


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

To the People of the State of Nebraska:

Once again it is my pleasure as Chief Justice of Nebraska, on behalf of myself and the entire Supreme Court, to greet all of the citizens of the State of Nebraska. As we have in past years, we have again prepared this annual report so that you may have information concerning the judicial system of Nebraska. An examination of the report should disclose that the problem of handling the volume of cases coming before the Court continues.

In an effort to meet those continuing problems, the Court is examining a number of possible solutions, including the matter of redistricting, establishing preargument conferences, and instituting other administrative devices which will reduce the volume without affecting the citizen's right to have his/her disputes resolved both quickly and fairly.

Another matter of extreme concern to the Court, as well as to the public, is the matter of crime in our communities. The problem continues to grow and it is apparent to those of us involved in the handling of criminal matters that we need to begin designing new and better solutions to the problem. Merely turning to slogans such as "harsher sentences" or "faster disposition" is not the answer. We must be prepared to properly analyze the problem and design the solutions. These solutions may require us to make commitments of substantial dollars and we should understand the problem if we are to make those commitments. The Court is aware of both the serious problem and its obligation to solving that problem and we will during the current year be addressing that matter.

It is now apparent to us, however, that if any of these problems are to be met it will require the joint cooperation of the courts, the lawyers, and the citizens. Your suggestions in the past have been most helpful to us in attempting to meet our task and we continue to look forward to hearing from you in the coming year.

NEBRASKA JUDICIAL SYSTEM

Nebraska's Constitution vests the judicial power of the state in a Supreme Court, district courts, county courts, and such other courts inferior to the Supreme Court as may be created by law. In addition to the courts created by the Constitution, the Legislature has provided for three other types of courts — municipal courts in Lincoln and Omaha, separate juvenile courts in Lancaster, Douglas, and Sarpy counties, and a Workmen's Compensation Court.

Amendments to the judicial article of the Constitution in 1970 gave the Supreme Court general administrative authority over all the courts, permitted the appointment of a state court administrator, removed the constitutional basis for justices of the peace, and permitted the unification of courts of limited jurisdiction.

The Legislature reacted promptly to those constitutional changes, enacting legislation in 1972 which abolished the justice of the peace and local police magistrate courts and merged their functions into a reorganized county court system, effective January 4, 1973.

The Supreme Court established the Office of the State Court Administrator on July 1, 1972, to implement the new county court system and to assist in the added administrative responsibilities vested in the court by the 1970 constitutional amendments.

The merit system, sometimes called the Missouri plan, is used for the selection and retention of all judges. When a vacancy occurs, a bipartisan judicial nominating commission submits the names of two or more qualified applicants to the Governor, who makes the appointment to fill the vacancy.

The bipartisan judicial nominating commission consists of eight members: four lawyers selected by the Nebraska State Bar Association and four nonlawyers appointed by the governor. All members of the commission must reside in the district where the vacancy is to be filled. In addition, the bipartisan commission must not have more than two lawyer members from each political party or two nonlawyer members from each political party.

The new judge runs for retention in office at the first general election occurring more than three years after his/her appointment. Thereafter, the terms are for six years.

When a judge runs for retention in office, the question posed to the voters on the ballot reads, "Shall Judge _____ be retained in office?" If more than 50 percent of the voters indicate that the judge not be retained, the judge is removed and a vacancy occurs.

The merit system was adopted by constitutional amendment in 1962. It originally applied to the selection of judges to the Supreme and district courts. Subsequently, it was extended to all other judges by legislative action, consistent with the authority contained in the 1962 amendment.

Judges may retire at age 65, and must retire upon reaching age 72. Earlier retirement for disability may be approved by the Commission on Judicial Qualifications, which also has the responsibility of investigating complaints against judges.

A constitutional amendment adopted in 1980 provides that the Commission on Judicial Qualifications shall consist of three judges, including one district court judge, one county court judge, and one judge of any other court inferior to the Supreme Court; three members of the Nebraska State Bar Association; three lay citizens; and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court who serves as chairperson. The commission may recommend to the Supreme Court that a judge be reprimanded, disciplined, censured, or suspended for willful misconduct in office; willful disregard of or failure to perform his or her duties; habitual intemperance; conviction of a crime involving moral turpitude; disbarment as a member of the legal profession; or conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice that brings the judicial office into disrepute.

