

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Preface

The 1981 edition of *Capital Punishment* features data bearing on the continuing growth rates in the Nation's death-row population. One in a series published under the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) program, the report also gives special attention to changes in status of death penalty laws that might affect this growth.

As in past editions, it examines basic sociodemographic characteristics-sex, race, region, ethnic origin. age, marital status at time of imprisonment, and level of education. Emphasis is placed on changes in the proportions of blacks and whites among incoming, outgoing, and yearend populations. Criminal justice matters treated include legal status at the time of arrest, prior felony convictions, offense, time spent on death row, and, for prisoners removed from death row, both the method of removal and status at yearend. For the first time, respondents were asked whether State laws provided for an automatic appeal for persons receiving the death penalty.

Appendix I summarizes the current status of capital punishment and the history of death penalty laws in each jurisdiction. The data tables on which the report is based are in Appendix II. Facsimiles of the questionnaires used to obtain data from correctional and judicial authorities are in Appendix III. Appendix IV, Methodology, discusses data collection procedures and changes made in the questionnaires during the past several years.

Based on voluntary reporting, the NPS program collects and interprets data on State and Federal prisoners. Begun by the Bureau of the Census in 1926, the program was transferred to the Bureau of Prisons in 1950, the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) in 1971, and the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) late in 1979. Since 1972, the Bureau of the Census, as the collecting agent for LEAA and BJS, has had responsibility for compiling the relevant data.

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
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Introduction



A record high of 838 persons were on death row at yearend 1981, the largest group awaiting execution since a national count began in 1953 (figure 1).¹ Reflecting a net increase of 150 from yearend 1980, 228 persons received death sentences during 1981 and 78 were removed from death row. Among the latter was the one person executed during the year, an Indiana prisoner whose death in March brought to 3,863 the total number of persons executed under civil authority in the United States since 1930. The execution marked the fourth time that the death penalty had been carried out since an unofficial 10-year moratorium ended in 1977. It is likely that the death-row population will continue to climb, with the possibility of more executions, unless court decisions with wide-ranging applications remove the sentences of large numbers of capital offenders or establish stricter criteria for the imposition of the death penalty.

Legal status of the death penalty

During 1981, as in the preceding 4 years, few major court decisions on capital punishment were handed down, further evidence that existing laws were withstanding constitutional challenge as the number of persons under sentence of death mounted. Two States-Oregon and Washingtonhad their capital punishment laws overturned, while Ohio replaced its statute struck down by the U.S. Supreme Court in the Lockett case (1978). In five States-Alabama, Connecticut, Oklahoma, Texas, and Virginia-death penalty laws were revised during the year, without, however, any major change in their basic structure. At yearend, 37 jurisdictions (36 States and the Federal system) authorized the death penalty for specified crimes, relying for the most part on laws developed in response to guidelines set down in major judicial decisions of the 1970's.²

Setting new standards: Decisions in the 1970's

Around the beginning of the 1970's, all but 10 States had statutes authorizing the death penalty, invoking it on a nationwide average of 130 times a year. In that period, however, no death sentences were carried out, a reflection of an unofficial moratorium on executions stemming from strong pressures mounted by forces opposing capital punishment. Then, in the 1972 landmark case of Furman vs. Georgia, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the death penalty as applied in the various States often had been used in an arbitrary and capricious manner, thereby violating Eighth Amendment guarantees against cruel and unusual punishment. All of the more than 600 persons then living on death row eventually had their capital sentences removed. However, the numbers began to build up again as many States moved quickly to revise their capital punishment statutes to meet the objections raised by the Court in the Furman case.

New laws that emerged from State legislatures were of two types. The first sought to eliminate any chance of discriminatory treatment by making the death penalty mandatory for specified crimes, contingent solely on a finding of guilt. A second type allowed the judge or jury to go beyond the issue of guilt and consider both aggravating and mitigating circumstances when passing sentence.

Two U.S. Supreme Court decisions in 1976—Woodson vs. North Carolina and Roberts vs. Louisiana—struck down mandatory death penalty statutes. In three other cases—Gregg vs. Georgia, Proffitt vs. Florida, and Jurek vs. Texas—the Court upheld laws that incorporated the use of guided discretion, providing States with the basic guidelines for framing constitutional death penalty laws.

