This edition of this periodic report is the first to combine both death sentencing information and current death row occupancy information concerning crimes committed by juveniles. Both the juvenile death sentencing rate and the juvenile death row population remain very small in comparison to that for adults, each being around 1% to 2% of the totals. However, attention to this narrow slice of the capital punishment issue remains high among lawmakers, the courts, the research community, and the media, suggesting a symbolic importance far transcending the very small number of juveniles involved.

For purposes of consistency, a juvenile crime is defined as one committed while the offender was under age eighteen, the most common age jurisdictional dividing line between juvenile and criminal courts. A juvenile death penalty is one imposed for a juvenile crime. These definitions render irrelevant the age of the offender when convicted or sentenced or the offender's current age. Also ignored is any individual state's particular age jurisdictional dividing line between juvenile and criminal courts. Therefore, even if a state (e.g., Texas) considers 17-year-olds to be adults and not juveniles, these offenders are listed as juveniles in this report.

HISTORICAL AND CONSTITUTIONAL BACKGROUND:

Actual execution of such condemned juveniles began in 1642 (Thomas Graunger, Massachusetts) and ended temporarily in 1964 (James Echols, Texas). Juvenile executions began again on September 11, 1985, with the execution of Charles Rumbaugh in Texas. On January 10, 1986, South Carolina executed James Terry Roach; on May 15, 1986, Texas executed Jay Kelly Pinkerton; and on May 18, 1990, Louisiana executed Dalton Prejean. Rumbaugh, Roach, Pinkerton, and Prejean were all age seventeen at the time of their crimes but were in their mid-twenties to early thirties when finally executed. From 1642 to the present, approximately 283 persons have been executed for juvenile crimes. For a complete history of this practice, please see V. STREIB, DEATH PENALTY FOR JUVENILES (Bloomington, IN: Indiana University Press, 1987).

The constitutionality of the juvenile death penalty has been the subject of intensive lititgation in recent years. 29, 1988, the United States Supreme Court decided Thompson v. (487 U.S. 815 (1988)), dealing with constitutionality of imposing the death penalty on an offender who was only fifteen years old at the time of the crime. holding in Thompson was somewhat fractured, with the fragile coalition majority of five justices resting their conclusions on fairly different premises and analyses. The combined effect of the opinions by Justice Stevens and Justice O'Connor in Thompson is to draw a minimum age line at sixteen for the death penalty. No state without a minimum age line in their death penalty statute can go below age sixteen without violating Thompson, and in fact no state with a minimum age line in its death penalty statute uses an age less than sixteen.

On June 26, 1989, almost exactly one year after the <u>Thompson</u> decision, the Court decided <u>Stanford v. Kentucky</u> (109 S.Ct. 2969 (1989)). A different but no less fragile coalition of five justices held here that the Eighth Amendment does not prohibit the death penalty for crimes committed at age sixteen or seventeen regardless of state statutory provisions.

Combining the Court's rulings in <u>Thompson</u> and <u>Stanford</u>, the constitutionally mandated minimum age for the death penalty is now age sixteen at crime. Although half of the death penalty states have no such express minimum age provision in their statutes, those states nonetheless must follow this constitutional standard and presumably will soon be amending their statutes accordingly. This legal premise apparently is being challenged by a trial court in Baldwin County, Alabama, which on February 23, 1990, sentenced Clayton Joel Flower to death for a crime committed at age fifteen.

JUVENILE DEATH SENTENCES IMPOSED:

The current American death penalty system began when new death penalty statutes were passed beginning in the Fall of 1972. These statutes followed the United States Supreme Court's decision in <u>Furman v. Georgia</u>, 408 U.S. 238, on June 29, 1972, which in effect struck down all then existing death penalty statutes. Sentencing began under the new statutes in 1973 and continues through today. While some of these post-<u>Furman</u> statutes have undergone minor and sometimes major challenges, most have endured relatively unchanged, making them and the sentences under them the legal structure for our current death penalty system.

While some uncertainty exists as to the precise number of death sentences imposed in the early years of this period, Table 1 on the next page lists the sentences imposed each year according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics and to my research. A total of 102 juvenile death sentences have been imposed since 1973, only 2.4% of the total of the approximately 4,304 death sentences imposed for offenders of all ages. Two-thirds of these juvenile death sentences have been imposed on 17-year-old offenders, the other third on offenders ages 16 and 15, and none on offenders age 14 or younger at the time of their crimes.

The rate of juvenile death sentencing fluctuated considerably in the early years of this current era but has settled into a consistent annual rate of about 2% of total death sentences since 1983. The only blip in this pattern occurred in 1987 to 1989. The juvenile death sentencing rate dropped considerably during those years, presumably deterred by the cases pending before the Supreme Court at the time. The rate appears to have returned to normal now that those cases have been decided and the issue largely has been left up to each individual state to decide.

Appendix A to this report (pp. 5-8) provides a more detailed listing of name, age, race, gender, state, and current status for each case. While the sources of this information are many, the major sources are the outstanding research effort of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc. (particularly their newsletter, <u>Death Row, U.S.A.</u>) and the equally fine monitoring effort of the National Coalition for the Abolition of the Death Penalty. However, the data from 1973 through the early 1980s may not be as complete as those for more recent years. This data compilation effort has always been and it appears will always be "research in progress," so recipients of this report are asked to complement this research with any corrections, additions, and deletions which they might be able to provide.

CURRENT DEATH ROW INMATES UNDER JUVENILE DEATH SENTENCES

As of February 1, 1991, 31 persons are on death row under death sentences received for juvenile crimes. These 31 condemned juveniles constitute only 1.3% of the total death row population of 2,412. Although all were age 17 or younger at the time of their crimes, their current ages range from 18 to 32. They are under death sentences in 12 different states and have been on death row from 2 weeks to over 12 years.

All 31 juveniles offenders now on death row are male and were convicted and sentenced to death for murder. The demographic characteristics of the 31 juveniles and their 38 victims are outlined in Table 2.

Nearly three-quarters of these cases involved 17-year-old offenders, with race being evenly split between white and minority offenders. In contrast, over 90% of the victims were adults with nearly a quarter being over age 50. Three-quarters of the victims were white and a majority were females. Thus, the typical juvenile death penalty case is the 17-year-old white or black male who kills an older white female.

Appendix B to this report (pp. 9-11) sets forth the names of these offenders and some brief details about their crimes and sentences. Multiple sentencing dates mean that the earlier death sentence was reversed but then a new death sentence was imposed.