In 1981, the Nebraska Unicameral passed LB475, providing for the statutory changes required by the 1980 adopted constitutional amendment.

SUPREME COURT

While the Constitution permits original jurisdiction for the court in certain cases, primarily where the state is a party, the court's basic responsibility is appellate — as Nebraska's court of last resort.

The Constitution guarantees the right to appeal to the Supreme Court in all felony and civil cases, and legislation permits appeal to the highest court in virtually every other type of litigation. Appeals come directly to the Supreme Court from the district courts, the separate juvenile courts, the Workmen's Compensation Court, and certain regulatory agencies such as the Public Service Commission.

The court consists of a chief justice and six judges. The chief justice is appointed by the Governor from a statewide list of applicants whereas the other six judges are chosen from districts.

The court may sit in two five-member divisions, with the addition of district court judges or retired judges, when necessary for the prompt determination of cases.

Divisions may decide all cases except those involving homicide or the constitutionality of a state statute, and decisions of a division may be reviewed by the full court. During 1980 the court sat in divisions on nine days and heard a total of 90 cases.

Since 1920 the Supreme Court has had the constitutional authority to "promulgate rules of practice and procedure for all courts, uniform as to each class of courts, and not in conflict with laws governing such matters."

Until recent years, however, exercise of the rule-making authority had been limited, although the court had appointed committees to develop pattern jury instructions and new rules of evidence, the latter being adopted by the 1975 Legislature.

The constitutional amendment of 1970, giving the Supreme Court general administrative authority over all the courts, coupled with the previously established authority to promulgate uniform rules of practice and procedure, has led to increased exercise of that authority by the court.

The Supreme Court is also responsible for the regulation of the practice of law in Nebraska. This responsibility includes the monitoring and appointment of members to serve on local committees of inquiry, as well as the Advisory Committee, a state committee on discipline and professional responsibility.

In addition, the Supreme Court handles the admission of applicants to the Nebraska State Bar Association as practicing attorneys.

COURT STRUCTURE AND PROCESS OF APPEAL



Supreme Court Caseload


While the Supreme Court's administrative responsibilities have increased, so to has its caseload.

In an 11-year period the court's caseload has risen from 322 cases docketed in 1969 to 741 cases in 1980. See the table below for an 11-year caseload comparison.

Case filings in Nebraska during the past 20 years have increased from slightly over 200 filings in 1961 to a projected 900 filings in 1981. The above graph shows the steady growth of case filings from 1961 when Supreme Court Judge Leslie Boslaugh, the longest serving member of the Court, took his oath of office to 1979, when Governor J. James Exon appointed Supreme Court Judge William Hastings. Cases filed with the Clerk of the Supreme Court in 1980 totaled 741; approximately 900 appeals are expected to be filed in 1981.

With the appointment of a new chief justice in 1978 came additional efforts to reduce the backlog. In 1979 the court began sitting regularly in two five-member divisions. The court is considering the implementation of an expanded summary docket in which certain cases would be decided without oral argument and in unpublished memorandum opinion. The settlement conference, a voluntary procedure wherein attorneys for a case may agree to appear before a retired judge in attempt to settle the case, began as an experiment in 1979 and continued during 1980. As of March, 1981, the point at which the conference became mandatory for certain types of cases, 215 cases had been processed through this procedure. Of those, 108 were settled, and 107 were returned to the regular Supreme Court Docket.

DISTRICT COURTS

The district court is a trial court of general jurisdiction, but also functions as an intermediate appellate court in deciding certain appeals from the county and municipal courts and from various administrative agencies.

There are 47 district court judges. The district courts of Nebraska are organized into 21 judicial districts which serve all 93 counties.

The district courts try all felony cases and some misdemeanor cases, but more misdemeanor cases are tried in the county and municipal courts. All civil cases involving more than \$5,000 are tried by district courts, as well as some cases involving lesser amounts.

A large percentage of district court filings are domestic relations cases. In addition to the new filings, reopened cases resulting from legislation requiring court clerks to audit all cases where child support is involved make domestic relations cases more than half of the total volume.

Most appeals from the county and municipal courts, which account for more than half of the appellate volume, are decided by a judge of the district court solely on the record.

In 1980, the Nebraska Unicameral changed the appeal procedure in all but small claims cases to require the appeal to be heard on the record by the district judge. In small claims cases, the appeal is heard anew in the district court.