The U.S. Supreme Court continued to monitor the imposition of capital punishment in the late 1970's. In *Coker vs. Georgia* (1977), the Court found that rape of adult women was not grave enough to warrant a death sentence, triggering the removal of 20 persons who were awaiting execution for that crime in various States. In *Lockett vs. Ohio* (1978), the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the sentencing authority must consider every possible mitigating factor to the crime and may not be limited, as had been stipulated in the Ohio law, to a specific list of factors.

Current developments

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In May 1981, the High Court in the case of Estelle vs. Smith nullified the death sentence of a Texas defendant on the grounds that testimony obtained during a pretrial competency hearing was wrongly used in the sentencing phase, because the defendant had not been warned prior to that hearing of his right to remain silent and to retain counsel. The State had attempted to use information from the hearing as evidence of the defendant's future dangerousness and, hence, of the appropriateness of a death sentence. Touching on a judicial practice common in Texas, this decision could eventually affect as many as half of that State's death-row prisoners.

Important rulings also were handed down by State supreme courts in Oregon and Washington during 1981; these rulings resulted in the removal of all prisoners from death row in the two States.

Oregon's supreme court, in Oregon vs. Quinn, ruled that its capital punishment statute was unconstitutional because it placed the responsibility for determining a defendant's state of mind at the time of the crime upon the judge rather than the jury, in effect depriving the accused of the right to a jury trial. The ruling struck down the State's death penalty law, and the three Oregon inmates awaiting execution had their sentences vacated.

In State vs. Frampton, Washington also had its capital punishment law struck down. The State supreme court found that a defendant who pleaded not guilty could be sentenced to death, whereas defendants who pleaded guilty could not because the law did not provide for a sentencing jury in such cases. As a result of this ruling, the death sentences of Frampton and Washington's four remaining death-row inmates were vacated. A month later, the legislature replaced the unconstitutional law with one designed to overcome the defect. In another State legislative action during 1981, Ohio passed a new capital punishment law to replace one ruled unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1978 (Lockett vs. Ohio). Oklahoma, which already provided the death penalty for murder, passed a law making rape of a minor or mentally incompetent person a capital offense. Alabama, in response to the 1980 decision rendered by its supreme court in Beck vs. Alabana, also revised its death penalty law. The new law allows the jury to convict a defendant of lesser crimes rather than, as provided by the original law, only the capital offense. It also establishes a dual trial procedure, one for determining guilt and one for sentencing, as well as a mandatory appellate review.

Connecticut, Texas, and Virginia made minor changes in their death penalty laws before the end of the year.

In 1981 for the first time, States were asked to report whether their death penalty laws provided for automatic appeal from death sentences. With the exception of Arkansas, New York, and the Federal system, the statutes of all jurisdictions call for an automatic appeal, even if the defendant wants to waive the right. Some State laws provide for review of the sentence only; others require a review of both conviction and sentence.

Persons sentenced to death during 1981

Death sentences were meted out to 228 persons in the United States during 1981, amounting to a 16% increase over the number recorded in 1980. It was only the third time since 1968 that as many as 225 persons or more were sentenced to death in any one year, the others being 1975 and 1976.³ All of the new sentences were imposed by the States, whereas the Federal system, for the eighth year in a row, imposed no capital sentences.

Of the 36 States with death penalty statutes in force, 25 imposed at least one capital sentence during the year, and 15 of these handed down more than in the year before. Five States—Alabama, Arkansas, California, Maryland, and Mississippi---sentenced at least five more people to death in 1981 than in the previous year; the greatest difference was in California where the number of persons sentenced to death rose from 24 in 1980 to 40 in 1981.

Of the 25 States sentencing inmates to death, California (40), Texas (26), and Florida (24) accounted for two-fifths of the national total.⁴ These three also led in the number of sentences handed down in each year since 1978. Two States—Colorado and Idaho—invoked the death penalty in 1981 but not in 1980; the reverse was true of Louisiana, Oregon, and Utah. All the rest of the 25 passed sentences in both years.

Regionally, the South accounted for 62% of the Nation's death sentences in 1981, a proportion similar to those of the previous 2 years but considerably lower than that of earlier years.⁵ Overall, 141 capital sentences were imposed in the South, compared to 57 in the West, 25 in the North Central region, and 5 in the Northeast (all in Pennsylvania). All but the North Central region showed an increase over the past year in the number of persons sentenced to death.



