

F O R E W O R D

This revised edition of our Community Resources Handbook has been designed to provide concise and pertinent information on social service programs helpful to defendants in the criminal justice system. Hopefully, criminal justice practitioners, particularly defense lawyers, paralegal workers and, of course, judges, will be able to use this information to develop community-based alternatives to incarceration in appropriate cases.

This handbook is not intended to provide an exhaustive list of social service agencies in New York City. Other resource manuals are available for that purpose. Our goal has been to summarize our staff's six years of experience in day-to-day work with defendants by capsulizing significant information about programs we frequently use. Most of the agencies listed here are unique among social service providers in that they are familiar with the special needs of defendants, the procedures and demands of the courts, and the concerns of various other parties in criminal cases. Consequently, they are especially able to be of assistance to practitioners in this field.

The staff of Special Defender Services deserves credit for the information presented here. Their work with clients of the Legal Aid Society was the basis for this handbook and the final measure of what was included in the listings. Ms. Rosalind Lichter, who directed Special Defender Services for six years, conceived and initiated this project; the stamp of her leadership is present throughout the contents. three months, to a maximum of six months. The program's aim is to provide support and assistance in the skills of daily living in preparation for return to the community.

Comment: This is a 4-12 week inpatient program. Patients must attend Alcoholics Anonymous meetings. Services offered include GED preparation, job training, group and supportive therapy, and medical evaluation. The staff will make referrals to aftercare facilities and maintains a social service network to help graduates with finances, housing, etc. The program is for Bronx residents, but exceptions may be made. A good program, which is interested only in genuinely motivated clients.

Kirby offers the only in-hospital bilingual program for Spanish speaking clients in the state. After client graduates, he or she is referred for outpatient care or to a halfway house in the city. The program is not interested in patients

who are only there because the alternative is jail. They also will not service psychotic or non-ambulatory patients.