Detailed tables of district court activity are listed on pages 12 through 18 of the Appendix.

COUNTY COURTS

Before reorganization enacted by the 1972 Legislature and implemented on January 4, 1973, each of Nebraska's 93 counties had a county judge, the majority of whom had no legal training. In addition, there were several hundred justices of the peace and local magistrates, almost none of whom had legal training.

The reorganized system abolished the justice of the peace and police magistrate courts and merged their functions into the county court system. County court jurisdiction was increased and qualifications were established for judges and other court personnel.

The county court system is organized into 21 judicial districts, coinciding with the district court judicial districts. Each county has a county court, and in some counties divisions operate at locations other than at the county seat. The districts range in size from one to nine counties, with one to three judges for each district. The 44 county court judges are all required by law to be lawyers.

In addition, at least one associate judge has been appointed in each county, who, in most cases, also serves as clerk of the county court. The associate county judge is primarily responsible for clerical and administrative, rather than judicial, matters. Most are not lawyers, but they are required to attend annual training institutes under the direction of the Supreme Court.

Additional associate judges may be appointed by the county court judges for the district when required by the volume of cases. Salaries of associate judges are set by the appointing judges, subject to a statutory maximum of three-fourths of the salary of a county court judge and subject to approval by the Supreme Court.

The county courts have exclusive original jurisdiction in all probate, guardianship, conservatorship, adoption, and eminent domain cases. They have concurrent jurisdiction with the district courts in misdemeanor cases arising under state law, but virtually all misdemeanor cases are tried in the county courts. The jurisdictional limit of the county courts in civil cases is \$5,000. While this is exercised concurrently with the district courts, the majority of cases involving less than \$5,000 are filed in the county courts.

Except in Nebraska's two largest cities — Omaha and Lincoln — the county courts also have exclusive original jurisdiction in cases involving violations of municipal ordinances. Except in those cities and in Sarpy County, the county courts also have exclusive original jurisdiction in juvenile matters.

All preliminary hearings in felony cases are held in the county courts, except in Omaha. In Omaha, the municipal court conducts most of the preliminary hearings.

Since Nebraska rarely uses grand jury indictments, the preliminary hearing is used to determine whether there is probable cause to believe that a crime has been committed, and that the accused committed it.

County court filings increased steadily since the court system was reorganized, totaling 291,843 in 1979. Court filings decreased somewhat in 1980, totaling 283,196. Detailed tables of county court case activity are listed on pages 19 through 27 of the Appendix.

SEPARATE JUVENILE COURTS

Nebraska has three separate juvenile courts, located in Sarpy, Douglas and Lancaster counties. The remaining 90 Nebraska counties hear juvenile matters in their respective county courts.

Nebraska law permits separate juvenile courts to be created, with the approval of the voters, in any county with more than 30,000 population.

In 1980 the juvenile caseloads of Lancaster and Douglas counties increased, while the caseload in Sarpy County decrease moderately. Sarpy County experienced a decrease in petitions filed, from 409 in 1979 as compared with 391 in 1980. Douglas County petitions filed in 1980 increased to 955 as compared with 851 in 1979. Lancaster County had an increase in petitions filed, from 388 in 1979 to 557 in 1980.

The separate juvenile courts have the same jurisdiction and employ the same procedures as the county courts sitting as juvenile courts in other counties, except that appeals for the separate juvenile courts go directly to the Supreme Court. Douglas County has two judges; Lancaster and Sarpy counties each has one. The judges are selected and retained under the merit plan.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Nebraska has two municipal courts — one in Lincoln and one in Omaha. A state statute requires each city of the metropolitan and primary classes to maintain a municipal court.

Municipal courts have exclusive jurisdiction in cases involving the violation of city ordinances of their respective cities. They have concurrent jurisdiction with the county courts in civil cases, including small claims, and in criminal and traffic cases arising under state law.

As a matter of policy, felony preliminary hearings are heard in the Omaha municipal court but not in the Lincoln municipal court. State Patrol traffic cases are filed in the Lincoln municipal court but not in the Omaha municipal court.

While the two municipal courts are financed entirely by the respective cities, they are subject to the administrative authority of the Supreme Court, their judges' salaries are set by state law, and the judges are selected and retained under the merit plan.

