly "feedback" report is disseminated to each contributor to the program. This "Monthly Crime Trend Feedback Report" presents an accurate account of the status of crime in each municipality of the state. The report contains information as to the type and time of criminal operations and crime targets, as well as the volume and trend of crime within each municipality. In addition to comparing the current month with the same month of the previous year, further analysis is done for a current cumulative monthly total compared to the same period of the previous year. A trend for two prior years within the same crime categories is also established.

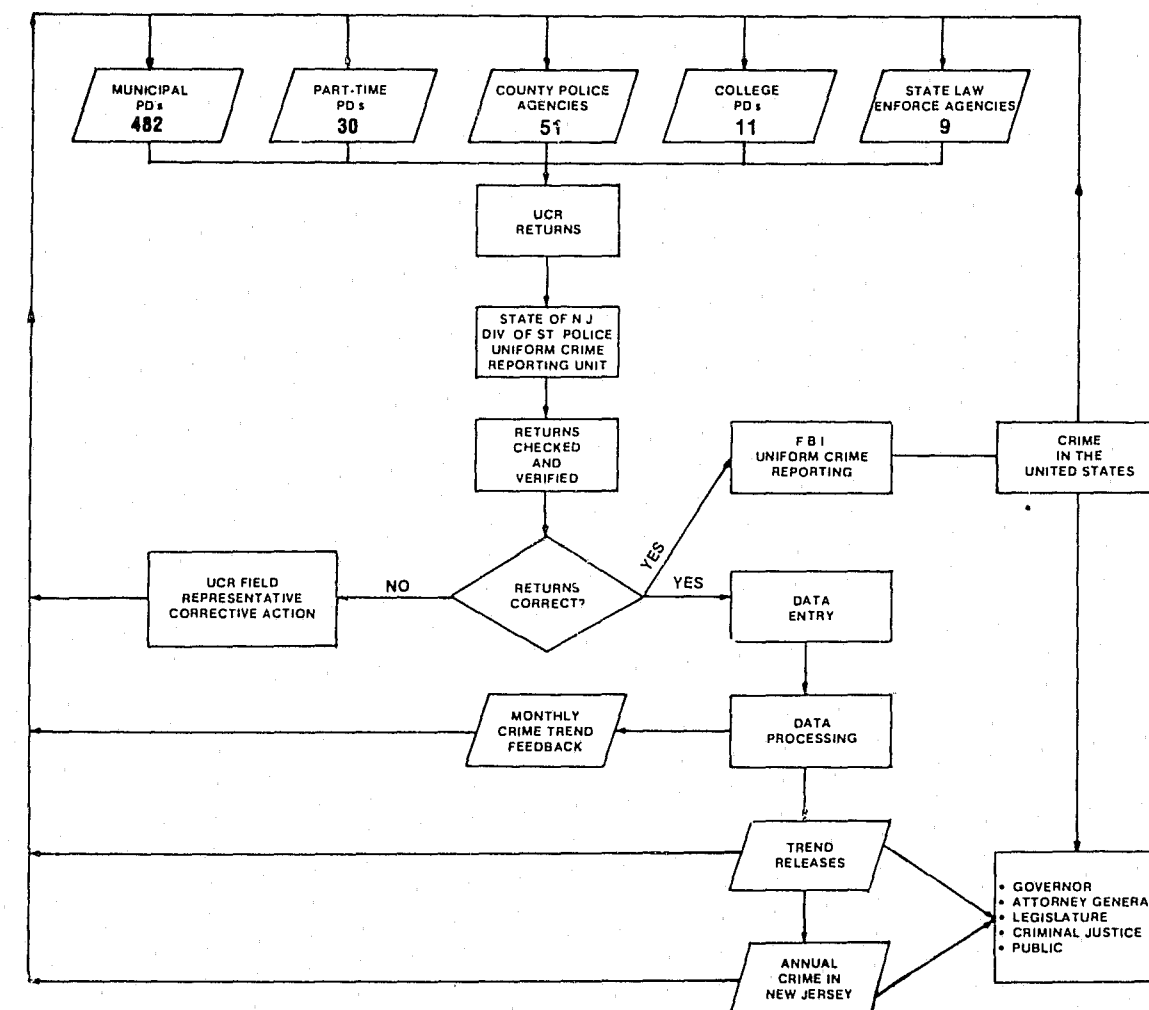
In addition to Monthly Crime Trend Feedback Reports, the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit updates and implements recordkeeping systems for Criminal Justice agencies upon request. To assist in this updating of reporting techniques, the Unit has written, published, and distributed a "Law Enforcement Internal Records Systems Guide" (LEIRS). The Unit also improved its capabilities to provide individual crime analyses for requesting Criminal Justice agencies.

In 1971, crime statistics by urban, suburban and rural classifications were collated and analyzed for the first time since the beginning of the program in 1967. These statistics were presented in the 1971 publication and will be continued in all future publications.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit crime reports to the program. During the year 1980, offense and related supplementary information, as well as arrest data, were received from 482 full-time municipal police departments, 30 special part-time municipal police departments and the New Jersey State Police who provided the necessary information for the 55 municipalities without local police services.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data were received for the state's 21 county prosecutors' and 21 sheriffs' offices, 4 county police departments and 5 county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement under the system, the 9 other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as 11 college campus police departments were included under a pilot program. This gives a total of 583 law enforcement agencies reporting.



In the interest of satisfying not only a national, but also a state need for uniformity, completeness and accuracy in crime statistics, every report submitted under the system is prepared in triplicate by the contributor. One copy is retained by the contributor. The remaining copies are submitted to the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit. A copy is forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for inclusion in the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

METHOD

Reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise in some manner, dispose of the case. The clearance, in every case, is attributed to the municipality in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which was revised during 1977, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field Representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

Municipal law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: (1) Homicide, (Murder and Manslaughter), (2) Forcible Rape, (3) Robbery, (4) Aggravated Assault, (5) Burglary, (6) Larceny-Theft, (7) Motor Vehicle Theft, and (8) Arson.

This count is determined from a record of all criminal complaints received by the police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined by the police investigation to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. The number of "offenses known" in each crime category is reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy, or any other consideration. Municipal law enforcement agencies also report the total number of these crimes cleared by arrest. A separate category is made for crimes cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age. Certain other analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted information is also collected by month.

Other monthly report forms contain data such as the number of persons arrested for all criminal offenses with respect to age, sex, and race of the offender. Police employee data is submitted on an annual basis.

In summary, "Crime in New Jersey" reflects the compilation of the eight serious "offenses known to police," arrests of persons under 18 years of age and 18 years of age and over. This data is then related to the State of New Jersey, by population groups, character, individual counties, and municipalities.

VERIFICATION PROCESSES

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics from 583 law enforcement agencies throughout the state is the uniformity of data received. Program aids such as guides and instructions do not necessarily guarantee the accuracy and correctness of the reports submitted by the contributors; additional controls are therefore necessary.

Each report received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and, possibly more important, for reasonableness as to interpretation of offense classifications. Fluctuations from levels established through previous reports submitted by the contributor become suspect of inquiry as to reasons for variations. Improper classification, changes in reporting procedures or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a Field Representative to the reporting agency. These personal contacts are necessary for sustaining the accuracy of the system. Field Representatives are engaged in a constant effort to provide adequate, meaningful training in order to provide a vital link between the program and the reporter.

CLASSIFICATION OF OFFENSES

Uniformity in reporting under the New Jersey system is based upon the proper classification of offenses by police. The adoption of the federal system of reporting included the utilization of the offense classifications of that system. Law enforcement in this state has made accurate application of those classifications in the reports submitted to the program.

In view of the need for compatibility with the federal system, "offenses" under the program are not distinguished by designation of "high misdemeanors," violations of the Disorderly Persons Act or Municipal Ordinances. The explanation of offense classifications may vary slightly with those employed at the federal level because the language used is familiar to law enforcement in this state. However, the major categories of offense classification remain the same as those employed nationally.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 978.7 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor & Industry, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. Preliminary 1980 census counts of population were used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- URBAN CENTER RURAL Densely populated core area but surrounded by rural areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominately single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- SUBURBAN RURAL Rapidly developing area but still large tracts of open land available for development.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding municipalities rural.
- RURAL CENTER-RURAL Small developed core area surrounded by rural areas.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of New Jersey and project a statewide view of crime. Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. The fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only one part of the criminal justice system; the criminal justice system is only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time. Enumerated below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place.

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of the police force.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward law enforcement problems.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Seasonal population figures are too inaccurate and fluctuating to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

As in the past, the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit has been surveying police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their viewpoint concerning contributing crime factors. Increased abuse of drugs and alcohol, insufficient manpower, lenient courts, and seasonal population changes, are some of the general type responses received from many of the police agencies.

Many of the specific type responses concerning the increase or decrease of a particular crime have been documented in earlier publications of "Crime in New Jersey," but these viewpoints are still valid and appear again below.

ROBBERY:

Increases

- Availability of new interstate roadways that provide a swift avenue to-and-from communities previously difficult to reach. This factor has also shown a relationship with burglaries in suburban and rural areas.

Decreases

- The addition of highly visible scooter and foot patrols in high density crime areas; selective enforcement; stake out squads are assigned to target areas using analytical information derived by studying past robbery occurrences.

BURGLARY:

Increases

- Husband and wife both working; leaving homes more frequently unoccupied during the daylight hours.
- High truancy rates at Junior High Schools and High Schools has also been noted as a contributor to daytime burglary increases.
- Unoccupied vacation homes being entered during the off-season. Many police administrators cite insufficient manpower to properly patrol these areas as a contributing factor.
- Little or no security measures initiated by the average citizen to protect his own property.
- Juvenile recidivists receiving no detention after they are arrested numerous times for being involved in burglaries.
- Considerable increases in the value of gold and silver make the crime of Burglary even more attractive than in past years.

Note: Stolen property values (jewelry and precious metals) increased 109 percent over the previous year and historically have a low recovery rate, i.e., 4 percent in 1980.

Decreases

- Crime prevention programs are being stressed in many communities as a means of decreasing crime. Programs as "Neighborhood Watch" and "Operation I.D." have proven to be successful as a deterrent to burglaries, as well as other crimes.
- Increased patrols during probable times and location of residential and commercial burglaries.

LARCENY:

Increases

- Larceny of auto parts, and property contained inside motor vehicles is the most common type of larceny being reported to police in New Jersey. This is attributed to:
 - Shortage of police manpower to adequately patrol parking lot areas.
 - A lack of security provided by the various shopping malls in their own parking areas.
 - Availability and visibility of the articles left in the vehicles.
- Shoplifting is a larceny that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their arrest policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent, an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.

Decreases

- Surveillance of shopping mall parking areas, utilizing motor scooters, bicycles and plain clothes foot patrols.
- Use of additional or improved lighting to prevent criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in larceny from parked vehicles. These types of programs also help reduce bicycle thefts.
- Larceny of bicycles has decreased as a result of Safety and Security programs implemented by police in the various schools. This includes the registration and marking of bicycles with special numbers.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT:

Increases

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in Motor Vehicle Thefts in 1980. The vehicle's value has nearly doubled in recent years, due to the high replacement cost of parts and accessories.