Increase in proportion of blacks

Blacks comprised 44% of those sentenced to death during 1981—6 percentage points higher than in 1980 (figure 2). Reflecting a 33% increase in the number of blacks condemned to death, it was the first time since 1977 that their proportion was greater than the preceding year. Numerical increases were largest in California and Alabama, each of which sentenced eight more blacks to death in 1981 than they did the year before. Among all prisoners sentenced to death in 1981, three were American Indians and one was Asian.

The number of Hispanics receiving death sentences was also higher than in past years and was double that for 1978.⁶ Of the 14 members of this ethnic group sentenced to die during 1981, 6 were in California, 3 in Texas, and 1 each in Arizona, Florida, Nevada, New Mexico, and Virginia.

Three women received the death penalty during 1981, one each in Alabama, Georgia, and Maryland. This increased the number of States with women on death row from six to seven.

Among those received from court, one person in Florida was sentenced to death for sexual battery; all others had been convicted of capital murder. Over the past 5 years, only two other persons received the death penalty for a crime other than mur-

Marked rise in prior felons

One or more prior felonies marked the records of 70% of the incoming death-row inmates compared to only 55% for 1980. This increase was based on data representing about four-fifths of all persons newly sentenced to death, generally the same coverage as that for the past 4 years.⁸ As in previous years, blacks were more likely than whites to have been convicted of a prior felony. Regionally, the highest proportion of prior felons-about threefourths-were admitted in North Central States. Among the States with 10 or more new death-row commitments, Illinois and Texas committed only persons with prior felony convictions.

A third of the inmates receiving the death penalty in 1981 were under sentence for at least one other crime at the time they were arrested, a somewhat larger proportion than in 1980. Of the 1981 group, 35 were on parole, 7 on probation, 6 in prison, 5 on escape, and 1 on work release. The proportion of blacks under sentence at the time they were arrested for a capital offense was higher than that for whites— 37% versus 29%. While the proportion of blacks in 1981 was higher than in 1980, that for whites stayed about the same.

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

Persons leaving death row during 1981



For every three persons received on death row during 1981, one was removed—the lowest ratio since criteria for constitutional death penalty laws were laid down by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1976 (figure 3). Four persons died during the year—two by natural causes in Texas, one by suicide in Florida, and one by execution in Indiana. The execution was the fourth carried out in the United States since an unofficial 10year moratorium on the death penalty ended in 1977. Of the three other executions, one occurred in 1977 (Utah) and two in 1979 (Florida and Nevada).

Among the 74 persons receiving dispositions, only a few had been convicted under defective statutes. In all, five persons in

Washington and three in Oregon were relieved of death sentences after the death penalty laws of those States were overturned by their supreme courts (figure 4).

The remaining 66 were removed by having their convictions overturned (15), by having their sentence vacated (36), or by having their sentence commuted to life imprisonment (15). All persons removed had been convicted of murder.

Most sentences reduced to life

By yearend, 50 of the 74 persons relieved of the death penalty had been resentenced to prison for life and 4 to terms of 20 years or more. Another nine were awaiting resentencing and six a new trial, both groups still subject to the possibility of a new death sentence. Three persons had been cleared of the charges on which their death penalty was based, two in Nevada whose capital charges were dropped and one in South Carolina who was found not guilty. The yearend status of two prisoners removed from death row was not reported.

Dispositions granted in more States

The number of States reporting removals from death row during the year was 21, more than in 1979 and 1980. Five States with one or more removals did not commit any capital offenders during 1981. On the other hand, nine States meting out the death penalty did not have any removals. Texas recorded the highest number of persons relieved of the death penalty—20; 18 of these were resentenced to life imprisonment and 2 to sentences of more than 20 years. Florida recorded the second highest number of dispositions (17). No other State relieved more than five death-row inmates.

Blacks accounted for slightly less than a third of all dispositions, a proportion similar to that in previous years. Six Hispanics were relieved of their death sentences, five in Texas and one in California. During 1981, one woman, a white inmate in Florida, had her death sentence revoked.

