


#### DATA COLLECTION DESCRIPTION

The National Crime Surveys were conducted to obtain current and reliable measures of serious crime in the United States. The Commercial Victimization Surveys, which are restricted to coverage of burglary and robbery incidents only, include all types of commercial establishments as well as political, cultural, and religious organizations. The Survey includes a series of questions about the business, e.g., type and size, form of ownership, insurance, security, and break-in and robbery characteristics. Time and place, weapon, injury, entry evidence, offender characteristics and stolen property data follow for each of the incidents mentioned in the first part of the questioning.

A multistage cluster sample design was employed to collect the data. Both victimized and non-victimized establishments in twenty-six different cities were interviewed during 1972, 1973, and 1974. In the 1975 Survey thirteen of these cities were reinterviewed.

These data are contained in thirty-nine hierarchical data files, one city per year, each with a logical record length of 165 characters. The printed codebook documents the 166 variables for the 1509 to 8154 cases of combined business and incident records. Class IV



#### INTRODUCTION

#### 1.1 Survey Overview

The National Crime Surveys are conducted for the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration by the U.S. Bureau of the Census in order to obtain current and reliable measures of serious crime in the United States. The program is unique in that it turns to the public for information about crime rather than relying on law enforcement records. The primary impetus for this type of approach was an earlier victim survey which indicated that a considerable number of crimes were not being reported and consequently existing crime measures underestimated true rates of crime. In addition to providing a supplementary source of data for estimating the amount of crime, the survey provides a wide range of descriptive characteristics and offers general purpose data on criminal victimization over time.

There are two major categories of surveys: the surveys of commercial victimization, and surveys of personal and household victimization. Within each of these categories surveys are planned and conducted on a national or city basis. The documentation provided here is for the Cities Sample Commercial Victimization Survey (CVS).2

The Commercial Victimization Surveys are restricted in coverage to incidents of burglary and robbery. Other crimes affecting business establishments, such as vandalism, shoplifting and white collar crimes, are not within the scope of the survey. The commercial survey also excludes victimizations covered in the household surveys (i.e., household robbery and burglary, assault, rape, motor vehicle theft and larceny). The commercial survey seems to measure events which are relatively rare phenomena. This means that a large number of establishments must be surveyed to obtain a sufficient number of victimization reports to permit statistically meaningful analysis.3

Virtually, all types of commercial establishments are included in the survey, as well as political, cultural and religious organizations. Establishments that are specifically excluded are farms and ranches or other units of agricultural production, and government offices at all levels, except government-run liquor stores and transportation facilities.

In 1972, eight so-called Impact Cities were surveyed to evaluate extensive federally funded crime prevention programs. In 1973, the nation's five largest cities were surveyed; and in 1974, thirteen other large cities were covered. The eight Impact Cities and five Largest Cities were reinterviewed in 1975. Businesses were asked to report victimizations during the 12-months reference period prior to the month of interview. Since the reference period consists of the 12 months prior to the interview, it is variable and depends on the month of interview.

At each interview data were gathered on business characteristics, such as the form of ownership, size and type of business and presence of security measures. A series of screening questions was asked to establish whether any incidents of robbery or burglary (attempted or completed) took place during the reference period. Detailed information was obtained about any reported incidents.

#### 1.1.1 Sample Design

The Commercial Victimization Survey data were obtained from separate samples of business enterprises and organizations in each of the 26 cities. The CVS employed a multistage cluster sample design. The first stage was the systematic selection within the city limits of segments, from which the sample units were ultimately selected. A segment is a small geographical area defined for sampling purposes by clearly identifiable boundaries. Sample segments included in the Cities CVS were chosen from those available after excluding any segments that had been designated as sampling points for the National CVS. The number of segments sampled varied from city to city.

Business establishments within the sample segments were then designated for enumeration. In some segments an interview was sought with all commercial and organizational entities in the scope of the survey. In other segments particular establishments were chosen for enumeration following detailed sampling instructions.

The probability that any particular establishment would be included in the survey was about 1 in 17 for the 8 Impact Cities and the 13 Other Cities. For the 5 Largest Cities the probability ranged from 1 in 21 for Detroit to 1 in 114 for New York. The sampling procedures followed resulted in the selection of a variable number of establishments for enumeration, ranging from about 1200 in Minneapolis to 8300 in New York. The city-specific basic weight, which is the inverse of the probability of selection for an establishment is shown in section 1.2.6.

