
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

NEBRASKA UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

Introduction

The Nebraska Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program involves the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime statistics reported by law enforcement agencies in the State in accordance with guides and regulations prescribed by law.

Historical Background

The Nebraska UCR program is a counterpart of the National UCR Program which is under the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The National Program, which came into existence in 1930, is celebrating its 50th anniversary in 1980. The Program was the result of a need for nationwide and uniform compilation of law enforcement statistics. The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police developed the Uniform Crime Reporting Program and Congress passed legislation on June 11, 1930, authorizing the FBI to act as the clearinghouse for crime information. Since that time, the number of law enforcement agencies participating in the Program has grown from 400 to 15,000.

In the late 1960's, with the availability of funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, the individual states began taking over the direct collection of the UCR's from the FBI. Nebraska began developing its state UCR Program in 1970 and became operational January 1, 1971. Commencing on that date all crime statistics flow through one central agency, the Crime Commission, before submission to the National UCR Program. The Commission publishes quarterly and annual reports on crime in Nebraska. As we approach the 10th anniversary for the Nebraska UCR Program, this Commission expresses sincere appreciation to those law enforcement agencies who have participated in the Program and we pledge to strive for improvement in the quality of the Program in the coming years.

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Uniform Crime Classifications

Uniformity of reporting depends upon the proper classification of offenses by the law enforcement agencies. The basic guidelines for classifying offenses are formulated by the Uniform Crime Reporting Section of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It must be emphasized that the following classifications are not meant to be legal definitions of offenses, in fact, the classifications may differ considerably, in some cases, from the legal definitions as they are written in the Nebraska Penal Code. The purpose of these classifications is to establish a uniform national system for classifying similar offenses even though their legal definitions may vary considerably from state to state.

Part I Offenses (Index Offenses)

- (1) Murder any unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present in the murder. Manslaughter any unlawful killing of a human being without the element of malice aforethought.
- (2) Rape -
 - (a) Rape by Force the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will, but excluding statutory rape and other sex offenses.
 - (b) Assault to Rape all assaults and attempts to rape.
- (3) Robbery the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will by violence or by putting him in fear. Robbery differs from larceny in that it is aggravated by the element of force.
- (4) Assault an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.

- (5) Burglary any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, burglary with larceny is classified and scored only as burglary; the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.
- (6) Larceny-Theft (Except Auto Theft) the unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. This involves all larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting, larceny from auto, larceny of auto parts and accessories, bicycle theft, larceny from buildings and larceny from any coin-operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or any theft that does not result from a breaking and entering is scored here. Embezzlements, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.
- (7) Motor Vehicle Theft larceny or attempted larceny of automobiles. All thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles are included. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Those incidents in which the alleged offender had unlawful access to the vehicle as in a family situation or the unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle such as chauffeur, employee, etc. are excluded.

Part II Offenses

- (8) Other Assaults (Misdemeanor).
- (9) Arson.
- (10) Forgery and Counterfeiting.
- (11) Fraud.
- (12) Embezzlement.
- (13) Stolen Property.
- (14) Vandalism-Destruction of Property.
- (15) Weapons.

- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized Vice.
- (17) Sex Offenses.
- (18) Drug Abuse Violations.
- (19) Gambling.
- (20) Offenses Against Family and Children.
- (21) Driving Under the Influence.
- (22) Liquor Laws with the exception of driving under the influence, all state or local liquor law violations are placed in this class.
- (23) Drunkenness decriminalized in Nebraska in 1979; not recorded as a UCR arrest category in 1979 and later.
- (24) Disorderly Conduct Disturbing the Peace.
- (25) Vagrancy.
- (26) All Other Offenses includes all violations of state and local laws not otherwise classified.
- (27) Suspicion limited to suspicion arrests when the persons arrested are later released by the police.
- (28) Curfew and Loitering Law Violations.
- (29) Runaways (Juveniles).

Crime Index

The extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in the State is measured by the crime index. The crime index is composed of the following offenses: murder/manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, felony assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft. Many categories of crime are not of sufficient importance to be included in the index; some serious crimes such as kidnapping do not occur with enough regularity to be meaningful in the index.