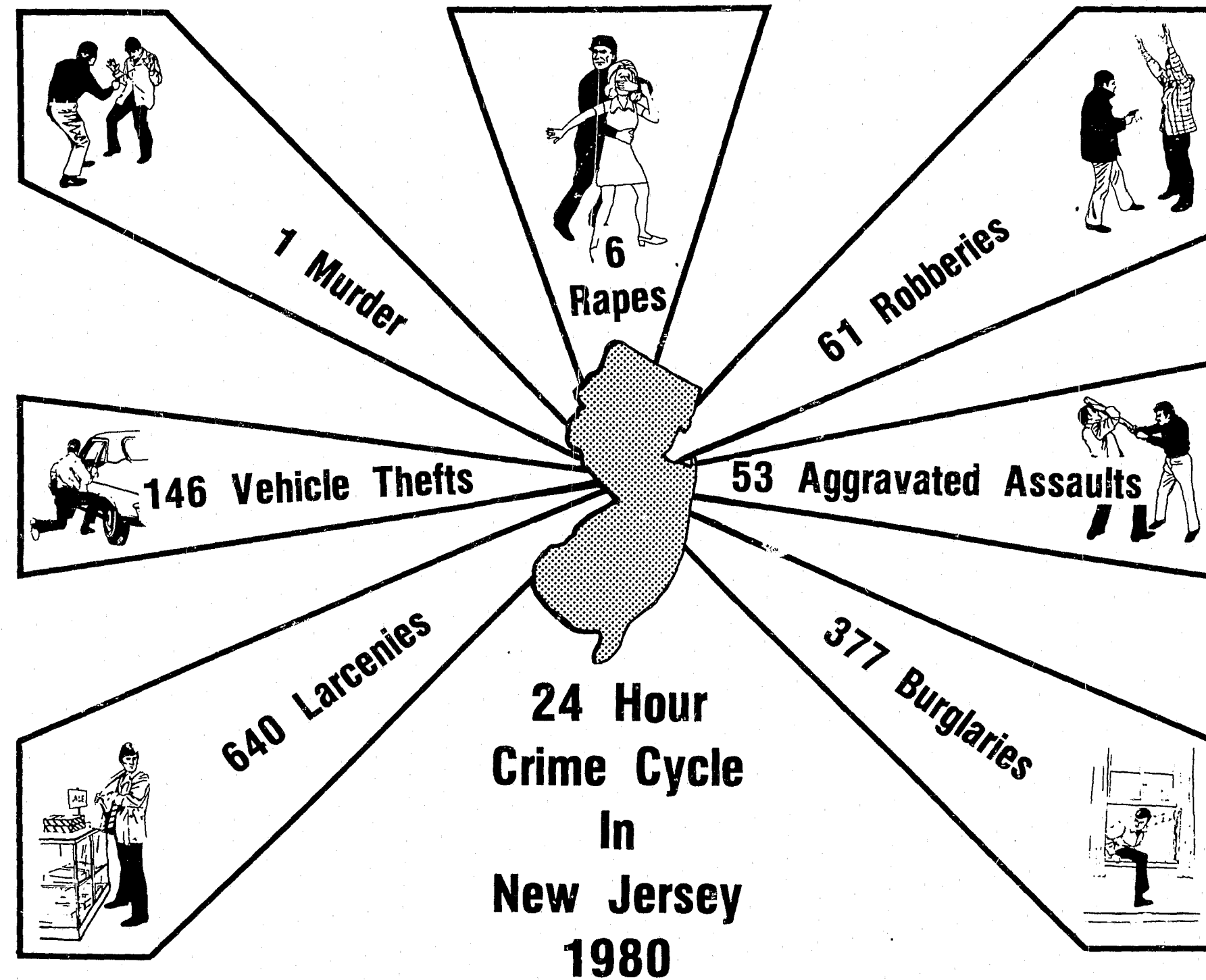
Note: Stolen motor vehicle values increased 10 percent over 1979, conversely, only 60 percent of the stolen motor vehicles were recovered in the UCR Program, probably due in part to "theft for parts," chop-shops," etc.

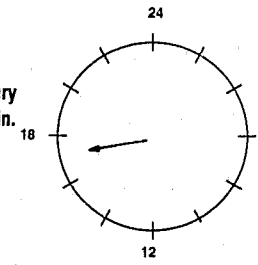

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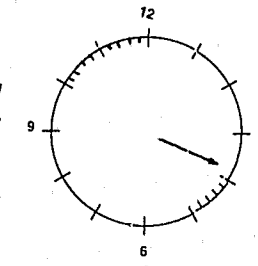


NEW JERSEY CRIME CLOCKS—1980

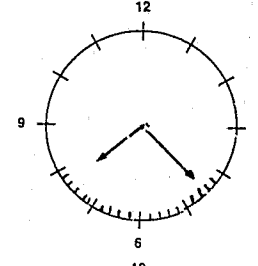

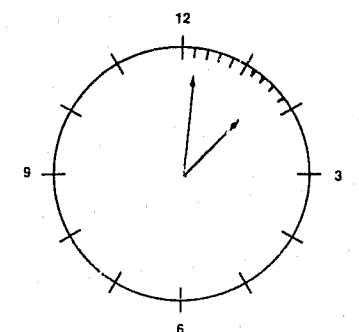

- New Jersey and the United States increased 9% and the Northeastern states increased eight percent.

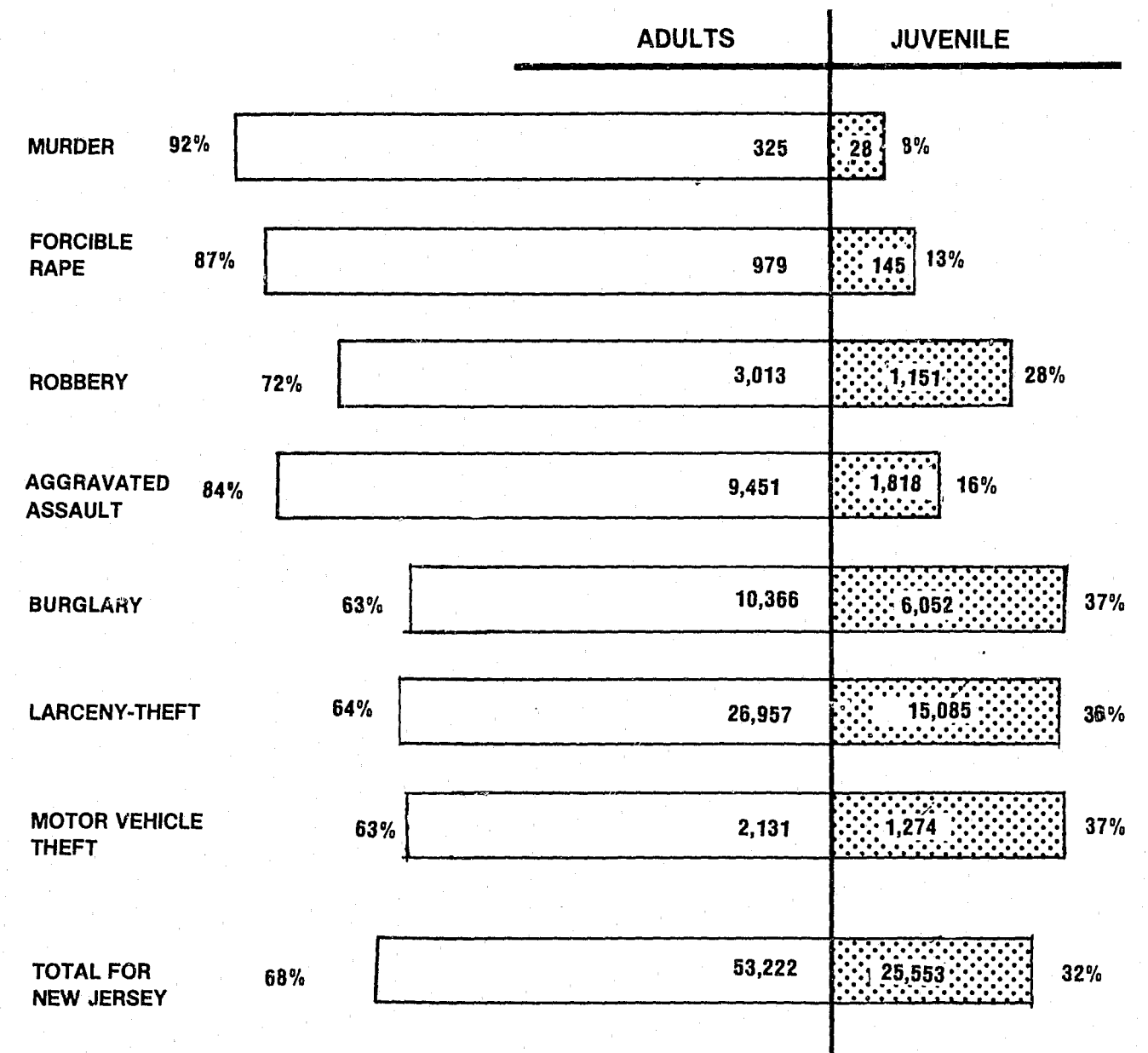

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 84,371 persons were arrested for serious Crime Index offenses, representing an 8 percent increase over 1979.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 24 percent of the total arrests during 1980.