#### 1.1.2 Conducting the Survey

The Census Bureau began conducting interviews for the Cities CVS in July, 1972. Interviews were conducted in each cities group at different time periods. Interviews were conducted in the 8 Impact Cities from July through November, 1972 and again in March through May, 1975. Field work for the 5 Largest Cities took place in January

through March, 1973 and again during January through March, 1975. Interviewing of establishments in the 13 Other Cities occurred in January through March, 1974.

Interviewers were assigned particular segments to canvas with instructions to include commercial establishments of all types, including those located in government buildings or within military reservations. Farms and ranches, or other agricultural units, were excluded, as well as foreign, federal, state or local governmental offices, (except government-run liquor stores and transportation facilities). Also excluded were home businesses if no sign was displayed or the business was not recognizable. Detailed instructions to the interviewers for inclusion or exclusion of establishments may be found in the Interviewer's Manual.<sup>5</sup>

The interviewer determined if the establishments at sample addresses had changed, become vacant, or had been converted to a non-listable type of activity. In addition, checks were made for mergers or divisions of listed establishments and organizations. New addresses or establishments could be brought into the sample during the course of the survey.

Interviewers made every attempt to conduct an interview with an owner or manager at listed addresses. However, assistant managers, accountants, senior sales clerks or other knowledgeable employees were interviewed if repeated attempts to contact the owner or manager had failed.

Interviews were divided into three parts. In the first part general questions about the business establishment were sked. Part two, consisting of a series of screen questions, elicited information about any incidents of robbery or burglary experienced during the twelve month period preceding the month of the interview. In part three, information about the incidents themselves was collected. The parts of the interview process correspond to the three parts of the questionnaire, shown in section 1.3.2. The kinds of data collected in this survey may be previewed by examination of these forms.

Of course it is not possible to obtain an interview at every sample address. There are two general types of noninterviews. First the owner or a knowledgeable person at an establishment could not be located, or when located refused to be interviewed. Second, the listed establishment had gone out of business or was otherwise impossible to interview. Noninterviews are classified in three categories.

Type A: The owner or a representative was not available for an interview.

Type B: The establishment was not open for business.

Type C: The establishment was unlistable (e.g., torn down or converted to other uses).

Type A noninterviews represent a very small proportion (usually less than 3%) of establishments in the sample.

#### 1.2 Description of the Cities Commercial Victimization Survey Files

The Cities Commercial Victimization Survey files contain all of the data collected during the surveys, including data for victimized as well as non-victimized establishments. The files are offered on a per city basis; one file for each city.

#### 1.2.1 Reference Period

Interviewing for each set of cities took place over a 10-12 week period, except for the 8 Impact Cities in 1972 where the period of field work was somewhat longer. Therefore the 12-month reference period for which victimizations were reported varies from business to business, depending on the exact month of the interview. Because the month in which the interview was conducted is not recorded in the files it is not possible to determine the exact 12-month reference period. The chart on the following page illustrates the approximate 12 months in which reported victimizations occurred.

### 1.2.2 File Structure

The files are hierarchical in structure. The data for each establishment (case) are contained on two record types: a business record and an incident record. The data are sorted so that a business record is immediately followed by any incident records pertaining to that business. The number of incident records following a business record depends on the number of victimizations reported for that establishment. Many establishments will not have been victimized during the reference period, and therefore no incident record will be present. The file structure for the Cities Sample Commercial Victimization Survey is illustrated in Figure 1 below.

Record types are identified by the first character position of each record. A 'l' in this position indicates a business record and a '2' indicates an incident record. In addition, the business record con-... tains information on the number of incident records which follow it. This information is found in character positions 14-16.

#### 1.2.3 Sequence of Records

Business records are not sorted in any particular sequence; however each business record is assigned sequentially a 5-digit case number starting with 0000l on the first record in each city file. Incident records for a particular business will have the same case number. Incident records also are not sorted in any particular sequence but a sequence number is assigned to each incident. The highest incident sequence number equals the number of incident records shown on the business record.