Average stay slowly increases

Persons removed from death row in 1981 had already spent an average of almost 3 years in prison for their capital offense, a few months longer than in 1980 and nearly a year longer than 1979. Blacks relieved during 1981 had served less time than whites, a median of 30 and 33 months respectively. Two inmates, 1 in Arkansas and 1 in Texas, served more than 6 years on death row; another 12 had been deathrow prisoners for at least 4 years. The median age of persons leaving death row was 29 years, although one person in Texas and one in Louisiana were 55 or more years of age when relieved of their death sentences.

Persons under sentence at yearend 1981



The record 838 inmates held under sentence of death at yearend 1981 were concentrated by both region and State. As in the past years, the South held the bulk of all capital prisoners (72%), followed by the West (17%), the North Central region (9%), and the Northeast (1%). Of the 36 States with capital punishment statutes in force, 28 were holding at least one deathrow inmate. Eight States—Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Mississippi, Oklahoma, and Texas—held close to 75% of the Nation's death-row population (figure 5). In fact, three of these—Florida, Georgia, and Texas—accounted for almost half of the total. Of the 28 States with capital prisoners, all but Louisiana and Utah either increased death-row populations or held the same number as on December 31, 1980. Three States—Wyoming, Washington, and Oregon—had held at least one inmate on death row at yearend 1980, but none in 1981. In the latter two, death penalty statutes were struck by their State supreme courts. Colorado was the only jurisdiction with an inmate under sentence in 1981 but not in 1980.

Stay averages 2 years

Prisoners on death row on December 31, 1981, had spent an average of about 2 years there. One in every 10 had been there 6 years or more. The longest period for any individual was the eight and onehalf years spent by a Georgia prisoner. Whites and blacks had put in approximately the same amount of time.

Numerous prior offenders

Data on legal status at arrest, as well as on prior felony history, were available for roughly four-fifths of those under sentence of death. Almost a third of these were already under sentence for at least one other offense when arrested on suspicion of a capital crime. Of this group, 116 were on parole, 31 were on probation, 26 were imprisoned, 20 were on escape, 7 were on mandatory conditional release, and 2 were on work release. Blacks were somewhat more likely than whites to have been under such a sentence—34% vs. 30%.


Nearly two-thirds of all persons on death row at yearend had been convicted of a prior felony at least once during their lifetime. Close to 70% of all blacks had such a criminal background, compared to 62% of the whites.

Level of education rises


Data on level of educational attainment, available for nearly 80% of the death-row population, indicated that close to 40% had at least a high school diploma. This proportion was the highest ever reported at that level, and indicated the steady rise in the education of persons entering death row.

The median age of prisoners under sentence of death as of December 31, 1981, was 30, a year higher than that for 1980. Whites were slightly older than blacks, with median ages of 31 and 29, respectively. The youngest person under sentence of death at yearend was an 18-year-old white man in Kentucky. Fourteen other prisoners were under age 20, five in Texas, two in Mississippi, and one each in Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Maryland, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Tennessee. The oldest person on death row was a white man in Texas, age 80.

More than two of every five persons under sentence of death were never married, a proportion similar to that in past years; the figure for blacks was considerably higher than that for whites, 57% vs. 33%. A third of the death-row population were married, 20% were divorced or separated, and 2% were widowed.

Between 1968 and 1975, blacks had consistently accounted for at least half of all persons under sentence of death, but in no year since 1975, when blacks comprised 54% of all death-row inmates, has their proportion reached 50% (figure 6). The relatively large number of blacks admitted during 1981, however, increased their share from 39% to 41%. Among all blacks on death row at the end of 1981, threefourths were held in Southern States, 13% in the North Central region, 11% in the West, and 1% in the Northeast.


The percentage of blacks on death row was $3^{1/2}$ times greater than the percentage of blacks in the general population (figure 7). This disproportionality was present in every region, with the greatest disparity in the North Central region where they were six times their share of the general population. Moreover, this was the only region in which blacks outnumbered whites on death row.

The number of Hispanics under sentence of death continued to climb in 1981, reaching a record 47 by the end of the year. Sixteen of these were held in Texas, 12 in California, 5 each in Florida and Arizona, 4 in Illinois, and 1 each in Arkansas, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, and Virginia.

Among all death-row prisoners, five were American Indians and three were Asians.