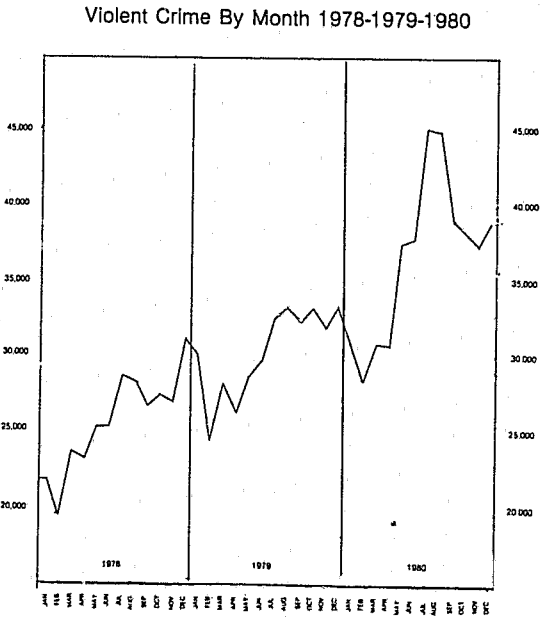

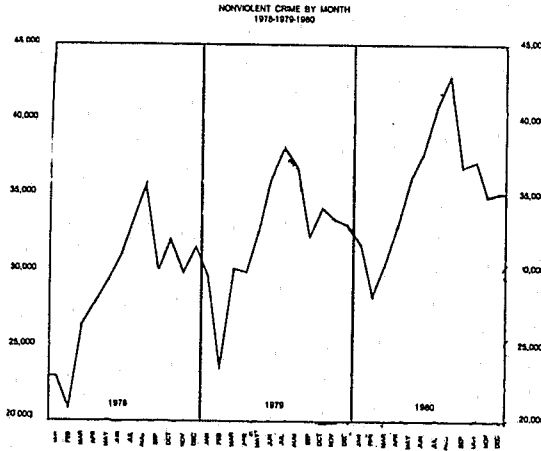

MURDER

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification

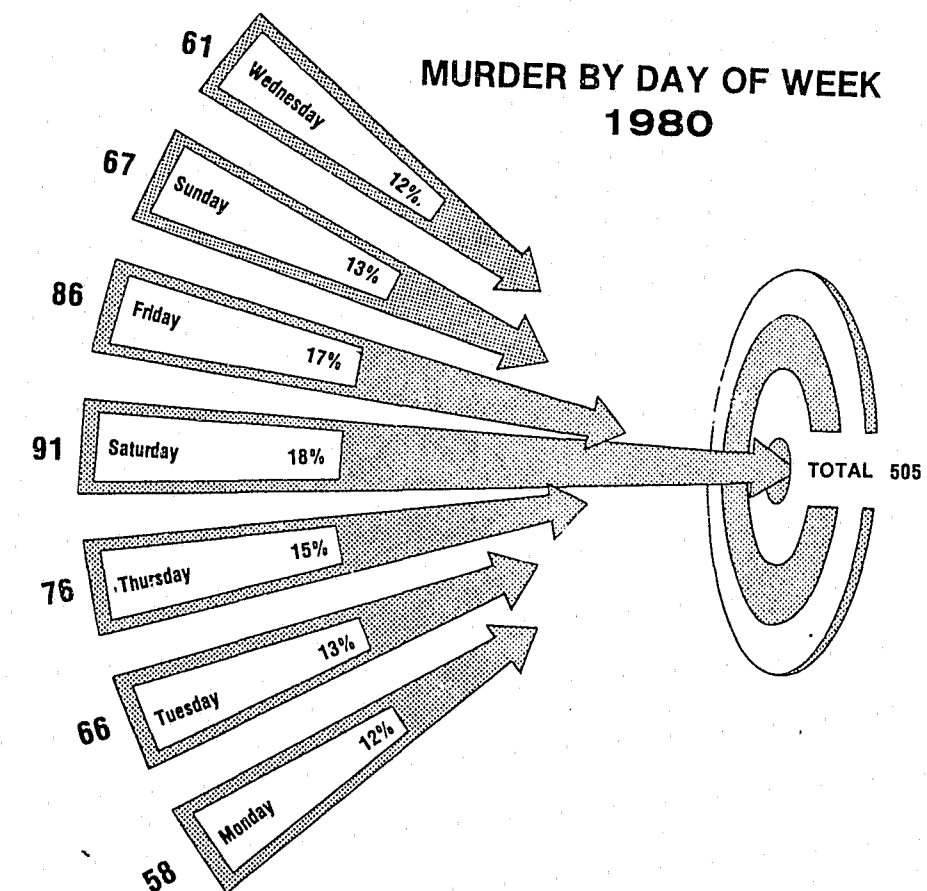

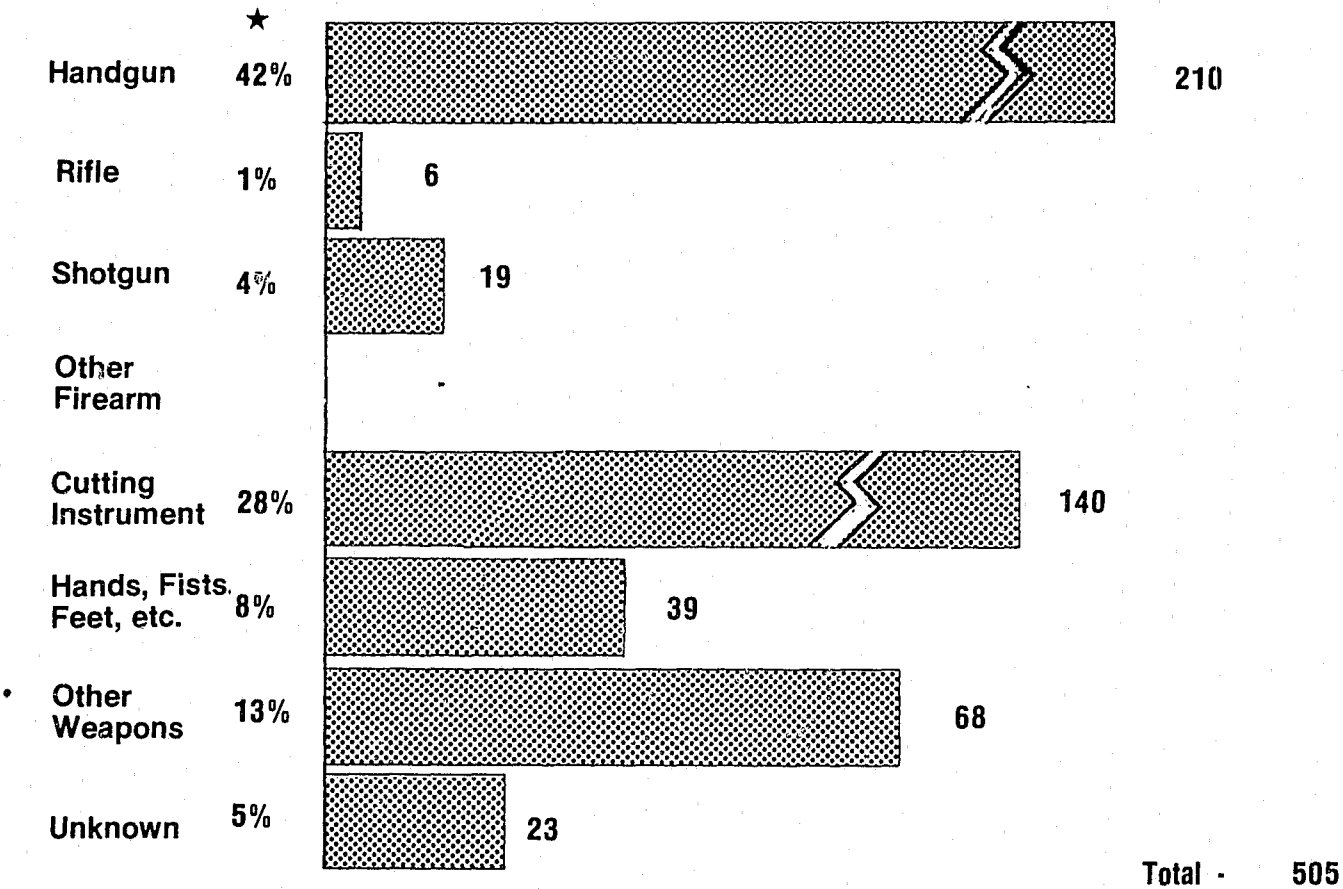

- August and June recorded the highest number of murders, with 59 and 52 respectively, February was the lowest reported with twenty-nine offenses (29).
- Murder by day of week disclosed Saturday was the highest day of occurrence, with 91 offenses.
- The age group 20-34 accounted for 40 percent of all murder victims.
- Fifty-one percent of murder victims were negro, 49 percent were white, and 74 percent of the victims were male.

- Firearms were used in 47 percent of all reported murders. Cutting or stabbing instruments accounted for 28 percent; other weapons, i.e., clubs, hammers, poison, arson, etc., accounted for 13 percent, and physical force, such as hands, fists and feet were used in the remaining 8 percent of the murder offenses.

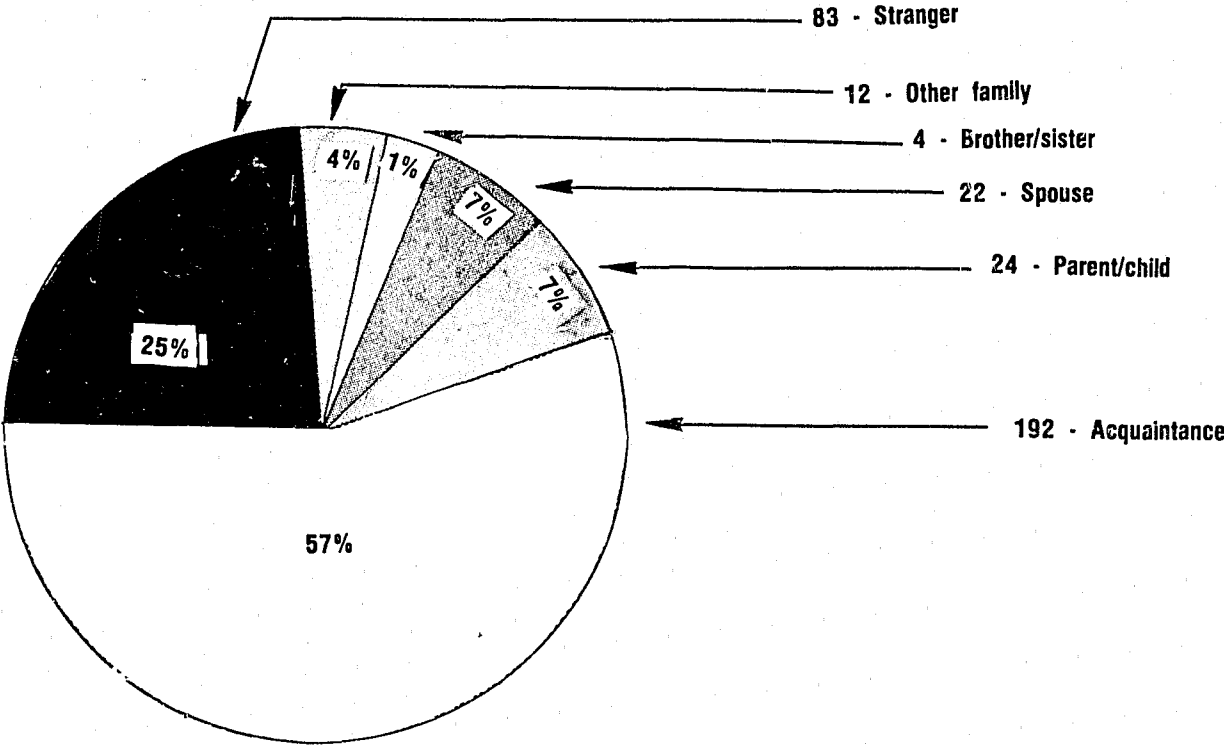
MURDER — Distribution by Type of Weapon

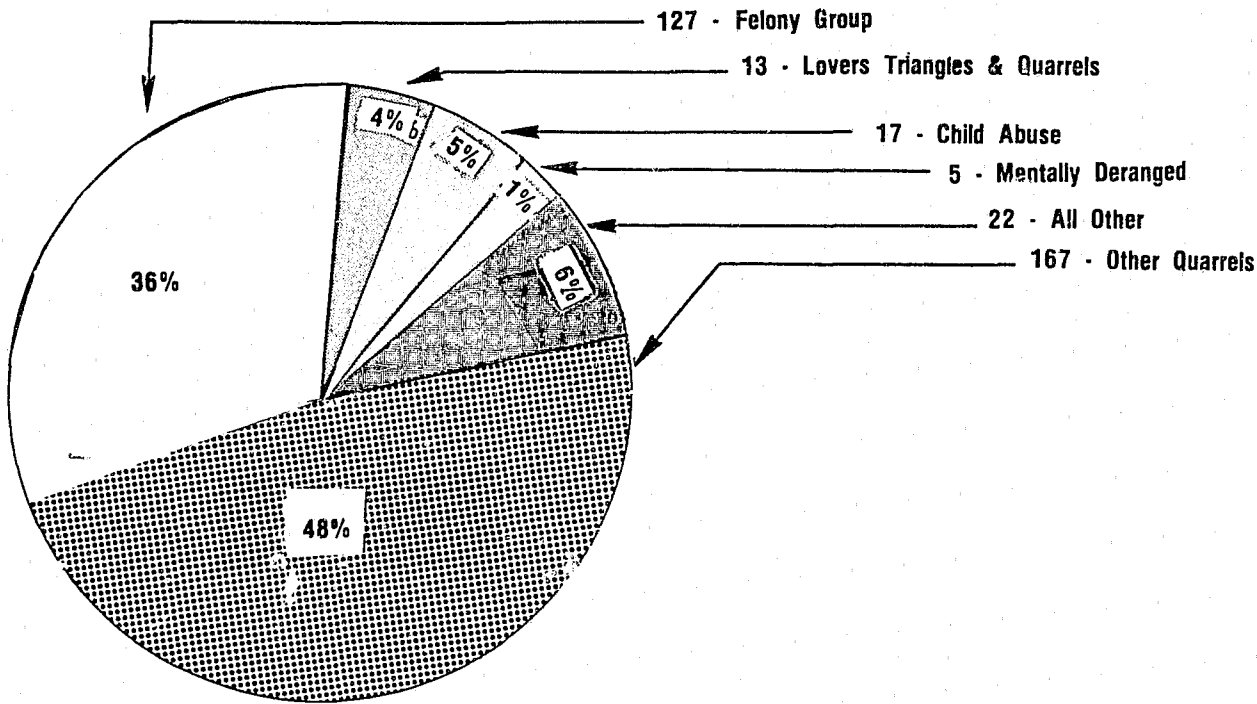
- Forty-three percent of the reported murders occurred in private residences, 33 percent on highways or streets, and 7 percent in commercial houses.