Clearances

For UCR purposes, an offense can be cleared by arrest or by exceptional means. An offense can be cleared by arrest when the offender is identified, there is enough evidence to charge him and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several offenses and several persons may

clear one offense. When some element beyond police control precludes formal charges against the offender, such as the victim's refusal to prosecute or death of the offender, an offense can be cleared by exceptional means. There is no distinction made between cleared by arrest and cleared by exceptional means in the publication.

Crime Rates

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to population. Estimates of current permanent population are used in computing crime rates. Crime rates allow for comparisons among several areas with different populations over a period of time without the information being biased by population differences. To compute a crime rate, first divide the population of the area by 100,000 and then divide the crime index by that answer. Crime rates per 1,000 and 100,000 population are used in this report.

Crime Factors

Statistics gathered under the UCR Program are law enforcement statistics. The agencies report the offense and arrest data according to the standard offense classifications and not according to state statutes or local ordinances. Offenses are related to municipality and county in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise dispose of the case. The clearance is attributed to the municipality or county in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon many characteristics of the community, and therefore, when attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and the factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors

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are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures among communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community. Below are some of the conditions which will by type and volume affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.

Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

Economic status of the population.

Relative stability of the population, include commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.

Climate, including seasonal weather changes.

Educational, recreational and religious characteristics.

Standards governing appointments to the police force.

Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.

Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.

The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

Caution should always be used when using the crime statistics presented herein, however, it should also be kept in mind that the data presented is the most accurate currently available. The law enforcement personnel who provide the data are to be commended for their efforts to provide accurate data. Without their cooperation, this publication would not be possible.

NEBRASKA CRIME TRENDS, 1971 - 1979

This report summarizes selected offense and arrest information from the Nebraska UCR Reporting Program for the period 1971 to 1979. The amount of data collected and compiled over these years is quite large, and no attempt has been made to review all of the information available. Annual UCR reports published by the Commission each year during this period, however, contain year-end summaries and descriptions of a much more detailed nature.

The focus of this report is on the seven Part I (Index) offenses (murder, rape, robbery, felony assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft) and the general characteristics of Part I and Part II arrests. More specifically, the data presented herein (unless otherwise noted) represent UCR information received only from those agencies which consistently reported as distinct agencies during the nine year period. That is, agencies that did not submit reports for one or more years are excluded from summaries of arrest and reported offense information for the entire period. The rationale for this approach is twofold:

- Changes in crime rates or frequencies over time are affected by the number of agencies that report crime information. For example, if 100 agencies reported in 1978 and 90 in 1979, the incidence of reported crime may change simply because fewer agencies are reporting crime. If the reported crime rate then decreased from 1978 to 1979, it does not imply that the actual crime rate decreased.
- 2. In order to provide a consistent estimate of changes in reported crime over time, it is necessary to record information from the <u>same</u> sources (agencies) over the time period. In this way, crime information is representative of the same group of agencies.

Because of factors such as law enforcement consolidation or simple non-reporting for certain years, not all Nebraska UCR reporting agencies are represented in this report. However, an average of more than 98% of reported crime and more than 92% of Nebraska's population is included over the period.

Sources of Data

All information in this report was compiled from UCR records maintained by the Uniform Crime Reporting Section of the Commission. Much of the data was summarized by computer, including individual agency reports on index offense and clearance trends from 1971 to 1979. Copies of these individual reports, sent to all reporting agencies, provide analyses specific to each jurisdiction, and although not included in this report, are available upon request. Estimates of the populations of agency jurisdictions and statewide totals are based on estimates provided by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Although these estimates may contain some error, they are the only consistently available population figures for all UCR reporting agencies during the period from 1971 to 1979.

Statewide Index Offense Rates, 1971-1979





FIGURE 1: INDEX TOTAL, PROPERTY, & VIOLENT CRIME RATES BY YEAR

Crime in Nebraska has steadily increased since 1971. The total index crime rate rose gradually from 1971 to 1979, from a low of 2,736 per 100,000 population in 1971 to 4,219 per 100,000 population in 1979. This represents a 54.2% increase in the total index crime rate from 1971 to 1979. Since property crime (burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft) comprised most of the total crime index, the property crime rate followed this general trend with a low of 2,569 per 100,000 population in 1971 and a high of 3,979 per 100,000 population in 1979 (a 54.9% increase). Violent crime (murder, rape, robbery, and felony assault) comprised a much smaller fraction of total index offenses, and, therefore, the violent crime rate over the period was much less, with a low of 168 per 100,000 population in 1971 and a high of 274 per 100,000 population in 1975. The violent crime rate in 1979 was 42.9% above that in 1971. Figure 1 illustrates the patterns of change in the index total, property, and violent crime rates over the period.