### 1.2.5 Cities Commercial Victimization Survey Tape File Coding Characteristics

#### Coding Conventions

Data fields in the NCS tape files vary in size from one to six characters. Every possible effort has been made to convert alphanumerics to numerics. The character set is limited to the ten digits in all documented fields. Values and codes are represented as integers. Some fields have implied decimal places. These fields are noted in the detailed file documentation.

#### Padding

All padding which occurs in the files is described in the codebook documentation.

#### 1.3 Description of Contents

#### 1.3.1 Geographic Identification

The victimization data are for businesses in the central city only and do not apply to the surrounding metropolitan areas. There are no geographic identifiers for areas smaller than the city as a whole due to requirements of preserving the confidentiality of individual respondents. In New York, however, the boroughs of Bronx, Queens, Manhattar, and Brooklyn and Staten Island (combined) may be identified by PSU number. New York is the only city where sub-city identification is possible.

#### 1.3.2 Subject Content

The questionnaire forms best illustrate the kind of data contained in the tape files and are included in this section. Another important reason for reviewing the questionnaire forms is the need to understand the somewhat complex skip patterns used in interviewing. The skip patterns affect the number of cases available for analysis for any given variable.

1.4 Guidelines for Using the Tape Files

#### 1.4.1 Estimation Procedures

Every data record in the Cities Commercial Victimization Survey files carries a weight which must be cumulated to produce universe estimates. The assigned weights are the product of one or more of the three components described below. The establishment weight on the business record and the weight on all incident records associated with that business have the same value.

- (a) Sample Weight: The basic sample weight is the inverse of the probability that a particular establishment would be selected for the sample. The basic establishment weight for each city is shown in section 1.2.6.
- (b) Noninterview Adjustment Factor: The noninterview adjustment factor was determined by dividing the total number of sample establishments required for each particular kind-of-business imputation class by the number of useable business records actually collected. The kind-of-business imputation classes are shown below. The noninterview adjustment was made by multiplying the basic weight by the noninterview factor.
- (c) Part-Year Imputation Factor: This factor represents an upward adjustment of the weighted incident count through duplication of incident records for businesses operating for part of the year. Note that the adjustment was accomplished through physical duplication of records rather than through changing the numerical value of the weight. This imputation factor is applied only to the incident records for businesses with useable reports operating less than 12 months during the reference period. It is an attempt to account for the number of incidents that probably would have occurred had the business been operational for the entire period. The extent of duplication depends on the number of months the establishment was in operation, as indicated in the chart on page 19.

Each duplicate incident record then carried the appropriate weight, assigned on the basis of factors (a) and (b) described above.

To obtain an estimate of the total number of businesses, or number in a sub-group, operating during the interview period, the establishment weight for applicable business records must be cumulated. Estimates of total victimizations, or number with particular characteristics are obtained by applying the incident record weight.

Victimization rates per 1,000 businesses are obtained by dividing the estimate of businesses by 1,000. This figure is then divided into the estimated number of victimizations to obtain the rate.

Users attempting to generate monthly or quarterly estimates of total crime victimization should do so with caution. Because the month of interview is not available from the tape files it is not possible to determine the precise 12-month reference period. It is possible, however, to define a constant reference period for a set of cities by selecting victimizations which occurred during months common to all interviews. For example, the chart on page 6 indicates that reported victimizations for the 1973 5 Largest Cities may occur between January, 1972 and February, 1973. Months common to all interviews are March through December, permitting users to estimate crime occurrence on a monthly basis using the full sample for these months.

#### 1.4.2 Reliability of the Estimates

Estimates derived from the CVS data files are subject to sampling variability. Results based on a sample may differ from one sample to another, and from results that would be obtained from a complete enumeration. In general, any estimate based on 10 or fewer sample (unweighted) cases should be considered unreliable.

In addition to sampling error, estimates from the Commercial Victimization Survey data are subject to nonsampling errors. One of the principal sources of such error is the problem of recalling victimizations that occurred during the 12 months prior to interview. Because of a number of factors, however, it is likely that non-sampling errors were less prevalent in the commercial surveys than they were in the household crime surveys. These factors include the greater likelihood of businesses keeping records and reporting incidents to police, as well as the concentration of the survey on two of the more serious crimes, burglary and robbery.