Total case filings in the Lincoln municipal court in 1980 decreased 13 percent over 1979, from 56,609 to 49,062. Case filings in the Omaha municipal court for the same period decreased 5.7 percent, from 96,609 to 91,105.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION COURT

The Nebraska Workmen's Compensation Court has authority to administer and enforce all provisions of the Nebraska Workmen's Compensation Act, which includes original jurisdiction of all claims for workmen's compensation benefits resulting from occupational injuries or illnesses. All industrial accidents are required to be reported to this court.

The court consists of five judges, one of whom is elected by them as presiding judge. Compensation court judges have statewide jurisdiction and travel to all parts of the state to hold hearings in county seats.

All disputed claims for workmen's compensation are submitted to the Workmen's Compensation Court for finding, award, order, or judgment. One judge of the court hears all disputed cases in the first instance, and all cases on rehearing are heard before three judges sitting en banc. Appeals from the judgment of the compensation court after a rehearing go directly to the Supreme Court.

OFFICE OF THE STATE COURT ADMINISTRATOR

Creation of the Office of the State Court Administrator was authorized by Nebraska voters in 1970 when they approved amendments revising the judicial article of the Constitution. Among the revisions was the adoption of the following provision:

In accordance with rules established by the Supreme Court and not in conflict with other provisions of this Constitution and laws governing such matters, general administrative authority over all courts in this state shall be exercised by the Chief Justice. The Chief Justice shall be the executive head of the courts and may appoint an administrative director thereof.

When the 1972 Legislature adopted Legislative Bill 1032, establishing the new county court system and giving the Supreme Court responsibility for its implementation, Chief Justice Paul W. White appointed James E. Dunleavy as Nebraska's first state court administrator, effective July 1, 1972.

In October 1979 Dunleavy resigned his position after seven more years of service. Chief Justice Norman Krivosha appointed Joseph C. Steele as state court administrator.

The Office of the State Court Administrator is an adjunct to the Supreme Court, assisting the court and the chief justice in the exercise of their administrative duties.

During the early years of its operation, the court administrator's office concentrated almost exclusively on implementing the reorganization of the county court system. With the new system in operation, the office turned to projects assisting the courts in case processing and records management, and the development of a statistical reporting system for both the county and district courts. A uniform accounting system has been implemented for all county courts, along with improved in-service training programs for court personnel.

Ongoing responsibilities of the office include development, presentation, and management of the courts' budgets; review of all legislation for impact on the courts; providing information to the public; developing and presenting judicial education programs; assisting in the development of improved court facilities throughout the state, and assisting in the development of caseload management systems.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

JUDICIAL EXPENDITURES

The financing of Nebraska's courts is a mixed state and local responsibility. This makes it difficult to determine exact expenditures for the operation of all of the courts of the state. The court administrator's office has sought information from individual courts and has reviewed county budgets on file in the Office of the State Auditor.

From this effort, it is obvious that counties employ a variety of budgeting methods. Some appear to include capital expenditures within the operating budgets of the clerks of the district court. Others appear to include probation expenses within county court budgets. But not all counties do one or more of these things.

This year the court administrator's office attempted to identify some of the local costs that are judicial services to the county rather than specific district court or county court expenditures.

JUDICIAL APPROPRIATIONS

Less than two percent of the total state budget is allocated to the judicial branch. The Supreme Court and the Workmen's Compensation Court are entirely state financed.

The county court system is approximately 90 percent state financed, the state paying all personnel costs, including travel, and expenses associated with tape recording equipment. Counties are responsible for providing office supplies, equipment, and facilities.

Salaries and expenses of the district court judges and separate juvenile court judges and their court reporters are paid by the state. Counties are responsible for other operating costs of the district and separate juvenile courts, including clerical personnel.

The Omaha and Lincoln municipal courts are financed entirely by the respective cities.

Operation of the statewide probation system is the statutory responsibility of the Nebraska Probation Systems Committee. This committee is comprised of district and county judges, and members of the field probation service. The system serves both the district and county courts. Probation staffs of the separate juvenile courts in Douglas, Lancaster, and Sarpy counties are paid by the counties.

DISTRIBUTION OF COURT-GENERATED REVENUE

Fees and cost collected by the Supreme Court, the county courts, and the Workmen's Compensation Court are deposited in the State General Fund. Counties receive fees and costs collected by the district courts, and the cities of Lincoln and Omaha retain the fees and costs from the municipal courts.