- Altercations and quarrels between victims and perpetrators continue to account for most murders, 48 percent this year.
- Felony murders account for 36 percent of all reported murders, with robbery identified as the motive in 24 percent of these offenses. This is the highest since 1974.
- The total value of property stolen resulting from all murders, amounts to \$29,925.00

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 434 persons were arrested for murder during 1980, a 9 percent increase over 1979.
- Adult murder arrests increased 5 percent (from 358 to 376), and juvenile arrests increased 45 percent (from 40 to 58).

FORCIBLE RAPE

Forcible Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to tape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

1980 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 2,260 forcible rapes reported in New Jersey during 1980. This represents a 13 percent increase over 1979.
- Forcible rape accounted for one-half of one percent of the total crime Index and 5 percent of all violent crimes.
- For every 1,000 persons in the state, there were .3 forcible rape victims. When calculated on the estimated 1978 female population, the forcible rape rate increases to .6 per 1,000 females.

ROBBERY

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting his in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included. Effective January 1, 1974, the robbery subheadings were changed from armed and strong arm, to robbery by firearm, knife or cutting instruments, other dangerous weapon and strong arm (hands, fists, feet, etc.)

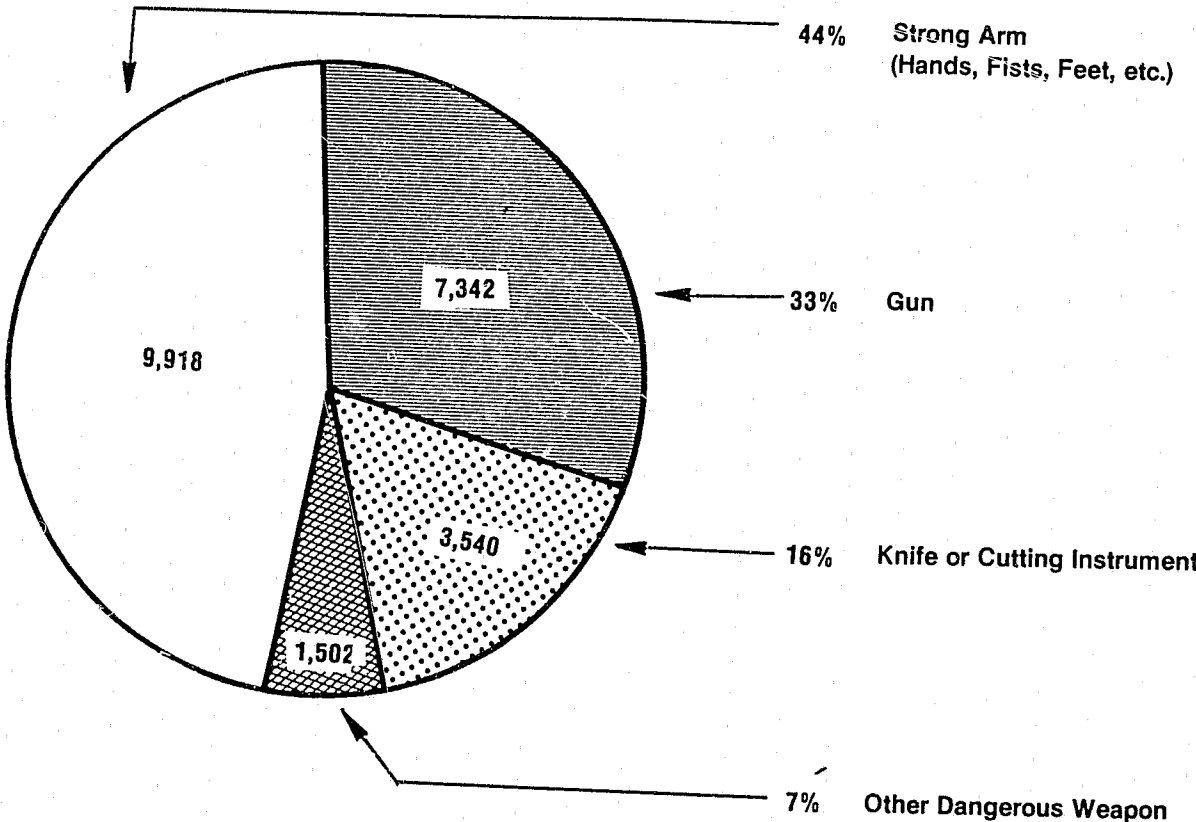

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 5,437 persons were arrested for robbery during 1980, a 17 percent increase over 1979.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Aggravated Assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt to offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

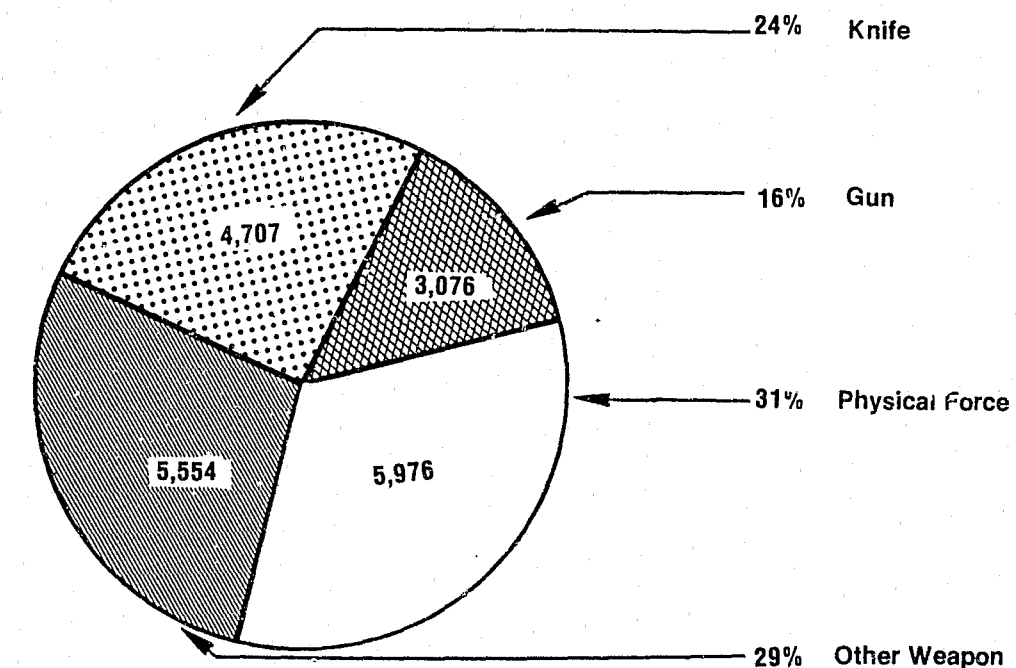

BURGLARY

LARCENY-THEFT

The definition of Larceny-Theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are not included.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

In Uniform Crime Reporting, Motor Vehicle Theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as a family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.).

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 53,581 motor vehicles stolen in 1980, a 5 percent increase when compared to 1979. This represents the highest number of Motor Vehicle Thefts reported and continues the upward trend from 1976.
- Motor Vehicle Theft accounted for 11 percent of the total Crime Index and 13 percent of the nonviolent crimes.
- The Motor Vehicle Theft rate increased to 7.3 victims per 1,000 population, which is a 6 percent increase over 1979.

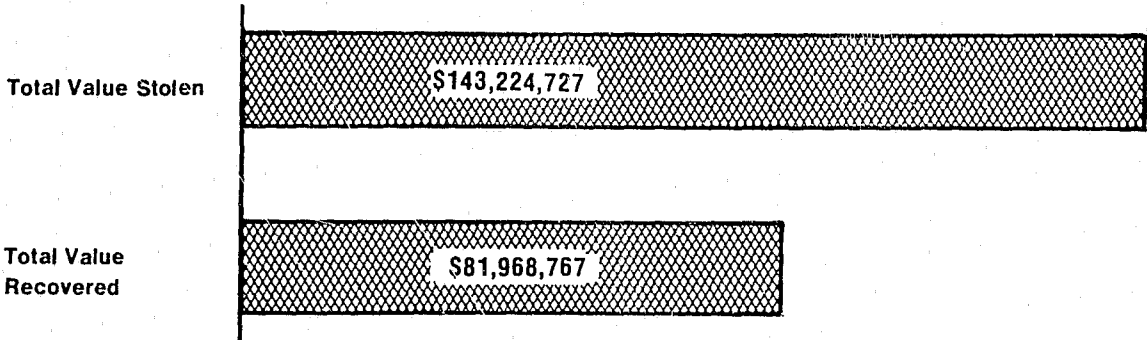

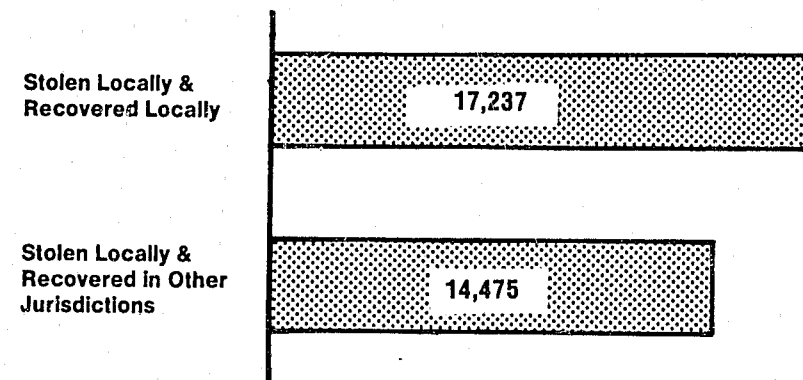

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

ARSON

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

BACKGROUND

Arson was designated a UCR Part I Crime Index offense by congressional mandate in October, 1978.

Since the Crime Index is based on actual offenses known to law enforcement, it was determined that only data on fires established through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set, including attempts, were to be counted. Unknown origin or suspicious fires were to be excluded from the offense counts until authorities definitely determined them to be arsons.

It also was recognized that Arson offenses frequently occur in conjunction with other Index crimes, i.e., burglary. To ensure that all arsons are reported to the System, an exclusion to the Uniform Crime Reporting hierarchy procedure was established. Regardless of their occurrence with other crimes, all arsons were to be reported.