A recheck/reinterview program has also been established for the cities commercial surveys, involving about 10 percent of the sampled segments. This program covered the work of most interviewers. Results indicate that differences between the reinterview and the original interview are minimal, well within the margin of sampling error.

Other nonsampling errors may have arisen from deficient interviewing and from data processing mistakes. However, quality control measures similar to those used in the household survey were adopted to minimize such errors.





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#### APPENDIX A: KIND OF BUSINESS DEFINITIONS AND CODES

2 <b>01</b>	Food - Retail stores primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption.
02	Eating and drinking - retail establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on the premises, and also lunch counters and refreshment stands selling prepared foods and drinks for immediate consumption.
03	General merchandise - retail stores which sell a number of lines of merchandise such as department stores and variety stores.
04	Apparel - retail stores selling new clothing and related articles for personal wear and adornment.
05	Furniture and appliance - retail stores selling goods used for furnishing the home, includes furniture, floor covering, drapery, household appliance, radio and television, and record stores.
06	Lumber, hardware, mobile home dealers - retail establishments selling lumber and other building materials, lawn and garden supplies, and mobile home dealers.
07	Automotive - retail establishments with major sales of new and used automobiles, boats, recreational and utility trailers, motorcycles or new automobile parts and accessories.
08	Drug and Proprietary - retail establishments with major sales of prescription drugs and patent medications.
09	Liquor - establishments engaged in the retail sale of packaged alcoholic beverages for consumption off the premises.
10	Gasoline service stations retail establishments with major sales of gasoline and lubricating oils and may perform minor repair work. Automotive repair shops are classified as service.
11)	Other retail - retail establishments not elsewhere classified.

Wholesale - establishments or places of business primarily engaged in selling merchandise to retailers; to industrial, commercial, institutional, farm, or professional business users; or to other wholesalers.

Wholesale, durable - establishments engaged in the wholesale distribution of durable goods such as:

Electrical goods - electrical generating, distributing, and wiring equipment, and household appliances whether electrically, manually, or mechanically powered.

Furniture and home furnishings - home, office, and public building furniture and home furnishings and homewares.

Hardware and plumbing and heating equipment and supplies - hardware, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, and refrigeration equipment and supplies.

Lumber and other construction materials - rough, dressed, and finished lumber; and construction building materials.

Machinery, equipment, and supplies - commercial, construction, mining, farm and garden, industrial, professional, service, and transportation machinery, equipment and supplies.

Metals and minerals except petroleum - coal and other minerals and ores, and ferrous and nonferrous metal semi-finished products.

Motor vehicles and automotive parts and supplies new and used automobiles, trucks, and other motor vehicles; automotive parts, supplies, tires, and tubes.

Sporting, recreational, photographic, and hobby goods, toys, and supplies - all types of sporting goods and accessories; games, toys, and hobby goods and supplies; and photographic equipment and supplies.

Miscellaneous durable goods - jewelry, precious stones and metals, watches, clocks, silverware, musical instruments, and forest products except lumber. Also included are establishments engaged in assembling, breaking up, sorting and wholesale distribution of scrap and waste materials.

Wholesale, nondurable - establishments engaged in the wholesale distribution of nondurable goods such as:

Apparel, piece goods and notions - apparel and furnishings, footwear, notions, knit goods, woven piece goods, and yard goods of natural or man-made fibers.

Beer, wine and distilled alcoholic beverages - beer, ale, porter and other fermented malt beverages; and distilled spirits, including neutral spirits and ethyl alcohol used in blending wines and distilled liquors.

Chemicals and allied products - chemicals and allied products, such as acids, industrial and heavy chemicals, dyestuffs, industrial salts, navel stores, plastics materials, rosin and turpentine.

Drugs, drug proprietaries and druggists' sundries - drugs, drug proprietaries, druggists' sundries, and toiletries.

Farm product raw materials - buying and/or marketing cotton, grains, livestock, horses and mules, leaf tobacco, hides, skins, furs, wool, mohair, raw silk, hops, and nuts, except roasted or salted.

Groceries and related products - general line groceries, frozen foods, dairy products, poultry and poultry products, confectionery, fish and seafoods, meat and meat products, fresh fruits, and vegetables, and related products.

Paper and paper products - writing paper, stationery and office supplies, wrapping and other coarse paper; and converted paper products, such as bags, boxes, dishes, napkins, and shipping supplies.