Nebraska's Constitution prescribes the distribution of fines collected by the courts, with most of the money being distributed to school districts. Fines resulting from truck overload violations are split between the state highway fund (75 percent) and the general fund of the county in which the violation occurs (25 percent).

The courts collect a \$1 fee in each civil and criminal case for the judges retirement fund, and a fee based on the value of the estate in probate cases. In all criminal and traffic cases in which there is a conviction, the courts collect a \$1 fee for the Law Enforcement Improvement Fund, which supports the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Academy.

The table on page 8 summarizes the distribution of court-generated revenue for calendar 1980.

The Nebraska Supreme Court has adopted guidelines to aid judges of Nebraska courts in determining when, if at all, a court proceeding should be closed to the public, in whole or in part.

The guidelines stipulate that all proceedings will be open to the public except where the voluntariness of a confession may be seriously disputed or when the defendant is seeking to suppress evidence allegedly obtained illegally.

Chief Justice Norman Krivosha noted that the guidelines were formulated on the general principle that all trials and proceedings are to be open to the public, except if there is a substantial likelihood that by permitting a portion of the proceeding to remain open, the defendant will be denied a fair trial, and there are no other reasonable alternatives available to protect against such substantial and adverse effect.

The guidelines were proposed by a subcommittee of judges, which had gathered input from the media and bar association. The subcommittee included Krivosha, District Judges Theodore Richling of Omaha, Merritt Warren of Creighton, and County Judges Robert Camp of Lincoln, and Richard DeBacker of Grand Island (Judge DeBacker has since been named District Judge for the 10th Judicial District).

VALLEY HOPE HONORS JUDGES

In November, 1980, the Valley Hope Association presented to the judges of the state its Humanitarian Service Award for their pioneering achievements as participants in the nation's first judicial alcohol and drug in-patient training program.

Nebraska judges have been participating in a training program designed to help them better understand the problems of the individual addicted to alcohol and drugs. All of the Nebraska judges were invited to voluntarily attend a one-week training session at the Valley Hope Treatment Centers in Norton, Kansas, and O'Neill, Nebraska. The Valley Hope Treatment Centers are dedicated to the rehabilitation of patients chemically dependent upon alcohol and drugs.

Throughout 1980, in nine separate sessions, a number of judges, three to seven at a time, spent five days and nights with the patients at the treatment centers. Approximately 60 percent of all Nebraska judges have now attended the program. The judges were identified to the patients as outsiders and observers. At the same time, they were invited and expected to participate in group discussions. They attended and participated in group therapy sessions, attended the lectures, met with the treatment staff, ate their meals with the patients, and generally interacted with them in an effort to develop a more sensitive understanding of their problems.

The program originated in 1979 when Robert Keller, state probation administrator, and Dr. William Leopold, director of Valley Hope, designed the program for the state's probation officers. The program was so well-received by the probation officers that it was expanded to include the state's judiciary.

Supreme Court Chief Justice Norman Krivosha, who attended one of the nine sessions, said that the program was designed to accomplish three objectives. First, the seminars helped the judges understand the disease of alcoholism. Second, they helped the judges understand the limitations of an alcoholic so that the judge would not impose requirements on a defendant which would insure failure. And finally, the judges learned what rehabilitation programs are available and the kinds of treatment that are effective for those with chemical dependency problems.

Nearly all of the 69 judges who participated in the program reported that it was a very worthwhile experience. Typical of their comments:

"It was probably one of the best training sessions I have attended since graduation from law school."

"I would recommend that all judges who can possibly attend this program do so. They will have a much better understanding of how to help people with chemical problems."

"This is a tremendous program. I would sincerely urge all judges to attend. It was very beneficial to me."

"It is an excellent program and one which every judge in the state should attend. As a matter of fact, I am not sure that it shouldn't be attended by every citizen in the State of Nebraska."

"This session taught me that there is always a chance that treatment will take and one should not give up even after many tries."

The seminars were funded by the Nebraska Highway Safety Program through a federal grant administered by the state court administrator. Continuation of the funding for 1981 has been obtained for those judges that were previously unable to attend and want to do so in the upcoming year. Future plans are being formulated to include this session in the new judges' orientation programs.