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 5,861 Arsons reported in 1980, (this is the first reportable year for arson data).
- The Arson rate is .8 victims per 1,000 population.

PART II — ARREST SUMMARY

OTHER ASSAULTS (NOT AGGRAVATED)

Other Assaults, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, are assaults or attempted assaults which are not of an aggravated nature and do not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 31,856 Simple Assault arrests during the year, representing a 7 percent decrease when compared to 1979.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 9 percent, and accounted for 28 percent of the Simple Assault arrests.
- Adult assault arrests decreased 6 percent and represented 72 percent of the total arrests for assault.
- Males accounted for 83 percent, and females 17 percent of the persons arrested for assault.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested were white, and 29 percent were black.

ARSON

Under this Program, Arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building or any building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 879 arrests reported for Arson offenses, a 5 percent increase over 1979.
- Juveniles accounted for 57 percent and adults 43 percent of persons arrested for Arson.
- Males were arrested in 90 percent of the cases, and females in 10 percent.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

The definition of Forgery and Counterfeiting, is the making, altering, uttering, or possessing or attempts to make, alter, utter or possess with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 1,147 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for Forgery or Counterfeiting during the year. This represents a decrease of 33 percent.
- Adults accounted for 86 percent and juveniles 14 percent of the arrests.
- Males were arrested in 72 percent of the cases, and females 28 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, and 39 percent were black.

FRAUD

In Uniform Crime Reporting, Fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 7,970 arrests reported during the year for Fraud, a 3 percent decrease over 1979.
- Adult arrests represented 95 percent and juveniles 5 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males were arrested in 59 percent of the cases, and females 41 percent.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white and 31 percent were black.

EMBEZZLEMENT

The definition of Embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property in trust to one's custody or control.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 173 persons arrested for Embezzlement; a 55 percent decrease over 1979.
- Ninety percent of the arrests were that of adults, and 10 percent were juveniles.
- Males were arrested in 80 percent of the cases, and females 20 percent.
- Sixty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 33 percent were black.

STOLEN PROPERTY — BUYING, RECEIVING, POSSESSING

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- In 1980 there were 10,532 arrests made for stolen property—an increase of 7 percent over 1979.
- Of the total, 61 percent were adults, and 39 percent were juveniles.
- Ninety-one percent were males, and 9 percent were females.
- Fifty-six percent were white, 44 percent were black.

MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Malicious Mischief, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is the willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 15,341 arrests made for Malicious Mischief, a decrease of 5 percent over 1979.
- Juveniles accounted for 66 percent, and adults 34 percent of persons arrested for Malicious Mischief.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 78 percent of the Malicious Mischief arrests.
- Males were arrested in 91 percent of the cases, and females 9 percent.
- Eighty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, and 19 percent were black.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, ETC.

Under this program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers and attempts.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 7,449 arrests reported for Weapons offenses, a 16 percent increase compared to 1979.
- Of the total, 74 percent were adults, and 26 percent were juveniles.
- Males were arrested in 94 percent of the cases, and females 6 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons were white, 38 percent were black, and 1 percent were of other races.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

The definition of Prostitution and Commercialized Vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 762 arrests recorded during the year—for Prostitution and Commercialized Vice—a 10 percent increase from arrests reported in 1979.
- Ninety-three percent of the arrests were adults, while juveniles were arrested in 7 percent of the cases.
- Females were arrested in 69 percent of the cases, and males 31 percent.
- Blacks were arrested in 65 percent of the cases, whites in 35 percent.

SEX OFFENSES

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, does not include forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 1,765 sex offense arrests during the year, representing a decrease of 1 percent when compared to 1979.
- Adults accounted for 69 percent and juveniles 31 percent of the arrests.
- Males were arrested in 97 percent of the cases, and females 3 percent.
- Seventy-five percent of the persons arrested were white, and 25 percent were black.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

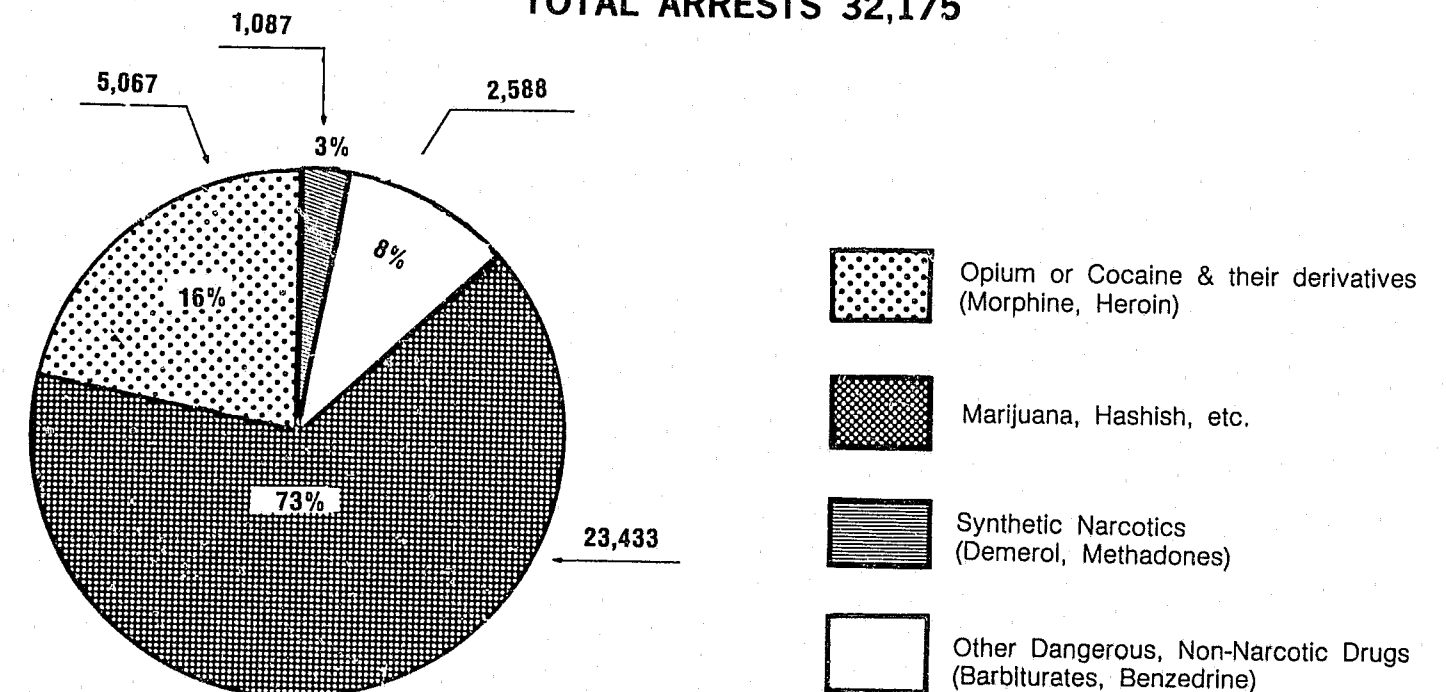
Under this program, Drug Abuse Violations are defined as the unlawful Sale/Manufacturing, Possession/Use of the below listed narcotics and drugs.

- Opium or Cocaine and their Derivatives (Morphine, Heroin, Codeine)
- Marijuana, Hashish, etc.
- Synthetic Narcotics - Manufactured Narcotics which can cause true drug addiction - (Demerol, Methadones)
- Other - Dangerous Non-narcotic Drugs (Barbiturates, Amphetamines, Hallucinogens).

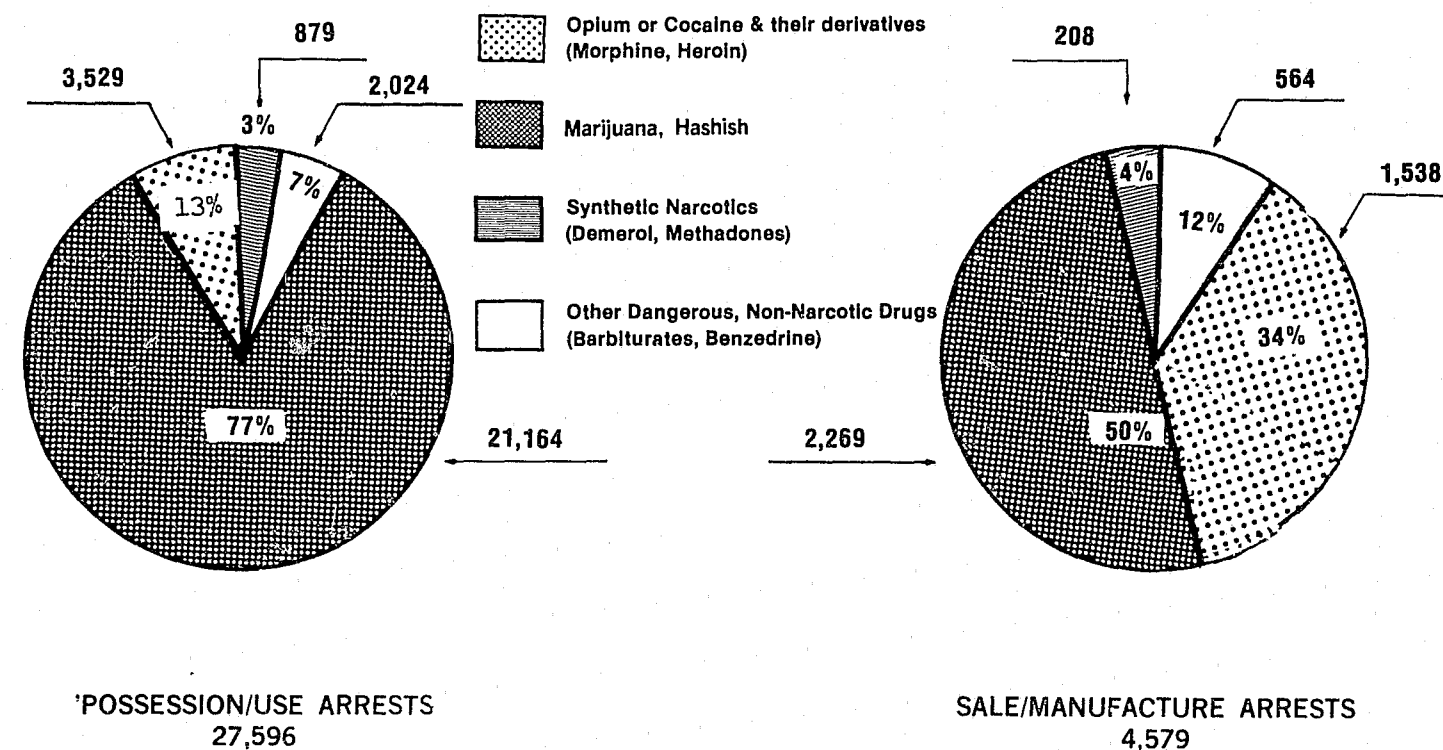
1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 32,175 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for Drug Abuse Violations, a 9 percent increase compared to 1979.
- Adults accounted for 73 percent of the arrests, and juveniles 27 percent.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 53 percent of the drug abuse arrests.
- Males registered 86 percent of the arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 14 percent.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, and 28 percent were black.
- Arrests for Possession/Use of drugs accounted for 86 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 14 percent were for the Sale/Manufacture of drugs.
- Marijuana/Hashish arrests represented 77 percent of the Possession/Use arrests, and 50 percent of the Sale/Manufacture arrests. Overall, they accounted for 73 percent of the total Drug Abuse Violation arrests.
- Arrests for the Sale/Manufacture of drugs increased 30 percent as compared to 1979.