Petroleum and petroleum products - pertoleum and products including packaged and bottled petroleum products distributors, truck jobbers, and bulk liquid storage facilities.

Miscellaneous nondurable goods - books, periodicals and newspapers, art goods, flowers and florist suppliers, industrial yarn, textile bags, and bagging and burlap.

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Manufacturing - establishments engaged in the mechanical or chemical transformation of materials or substances into new products. These establishments are usually described as plants, factories, or mills and characteristically use power driven machines and materials handling equipment. Establishments engaged in assembling component parts of manufactured products are also considered manufacturing if the new product is neither a structure nor other fixed improvement. Also included is the blending of materials such as lubricating oils, plastics, resins, or liquors.

Manufacturing, durable - establishments manufacturing durable goods such as:

Electrical and electronic machinery, equipment, and supplies Fabricated metal products Furniture and fixtures Jewelry, silverware, and plated ware Lumber and wood products Machinery Measuring, analyzing, and controlling instruments; photographic, medical and optical goods, watches and clocks Musical instruments Primary metal industries - smelting and refining of ferrous and nonferrous metals and manufacturing metal products Printing, publishing and allied industries Rubber products Stone, clay, glass and concrete products Transportation equipment

Manufacturing, nondurable - establishments manufacturing nondurable goods such as:

Apparel and other finished products made from fabrics and similar materials
Chemical and allied products
Costume jewelry, costume novelties, buttons, and miscellaneous notions, except precious metal Food and kindred products
Paper and allied products
Pens, pencils, and other office and artists' materials
Petroleum refining and related industries
Tobacco manufacturing
Textile mill products
Toys and amusements

Included are such diverse activities as research, development, and testing laboratories; central warehouses for the company's own vehicles; trading stamp redemption stores; milk receiving stations; and sales promotion offices.
23	Communications - establishments furnishing point to point communication services, whether by wire or redio, and whether intended to be received aurally or visually, and radio and television broadcasting. Services for the exchange or recording of messages

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Construction - establishments engaged in heavy construction, such as construction of residential, farm, industrial, commercial, public or other buildings. Specialized contractors who handle electrical, plumbing, or painting contracts are also included.

Electric, gas and sanitary services - establishments engaged in the generation, transmission and/or distribution of electricity, gas, or steam. Water and irrigation systems, and sanitary systems engaged in the collection, and disposal of garbage, sewage, and other wastes by means of destroying or processing meterials are also included.

Finance and credit - establishments engaged in extending credit in the form of loans, but not engaged in deposit banking. Also includes establishments engaged in the underwriting, purchase, sale, or brokerage of securities and other financial contracts on their own account or for the account of others.

Insurance - includes insurance carriers of all types, agents and brokers dealing in insurance and organizations rendering services to insurance carriers and to policy holders.

Churches and non-profit organizations - (Code used only in 1973) - includes civic, social, and fraternal organizations, churches, religious schools, and charitable organizations.

Other - includes four groups of businesses that are not elsewhere classified.

Fishing. hunting, and trapping - establishments engaged in commercial fishing and the operation of fish hatcheries, fish and game preserves, in commercial hunting and trapping, and in game propagation.

Forestry - establishments engaged in the operation of timber tracts, tree farms, forest nurseries, and related activities.

Holding and other investment offices - includes investment trusts, investment companies, holding companies, and commodity trading companies.

Mining - includes establishments engaged in the extraction of minerals occurring naturally, the exploration and development of mineral properties, and the quarrying, well operation, milling, and other preparation customarily done at the mine site, or as a part of mining activity.

#### APPENDIX B: DEFINITION OF CRIMES AND COMPOSITION OF INCIDENT CLASSIFICATION CODES

Burglary and Robbery are defined for the Commercial Victimization Survey as follows:

Burglary - any illegal entry into a building for the purpose of committing a crime. Burglary is not to be confused with larceny where the person has a right to be on the premises. Larcenies are not covered in the CVS.

Robbery - the act of taking something away from someone by force or threat of force. If an individual is not present during the incident it shall be considered a burglary.

The composition of the incident classification codes used in Ref. No. 161 is shown below. The numbers used to define the classification codes are the values required for the component variables, as documented in this User Directory by the reference numbers given.
