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## FOREWORD

The Bureau of Justice Statistics is pleased to announce the publication of the Criminal Justice Data Directory by ICPSR. Since 1977, BJS and its predecessor organization have sponsored the National Criminal Justice Data Archive project at ICPSR to partially satisfy BJS's legislative mandate to disseminate criminal justice data. The main focus of the archive project is to encourage and facilitate secondary analysis of BJS-sponsored data collections and of other relevant datasets. While holdings have increased at a steady pace, the archive cannot hope to acquire and process all datasets of relevance to criminal justice research questions. The archive typically acquires datasets of broad interest which can be applied to a number of issues, but a number of important questions can only be studied with access to data outside the archive's holdings. In order to facilitate crime-related research in these areas, ICPSR has prepared this directory to help researchers find and acquire relevant data. I believe this is an important extension of the archive's activities and am pleased to announce publication of this document.

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## INTRODUCTION

The Criminal Justice Archive and Information Network (CJAIN) has been in operation since 1977 at the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research. Funded currently by the Bureau of Justice Statistics in the Department of Justice (Grant No. 82-BJ-CX-K001), it is designed to provide three basic services to analysts, policymakers, and researchers in the criminal justice fields: development of computer-readable data resources for the quantitative study of crime and the criminal justice system through archiving and dissemination; technical assistance in selecting appropriate data and the computational hardware and software resources to use them in an efficient and effective manner; and training in the methods of social science data analysis appropriate to analysis of the data.

During the past five years the CJAIN staff has assembled a large collection of data relevant to its mission in the ICPSR archive. For a variety of reasons, it has never been the intention of the project to acquire and process all possible data of relevance to crime and the criminal justice system in Ann Arbor. Limitations on the availability of resources would never have permitted such an ambitious undertaking. Some data are currently housed in other archives where access is open and available; acquisition of such data would simply involve a duplication of effort. Furthermore, some data are archived at locations in which a specially-trained staff is available to provide advice, consultation, and special tabulations where considerations of protection of the confidentiality of individuals is an issue.

Much of the information about the availability of data from these other sources has not been available to researchers in an assembled form. The Criminal Justice Data Directory is designed to serve as such a central resource for analysts, policymakers, and researchers in the criminal justice field. It is a guide to quantitative, computer-readable resources relevant to the study of crime and the criminal justice system, indicating their availability and general content.

The directory can be used as a handy reference to criminal justice data, indicating where additional information can be obtained about the detailed characteristics of specific datasets. As is the case with any well-documented computer-readable dataset, the complete information about the contents of a dataset, the research design under which it was collected, and other relevant processing information can be found in its codebook. The reader will have to request such information from the institution from which the data are available. A list of all such sources is appended to the directory.

The directory is actually a living document of sorts in that it also exists itself in computer-readable form as a SPIRES subfile on The University of Michigan computing system (MTS), where it can be accessed remotely for computerized searches. This first published version of the directory contains descriptions of 434 datasets which existed in the subfile as of October, 1982. Future printed versions of the directory will be published as the size of the computer-readable database grows.

In this regard, the CJAIN staff would appreciate receiving information about the existence and availability of other computer-readable data relevant to the study of crime and the criminal justice system. This information will be added to the SPIRES database as it is received, and it will be published in subsequent versions of the directory.

Any project of this magnitude must necessarily involve the contributions of several staff members. The principal investigator for the CJAIN project is Dr. Michael W. Traugott, Director of Resource Development for the ICPSR. Dr. Christopher Innes has had direct super-

The second section, DATASET DESCRIPTIONS, is a listing of all 434 records or datasets as they presently appear in the SPIRES CJD subfile. If one were to use SPIRES to retrieve all 434 records, the result would be identical to the one appearing on pages 1-100, with the exception that the records have been put into alphabetical order by Principal Investigator to aid the reader in locating a particular investigator.

Section three, located on page 101, is a list of all keywords used to describe the datasets in the CJD Directory. There are a total of 81 keywords. If the reader does not have a particular investigator in mind but wishes to locate all the datasets available in the directory on a particular topic, this may be accomplished by examining the list of keywords. Once one or more keywords have been selected as descriptive or related to the topic in question, the reader should turn to the KEYWORD INDEX (section four) beginning on page 103.

Section four contains all the keywords used to describe the datasets in the CJD Directory. They are arranged in alphabetical order. The reader should locate the keyword he or she has chosen. Listed below the keyword are the titles of the datasets which have been described by the keyword and the page on which the description of the dataset appears.

Section five, the final section located on page 151, is simply a summary of all the sources cited in the datasets. There are a fairly small number of sources as each source offers a sizeable number of datasets.
