FOREWORD

A review of the data compiled in this report shows that crime in Indian country is less than that shown for previous years. There may be a number of reasons for this. I want to continue to impress on all concerned, that the data collection and the maintenance of accurate records and reports is an extremely vital function and should be given top priority.

The data that you submit is the basis for making program and budgetary determination at your level and at all levels of the program.

By not keeping accurate data of the calls we respond to, of the miles we travel, the number of investigations we open and close, and the other data we must collect, we may be of a great disservice to the Indian communities.

The lack of accurate data places us in a position where we cannot measure effectively, what we do, when we do it and how it is done. This activity is the basis for funds, personnel and program resources. This data collection is the means by which we obtain the tools that we must have if we are to deal with crime in the communities we serve.

I want to thank each individual, both Tribal and Bureau, that contributed to the publication of this report. I know that each person involved in the collection of data will continue to support this program in the future.

Every officer, whether Tribal or Federal, who serves Indian communities should be extremely proud of their accomplishments in the past and I would like to personally commend every officer for his or her untiring efforts in behalf of Indian law enforcement. Keep up the good work.

In the meantime, we must continue to upgrade our capability at all levels and provide improved professional law enforcement services to the communities we serve. Hopefully, in the not too distant future, the data reflected in this report will diminish.

During Calendar Year 1981, your law enforcement organization investigated a total of 33,565 criminal offenses. Upon investigation, it was determined that 32,131 or 95.7% were actual offenses and 1,434 or 4.3% were unfounded. Of the actual offenses reported, 26,322 or 81.9% were alcohol/drug related.

During the same period, a total of 22,836 arrests for violations of the law were made by your department. A total of 137 arrests were made for Federal violations and 22,699 for Tribal, Traditional, CPR violations. A total of 16,357 adult male and 3,996 adult female arrests were made. In addition, 1,686 male juveniles and 797 female juveniles were arrested. Juvenile arrests represented 10.9% of the total arrests made.

To effect above investigations and subsequent arrests for the year, your department expended a total of 66,509 manhours. In addition to the investigations and arrests, your department made a total of 1,331 arrests for driving under the influence and arrested or issued 688 citations for reckless driving, 2,520 for moving violations, and 1,325 for other traffic violations expending a total of 7,555 manhours.

The greatest number of investigations for criminal matters took place on Saturdays between the hours of 0001 and 0059. The most reported incident that an arrest was made for during the year, was for DRUNKENNESS and it constituted 34.2% of all reported offenses.

In addition to performing duties of an enforcement nature, your department performed a total of 134,644 non-enforcement duties that required a total of 341,911 manhours.

Your department reported that PERSONAL PROPERTY valued at \$385,598, GOVERNMENT/TRIBAL PROPERTY valued at \$104,467, NATURAL OBJECTS/ARTIFACTS valued at \$150, and MOTOR VEHICLES valued at \$377,739 were stolen. Property valued at \$421,123 was recovered, the majority of this being MOTOR VEHICLES valued at \$299,144. In addition to property stolen and recovered, property valued at \$9,172 was confiscated, the majority of this being MOTOR VEHICLES valued at \$7,250.

During the same period, a total of 887 arrests for violations of the law were made by your department. A total of 1 arrest was made for Federal violations and 886 for Tribal, Traditional, CPR violations. A total of 572 adult male and 175 adult female arrests were made. 

To effect above investigations and subsequent arrests for the year, your department expended a total of 3,824 manhours. In addition to the investigations and arrests, your department made a total of 130 arrests for driving under the influence and arrested or issued 19 citations for reckless driving, 423 for moving violations, and 77 for other traffic violations expending a total of 1,036 manhours.

The greatest number of investigations for criminal matters took place on Saturdays between the hours of 2300 and 2359. The most reported incident that an arrest was made for during the year, was for DRUNKENNESS and it constituted 22.4% of all reported offenses.

In addition to performing duties of an enforcement nature, your department performed a total of 30,297 non-enforcement duties that required a total of 48,411 manhours.

During Calendar Year 1981, your law enforcement organization investigated a total of 2,061 criminal offenses. Upon investigation, it was determined that 2,026 or 98.3% were actual offenses and 35 or 1.7% were unfounded. Of the actual offenses reported, 1,008 or 49.8% were alcohol/drug related.


During the same period, a total of 1,340 arrests for violations of the law were made by your department. A total of 45 arrests were made for Federal violations and 1,295 for Tribal, Traditional, CFR violations. A total of 776 adult male and 204 adult female arrests were made. In addition, 203 male juveniles and 157 female juveniles were arrested. Juvenile arrests represented 26.9% of the total arrests made.

To effect above investigations and subsequent arrests for the year, your department expended a total of 2,212 manhours. In addition to the investigations and arrests, your department made a total of 60 arrests for driving under the influence and arrested or issued 11 citations for reckless driving, 415 for moving violations, and 230 for other traffic violations expending a total of 725 manhours.

The greatest number of investigations for criminal matters took place on Saturdays between the hours of 1600 and 1659. The most reported incident that an arrest was made for during the year, was for DRUNKENNESS and it constituted 34.8% of all reported offenses.

In addition to performing duties of an enforcement nature, your department performed a total of 1,311 non-enforcement duties that required a total of 1,975 manhours.

Your department reported that property valued at \$199,255 was stolen, the majority of this being PERSONAL PROPERTY valued at \$150,360. PERSONAL PROPERTY valued at \$30,356, GOVERNMENT/TRIBAL PROPERTY valued at \$35,520, NATURAL OBJECTS/ARTIFACTS valued at \$3,800, and MOTOR VEHICLES valued at \$2,500 were recovered. In addition to property stolen and recovered, NARCOTICS valued at \$3,800 were confiscated.






