ALTERNATIVE PROBATION STRATEGIES IN BALTIMORE, MARYLAND (ICPSR 8355)

The purpose of this study was to assess the relative cost effectiveness of supervised probation, unsupervised probation, and community service. Data were collected from several sources: input-intake forms used by the State of Maryland, probation officers' case record files, Maryland state police rap sheets, FBI sources, and from interviews with Maryland probationers. Non-violent, less serious offenders who normally received probation sentences of 12 months or less were offered randomly selected assignments to one of three treatment methods over a five-month period. Baseline data for probationers in each of the three samples were drawn from an intake form which is routinely completed for cases. An interim assessment of recidivism was made at the midpoint of the intervention for each probationer using information drawn from police records. Probationers were interviewed at a point six months and twelve months after probation ended.

This study was conducted by the Research Triangle Institute under a grant (#81-IJ-CX-0005) provided by the National Institute of Justice. The study contains eight files. The logical record lengths of the first four files are 147, 87, 24, 17 characters while the remaining four files have lengths of 80 characters each. Class IV

## A. INTRODUCTION AND DESCRIPTION OF FILES

The eight Maryland Probation Study files described in this codebook record data from input-intake forms used by the State of Maryland, probation officers' case record files, Maryland State Police rap sheets, FBI sources, and from interviews with the Maryland probationers. Appendix A contains the manual used by Maryland State Police in completing the input-intake form. The codebook for the input-intake file refers to this manual for some variables. Appendix B contains a copy of the case record data abstraction form used at the Research Triangle Institute to code data from case record files. The top half of the form was generated from variables already contained on the input-intake forms. Those variables are not included again in the case record codebook. Appendix C contains a copy of the followup survey instrument used in the four rounds of the interview. Rounds 1 and 3 are the first set of interviews. Rounds 2 and 4 are the later set of interviews with round 2 being the second interview for those included in round 1 and round 4 being the second interview for those included in round 3. Since there were only very minor modifications in the survey, just one general codebook is given for all four rounds with the differences in coding practices clearly marked at each item. The RTIID identification variable uniquely identifies each of the 371 probationers in the study and is consistent across all files.

## INTRODUCTION

This manual is designed to provide brief instructions which enable completion of the Case Record Intake-Input Form (Form Number 53). The manual is intentionally brief and includes instructions considered necessary for form completion. In most cases, relevant but unnecessary narrative concerning data elements has been omitted.

The purposes of the Intake-Input Form is to open a case in the Division of Parole and Probation (in the Field Office and data systems) as rapidly as possible.

Form 53 makes the following forms obsolete:

- 1) New Case Record Input Form (Form No. 50 and Manual)
- 2) Probation Intake Form (revised Form No. 11)
- 3) Payment Case Intake Form (Form No. 35-5M)
- 4) Fines, Costs and Restitution Forms

The following general instructions are essential to the "case number" and numbered data elements, which will be entered into the computer:

- 1) USE UPPER CASE BLOCKED LETTERS
- 2) FILL IN ALL BLOCKED DATA ELEMENTS (with the exception of (a) "Payment Information", which is not entered into the computer and (b) the "modifier only" block in the offense code - element # 46, which is used appropriately as instructed on pages 11 - 12) WITH THE APPROPRIATE INFORMATION
- 3) PAROLE CASES NEED ONLY FILL OUT THE DATA SYSTEM BLOCKED ELEMENTS,

Data elements are listed in their order of appearance on the Intake-Input Form. Changes to data elements are described and explained in the Case Record Change section.

In any situation where form completion procedures are questionable or uncertain, it is strongly advised to check the appropriate information in the Manual.

To expedite locating needed information the various computer-related data elements are numbered at the bottom of the page on which they appear in addition to the Index.