1980 ANALYSIS OF DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS TOTAL ARRESTS 32,175



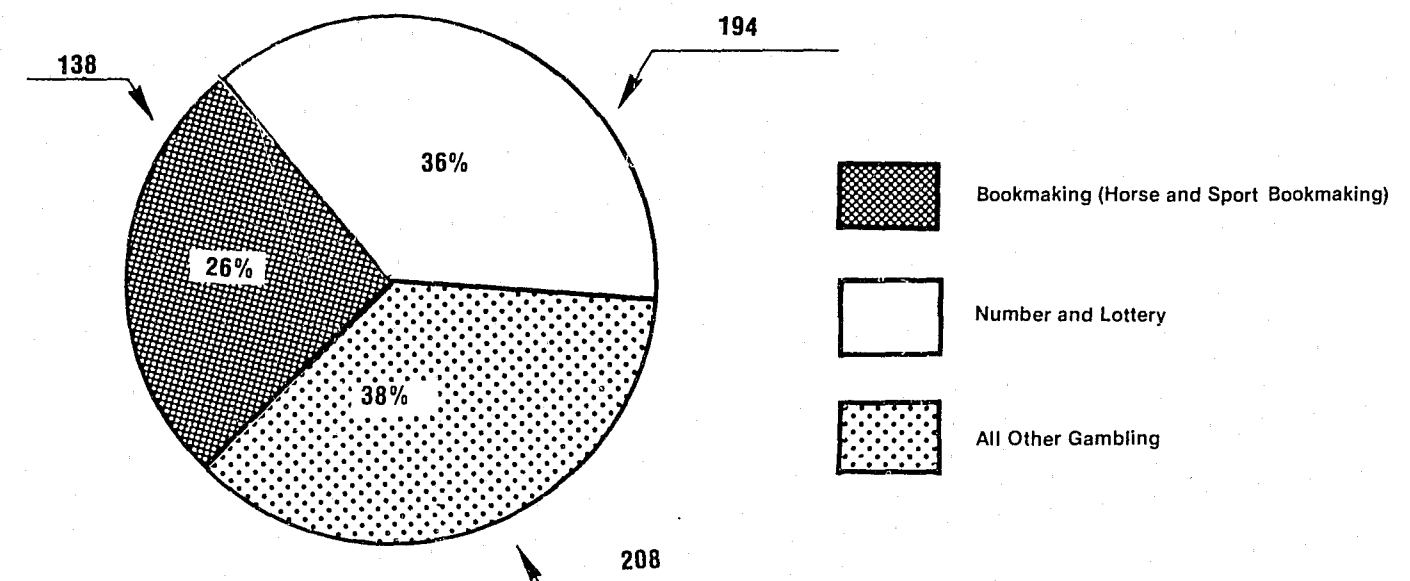
GAMBLING

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 540 gambling arrests reported during 1980, resulting in a 39 percent decrease compared to 1979.
- Ninety-seven percent of arrests were adults, and 3 percent were juveniles.
- Males were arrested in 83 percent of the cases, and females 17 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested for gambling were white, and 39 percent were black.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

The definition of Offenses Against Family and Children, is the non-support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 3,572 arrests made for Offenses Against Family and Children during 1980, representing an increase of 10 percent from the previous year.
- All arrests for this offense were that of adults.
- Males were arrested in 92 percent of the cases, and females the remaining 8 percent.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 41 percent were black.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of Driving Under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of narcotics.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 30,603 arrests reported for Driving Under the Influence during 1980, a trend increase of 18 percent.
- Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were that of adults, and only 2 percent were of juveniles.
- Arrests of persons under the age of 21 increased 15 percent as compared to the previous year.
- Males registered 90 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 10 percent.
- Eighty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white and 11 percent were black.

LIQUOR LAWS

Included in this class are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "Driving Under the Influence." Federal violations are excluded.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 8,866 arrests recorded for Liquor Law Violations; an increase of 2 percent over the previous year.
- Juveniles were responsible for 60 percent of the arrests, while the remaining 40 percent were attributed to adults.
- Males were arrested in 82 percent of the Liquor Law Violations cases, and females were involved in the other 18 percent.
- Ninety-five percent of the persons arrested were white, and 5 percent were black.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

In this class are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace—(Disorderly Persons).

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 41,832 disorderly conduct arrests made in 1980, an increase of 3 percent over 1979.
- Sixty-three percent of the arrests were adults, while juveniles were arrested in 37 percent of the cases.
- Males were arrested in 84 percent of the cases, and females 16 percent.
- White persons were arrested in 79 percent of the arrests, and 21 percent were black.

FAILURE TO GIVE GOOD ACCOUNT

In this class are placed all charges of vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 712 arrests in this area during the year; a 53 percent decrease as compared to 1979.
- Adults were arrested in 66 percent of the cases, and juveniles the remaining 34 percent.
- Males were arrested in 81 percent of the cases, and females 19 percent.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 31 percent were black.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Included in this class are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 61,477 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1980, resulting in a 10 percent increase over 1979.
- Adults were identified in 69 percent of the cases, and juveniles 31 percent.
- Males accounted for 84 percent of the arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 16 percent.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

In this class are placed all offenses relating to juveniles of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 2,914 arrests reported for Curfew and Loitering Law Violations during the year. This represents a 5 percent decrease over 1979.
- Males were arrested in 77 percent of the cases, and females 23 percent.
- Ninety-two percent of the persons arrested were white, and 8 percent were black.

RUNAWAYS

For UCR purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes as runaways.

1980 ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 7,023 arrests for this offense reported during the year, resulting in a 1 percent increase compared with 1979.
- Females were arrested in 58 percent of the cases, and males 42 percent.
- Seventy-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 21 percent were black.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 14,625 persons arrested during the year, an 18 percent increase when compared to 1979.
- Adult arrests increased 25 percent, and juvenile arrests increased 3 percent.
- Seventeen percent of all Index Crimes were solved during 1980 and 27 percent of those cases solved were cleared by the arrest of juveniles.

BERGEN COUNTY 1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 42,389 Index offenses reported in Bergen County during 1980, revealing a 9 percent increase when compared to 1979.
- The Crime Rate per 1,000 population was 50.2, an increase of 12 percent.
- Violent crimes increased 17 percent and Nonviolent crime rose 9 percent.
- Burglary and Larceny accounted for 85 percent of the county's serious crime.
- Seventy-three percent of the reported burglaries were of private residences, mostly committed during daytime hours.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Police of the county made 21,521 arrests during 1980, reflecting a 4 percent rise over the previous year.
- Adult arrests registered an increase of 12 percent, while juvenile arrests were down 6 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 23 percent; and juveniles were responsible for 50 percent of those cases solved.

PASSAIC COUNTY 1980 Summary Analysis

OFFENSES BY POPULATION GROUPS

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

CRIME IN THE CITIES

CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section will deal with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent twenty (20) percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period (1971-1980) and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis have been categorized as Urban municipalities, (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) To be classified as Urban character and (2) Have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the Urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings. Group number one consisted of the State's six largest Urban centers with populations of 85,000 or over and categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional Urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and referred to as the Urban Municipalities.

CRIME IN THE CITIES

SUMMARY

Distribution

- Six major Urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 13 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same Urban centers, during the period 1971 through 1980 accounted for 24 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers, from 1971 through 1980, accounted for 51 percent of all Violent crime and 21 percent of the Nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 Urban municipalities represent 21 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1971 through 1980, these "15" Urban municipalities accounted for 33 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 61 percent of all Violent crime, and 30 percent of the state's Nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported, occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

The accompanying Table reflects the percent distribution of major Urban and "Urban Fifteen" crime within the state for the years 1971-1980.

Percent Change

During this period, New Jersey's Crime Index paralleled the upward trend that was reflected at the national level, recording a 62 percent increase for the years 1971-1980.

Although the crime trends in the "Urban Fifteen" did not increase as rapidly as recorded statewide, the increases however, were quite significant.

- Statewide Crime Index spiraled to a 62 percent increase from 1971 through 1980.
- The "Urban 15" registered a 38 percent increase in the Crime Index from 1971-1980.
- The total Crime Index for the six "Major Urban" cities registered a 25 percent increase during the ten year period.
- The state's Violent crime recorded a 68 percent increase during the ten year period.
- Violent crime in the "Urban 15" increased 51 percent and Nonviolent crime was up 36 percent during this same ten year span.
- Nonviolent crime recorded an increase of 62 percent in New Jersey during this ten year span.
- The Major six Urban cities recorded a 41 percent increase in Violent crime and an 21 percent increase in Nonviolent crime during the period.

The accompanying Table reflects percent changes in the state's "Major Urban," and the 15 Urban Municipalities Crime Index for the years 1971-1980.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for "street crime" within the Criminal Justice System. The nation's Clearing House for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more, this "media term" has often been confused with the Violent Crime group of Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the streets, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, larceny from autos, larceny of auto parts and accessories, larceny of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the Violent crime group.

SUMMARY

- Street crime increased 26 percent between 1971-1980.
- Nearly 8 out of every 10 highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- Over half of all motor vehicle thefts, during the survey span, occurred in these 15 Urban Municipalities.
- Fifty-five of all purse snatching was perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, and distribution are discussed in this Section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables following the narrative portion of this Section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in the section entitled "New Jersey Demographic Section."

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be a subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The Tables and Charts shown in this Section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

- During 1980 there were 33,437 police employees employed full-time by police agencies in New Jersey. This represents a 2 percent increase over 1979.
- Seventy-five percent or 25,089 were sworn officers. The 8,348 civilian employees accounted for the remaining 25%.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

The number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME/RATE

- During 1980, 19,823 municipal police employees were employed full-time, which is less than a one half of one percent increase compared to 1979.
- There were 2.7 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state.

- Atlantic County recorded the largest numerical increase (66 employees), up 8% from the 817 reported in 1979 to 883 in 1980.
- Essex County decreased eight percent during the year, from 2,931 employees, to 2,700 police employees in 1980.
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate, 4.7 per 1,000 inhabitants. (This rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County (1.4), Warren County (1.5), and Sussex County (1.4) located in the rural northwest portion of the state, recorded the lowest police employee rates.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. This current trend in employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties, is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

- There were 2,826 civilian police employees in 1980 resulting in a 4% increase compared to 1979.
- Fourteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

The number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 16,997 full-time municipal police officers reported in 1980, a decrease of one percent over the 17,107 in 1978.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers for each 1,000 persons in the state was recorded at 2.3; no change since 1974.
- Eighty-six percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.

- The largest numerical increase was reported in Atlantic County; up 45 sworn officers.
- Essex County reported the largest decrease of police officers, down 236 sworn officers.
- Counties reporting the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers per 1,000 inhabitants during 1980 were: Atlantic 3.6, Cape May 3.3 and Hudson 3.4.
- The smallest number per 1,000 inhabitants were found in Sussex 1.1, Hunterdon 1.2, Warren and Salem 1.3.

The police employee rates per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal populations, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement officers vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county. County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutor's officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

- The various county law enforcement agencies reported a total of 5,195 full-time police employees for 1980, a 1 percent decrease over 1979.
- There were 3,608 sworn full-time police officers employed by county agencies, 69 percent of the total county police employees.
- Full-time civilian employees were reported at 1,587, 31 percent of the total county police employees.

STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services, to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

- The New Jersey State Police reported a total of 3,294 full-time police employees during the year, a 7 percent increase over 1979.
- There were 2,094 sworn police officers employed during 1980, 64 percent of the total state police employees.
- Thirty-six percent, or 1,200 employees were civilian personnel.

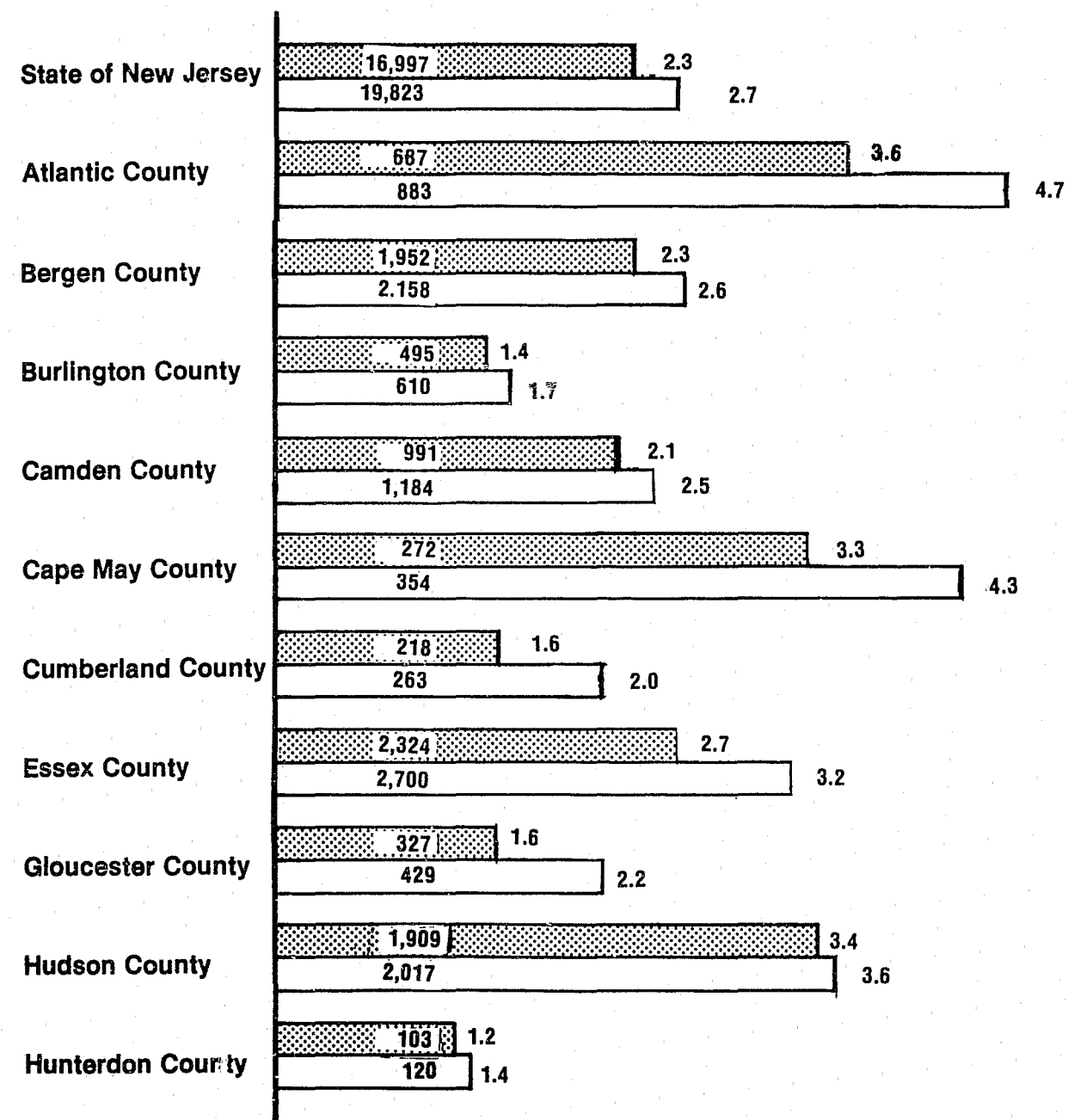
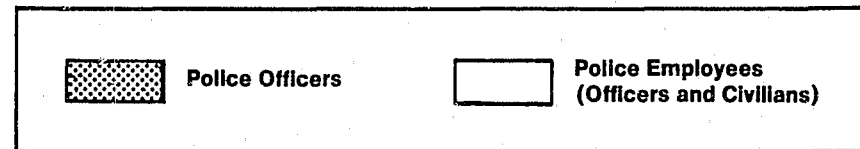

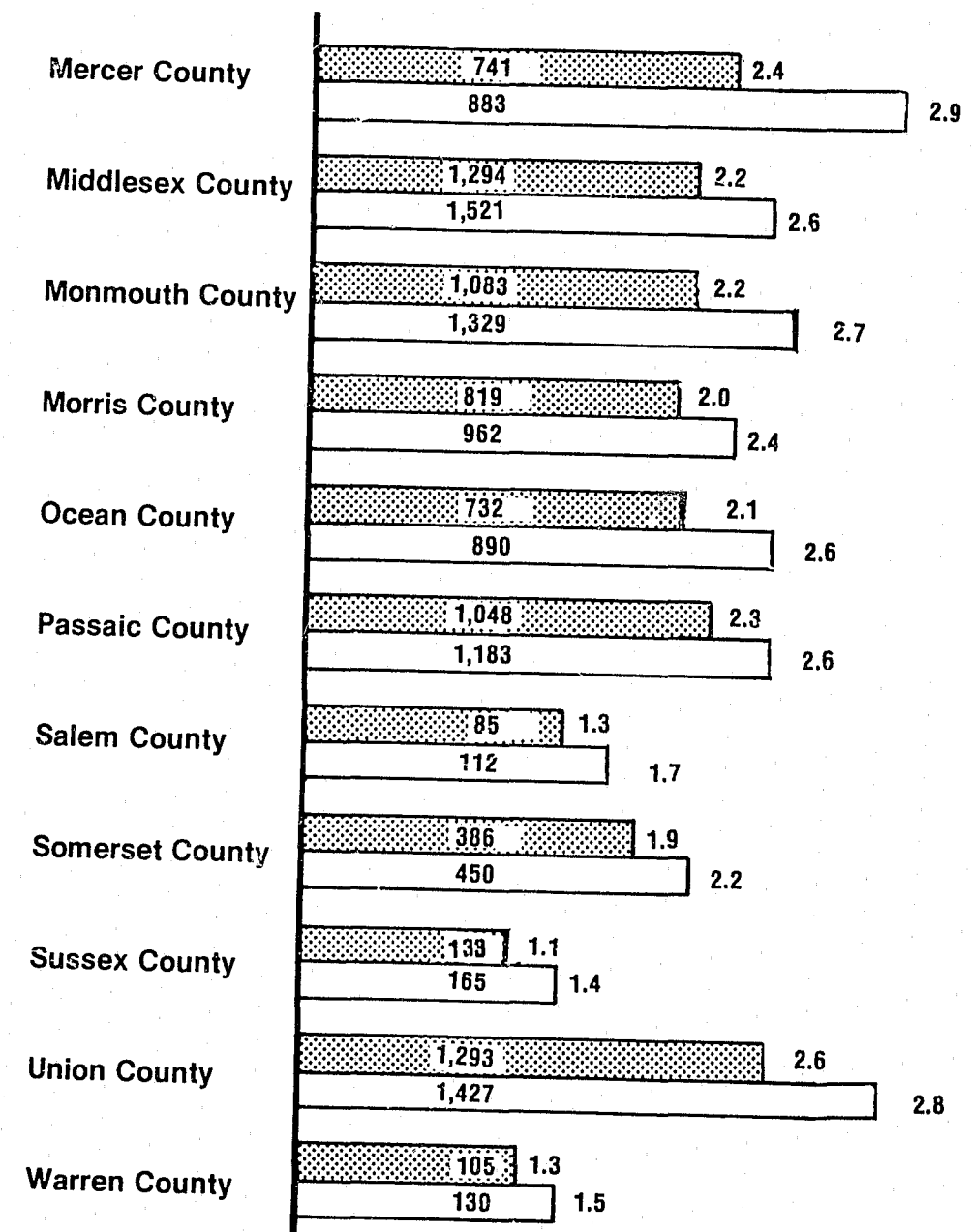
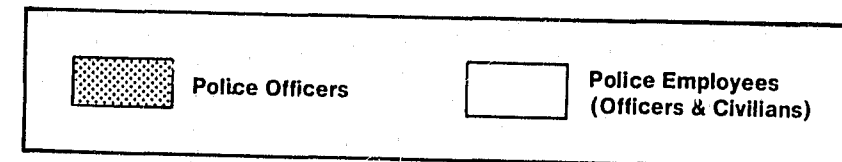

SUMMARY

Police Officers Killed and Assaulted

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and a serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED 1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

- During 1980, one N.J. police officer was killed as a result of criminal action.
- The police officer was killed by the use of a firearm.
- Law enforcement cleared this police killing.
- This is the third time one police officer has been killed during the one year period since statewide crime statistics began in 1967.
- Since 1967, thirty-four police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.
- On Nov. 28, 1980, a patrolman with Newark P.D. was killed with a .38 calibre handgun. The officer was shot and killed while attempting to thwart the armed robbery of a bank in Newark, N.J.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place, it is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

- There were 4,279 police officers assaulted in New Jersey during the year 1980, a one per-cent decrease over the previous year.
- This is the second year police assaults have decreased in the state.

- No assault rates are computed for total police officers assaulted, because of the broad field of services performed by many state and county policy agencies.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS 1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 3,950 municipal police officers assaulted, a three percent decrease compared to 1979
- Thirty one percent or 1,214 officers sustained physical injury to one degree or another.
- The assault rate for every 100 municipal police officers. reached 23.2 assaults; a decrease of three percent when compared to 1979.

OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following state and county law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately, and are not included when computing municipal assault rates. The services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies, and therefore should be considered within the municipal grouping.

1980 Summary Analysis

VOLUME

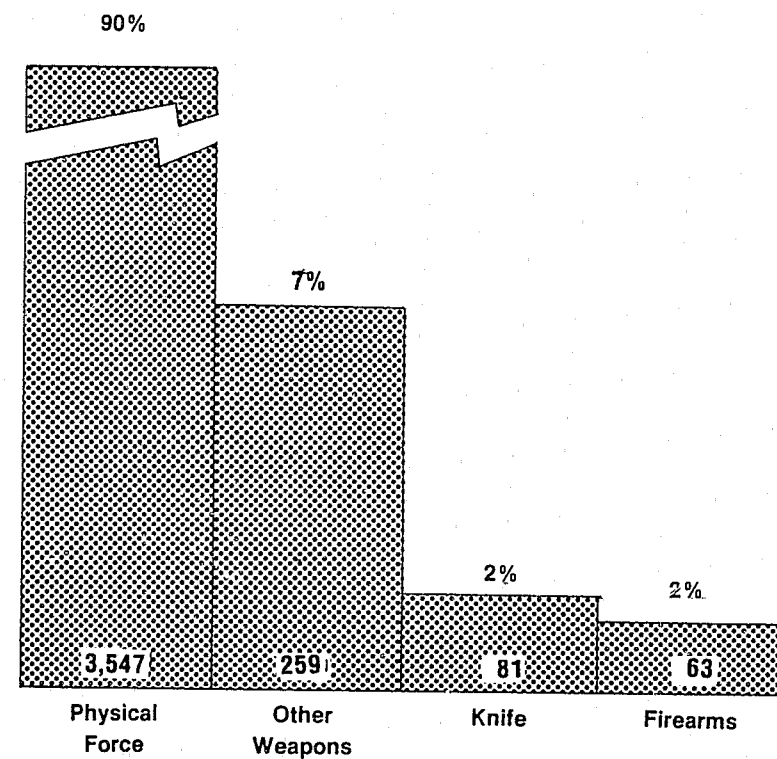
- County law enforcement agencies reported 171 officers assaulted, of these 49 sustained physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 93 troopers assaulted, 24 of whom were injured.
- Other state agencies with police powers, reported a total of 65 officers assaulted and 60 sustained injury.

