


#### ANNUAL REPORT

#### FISCAL YEAR 1980-81

The Public Defender is required to provide legal services to persons financially unable to employ private counsel in criminal cases, in juvenile cases, and in mental health and certain civil proceedings. (See Santa Clara County Ordinance Code, Sec. A2-51; Cal. Gov. Code Sec. 22706.)

#### I. GENERAL WORKLOAD ACTIVITY

During FY 1980-81, the Public Defender received a total of 26,061 new cases. This was an increase of 9%. 2 2,447 pplicants were financially ineligible and were denied services under financial criteria approved by the Board of Supervisors. 1,037 cases were rejected due to conflicts of interest. The legal staff numbered 55.6 attorneys. The caseload averaged 471 cases per attorney. 3



<sup>2.</sup> This increase is calculated on the basis of an adjustment due to prior clerical errors in counting Special Proceedings and Mental Health cases. Prior year caseloads have been reduced to adjust for the errors.

<sup>3.</sup> The felony caseload average was 204; the misdemeanor caseload was 649; and the juvenile caseload was 625. (See Five-Year Public Defender Attorney Caseload, Appendix G.) These caseloads are substantially above the recommended state and national standards of 150 cases per felony attorney and 400 cases per attorney for misdemeanors.

Court appearances totaled 75,655, or 1,360 per attorney. Trials, hearings and motions numbered 9,844.

#### III. SPECIAL PROBLEMS:

Midyear Workload Crisis. During January, 1981, the Department experienced a severe workload crisis due to a dramatic increase in felony cases. This resulted in the need to declare "workload conflicts" in 179 cases to avoid incompetence. The Board of Supervisors responded on February 24, 1981, by granting five (5) attorney positions and two (2) legal aides. Four (4) attorneys were assigned to the felony team of the superior court, increasing the felony trial staff to 19 attorneys. One (1) new attorney was also added to the preliminary examination staff.

Reimbursement for Counsel Fees Under Penal Code §987.8.

The top goal of the Department during the fiscal year was to work with the County's Revenue and Systems Agency and the courts to improve reimbursement fees for counsel costs. Earlier, lack of referrals by the courts and failure of clients to appear for financial interviews were major problems, with less than 10% of those receiving public defender services being interviewed by the Department of Revenue. As a result of several meetings with representatives of the courts and the county, forms were revised, procedures were rewritten, and the referral process was improved. As a result, during FY 1980-81 public defender reimbursements amounted to \$38,274, exceeding the prior years by over 100%.

File Room Organization. Another major problem during 1980-81 was that the Department's file room was seriously backlogged,

disorganized and overcrowded due to our clerical staff inadequacies. Attorneys were unwilling to return files for fear that
they would be lost and unable to be retrieved. In one instance,
a misplaced file resulted in court delay and a defendant's extended incarceration which led to criticism of the Department by
an appellate court in an appeal of that defendant's case. During the year, the Department's Administrative Support Officer,
Jim Peckham, aided by a new file clerk and other clerical staff,
completely reorganized the file room, and reduced the backlog,
thereby accomplishing this vital goal.

#### IV. ACHIEVEMENTS

Jail Overcrowding Social Worker Position. The Social Worker Grade V position, authorized during 1979-80, became effective in January, 1981. This position was aimed at helping alleviate jail overcrowding by alternatives to incarceration. Unfortunately, this program had to be terminated in July, 1981, due to budget reductions. However, from January to July, 1981, our social worker succeeded in arranging early releases for a total of 45 inmates, reducing jail custody time for these inmates by about 2,245 days. At \$33 per day (the cost for custody of prisoners placed in the San Mateo facility at San Bruno), this saved the County about \$74,085 -- compared to the cost of \$12,221 for the position during that period. Accordingly, we hope that it will be possible to restore this position in the near future, particularly as it also serves the duty of counsel to develop such alternatives and obtain early releases.

Office of Traffic Safety Clerical Position. The Department was successful in obtaining a grant of \$20,690 from the California Office of Traffic Safety to employ a Clerk III during 1981 for clerical services related to the defense of 2,000 drinking driver cases. By the end of the year, 2,946 cases were actually processed. This project allowed efficient handling of the increased load of DUI cases from stepped up enforcement funded by OTS, and it allowed a separation of the Department's drinking driver calendar, improving efficiency and clerical morale.

Acquisition of Word Processing Equipment. In the Spring of 1981, the Department obtained approval from the Board of Supervisors for word processing equipment. After a careful survey, we selected a Dictaphone Dual Display Word Processor with two terminals (CRTs and keyboards), a dual disk drive, and a printer. This equipment has improved efficiency and enabled our limited stenographic staff to handle an increased load of typing. The WP is extremely versatile and has many text editing features, and has a data processing capability.