FIGURE 2: MURDER, RAPE, ROBBERY, & FELONY ASSAULT CRIME RATES BY YEAR




Violent crime rates showed a marked peak in the 1974 to 1976 period, as indicated in Figure 2. In 1979, the felony assault rate was 20.7% above the 1971 rate, the robbery rate increased 100.3%, the rape rate increased 53.3%, and the murder rate increased 63.5%.

The largest year-to-year percent change in the crime rates for felony assault, robbery, and rape all occurred from 1973 to 1974: felony assault rates increased 22.3%, robbery 46.0%, and ape 18.6%. The murder rate exhibited the largest yearly percent increase (41.1%) from 1972 to 1973.

Crime rates for individual property crimes are presented in Figure 3. Larceny-theft and burglary rates showed a steady increase over the nine year period, while the motor vehicle theft rate peaks in 1973 at 322.5 per 100,000 population. Crime rates for larceny-theft and burglary were the highest of any year in 1979; 2,835 per 100,000 and 854.1 per 100,000, respectively. The 1979 rate for larceny-theft was 65.4% above the 1971 rate, while the 1979 rate for burglary was 47.6% higher than the corresponding 1971 rate. There was a 4.7% increase in the motor vehicle theft rate in 1979 over 1971.


The larceny-theft rate showed the largest year-to-year percent change (21.9%) from 1973 to 1974, burglary had the largest year-to-year increase (23.3%) during the same period, and motor vehicle theft exhibited the greatest percentage rate change (25.9%) from 1978 to 1979.

Statewide Index Offense Frequencies, 1971-1979

Figure 4 illustrates the relative frequencies of murder, rape, robbery, and felony assault over the period 1971 to 1979. The height of the bar for each year represents the total number of violent crimes, while segments within the bars indicate the frequencies of murder, rape, robbery, and felony assault relative to each other. Robbery and felony assault comprised a larger proportion of total violent crime in 1974 and 1975 than in any other year. In addition, the largest number of violent crimes was recorded in 1975, when felony assault and murder reached their highest levels of the entire period. As in Figure 2, there was a distinct rise in the total number of violent crimes from 1971 to 1975, with a declining trend from 1976 to 1978, followed by an increase in 1979. Compared to 1971, the number of murders in 1979 rose 75.0%, the number of rapes rose 62.1%, the number of robberies rose 112.3% and the number of felony assaults increased 27.9%.








FIGURE 5: RELATIVE FREQUENCIES OF BURGLARY, LARCENY-THEFT, & MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT BY YEAR



The total number of property crimes, as depicted in Figure 5 generally follows the trend of violent crimes shown in Figure 4. That is, the total number of property crimes rose each year from 1971 to 1975, declined through 1976 to 1978, and was followed by an increase over the previous year in 1979. The number of larceny-thefts rose more than the other property crimes over the nine year interval, from a low of 23,347 in 1971 to 41,065 in 1979, a 75.1% increase. In 1979, the number of burglaries was 56.2% higher than in 1971, and the number of motor vehicle thefts had increased 10.9% over 1971. Contrary to the violent crime total, which peaked in 1975, the largest number of property crimes was recorded in 1979; more motor vehicles thefts, burglaries, and larceny-thefts were recorded in 1979 than in any other year.

A breakdown of state total index offenses by population category and year is contained in Figure 6. For each year in the period 1971 to 1979, the figure depicts the percentage of total index offenses reported in each population group. County sheriffs' departments and state agencies (Nebraska State Patrol and University of Nebraska - Lincoln Campus Police Department) are considered separate groups. Although Omaha (over 250,000) accounts for the largest percentage of index offenses, its proportion of all index offenses has been steadily decreasing since 1973. The proportion of all index offenses reported in cities with population of 5,000 to 100,000, however, has been slowly increasing since 1973. A more detailed offense, clearance, and population breakdown is contained in Table B of the Appendix.