WEAPONS USED

- Personal weapons, such as hands, fist and feet were used in 90 percent of all police assaults.

Total Police Assaults - 3,950

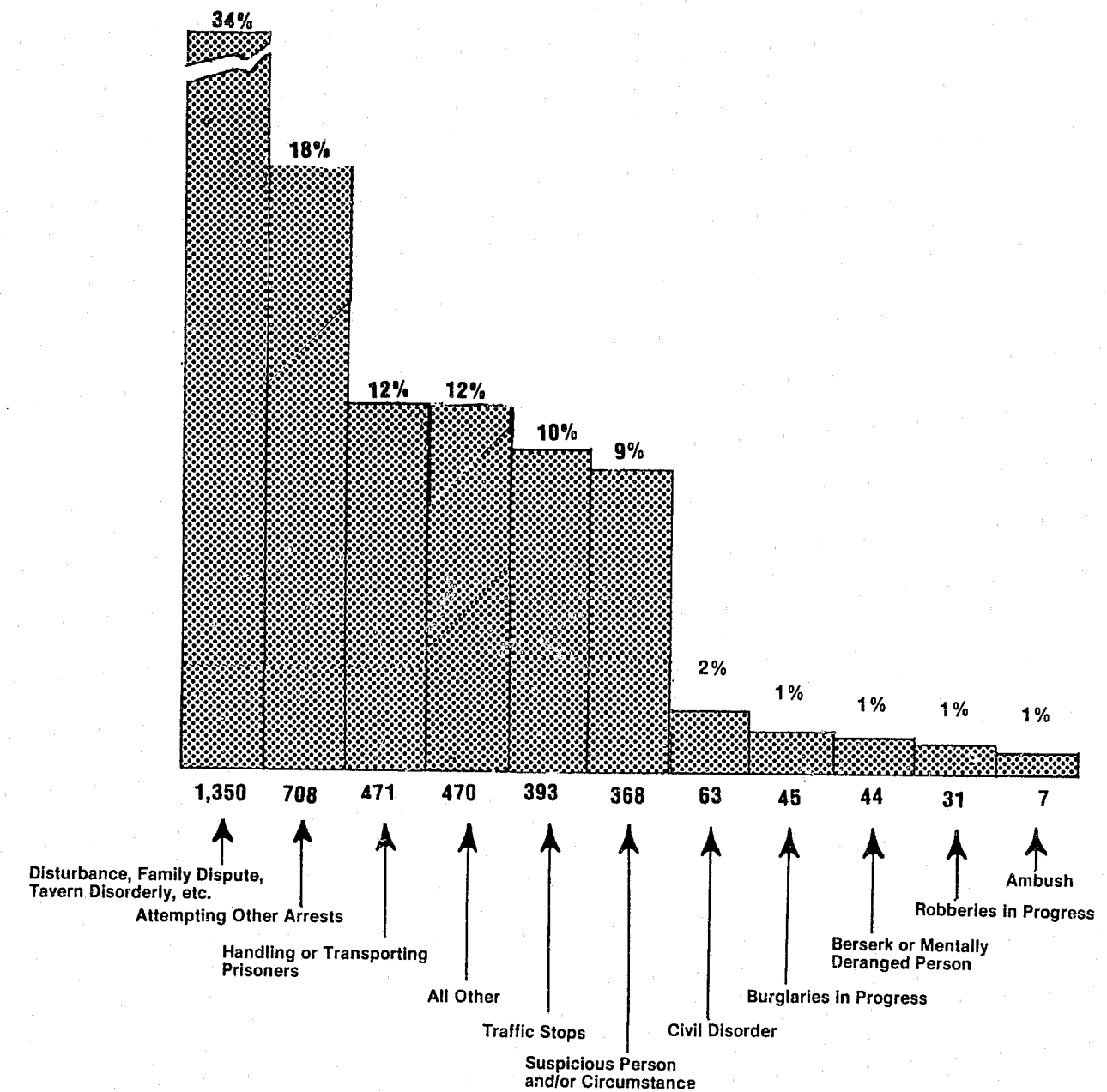

TYPE OF ACTIVITY

- Thirty-four percent of police assaults occurred when officers were responding to disturbance calls.
- Officers attempting other arrests accounted for 18 percent of the police assaults.

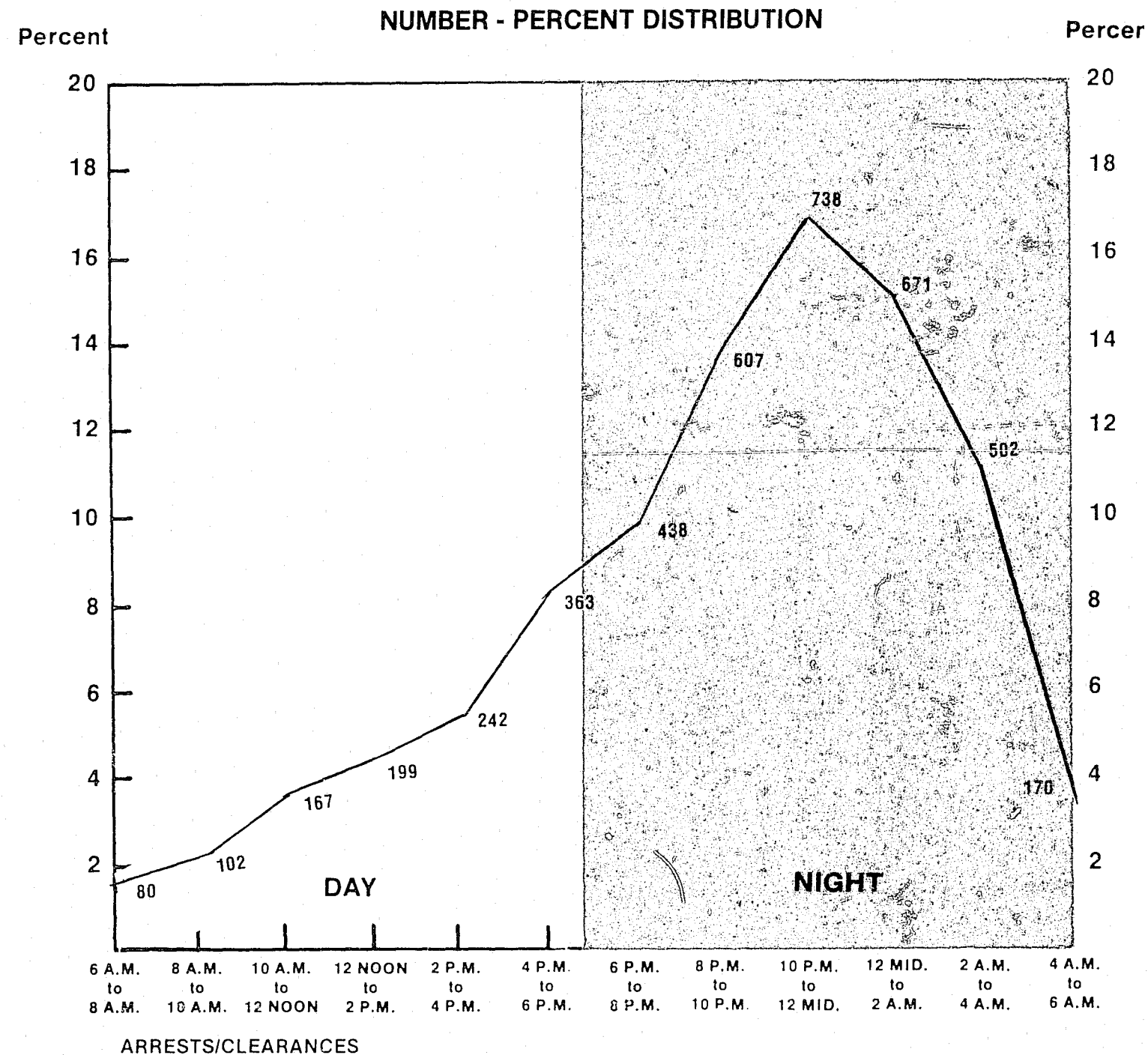
POLICE ASSAULTED BY TYPE OF ACTIVITY — 1980



TIME OF POLICE ASSAULTS

- The four hour period of 8:00 p.m. to Midnight accounted for over 31 percent of the assaults on police officers.
- Fifty-nine percent of the police assaults occurred during the eight hour period between 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS BY HOUR OF DAY



- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing by arrest 99 percent of the assaults directed at them
- Thirty-nine percent of those arrested for police assaults were charged with an indictable offense and the remainder were charged with the lesser non-indictable offense
- Juveniles accounted for 9 percent of those arrested for assaults on police officers

POLICE OFFICER ASSAULTED SCENARIO

A municipal Police Officer is assaulted by an individual using physical force between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m.; the officer is answering a disturbance call and the offender will be arrested in 99 percent of the cases.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
ALL OTHER RACE	For UCR purposes, applies to Filipinos, Hawaiians, Eskimos, Aleuts, Koreans, Asian Indians and Malaysians.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000. Arrest rates are computed in the same manner as crime rates.
CLEARANCE	For UCR purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For UCR purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft. These offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population, per 1,000. Crime rates are computed by dividing the number of Index offenses by the population of the community and multiplying the answer by 1,000. Example: 500 Index offenses divided by 10,000 population \times 1,000 = 50.0 Crime Rate.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Forcible Rape, and Aggravated Assault.
CRIME AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft.
DAY	For UCR purposes, the hours from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For UCR purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
FELONY MURDERS	Those killings which are perpetrated during the commission of another crime. They are classified as Rapes, Robberies, Sex Offenses, Aggravated Assault, Arson, and other felonious activities.
HIERARCHY RULE	For UCR purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given. This offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
INDIAN RACE	For UCR purposes, applies to the American Indian.
JUVENILE	For UCR purposes, a person under the age of 18.

JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
NIGHT	For UCR purposes, the hours from 6 P.M. to 6 A.M.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-Theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft.
OTHER DANGEROUS WEAPON	For UCR, includes assaults resulting from the use of any object or thing as a weapon which does or could result in serious injury.
PART I OFFENSES	The first of two main categories of crime classes composing a Universal Crime Classification System established for crime reporting purposes. Murder, Manslaughter, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft, make up the Part I offenses. These crimes are by their very nature more serious and/or occur more frequently. The monthly tabulation of Part I offenses provides a count of "offenses known."
PART II OFFENSES	The second of two main categories of crime classes composing a Universal Crime Classification System established for crime reporting purposes. Part II offenses are generally less serious in nature.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault.

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