Eleven women were under sentence of death by yearend 1981. This figure higher than in any year over the past decade—sustained the small but continued growth of women on death row. Of those females awaiting execution, all were in seven Southern States—four in Georgia, two in Texas, and one each in Alabama, Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina, and Oklahoma. Eight were white; three were black. It was the first time, at least in the past decade, that Maryland had a woman on death row.

Executions-1930 to 1981





In March 1981, an Indiana prisoner was put to death by electrocution, the fourth person to be executed in the United States in the past 14 years and the first in Indiana since 1961. For a decade following 1967. there were no executions in the United States. This moratorium ended with the execution of a Utah prisoner in January 1977, followed by two in 1979, one each in Florida and Nevada and, then, the 1981 execution in Indiana. These four brought the number of executions carried out under civil authority in the U.S. to 3,863 since reporting first began in 1930 (figure 8).9 Of this total, 3,830 were carried out by 42 States and the District of Columbia; the remaining 33 took place under Federal jurisdiction.10




Electrocution predominates

Five different methods of execution were prescribed by the 36 States that had death penalty statutes in force at yearend 1981. Half of the States used electrocution and the rest either gas, hanging, lethal injection, or firing squad (figure 9). For inmates sentenced to death under Federal law, the method of execution is governed by the law of the State in which the punishment is carried out.¹¹


Number of persons executed,

Most executions occurred in South

Roughly 3 of every 5 executions over the 1930-81 period took place in the South. Five States executed more than 200 prisoners in the 51-year period and account for 40% of the total; the largest number was in Georgia (366), followed by New York (329), Texas (297), California (292), and North Carolina (263) (figure 10). The vast majority of all executions were for murder; 12% were for rape. Among those put to death for murder, roughly half were white and half were black; among those executed for rape, blacks constituted almost 90% of the total (figure 11). All but 10 of the 453 executions for rape took place in the South, with the highest number in Texas (84); there were two other executions for rape, both under Federal jurisdiction.

Post-1976 group all whites

Since 1930, 53% of the prisoners executed were blacks, 45% were whites, and 1% were members of other minority races. None of those put to death since 1977 was black. The 42 members of the smaller minorities included 19 American Indians, 13 Filipinos, 8 Chinese, and 2 Japanese. Of the 32 women executed since 1930, 20 were white and 12 were black. All were convicted of murder except two-one for kidnaping and one for espionage, both executed under the Federal system. The last execution of a female was in California in 1962.

Status of death penalty statutes, by jurisdiction, December 31, 1981

General note

Most death penalty laws in force prior to the Furman vs. Georgia decision of June 29, 1972, provided for the imposition of the death penalty for murder, and, in some States, one or more additional crimes. In the Furman decision, the U.S. Supreme Court found that the death penalty, as then being administered, was "cruel and unusual punishment" in violation of the Eighth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Many States revised their laws to conform to standards set by the Furman decision and, subsequently, by other decisions that determined the validity of revised statutes. At yearend 1981, the critique of individual States' statutes was continuing as appeals of capital sentences reached State courts or the U.S. Supreme Court.

Under State laws revised since the Furman decision, the different types of capital murder must be specifically defined. Although varying somewhat from one jurisdiction to another, the kinds of homicide most commonly specified in these laws are murder perpetrated during the commission of another felony; murder of a peace officer, corrections employee, or fireman engaged in the performance of official duties; murder by an inmate serving a life sentence; and murder for hire. Different statutory terminology may be used by different States to designate substantively identical crimes; in some States but not necessarily all, such terms as "murder," "1st degree murder," "murder Class A felony," etc., may denote the same offense. While there are other offenses which carry the death penalty, most have not yet had their constitutionality tested.

Methodology

This report is based mainly on data obtained through a mail canvass of the Federal Bureau of Prisons and correctional authorities in the 50 States and the District of Columbia and from information in previous issues of this report. Information on the legal status of the death penalty and on methods of execution was obtained through a questionnaire mailed to the office of the Attorney General of each jurisdiction. The completion rate was 100 percent.

Capital Punishment covers all persons under sentence of death at any time during the year and held in a State or Federal correctional facility. The coverage includes capital offenders transferred from prison to such noncorrectional institutions as mental hospitals and those who may have escaped from custody (no such prisoners were reported for 1981). Not included are capital prisoners who for any reason remain in local correctional institutions that are outside the jurisdiction of the State or Federal correctional authorities from whom data for this series are obtained.