EXPERIMENT BECOMES MANDATORY IN DOMESTIC RELATIONS, TORT APPEALS

The Nebraska Supreme Court's Settlement Conference, which began as an experiment in 1979, has been expanded and made a mandatory step in domestic relations and tort appeals. All other civil appeals may go to the Prehearing Conference on a voluntary basis.

The Prehearing Conference gives the parties an opportunity to settle the case or at least narrow the issues before the case reaches the full Supreme Court for argument.

During the period beginning April 1, 1979 to and including Dec. 31, 1980, 201 conferences were held before the Honorable Harry Spencer, a retired member of the Supreme Court. As a result of those conferences, 90 cases were settled and removed from the court docket prior to argument.

Presently staffed by Spencer and retired District Judge Herbert Ronin, the procedure requires that meetings to settle a domestic relations or tort cases be held with the attorneys and the conference officer within 20 days after the filing of the notice of appeal and before either a transcript or Bill of Exceptions is prepared.

If the case is not settled, attempts are made to narrow the issues and to agree on the Bill of Exceptions, reducing the size of the Bill of Exceptions so it contains only that evidence necessary for a determination of appeal. Such efforts are intended to reduce the cost of litigation and the amount of paper the court must handle in deciding the case.

If the conference efforts are unsuccessful in settling the case, the prehearing conference officer recommends to the court whether the appeal can be disposed of with or without oral argument, and if a formal opinion should be written or simply a notice of decision made.

STUDIES EXAMINE PROCEDURES, RULES

The Nebraska Supreme Court has requested several judges to chair committees to study litigation processes and costs and the structure of the bar discipline procedures.

Supreme Court Judge William Hastings and his committee of district, county, and municipal judges, are examining time periods of the litigation process. The committee will recommend to the court rules that can be adopted whereby once a case is filed, it must be brought to issue within a specific period of time unless otherwise permitted for a good cause.

District Judge Dale Fahrbruch, chairman of the Supreme Court Committee on Procedures, is studying procedural changes that might reduce costs and delay of litigation.

A Supreme Court report stated that these changes "would involve things such as limiting the number of interrogatories which could be filed without permission of the court, and eliminating the current motion pleading practice and adopting a system more in line with the Federal practice."

In a third study recommendation, Supreme Court Judge C. Thomas White and his subcommittee, in cooperation with the Nebraska State Bar Association, is re-examining the overall structure of the bar discipline procedures.

"The subcommittee will recommend to the Supreme Court, what, if any, changes should be made in the procedure for handling complaints filed against lawyers," said the report. "Some revisions are required to insure that, on the one hand, a lawyer falsely accused may be exonerated without delay, while on the other hand, a valid complaint is promptly handled."

COURT EXPERIMENTS WITH CAMERAS IN COURTROOM

The Nebraska Supreme Court has been experimenting with cameras in the courtroom. Last October the Nebraska Educational Television (NETV) and the University of Nebraska's radio station taped the Supreme Court hearing arguments at Creighton University Law School. Upon the rendering of the decisions in the cases heard during the taping, an educational program will be developed for broadcast on the NETV network.

Chief Justice Norman Krivosha noted that this was an experimental project for the purpose of producing educational material on the workings of the Supreme Court for viewing by the general public. He also added that the taping will help determine some of the technical problems of having a camera in the appellate court during argument.

The Court Administrator's Office is conducting a study of cameras in courtrooms, examining the experiences in the other states which have allowed cameras in their courtrooms. Findings will be submitted to the Supreme Court for further consideration.

JUDGES RECEIVE 167 ASSIGNMENTS

During 1980, 26 of Nebraska's 44 county judges were assigned to judicial districts outside of their home districts, according to figures compiled by the State Court Administrator's Office.

Nebraska Statute 24-516 authorizes the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court to assign judges to other districts for purposes beneficial to the administration of justice or "in the event of a vacancy in the office of the county judge, or the disqualification, absence or the temporary incapacity of a county judge."



A total of 167 judicial assignments were made in 1980, covering 225 working days in which county judges received assignments. State Court Administrator Joe C. Steele said that approximately 50 of those days included assignments on a standby basis to cover for vacancies, illnesses and vacations, however no actual appearances in the assigned counties were made.

Statistics indicate that of the approximate 175 days of actual appearance, the most frequently assigned county judges were: Judge Clarence C. Kunc of Wilber, 32 days; Judge Thomas Dorwart of Sidney, 25 days; and Judge John Icenogle of Kearney, 12 days.




