

FOREWORD

The information contained herein is an annual report to the people of Rhode Island which concerns itself with the amount of serious crimes that were reported in our state during 1982, plus additional data.

Although the total number of serious crimes reported in Rhode Island fell for the second consecutive year, celebration is not quite in order. A review of the state's crime trend for the last ten years reveals that the 52,425 reported serious crimes in 1982 is nearly sixteen percent higher than the 45,311 crimes reported in 1973.

Moreover, the crime of rape has increased for the fourth consecutive year. For the ten (10) year period studied in this report, said crime experienced a low of 86 offenses in 1973 and climbed to an all-time high of 186 offenses during 1982. The Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) anticipates making a special statistical report/study of this criminal activity in the near future.

Perhaps no one reason can entirely explain why total serious crime is decreasing in Rhode Island and most parts of the United States. Many theories, from improved deployment of police, to the declining number of youths, to belief it is merely a cyclical trend, etc., have been fostered. Although all are noteworthy, the specific answer just may well be a multi-faceted one.

For the first time ever, this report, which is tailored to follow the procedures of the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) system, will consolidate in detail, arson statistics as well as the usually reported major crimes of: homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. The three major reasons for this consolidation are:

-Congressional mandate has made arson a Part I or serious crime classification.

-management information systems of both the State Police and Fire Marshal's . Office have improved so vastly that the availablility of data has become more quickly retrievable and more accurate, and

-time saved by this action will allow the SAC of the Governor's Justice Commission to pursue more studies in the criminal justice field.

Each month, police and fire departments throughout the state submit monthly Uniform Crime Reports to either the State Police or the Fire Marshal's Office (Division of Fire Safety). This information becomes the backbone of this report, thus, much gratitude is expressed to the following professional personnel who were instrumental in either collecting, systematizing, analyzing or calculating the data: Leo Trambukis, Brian Glancy (State Police), Everett Ignagni, John Butler (Fire Marshal's Office), and Dennis Tierney (SAC).







A Ten Year Comparison of the Total Number of Serious Offenses in R.I.






TREND RAPE










TREND LARCENY

DEFINITIONS

Definitions

HOMICIDE - Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

The classification of this offense, as for all other crime index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Not included in the count for this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, or accident.

- RAPE Rape (Forcible), as defined in the UCR Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are not included in this category.
- ROBBERY Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
- ASSAULT Assault (aggravated) is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.
- BURGLARY The UCR Program defines burglary as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary. Burglary is categorized into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is sued, and attempted forcible entry.
- LARCENY Larceny (theft) is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the UCR Program, this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT - In the UCR Program, motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. This definition excludes the taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by those persons having lawful access.

ARSON - Arson is defined by the UCR Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons.

Established criteria/definitions in Rhode Island for incendiary and suspicious acts are as follows:

- INCENDIARY Fires which have been intentionally set; where there is intention to defraud, or where there is intention to conceal for purposes which violate any section of the General Laws of the State of Rhode Island.
- SUSPICIOUS A fire where a definite determination of incendiarism cannot be ascertained, but where there is sufficient reason to believe that the fire may be of incendiary nature.