A major procedural change introduced in 1976 was continued through 1981. Beginning with 1976, inmates sentenced to death under statutory provisions later found unconstitutional are removed from the NPS death-row count as of the date of the relevant court finding rather than as of the date of the specific application of the finding to the individual, as had been the practice prior to 1976. As a result of this change, the following two data items for 1976 through 1981 are not strictly comparable with corresponding items in pre-1976 issues of this series: the length of time elapsed from sentencing to disposition in the case of those removed from under the death penalty, and the amount of time expired since sentencing in the case of those still on death row at yearend. This change also precludes strict comparability between 1976 through 1981 data and pre-1976 data on the number of persons removed from death row and on individuals remaining under sentence of death at yearend.

Two other changes in concept and format differentiate 1977–81 information from data reported in earlier issues of this report. For persons removed from death row, respondents were asked, as in previous years, to supply information about disposition. Prior to 1971, the "method of disposition" was displayed exactly as reported to the NPS program (e.g., indictment dis-

missed or judgment reversed, commuted to life or term of years, resentenced to life or term of years, new trial granted or resentencing ordered, etc.). Between 1971 and 1975, the specific method of disposition reported by respondents was not tabulated in the report; rather, persons removed from the death row count were listed under one of two categories: "removed from death row" or "died." In 1976, a single table displayed either the method of removal or, in the case of inmates who had undergone further processing after removal from death row, the yearend status (see table 12, Capital Punishment 1976). Beginning in 1977, respondents were asked to report, for each person relieved of the death sentence, both the "method of removal" (table 17) and the "yearend status" in the followup process (table 18). In 1976, for example, a prisoner whose capital sentence was vacated as a result of the nullification of a death penalty statute and who received a reduced sentence before yearend was tallied only once, i.e., under "reduction of sentence" (table 12, Capital Punishment 1976); beginning in 1977, a prisoner experiencing this sequence of events was tallied both in table 17 (under "sentence provisions of State statute struck down'') and in table 18 (under "serving reduced sentence"). Because method of disposition information beginning in 1977 included both method of removal and yearend status for each prisoner relieved of the death sentence, it is not comparable with that for 1976 nor with that for the years prior to 1971. Because no detail was published in the 1971 through 1975 issues, no such comparison is possible.

A second procedural change initiated in the 1977 issue of this report related to the annual revision of historical records on the movement of capital prisoners to account for admissions and removals reported late to the NPS program. Previously, such transactions were simply added to or deleted from the January 1 count of the year in which the report was received, without, however, adjusting the data on admissions, removals, or net yearend figures for the year in which the transactions actually occurred. Beginning with the 1977 report, the relevant data are presented to reflect such adjustments, and figures for previous years have been comparably revised to provide a consistent basis for assessing historical trends (table 6). Because of the time lag likely to occur between the receipt of the

death penalty and transfer to a State correctional facility, the figures for recent years are subject to revision as supplementary data are received by the NPS program.

The collection of data on ethnicity (i.e., Hispanic or non-Hispanic origin) started with the 1977 enumeration, and the characteristic is determined irrespective of race. *Hispanic origin* is defined in the instruction to Item 4b, Form NPS-8. The count of Hispanic inmates may be subject to error, as correctional authorities in some jurisdictions maintain such information as a matter of record, whereas those in other jurisdictions make a determination solely on the basis of surname inspection.

The 1981 questionnaire continued the firsttime effort made in 1980 to determine whether inmates who had a history of prior felonies had been convicted of criminal homicide (see Item 10b, Form NPS-8). Data were reported for 83% of inmates newly sentenced to death during 1981 but, despite increases, remained inadequate for those removed from death row (24% reporting) and those under sentence at yearend (45% reporting).

Overall, coverage on questions of legal status at time of arrest and prior felony history has been available for about 8 out of 10 prisoners since these items were first incorporated in the questionnaire in 1977.

For the first time in 1981, States reported whether their death penalty laws provided for an automatic appeal from death sentences (see Item 7, Form NPS-8B and NPS-8C). Coverage for this item was complete.