Statewide total data for each of the seven index offenses, population estimates, and clearance frequencies are presented in Table 1. The percentage of index offenses cleared has remained fairly stable from 1973 to 1979; the average clearance percentage over the period was 23.2%. Table A of the Appendix presents the same information for all agencies that reported in a given year, i.e., it includes data from all UCR reporting agencies, regardless of whether or not the agency reported each year during the period. Thus, Table A of the Appendix represents all index offense and clearance information reported from 1971 to 1979, but is not consistently representative across the period due to the irregularity of reporting by some agencies. Table D of the Appendix contains a listing of all UCR agencies which have contributed reports one or more years during the 1971-1979 period.

Statewide Arrest Data, 1971 - 1979

Under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program an arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, summoned, notified or cited. When a person under 18 years of age commits an offense, and the circumstances are such that if the offender were an adult an arrest would be made, the offender is counted as an arrest by the reporting agency.

For reporting purposes, one arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, regardless of the number of charges placed against him. If an individual is arrested more than once during the year, an arrest is counted each time. When several persons are arrested in connection with the same offense, each is counted as an arrest.

It should be noted that arrest practices and emphasis on certain crimes vary from place to place. Each reporting agency is responsible for reporting arrests made by the State Patrol in its jurisdiction.

The total arrest trends for Part I and Part II offenses over the 1971-1979 period are shown in Figure 7. The arrest frequency for Part II arrests was greatest in 1977. The frequency during this peak year was 9.1% higher than in 1971. In the two years following 1977, the Part II arrest frequencies dropped fairly rapidly. In 1979 the Part II arrest frequency was 6.5% below the 1971 value. 1979 was the first year in which there were fewer Part II arrests than in 1971. The peak year for Part I arrests was 1979 with a frequency value 60.1% higher than in 1971. This difference is due in large part to the rapid increase in Part I arrests from 1972 to 1974. These figures are based on arrests made by only those agencies which reported consistently from 1971 to 1979. The arrest frequencies for these agencies are listed in Table 2. Table C of the Appendix contains arrest frequency data for all agencies which reported during any year.

FIGURE 7: TOTAL ARRESTS FOR PART I AND PART II OFFENSES BY YEAR







FIGURE 9: BURGLARY, LARCENY-THEFT, & MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT ARREST FREQUENCIES BY YEAR

Individual Part I arrest frequencies are presented in Figures 8 and 9. The arrest frequencies for each index offense closely parallel the corresponding offense data for the period illustrated in Figures 2 and 3 and Table 1. Index offense arrest frequencies show a general peak in the years from 1974 to 1976, followed by a gradual decline, and then an upswing in 1979.

Felony assault arrests increased rapidly from 1971 to a peak of 778 in 1976, a 38.1% increase. Robbery arrests had an even steeper trend, from a low of 197 in 1971 to 556 in 1975, a 182% increase. Murder arrests increased 158% and rape arrests rose 13.5% from 1971 to 1979.

Larceny-theft arrests during the period increased more than arrests for other property crimes, 76% from 1971 to 1979, although the number of burglary and motor vehicle theft arrests followed the same trend.

FIGURE 8: MURDER, RAPE, ROBBERY, & FELONY ASSAULT ARREST FREQUENCIES BY YEAR

Characteristics of Arrestees





FIGURE 11: PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL PART I ARRESTS INVOLVING ADULTS AND JUVENILES BY YEAR 1

Age, sex, and race information concerning arrestees is presented in Tables 3, 4, 5 and 6, and Figures 10 and 11. Although there are few marked differences from year to year in these characteristics, the data do provide general information on the age, sex, and race characteristics of arrestees. It should be noted that the tabular and graphic information in this section is based (with two exceptions) on the total data available in a given year. That is, it was not possible, for these analyses, to extract only those agencies which reported each and every year; therefore, these figures are based on all agencies which reported in any year. The exceptions to this case are Figure 10 and Table 3; information therein represents data from agencies that reported consistently each year from 1971 to 1979.

FIGURE 10: TOTAL PART I AND PART II ARRESTS FOR JUVENILES AND ADULTS BY YEAR




